Howard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Josh Howard, 907 16th Street in Abernathy, is a member of the National Honor Society, Who's Who in Biology, American History, and Chemistry, and is Science Club reporter and vice president, and has been on the All-Year Honor Roll for the last three years. He placed second in District, first in Regional and 8th at State in U. I. L. Science. He is interested in photography, chess, wargames astronomy, science fiction and all fields of science.

Kathrine Newton, science teacher at Abernathy High School will accompany Roger on the trip.

Some 500 outstanding science students and teachers from throughout the state have been selected by their schools to attend the four-day meeting which is sponsored jointly by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation (TAERF) and the University of Texas.

Southwestern Public Service Company, a charter member of TAERF, is sponsoring 42 High Plains participants, including the students and teacher from Canyon. Participants will spend two afternoons touring the science laboratories at the University, including those where experiments sponsored by the foundation are being carried on in the thermonuclear (fusion) research.

Farmers, Stockmen To Answer Questions Farm/Ranch Survey

What's the state of Texas agriculture in 1980? That will be determined from information provided by many Texas Farmers and ranchers in a questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service over the next few weeks. A select number of producers will be interviewed.

Information gathered through these questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining acreage devoted to various crops and midyear livestock numbers, points out Ollie Liner, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Resulting crops and livestock reports developed from these surveys provide a dependable unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, says the county agent. Estimates derived from these reports serve as tools for farmers and ranchers in working out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use this data in planning agricultural programs, explains Liner. The estimates are also used in establishing various government programs, acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Extension Service economists and private firms use this information as a basis for advising farmers and ranchers. Accurate statistics make the job of forecasting more reliable and useful.

All this means that farmers and ranchers are encouraged to promptly and accurately complete the survey forms. These estimates can only be as accurate as the responses, and producers have a big stake in the outcome.

As always, individual farm and ranch information will be kept strictly confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published reports, adds Liner.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today issued rules that will change lunches served to children in schools starting next fall. The rules, based on recent surveys of children's eating habits and nutritional needs, encourage schools in the national school lunch program to tailor meal and portion sizes to the eating habits of children. This measure is expected to reduce plate waste among younger children and better the nutritional needs of older children.

These rules are the second and final part of a major change in school lunch meal patterns, originally proposed in 1977. The department implemented interim regulations in August 1978 to field test the proposed changes, and also solicited public comment. Today's final regulations reflect findings about the impact of the meal pattern changes gathered during the test phase.

The rules recommended that schools serve different sized portions of food to children of different age groups. For instance, schools will have the option of providing smaller servings to younger children and offering larger portions to older children. Department officials feel this is more in line with the eating habits of young children.

The new rules also require schools to increase the required servings of eggs and dry beans to make them nutritionally equivalent substitutes for meat and the other meat alternates.

Grandson Graduates From Petersburg High School

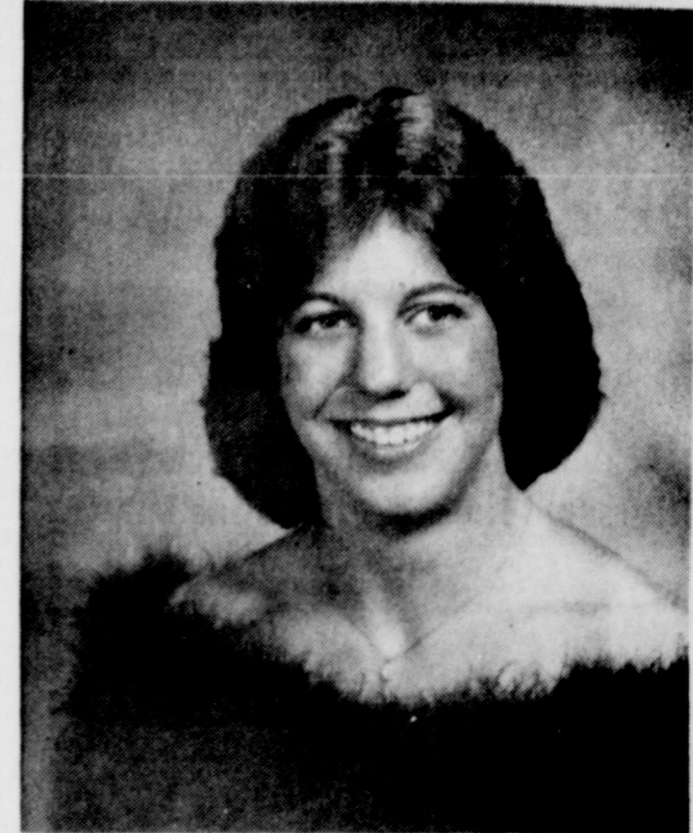

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Ag Consulting Firm Schedules Area Seminars

Tight and expensive money, high costs and low prices have been hitting farmers, ranchers and cattle feeders hard. With a recession in progress, the outlook for agriculture remains questionable, at best. The nation is in a budget cutting mood. It seems clear, therefore, that the government certainly is not going to be doing much to bail out farmers. U.S. farm income, despite possibilities of some larger crops, will be down about 25 percent. Some will be forced to sell.

These are current views of Dr. Willard F. "Doc" Williams, Doc and his staff of specialists of TARA, Inc. in Lubbock have been looking for answers. "We have been exploiting every possible source of improved efficiency for the past 50 years," Doc states, "but we still have a farm problem so efficiency cannot be the ultimate answer." Williams admits that new, lower cost techniques can help for awhile but these, according to Williams, generally lead directly to increased production and even lower prices. Because farmers end up back where they started, Williams calls this the "treadmill theory."

An answer with much greater possibilities, according to Doc, is "improved marketing strategies." Toward this end, Doc and his staff have been conducting marketing short courses throughout the Southwest during the past 3 years. "The idea," according to Williams, "is to teach farmers, ranchers and others how to extract more money from the market through planned marketing programs which include, but are not limited to, use of the futures markets and hedging." Farmers, Doc maintains, can do a great deal for themselves through improved, modern marketing techniques. There is a good possibility he believes that the time and funds spent on tractors, could have been devoted much more profitably to marketing education.

Historically, says Williams, farmers have spent 99 percent of their time being good farmers and going broke at it. One of the reasons is that they are spending so little time and effort on the business end of agriculture and on marketing. TARA, Inc., a private research and educational firm in Lubbock, is extending its educational efforts to all forms of marketing, including timely cash selling, programs of distributing sales

through the year, contracting and use of government loan programs, as well as hedging. "The time has come," according to Williams. "For planned marketing programs with as much emphasis on intelligent buying and selling as on production." Marketing, he says, can make the difference between profits and losses.

Hedging techniques require special attention. "It generally is not possible," according to Williams, "to acquire an understanding of all important aspects of hedging through magazine articles or pamphlets." One day seminars on the subject, he finds, often add to the confusion that already exists about futures markets. "There are so many stories and misleading and erroneous ideas about futures and hedging," Williams says, "that it is almost unbelievable." Hedging is one of the few legitimate ways of taking some of the price risk out of agriculture, of increasing the net price received from farm products and of increasing farm income. "And that," he adds, "is what it is all about."

The TARA staff has conducted 27 marketing short courses in the region. These, according to Williams, were highly successful. "Many farmers," according to Doc, "made enough to save their farms or reduce debt and some even bought additional land." He is planning a short course for this area. Those progressive farmers really interested in marketing and more income, Doc states, will be there. "We will be happy to provide all necessary details," he concludes.



Your legal voting box is located at the New Deal Clubhouse (Box #43). Even though you may have voted at the John Deere house in the First Primary, you can vote in the runoff election between Franklin Dunn and Eliseo Solis for Commissioner. The election judge of box #43 has confirmed this. The precinct line is from US Highway 87 east to the County Line and from the Hale County Line South to 19th Street in Lubbock. Your vote is desperately needed. In Lubbock the line is University Street.

Immunization Requirements

For several years, state laws have required all students to be immunized against certain diseases before entering school. Beginning with the 1980-81 school term, this will be strictly enforced.

Students entering school next fall must have on file, or bring to school, medical certification certifying that they have received the required immunizations. Students will not be allowed to enroll without this certification.

The following are the legal requirements for students entering school next fall.

Section 2.09 of the Texas Education Code requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary school must have been immunized against certain diseases. The following is a list of required immunizations:

(a) Children less than five years of age enrolled in pre-school programs:

Three doses of oral polio.

Three doses of DTP vaccines.

One dose each of measles, rubella and mumps vaccine.

(b) Children enrolled in kindergarten through grade five:

At least three doses of oral polio vaccine with the provision that one dose must have been received after age 4.

At least three doses of DPT but one dose must have been received after age 4.

All students must have received measles vaccine after age 1 or provide a history of measles illness.

Mumps vaccine is required for all students through seven years of age.

(c) Students in grade six through twelve:

All students must have received at least three doses of oral polio vaccine provided one or more doses has been received after age 4.

All students must have received at least three doses of DPT with at least one dose having been received after age 4.

Effective September 1, 1979, students twelve years of age and all students enrolled in the sixth grade, will be required to have received measles vaccine on or after their first birthday or provide a history of measles illness. On September the first of each year thereafter, students one year older or one grade higher must meet these requirements.

Rubella vaccine is required for students through age 11. (Not after the 12th birthday)

Tetanus-diphtheria (TD) boosters are required every 10 years.

In addition to these required immunizations, a new law requires that each student must have on file, or furnish, an official birth certificate from the Health Department.

Baptismal records or birth registration cards (Blue cards) will no longer be acceptable.

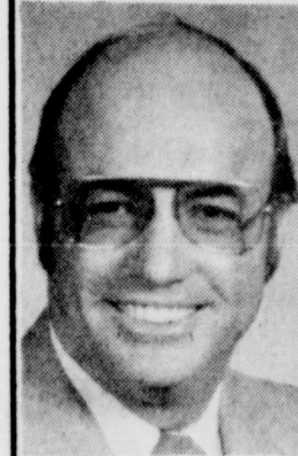

CORN CASSEROLE WITH SOUR CREAM

Fry til crisp three slices of bacon, remove bacon from pan, retain fat. Cook in fat 2 tablespoons onions (chopped fine) til just tender. Crumble bacon and sit aside. Into skillet with onion and bacon fat mix one 8 ounce package of sour cream. Mix well.

Place one package frozen whole kernel corn in casserole dish. Fold in sour cream mix and salt and pepper to taste. Top with bacon crumbles. Bake in 350 degree oven til hot and bubbly about 20 to 30 minutes.

For extra tenderness in fresh or frozen corn try adding sugar instead of salt to water while cooking. Add salt only before serving. To remove excess salt from soup or stew drop in a sliced raw potato.
