He was Vocational Agriculture Advisor and teacher here for 18 years before accepting the high school principal's position at Jim Ned in Tuscola, Texas this current school year. Jerry, some times known as "slick" or "Mr. Chromedome", had had an immeasurable influence on the lives of hundreds of Abernathy young people. 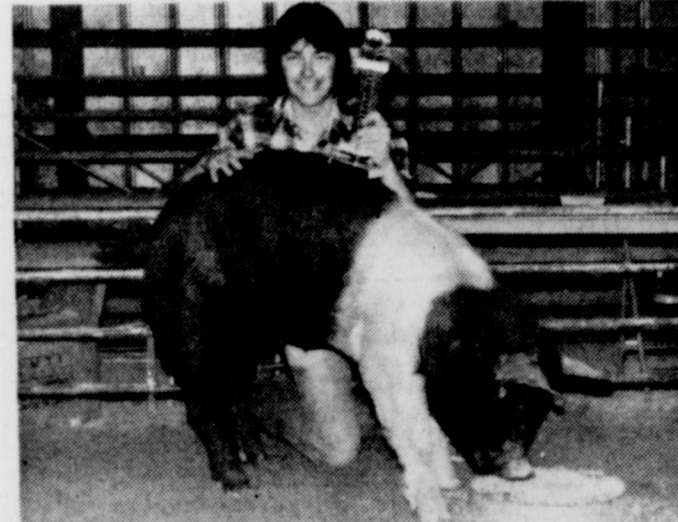

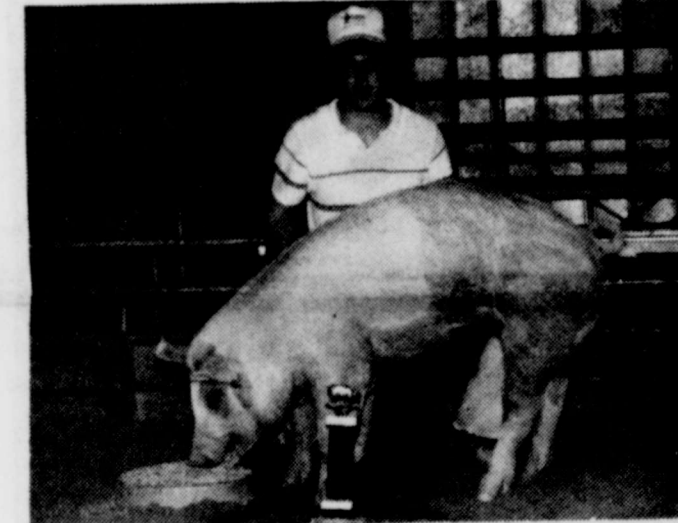

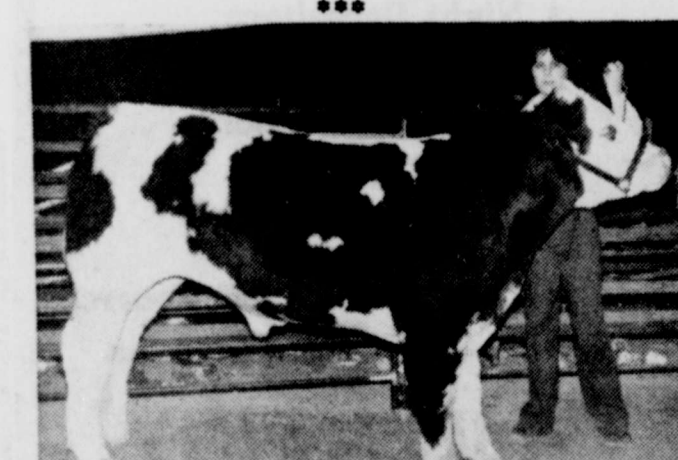

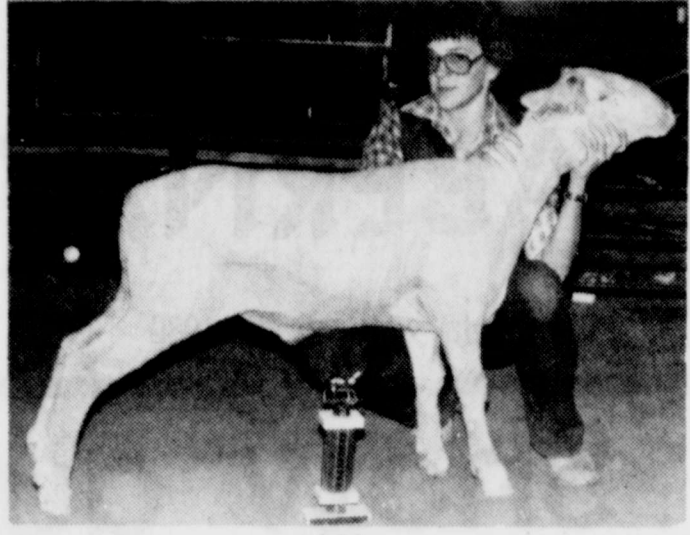

Prather feels that he can bring a new, fresh outlook to the school board. He feels that Abernathy has a good school system but that with the people of the community working together, our schools can be even better.

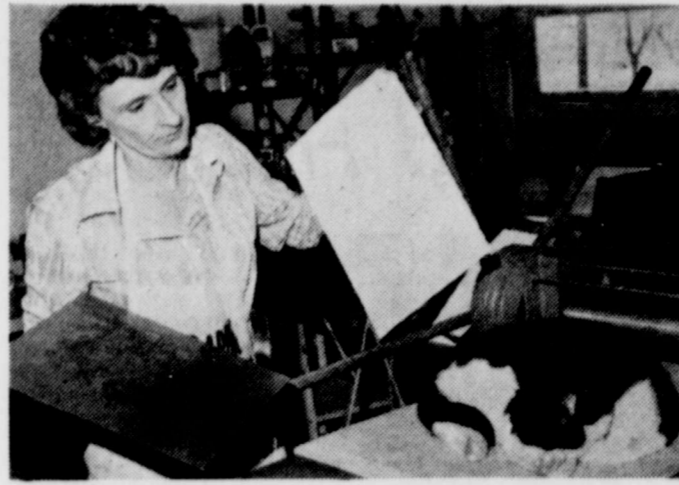
He hopes to represent our community by serving in order to continue to provide the best possible education for our young people in the best possible environment.

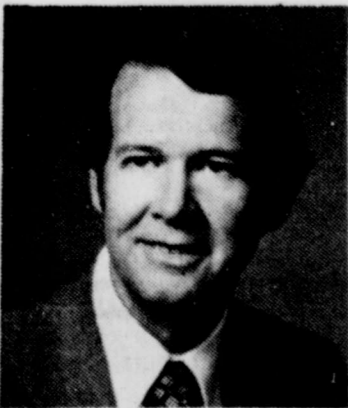

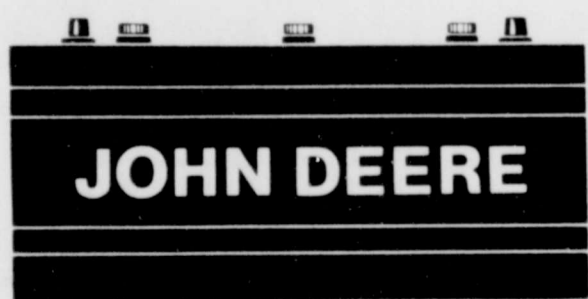

### Your Scouts And ERA

Some comments have been made regarding the National Girl Scout Council's stand on the ERA and in some ways I feel that it has weakened local support of the Girl Scout program in Abernathy. I would like to state my feelings on the subject and possibly clear up some misconceptions.

First--the scout program is what is happening in each of our local troops. It is what the leaders and girls in Abernathy make it, not some stand that National takes on an issue.

Second--Money earned for cookie sales does not go to National. It is used entirely to build and maintain our local established camp at Crosbyton. It also is used to buy equipment for girls to go troop camping. Each troop also receives a percentage of the total sales to aid in maintaining and financing their activities. So when you refuse to buy cookies that is your privilege, but don't think you are hurting National by not contributing to their cause, you are hurting your Abernathy girls who had nothing to do with ERA.

We are interested in girls becoming aware of values--values such as are stated in the Promise and Law. We want to provide opportunities for learning and growing and experiencing the joys of the self awareness that scouting provides.

I speak for myself and other leaders in Abernathy when I say that we aim high to provide good programs for girls and encourage them to make decisions on these programs. We need your local support and resources to provide the best. They are the program and the issue and each of you contribute to its progress and theirs either negatively or positively. They aren't into ERA--they are only girls into "growing up", and that is a wonderful experience Girl Scouting is an opportunity for adults and parents to work together with these girls to set common goals and values and bridge the gap between the "growing up" years and adulthood. It is a growing and learning experience for all who are willing to share, no matter what age. Nothing can compare with the thrill that you share with each girl the first time she cooks a meal on a campfire and the delight of how wonderful it tastes, or the first time she lies out at night under the open sky and views the breathtaking beauty of the stars in the heaven.

I appreciate the opportunity to serve and do it because the girls make it worthwhile. The Promise and Law are what we stand for and not ERA. Nationals stand on ERA will not change my dedication to these girls and the advantages that are available to them through a scouting program in this community. It has so many good things to offer girls and I feel very proud to be a part of it.

I would like to conclude with this: I am only one of several women in this community that is proud to be affiliated with the Girl Scout program. They are all busy homemakers and mothers active in church and community affairs and most hold full or part time jobs. But they like myself are very interested in our girls and would not be giving their time so freely if they did not believe in the scouting program. Maybe you should get to know your local program better. I challenge you to get involved and form your own opinions. The Girl Scout Promise: On my honor, I will try: To serve God, My country and mankind, and to live by the Girl Scout Law.

The Girl Scout Law: I will do my best: to be honest to be fair to help where I am needed to be cheerful to be friendly and considerate to be a sister to every Girl Scout to respect authority to use resources wisely to protect and improve the world around me to show respect for myself and others through my words and actions.
