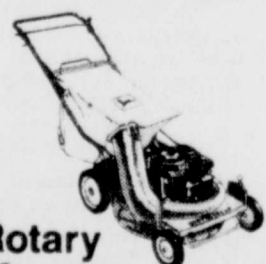

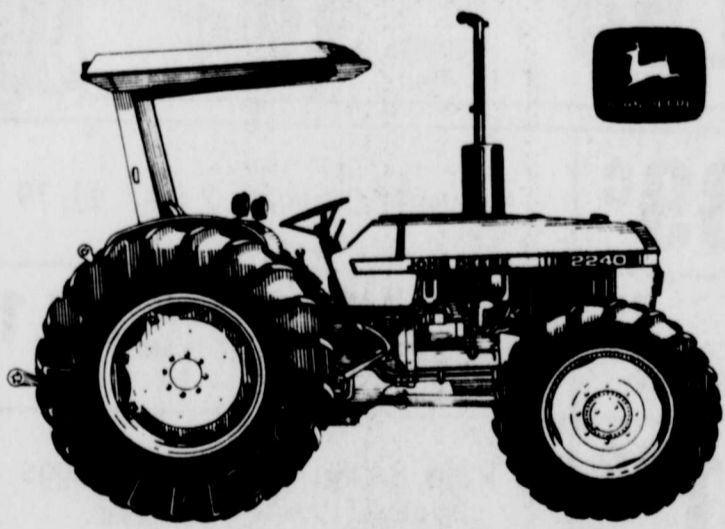

WTSU--Each weekday, for about two weeks, 31 persons gathered between 2 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. in the snack bar of the West Texas State University Student Union Building.


