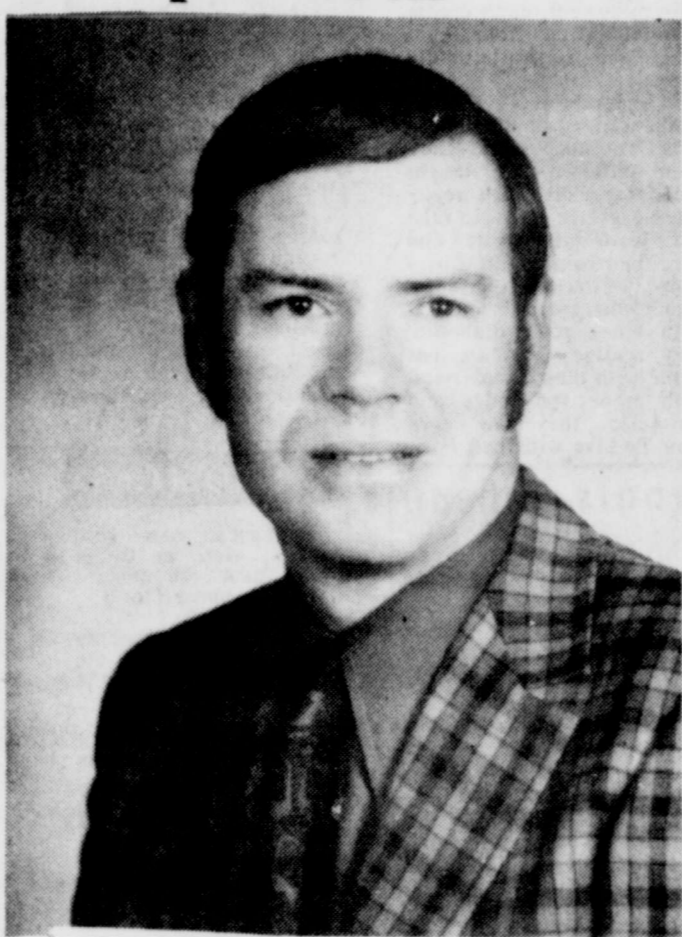
Sharla Griffin Wins 1st In District Golf

Regulations On Jr. High School As A Storm Shelter

1. The weather warning and observation plan for the city of Abernathy provides three types of warnings:

1. **TORNADO WATCH**-the area roped off by Kansas City to warn of the possibility that tornadoes could occur in this area for certain time period.

2. **TORNADO WARNING**-this warning is given by the National Weather Service when a tornado is sighted and confirmed and is a threat to an immediate area or city.

3. **HAIL WARNING**-this warning is given when hail is possible for a given area or city.

II. Mr. Charles Bowen and Mr. Gary Stalcup of the Abernathy Civil Defense Team will be stationed at the Junior High school and will open the building when a tornado warning is issued. Other administrators will have a key and their names and phone numbers will be listed with the Civil Defense officers in case of an emergency.

The building will be opened only for a warning--when a tornado is sighted or confirmed by members of the Civil Defense working with the National Weather Service and is a threat to the immediate area or city.

REGULATIONS

A. Only the downstairs area will be opened.

B. Classrooms will not be opened until corridor and mail area is full--approximately 300 persons.

C. The administrative area will be opened for radio, communications, and for sick room facilities and will be OFF LIMITS to the general public.

D. NO PETS will be allowed under any circumstances.

E. Smoking will be permitted only in designated areas.

F. Food will not be taken into carpeted areas.

G. All occupants will be subject to rules and regulations of regular Civil Defense authorities.

H. The school and school authorities will not be liable for the safety or protection of an individual or his possessions.

I. Occupants entering the downstairs area will be expected to remain there during the warning period.

J. All persons are expected to park in designated areas leaving the street clear, and enter the shelter at the east entrance.

K. It is advisable for occupants to bring battery operated lights. The building is equipped with minimum emergency lights in the event there is a total electric failure.

CITIZENS ARE URGED TO COME TO THE DESIGNATED PARKING AREA DURING ANY CONCERN OF A WATCH PERIOD. HOWEVER, THE BUILDING WILL NOT BE OPENED UNTIL THERE IS AN ACTUAL WARNING.

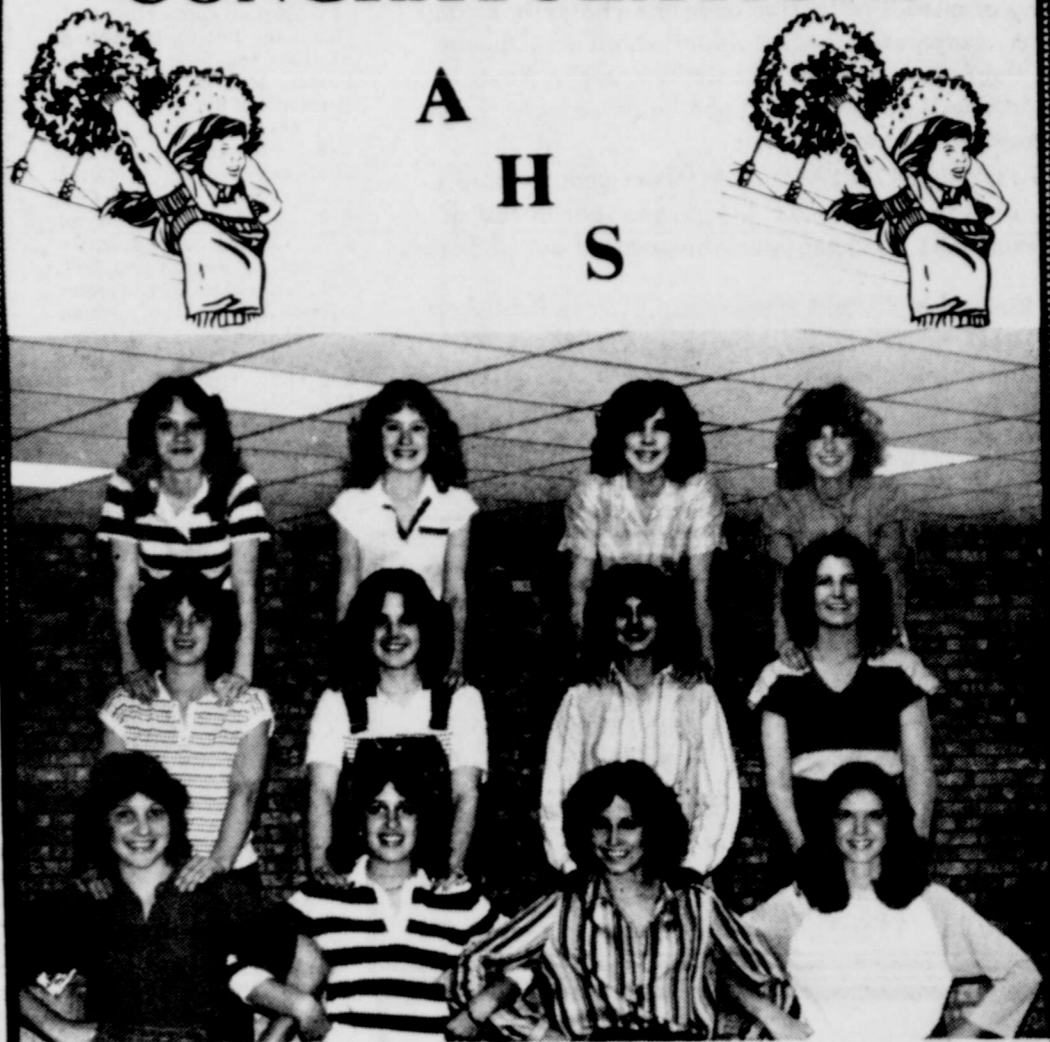
If a warning comes during school hours, adults will be admitted after all children are in areas of safety.

Largest Vote Turn Out Record Here Sat.

In what is believed to be the largest voter turn-out ever recorded in Abernathy, last Saturday's elections drew 637 voters in the city council race and 825 in the school board balloting.

Incumbents Jerry Givens, 489 votes, Charles Nelson with 445, and Harold Stillwell with 470, were all returned to their posts on the city council, beating out three other candidates, Carl Johnson, Jerry C. Adams and Lamar McKenzie. Johnson garnered 300 votes, while Adams had 51 and McKenzie 74.

Holdovers include Mayor Peter Thompson and Councilmen Hoppy Toler and Harold

Thompson.

A run-off in the school board race for Place 1 will be featured between incumbent Don McKenzie, who gained 350 votes, and runner-up Laurin W. Prather with 311. Also challenging McKenzie was L. A. Johnson with 158 votes.

For Place 3, incumbent Billie Harrison was defeated by Charles (Bud) Rhodes. Rhodes received 482 votes to Harrison's 337.

There were 28 write-in votes.

Holdover trustees are Bob Riley, David Pinson, Daniel Fondy, Richard Howard and Jerry Oswalt.

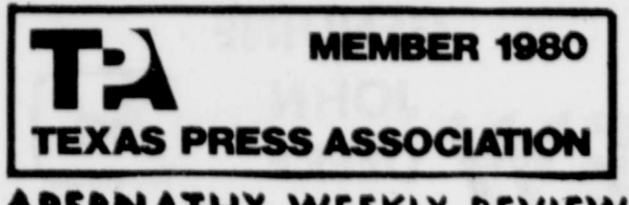

Tips For Rookie Tomato Growers

COLLEGE STATION--- Growing a few tomato plants can be a fascinating and rewarding venture, or it can be frustrating.

If you're growing tomatoes for the first time, a few pointers can help you avoid some common pitfalls, says Dr. Sam Cotner, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System.

First, don't grow tomatoes unless you have an area that receives sunlight for at least six hours during the day.

Next, good soil is a must. Oftentimes, garden soil is poor but can be improved with the right amount of organic matter and fertilizer.

Select a variety of tomatoes with the maximum resistance to common diseases, advised Cotner. Bonus, Big Set, Better Boy, Spring Giant and Floramerica all carry multiple disease resistance to most common diseases.

Buy short, stocky, young plants. Select plants four to six inches tall and about as wide.

If plants are in peat pots or peat blocks, do not remove them, says the horticulturist. Set the plants deeply into the ground with the top of the peat pot or peat material container below the surface. Plant them into well-prepared soil and water thoroughly immediately after transplanting.

When tomatoes start blooming, begin a weekly dust or spray program to prevent insects and diseases that are common in Texas gardens.

Stake, trellis or cage tomato plants for best results, adds Cotner. Any method is good if it keeps fruit off the ground to prevent rotting.
