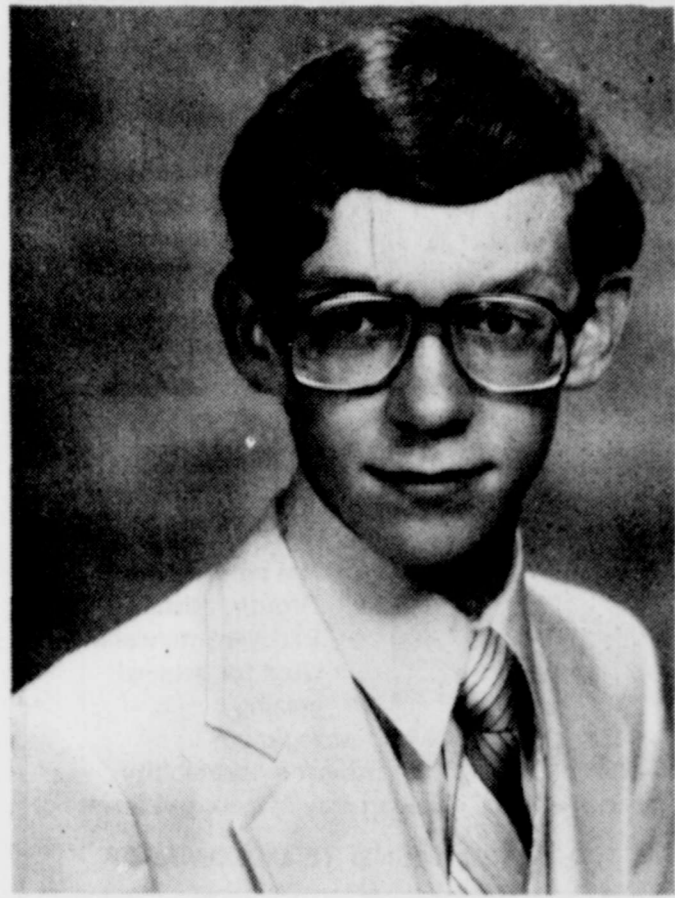

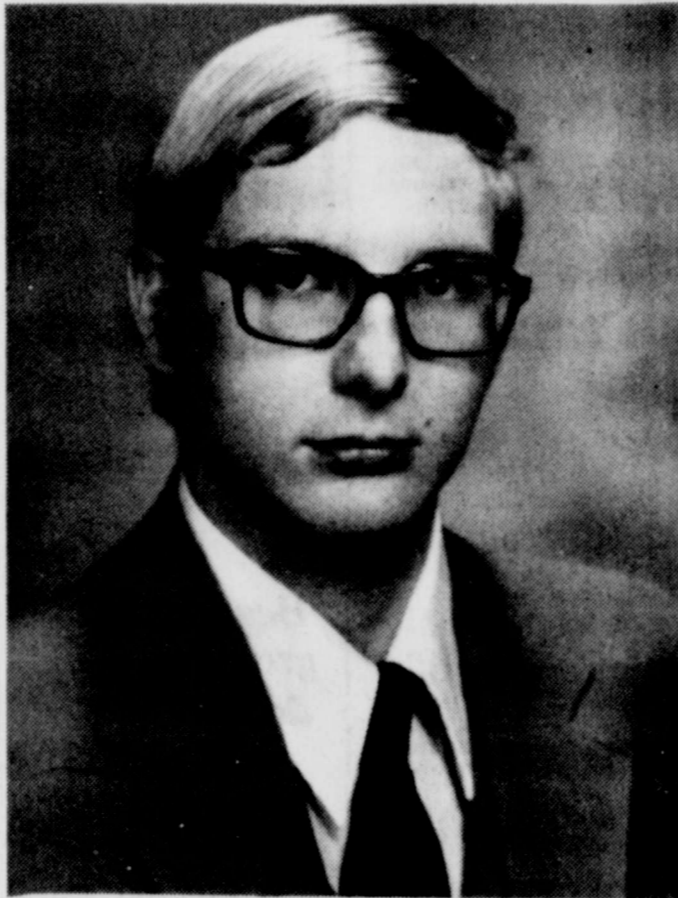
The Senior AHS Honor Students for 1979-80

The annual FFA-Parent Banquet was held Thursday night in the school cafeteria, with officers of the local FFA in charge, presided over by FFA president and master of ceremonies Van Riley. The invocation was given by FFA secretary Shane Cunningham. Following the meal catered by Seven Seas, the FFA Creed was recited by Jay Harrison, winner of the Greenhand Creed Reciting Contest. The Welcome was given by FFA treasurer Lane Thompson, with the response given by Chamber of Commerce President Richard Dubose. Following the introduction of guests by FFA Sentinel Roger Lindsey, Buyers' Certificates were presented by FFA Reporter Lance Horsford to those who purchased animals at the Plainview Stock Show. Chapter Awards were presented by agricultural teacher and FFA Advisor David Booth. The Outstanding Greenhand Award went to Jimmy Salitros, while the Outstanding Star Chapter Farmer Award was presented to Ricky Powell. Recipient of the Lone Star Farmer Award was Terry Motley, and the Outstanding Farm and Power Mechanics Award went to Ricky Pope. Mr. Booth also made presentations of Chapter Farmers Pins. Both Booth and vocational agricultural teacher and FFA Advisor Gerald Kelley had words of praise for the outstanding youth of this community, the parents, stock show board members, FFA Sweetheart JoAnn Stone, FFA Plowgirl Debra Crumpler, to scholarship donor Ray Sanders, and others of the community who have helped to make this a successful year for the FFA and vocational agricultural program at AHS. Kelley also presented the Student of the Year Award, to Van Riley, and read a statement supplied by Leland Phillips, representative of the Abernathy and County Line Co-Operatives donors of the Award. Walter "Spec" Cox, president of the local Young Farmer Chapter, presented Young Farmers Awards to Jay Harrison, Outstanding Greenhand, Max Riley, Outstanding Chapter Farmer and Don Stone, Outstanding Lone Star Farmer. Chapter accomplishments for the year were received by FFA vice-president Jeff Oswald. These included names of those who placed high in area and state Stock Shows, and accomplishments and team members of the various judging and leadership teams. Then Hale County Agent Ollie Linder presented the Grand Champion trophy to Max Riley, who showed the Grand Champion Barrow of the Plainview Stock Show. In the presentation of Special Awards, Roger Lindsey received a plaque and a \$50 Bond as Outstanding Power Mechanic student and Jeff Oswald was recipient of a plaque and \$50 Bond as the Most Improved Student in Power Mechanics. The awards were made possible by Sanders Auto. Scholarship Awards were presented by School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb. Antelope Bandsman Accomplish GOALS

Last August in the band hall, home of the Abernathy Antelope Band, there was a poster party. The party was held to uplift spirit in the band, and to welcome the new freshmen to the band. The spirit was there, and the posters would give direction to the efforts of the band. It was at this party that a "go for broke" spirit would start. Goals set that night were 1, win the South Plains Fair Parade, 2, make a 1st division at marching contest, 3, win sweepstakes in the spring, and 4, make the finals in the Canon City Colorado marching competition. Many of the posters hung on the band hall walls said, "Go For It." The results are in and all band students can point with pride at the record compiled by the 1979-80 Antelope Band. The band did, in fact, win 1st place in the AA class of the Fair Parade. It broke the long standing "bug-a-boo" that the winner of the fair parade makes a 11 in marching contest by making a 1st division. In Spring concert and sight-reading contest, the Antelope Band made 1st divisions in both events, resulting in the designation "Sweepstakes" band in ULL competition. Last but not least, the Band qualified for a spring trip,

travelled to Canon City, Colorado and placed fourth in its class in the field competition, losing a spot in the finals to the High School band from Perry, Oklahoma by .2 of a point. Individuals in the band have received many honors this past year, also. Students were named to the Region 16, South Zone All-Region Band. Four students tried out for the Texas Music Educators Association All-State Band, and two of these students advanced from regional competition to area competition. Three students were named to church sponsored honor bands. Twenty-nine students received 1st divisions at solo and ensemble competition with 27 of these qualifying to attend the ULL State Competition held in Austin at the end of May. The climax of the year activities for the Antelope Band was the annual spring concert held Friday at 7:30 in the Abernathy Auditorium. Certificates were presented to the band officers, Solo and Ensemble winners and All-Region people. Letters were presented to students who qualified and Who's Who, Outstanding Senior, Stage Band Award, Band Beau and Sweetheart and the John Philip Sousa award were presented.

Miss Harp To Be In Physician's Assistant Program At Baylor College of Medicine

Carol B. Harp of Abernathy has been offered a position in the Physician's Assistant Program 1980 entering class at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. The class will enroll 30 students selected from a field of more than 300 eligible applicants. The curriculum of the Physician's Assistant Program is twenty-four months in duration and begins in July. The first Physician's Assistant Program began at Duke University in 1965 with four students. Today there are over fifty Physician's Assistant Programs accredited by the American Medical Association Council on Medical Education. The program offered by Baylor College of Medicine is one of three in Texas. The American Medical Association defines the Physician's Assistant as "a skilled person qualified by academic and practical on-the-job training to provide services under the supervision and direction of a licensed physician who is responsible for the performance of that assistant." The Baylor College of Medicine Physician's Assistant Program is designed to educate the Assistant to the Primary Care Physician in carrying out many traditional physician functions under the direction and supervision of a physician in a clinic, hospital, or research setting. The program is accredited by the American Medical Association and is a member of the Association of Physician's Assistant Programs. Among the students enrolled in the 1979 class, 43 percent were residents of Texas and 73 percent were women. Eighty-seven percent had completed a baccalaureate degree and all had completed at least 60 hours of college course work. Sixty-six percent of the enrolled class had completed two years of work experience prior to application. The average age for entering students was 26. Carol Harp, a 1977 graduate of Abernathy High School, is a senior student at Texas Tech University. She is a member of Alpha Lambda Delta Freshman Honor Society, Phi Upsilon Omicron Honor Society in Home Economics and Alpha Epsilon Delta Premedical Honor Society. Carol has accepted the offer to enroll as a first-year Physician's Assistant student at Baylor. Her classes will begin on July 1.

More On FFA Banquet

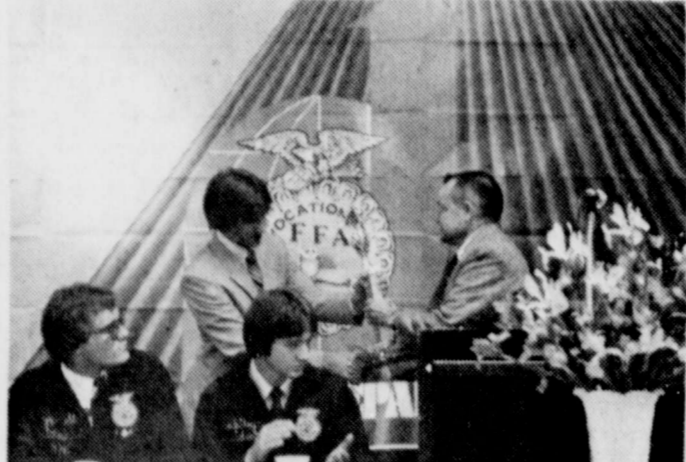
Speaker for the banquet was David Rattan, State FFA Vice President. Rattan, who attended school at Cal Farley Boys Ranch, is now an agricultural student at West Texas State University, Canyon. Young Rattan spoke concerning the importance of "the tools of our trade," adding that FFA members have these tools readily available to them. He stressed that we have a free country, we have goals to set and dreams to dream. Secondly, those in West Texas have an advantage... faith in our Creator... LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES, OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES, OR AMENDMENTS THERE-TO, THAT CONFLICT WITH THE TERMS OR CONDITIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE AND ENACTING IN LIEU THEREOF A NEW ORDINANCE REGULATING PLUMBING WORK IN THE CITY OF ABERNATHY TEXAS; DEFINING CERTAIN TERMS; PROVIDING FOR CERTAIN EXEMPTIONS; PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE AND THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS AND ESTABLISHING CERTAIN FEES; PROVIDING FOR SPECIFICATIONS, MATERIALS AND METHODS OF PLUMBING INSTALLATIONS; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Abernathy:

CHAPTER 1 TITLE CITED

1. This ordinance shall be known as the Plumbing Ordinance of the City of Abernathy, and may be cited as such.

It shall be unlawful for any person, association or corporation to engage in the business of plumbing, or do or perform any plumbing as defined in this ordinance, without first having procured the necessary licenses and permits as hereinafter provided for, and all plumbing, plumbing work and workmanship and materials shall meet the requirements of this ordinance and shall pass all inspections required in this ordinance in regard to the work done.

26.3 PENALTIES
Any person, either by himself or agent, and any firm, corporation or other entity who violates any of the provisions of this Code shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction of any such violation, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00); and each day during which such violation continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. In any case of a violation of any of the terms of provisions of this ordinance by any corporation, the officers and agents actively in charge of the business of such corporation shall be subject to the penalty herein provided. Any offense defined herein which has been defined by laws of the State of Texas as an offense and for which penalty has been prescribed shall be punished as provided in said State Law, and nothing herein shall be held as fixing any penalty contrary to a penalty provided by the laws of the State of Texas.

4 FORM OF COMPLAINTS
In any prosecution hereunder, it shall not be necessary for the complaint to negate any exceptions contained in this Code concerning any prohibited act, but any such exception may be urged as a defense by any person charged by such complaint.

5 RESPONSIBILITY FOR DEFECTS UNCHANGED
This Code does not relieve from or lessen the responsibility or liability of any person owning, operating, controlling or installing any plumbing, gas piping or gas-fired appliances for damages to person or property caused by any defect therein, nor shall the City be regarded as assuming any such liability by reason of the inspection authorized herein or certificate of approval issued as herein provided.

6 SEVERABILITY CLAUSE
If any provision of this Code, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances, is held invalid, the remainder of the Code, and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected thereby.

26.7 REPEALING CLAUSE
All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

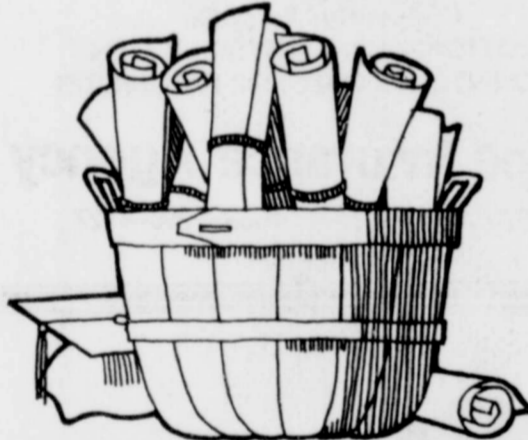




