LETTER

Inflation has its grip on every citizen of the United States. What is the reason the nation finds itself confronted by galloping inflation? The nation has no earning power due to a cheap raw material policy.

Money can be introduced into the economy by any one of these ways. It can be printed with nothing of value in reserve. It can be borrowed. Borrowed money must be repaid with interest. It can be earned. Only earned money is not inflationary money.

Since 1977 agriculture commodities have been priced at levels below production costs thereby denying agriculture producers a profit. Without a profit farmers have no purchasing power. There is no money to buy the services and manufactured goods of urban America. Each time a farmer plants a seed the possibility exists for new earned income to enter the national treasury. This new wealth, free and God-given, becomes available for all segments of the economy and owes no interest. Money that is neither printed nor owed guarantees economic prosperity for all resulting in a general decline in the inflation rate. A simple comparison is that of the hand water pump. The pump has to be primed before the water begins to flow. Agriculture commodities comprise 70% of the nation's earning power. When denied a profit, the nation is denied the free wealth necessary to prime the national economy.

In the 1920's and again in 1976 women led the way to Washington to proclaim to Congress that an economic depression would follow the agricultural depression. The same conditions exist today that prefaced the crash of '29. A recent commencement speaker in Lubbock, theorized that personal freedom is directly dependent on economic freedom. The loss of our nation's earning power is surely to cost us our personal freedom.

RECIPE

CHICKEN CACCIAOTORE

Total cooking time: 30 minutes

- 1 large onion, sliced and separated into rings
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 tablespoon cooking oil
1 8-ounce can tomatoes, cut up
1 8-ounce can tomato sauce
1/2 cup dry white wine
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon dried oregano, crushed
1/2 teaspoon celery seed
1 or 2 bay leaves
3 pound broiler-fryer, cut up

In 12x7 1/2 x2-inch baking dish, cook onion and garlic in oil covered, at HIGH for 5 to 6 minutes or till tender, stirring twice. Stir in tomatoes, tomato sauce, wine, salt, pepper, oregano, celery seed, and bay leaves. Add chicken; spoon sauce over.

Cook, covered, at MEDIUM HIGH for 25 minutes or till tender, giving dish half turn once. Remove bay leaves. Skim off excess fat from pan juices. Pass pan juices with chicken. Makes 3 or 4 servings.

Services for Mrs. A. D. (Lillie Mae) Williams, 85, of Abernathy, were conducted Tuesday in Abernathy First Baptist Church. The Rev. Loyd Riddles, pastor, of FBC and Condy Billingsley, minister of Abernathy Church of Christ, officiated.

N&C--I told you so: Jimmy Carter's stint as Governor of Georgia did not qualify him to fill the office of the presidency; that the office of the Texas Speaker of the House should be filled at the state's ballot boxes; that Texas is not running out of oil and natural gas; that H. E. W. meets the planes and boats with Social Security cards to be issued to refugees glutting this country; that 55's and older should join a national Senior Citizens' organization.

N&C--TAKING IT From the Top: Jimmy Carter is not turning in a satisfactory performance... he's mishandled the domestic affairs of this Nation. His role as a world Statesman is a flop: the Panama Canal giveaway... putting hundreds of American canal workers out of jobs... and "paying" Panama to take the Canal. Camp David: his role as "peacemaker" between Israel and Egypt. The two Middle East countries seem further apart today than they appeared to be before the marathon meetings with Carter at Camp David. Carter bought that one, too: giving Egypt the two air bases which Israel had built on land going back to Egypt... and promising two billions of American taxpayers' dollars to Israel to build two air bases on land they are keeping. I admit, those two air bases may be to the advantage of the United States under certain circumstances... but, I bet, the US of A will have to pay Israel for our use of them. In fairness

to Carter: the US hostage problem was (and is) a hard one to handle. No other US president faced such a dilemma... so there is no precedent for a solution.

TIPS GIVEN ON TORNADO

KNOW WARNINGS
Two phrases that should be part of every Texan's vocabulary are "tornado watch" and "tornado warning."

A watch--usually posted for broad areas spanning hundreds of miles--is issued anytime a squall line develops which has the potential of spawning tornadoes. It is not uncommon for a city or town to be included in a watch dozens of times without ever experiencing a tornado.

For this reason, the Texas Insurance Information Center (TIIC) says there is a danger of becoming complacent. No matter how often a watch is posted for a community, residents should monitor broadcasts and be generally aware of the potentially threatening weather.

Should a twister be spotted, a "tornado warning" is signaled. Warnings are issued for much smaller areas and may mean that residents have only a few minutes to take shelter.

If a warning is issued, persons in the affected area should immediately watch for danger and be ready to take cover at a second's notice.

STAY LOW
The key word in taking cover is "low". The lowest floor in any building is safest. Small rooms--such as the bathroom--or a closet in the central part of the structure offer the best protection. If this hideout isn't available, taking cover under heavy furniture such as a tipped-over, upholstered couch is advised.

Neither a mobile home nor buildings with wide, free-span roofs--such as auditoriums--are desirable shelters.

Most deaths associated with a tornado are caused by flying debris and most injuries are to the head or

chest. For these reasons, care should be taken to protect the head and chest no matter where shelter is taken.

AFTER STORM
Immediately after a storm has passed, stay put for a few minutes. Make sure there is no leaking gas in the area before striking matches. Remember, too, downed telephone and power lines are hazardous.

Whenever a community begins mopping up after a winds storm or tornado, insurance companies put into force pre-arranged catastrophe procedures to help a community recover from the disaster.

If warranted, additional claims people are called in to help expedite claims processing. As a general rule, hardship cases get first priority. The individual property owner can help by making temporary repairs to prevent further damage--the cost of which is often covered by the insurance policy--and by notifying the agent or company representative immediately upon discovery and estimation of potential loss.

Beware of unscrupulous, fly-by-night contractors who often follow the storm into town. Deal only with reputable contractors.

The message is an old one but worth repeating, especially this time of the year: proper action before and after a storm can save lives and property.

We need to express our objections to movies of this type and ask that *IN GOD WE TRUST* not be released, indicating that we will hold the studios responsible if it is. I believe that form letters would not be effective, but that if enough people care enough to take the time and trouble to express in their own words how they feel about this garbage, we may be able to stop this flow of horror before it becomes a flood. Finally, I send financial support to an organization called the Interfaith Committee Against Blasphemy, P.O. Box 90, Glendale, CA 91209. Your readers might like to consider the possibility of supporting this group.

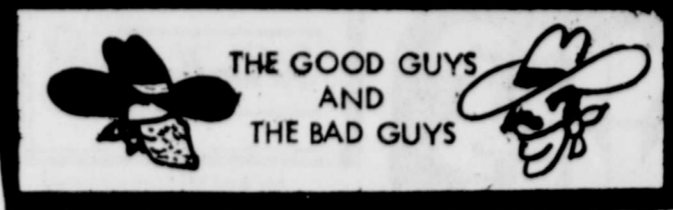

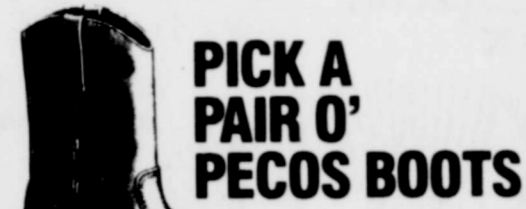
