Richard Howard was unanimously elected president of the Board of Trustees of the Abernathy Independent School District at the regular meeting on May 5, 1980.

After the invocation and approval of the minutes of the previous meeting, the votes of the run-off election were canvassed. The results were declared official with Mr. Laurin Prather receiving 448 votes and Mr. Don McKenzie receiving 348 votes of a total of 802 votes cast.

The oath of Office was administered to Bud Rhodes and Laurin Prather. The board then elected Richard Howard president, Bob Riley, vice president, David Pison, secretary and Daniel Fondy, vice secretary.

A gift of \$750 was accepted from the Abernathy booster club for the athletic fund. The board granted permission to the booster club to have an outsiders basketball tournament on May 12, 13, 15 and 16th.

Fire and Extended Coverage insurance bids were not opened at this meeting due to a discrepancy in the specification schedule. New bids have been requested to be submitted on May 19th.

Lawn Services of the Southwest was awarded the low bid of \$3,050 for hydromulching of the football field for approximately 95,000 square feet. Other bidders were: West Texas Turf and Nursery, West Texas Hydromulch and Wilcox Lawn Service of Lubbock.

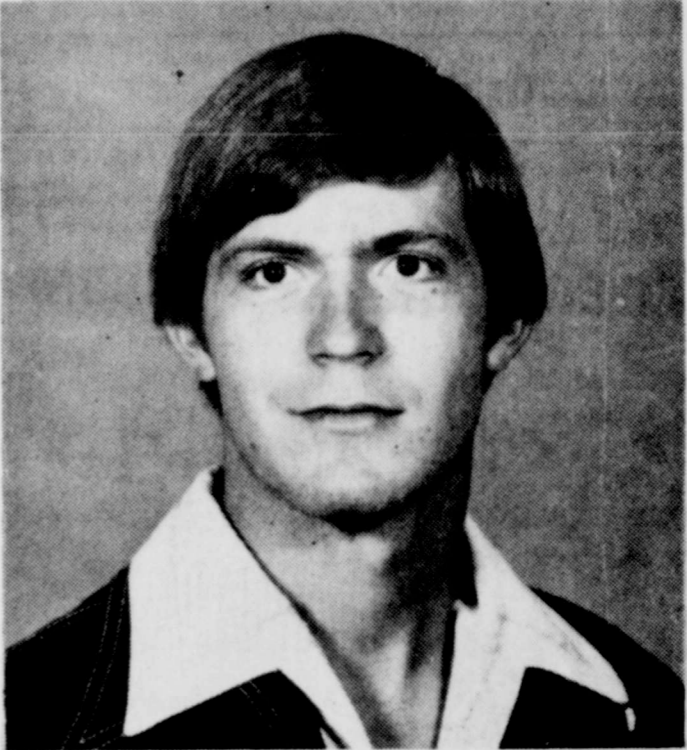
Letter From Former Abernathy Resident

Then my thoughts jumped to the time we came to central Arizona a little over ten years ago. Summarizing the beauty of the three places in all its seasons, and recalling the many good and true friends made in each community and area, we suddenly were struck as if by a bolt of lightning, that in almost every case, the friends we made who were fast and true were almost totally the old-timers of those areas!

That is not to say we haven't found some good friends in recent days, or weeks we mean the pioneers of those communities, with many years residence in the three different kinds of communities, were the ones who seemed to us to be truly and solidly honest, neighborly and interested in our welfare and our learning to like the area as they had learned to love it.

Names we recall of sturdy supporters during trying times are names from sturdy stock of several nationalities--all bonded together as were their pioneer neighbors in caring about how we fared in good times or bad--like blizzardy winters, months of searing summer droughty heat, dusty, windy dust bowl days.

These names are mixed from the three areas we write of, but are all of long tenure in their own areas; and they include the Pinsons, the Struves, the Millers, the Rutledges, the Bennetts, the Bandys, the Ritcheys, the McAlisters, the Winns, the Rambos, the Storms, the Lindseys, and then there were

the ministers and the doctors of the communities, also. That's only a sampling--others that need to be included are the school board members, the town councilmen, or trustees, ad infinitum.

But, to return to the original germ of thought that catapulted us into this day dreaming, are those old times who stood up to be counted in time of sorrow, or triumph, or to face an issue, or support a common cause. They were generally of venerable years; grey headed, wrinkled faces, and sun tanned--and sure and positive in their beliefs that most all mankind is good. You could surround yourself with soldiers who stood shoulder to shoulder with you when they learned you needed such support.

They were loyal to their neighbors and friends in their particular valley, or hollow, or wind-swept prairie--or in the tree shaded canyons. In this new adopted state in which we now reside, we've learned there are the same solid folk as we left in the two former communities we now call "back home." Mankind (and womankind) are the same wherever you move to. That's the backbone and the muscle of the character of those we fondly call "good neighbors."
