

SOUTHWEST CORN BORER SURVEY

The southwestern corn borer is alive and well on the High Plains. We at Palmer and Associates have recently been surveying random tilled and untilled corn fields east of Plainview to the Olton-Hart area to determine degrees of winter survival for southwestern corn borer. Winter survival is a good indicator of predicting the potential prob-lem with this pest for the

1980 corn growing season. The larval stage overwinters in the base of the corn stubble crown which may be three to five inches below the soil surface if left untilled. The soil and corn stalk surrounding the larvae offer an excellent overwintering site due to the insulation effect. Fields of corn followed by wheat are even more conducive since the beds are reshaped, pushing more soil around the corn stubble.

Our survey included three tillage situations untilled and grazed:untilled, rebedded and sown with wheat; and properly tilled corn stubble. In the first situation, there was a thirty to fifty percent survival rate of overwintering larvae. The second type yielded thirty-five to fifty percent surviving borers. Properly tilled stubble showed no signs of overwintering borers. Tilling pulls the stubble above ground, releases soil adhering to the plant crown and decreases the insulating effect on the larval overwintering habitat. weather is a natural controlling agent for these over-

wintering larvae.
While conducting our we discovered evidence of pupation. The pupae is the transformation stage from the overwintering larvae to the adult. What this suggests is early emergence of the moth this year; possibly as early as May 1. The Olton-Plainview area has an average emergence date of June 1 as seen from this same survey in past years.

The bottom line for this survey's results is that 1980 corn adjacent to these high overwintering populations could have economically damaging and early first generation borer infestations. High densities of first generation larvae can be very detrimental and may result in "dead heart". caused by consumption or disruption of the meristematic tissue (growing point) inside the whirl. Young corn may be killed or fruiting greatly reduced due to this type of injury.

Manipulation of plantngs dates has been very helpful in the past to lessen the severity of first generation borers and subsequently reduce the attractiveness of corn to borers throughout the remainder of the season. Corn planted as early in March as possible up to, and no later than, April 7 will reduce attractiveness since the corn plants will be more mature and less succulent at times of high borer density. Also, the more mature corn will be better able to resist infestation leading to a reduced need for chemical control, an important cost factor in corn production. Lodging of infested plants, if it does occur, delayed until around September 15. Corn should be harvested by this date which allows a margin of safety before lodging can occur.

Cash receipts from beef totaled \$4.1 billion while cotton receipts hit the \$1.6 billion mark. Total livestock receipts are esti-mated at \$5.3 billion while the crop sector added cash receipts of \$3.9 billion. Agriculturally related areas such as timber, hunting, fishing and horses added another \$474 million.



Tax Pamplet Is Available At New Deal City Hall

Patty Pledger, tax assesor-collector for the city of New Deal, today announced the availability of a new 12-page pamphlet which may help local residents save on their property taxes.

According to Patty explains how the property tax system in Texas operates, and highlights possible tax savings available to citizens. The publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with Senate Bill 621, passed by the Texas Legisl-

ature in 1979

Information in the pamphlet is applicable to property taxes collected by all levels of local government, including counties cities and school districts. Patty Pledger noted that homeowners are eligible for a \$2,000,000 city home-

stead exemption from the value of their property. Additionally, owners of agricultural land have the option of having such property taxed at its productive rather than market value.

April 30th, 1980 is the rendition deadline for the city of New Deal, and Patty Pledger urged citizens to render their property and apply for exemptions or productivity values for which they may qualify before that

THINGS A VOTER NEEDS TO KNOW Did you know? No one including election officials can find out how you voted, and you can vote your convictions without fear of reprisal.

Did you know? The place system means a candidate must receive over 50% of the votes of in order to win. Run-offs between candidates will now be possible. Did you know? The school board president is not elected by the general **public.** This office is filled by a vote of the school board members at a board meeting following the public election. Local custom, however, dictates that the member who has served longest on the board is elected to the presidency.
