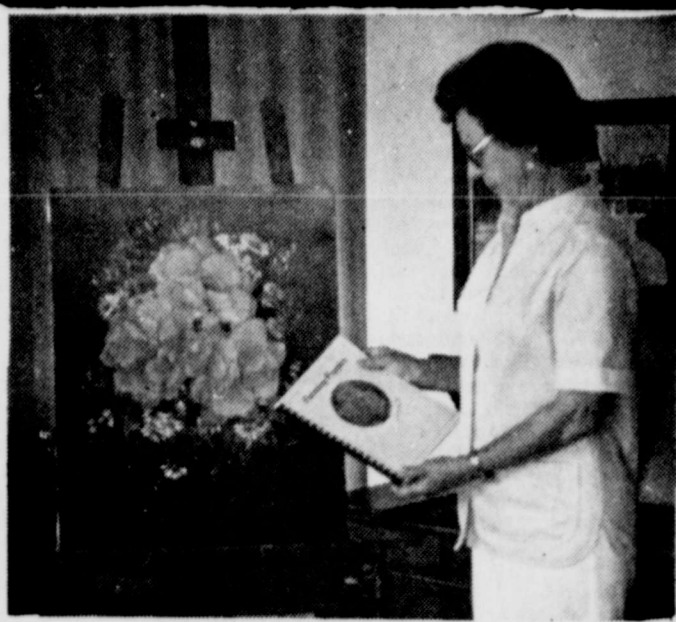

Local Teacher Writes Book for Canvas Painters on Technique of Painting Poppies

Georgia Bartlett, local teacher, has written a book for canvas painters on the technique of painting poppies. Her technique has gained wide recognition in the South Plains area and New Mexico. The poppy florals have been described as "fantasy florals" because of the transparent quality of the flowers and foliage.

Village Craft in the South Plains Mall in Lubbock has been instrumental in focusing attention on Mrs. Bartlett's florals. She teaches there on Saturday each month and much interest in the technique has been created by the display of her work in the mall area.

Mrs. Bartlett also teaches workshops in other cities when time allows. Galleries showing her work include Elegante, Odessa; Galleria Alamo, Alamogordo; Pecos Gallery, Artesia; Hanging Tree, Midland; Garland Loft Gallery, Plainview; Gift Gallery, Amarillo; and The Frame Gallery, Lubbock.

She was recently invited to exhibit in the Hanging Tree Roundup, a benefit show and sale for the Buffalo Springs Council of Boy Scouts in Midland. The show was by invitation only and was held at the Midland College Chaparral Center. Many of the artists exhibiting were nationally known.

Mrs. Bartlett's 70 page book has detailed instruction on the basic technique of painting poppies plus 14 lesson plans for painting different colors and composition on canvas. The color illustration is already being sold as framed prints in gift stores in Lubbock and Midland but the book itself will not be for sale in retail stores until the fall. They may be purchased directly from Mrs. Bartlett and will be on display at Abernathy Floral and Lon's Cleaners. Response from both painters and stores has been great.

It is the culmination of almost a year's effort. When I started teaching at Village Craft about 3 years ago I started the practice of giving students lesson plans for the paintings we were doing. I did this so they wouldn't have to take notes and also so they could paint another canvas at home. Students liked the idea and asked me

to write a book on the poppy technique. I felt it was a pretty ambitious undertaking and felt it really didn't have the time. After three years my lesson plans had accumulated and I began to consider the possibility of doing a book.

Since last summer it has been a serious endeavor. The basic technique was developed with a book in mind. I wanted it to be a book explicit enough so people who had never taken a class under me could understand the technique. Students who had taken classes, would have all the colors and composition available in book form and a review of the technique would be helpful to them.

Writing, rewriting and more rewriting took place. Kaye Lynne Dearing was of great assistance in suggestion as to format, clarity of instruction and typing my notes. Without her willingness to type and retype until it was satisfactory, I could not have completed the book. Sharon Kester did the final typing and the book went to the printers.

I was especially fortunate in my choice of people to print the color illustration and the book. Bill Dennis of Dennis Bros. in Lubbock did a great job on the color illustration made from a painting I did especially for the book. He also helped me develop plans I had in mind for the cover. Paul Duncan of Duncan Press, Lubbock, was of great assistance in planning the final printing and worked closely with Mr. Dennis to coordinate the work on the cover I had designed.

It was a thrilling moment when I picked up my first copy, June 4. Notification of the distribution date had been made by mail to 275 students who had taken my classes in the three years I had taught at Village Craft and surrounding area. The response has been very gratifying and my next step is to do demonstrations of the technique in as many distance cities as I have the time. In the fall I will start getting the book into retail stores. It has been a wonderful experience and many opportunities have been opened since the publication of the book.

School Employees Given Salary Hike

At its regular June Meeting, the board of education of the Abernathy I, S.D., unanimously approved a salary increase for all school employees for the 1980-81 school year. The increases will not alter the rate or ratio of the local tax structure but will utilize funds from increases in local school district mineral valuations. Increases of 15% were granted to all non-certificated personnel. Certified teaching personnel were increased to \$3,500 above the state minimum foundation scale, while administrators were granted a comparable increase of \$200 per month for the coming school year.

The board examined the five year school goals and will have an opportunity to study them before final adoption. In other action, the board approved the high school handbook. The only changes over the previous handbook was reverting back to the semester system from the quarter system which has been in effect for a number of years.

Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert, Moss, and Company were appointed as fiscal auditors for the current year. The local board gave approval to the Media Component of the Regional Education Service Center and also voted to participate in a cooperative personnel project with ESC XVII, and to join with the Texas Education Agency in a Dental Project studying the effects of fluoride in the prevention of tooth decay.

By taking no action for the next fiscal year, automobiles that are not used in business will be dropped from the tax roll. The board voted to change the regular July meeting back to June 30th in order not to interfere with the July 4th weekend. The same date was set for a public hearing of the competency tests that were given to the 5th and 9th grade students this spring.

A resolution was passed asking the Texas Association of School Boards to consider sponsoring accident insurance for students, including those participating in athletics.

Policy considerations included examination of the dress code and the residency policy for teachers and also the means of identifying Title I students.

Resignations were accepted from: Jonen Cummings, tennis coach; Coralie Cox, junior high girl's coach; Kay Sherwood, Biology; Pamela Hinz and Claudia Helm, special education teachers in the HONDA Program.

Scotty Windham, vocational agriculture teacher from Lazbuddie and Emily Ratcliff, an elementary teacher who previously taught in Lubbock and Seagraves were employed for the 1980-81 school year.

Reports presented without action included a budget progress report, a tax collection report (99.21% completed); a final enrollment report (elementary-480, Junior High-232; high school-313) and a luncheon report which showed the average daily participation for breakfast to be 133 and for lunch 651 for the just completed school year.

Correspondence from the University Interscholastic League was presented showing Abernathy's share of the state basketball tournament. Total payment to the local schools for their participation was \$5,079.63.

Local Teachers Have Retired

Two elementary teachers retired from the teaching profession after a number of years of service with the Abernathy Public Schools.

Mrs. Rachel Webb started her teaching career in the Abernathy Schools in 1942. She taught two years before taking a break when Rachel and Wesley Webb's son, Lindsey, was born.

Mrs. Webb resumed her teaching career in the fall of 1954 and taught first grade until her retirement in May, 1980.

Mrs. Webb was a dedicated teacher. Her students loved her and expressed their love and appreciation with a bouquet of flowers on her last day of teaching. Students of all ages, both present and past, were responsible for this tribute to a great teacher.

Louise Samsel began her teaching career in 1941. She took a break from her teaching duties from 1942 to 1944. In 1944, Mrs. Samsel accepted a teaching position at Roby, Texas, and taught third grade through 1948.

After an interval of nine years, Mrs. Samsel began teaching at Abernathy in 1957. She taught third grade in Abernathy for 23 years until her retirement in May, 1980.

Mrs. Samsel's present and former students also honored her with a bouquet of flowers on her last day of teaching.

On May 26th, the Abernathy Classroom Teachers Association presented Mrs. Webb and Mrs. Samsel a Brass School Bell with their years of service inscribed. Both teachers had given 28 years toward the educational development of boys and girls. Their presence will be missed in the classroom but their influence will live on in the hearts of those whose lives they have touched.

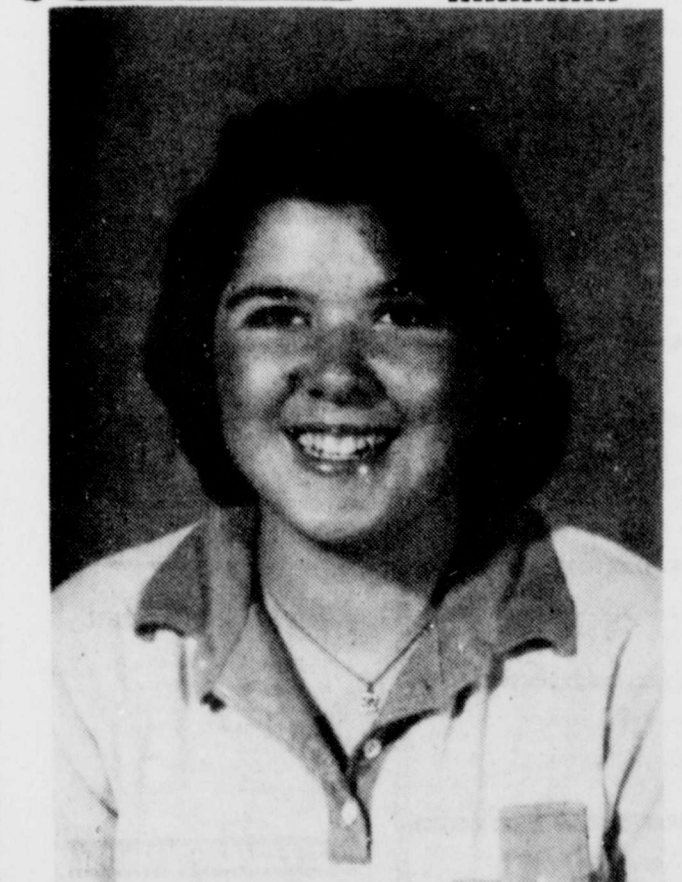
Need Donations

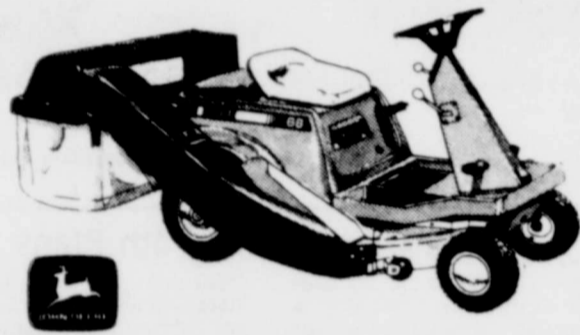

Allie Bailey Dies Sunday

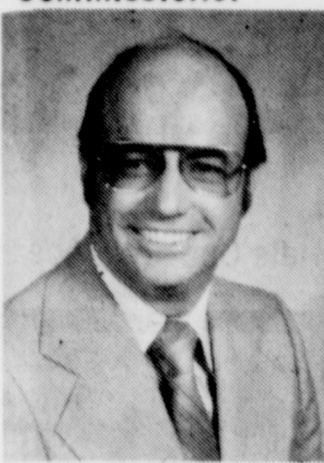

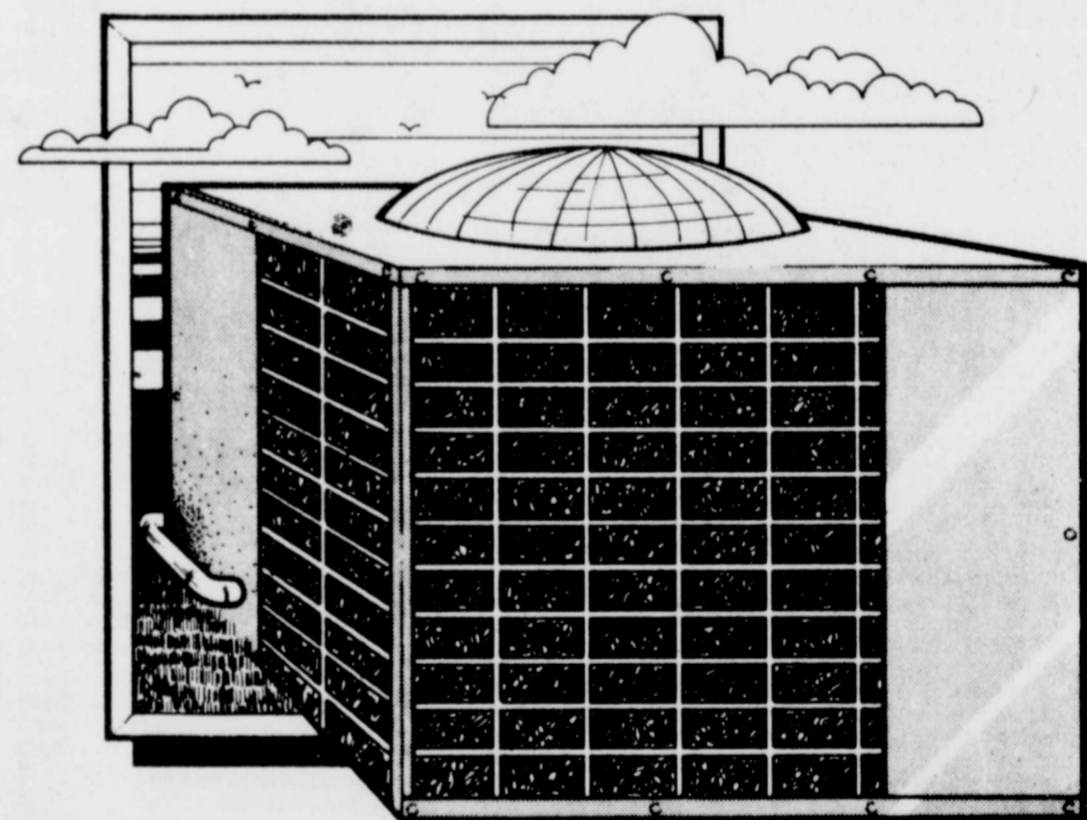
