Students Set An Enviably Record At Local School

Today it is characteristic of our society that we hear only the bad news. Perhaps this is more true of our youth and our schools than any other segment of our society. All too often the good is overlooked. In these days of Proposition 13 and accountability perhaps the time has come to present a collective report card which reflects the years progress of our youth and our school.

The following annual report of the Abernathy Independent School District is an enlightening view which shows that a whole lot of learning is taking place in our school. 6.2% of the students had perfect attendance. 9.0% of the high school students had perfect attendance. 10.8% of the secondary students (6 thru 12) were on the all year honor roll. 27% of the secondary students (6 thru 12) were on the honor roll at least one six weeks. 14.1% of the high school students participated in a state level contest. 81.2% of the high school students participated in extracurricular activities (Band-Athletics-UIL-ETC.) 91.6% of the students did not receive any type of punishment. 98.4% of the students were not expelled or suspended. 99.4% of the students were respectful of the staff. 98.1% were not disciplined for fighting. 99.9% were not admonished for having drugs and/or alcohol on school premises. 99.6% were not involved in school vandalism.

other details of the presentation. If you are going to, or through, El Paso on your vacation trip, come by and check on "VIVA EL PASO".

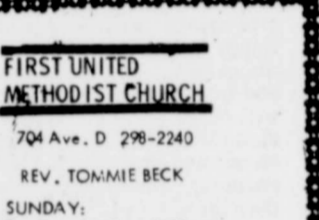
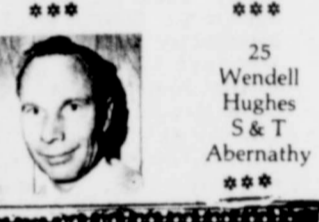

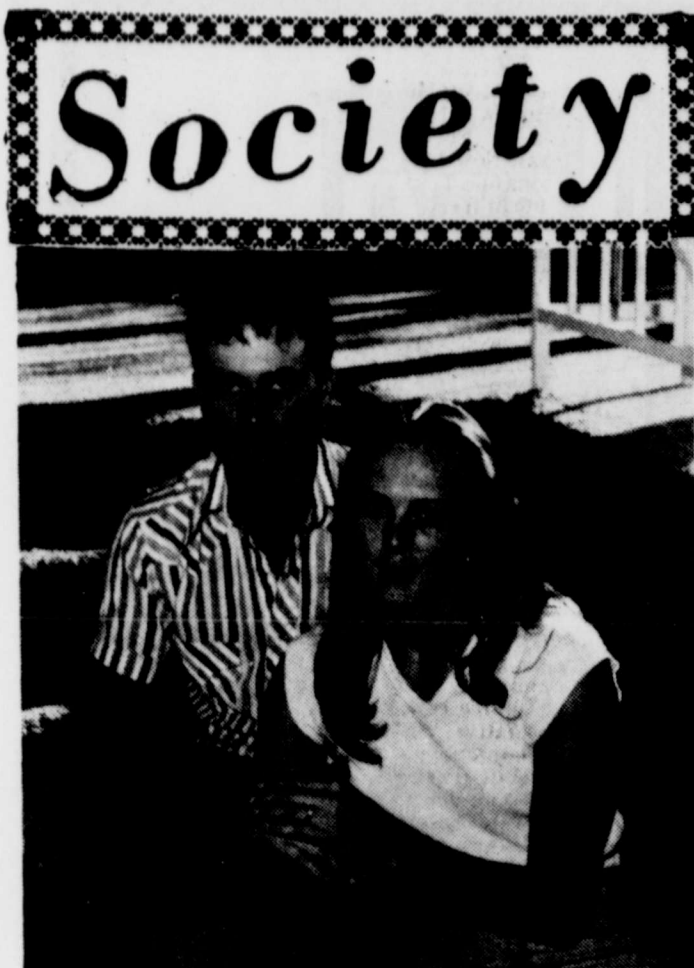

Carry out the theme in programs, stage decorations, commentary—in every aspect. Even the promotional materials.

It would be beneficial to use information sheets to write a commentary. By using descriptive, current fashion terms you can point out one or two highlights and leave the rest to the eyes.

Close attention should be given to modeling and makeup in a style show. These should be in advance of other activities allowing time for individual practice.

The actual show is fun. Relax and enjoy it. When the group works together from planning to final show time, there is great satisfaction of a job well-done.

Saute onion, pepper and celery in 2 tablespoons Crisco oil. Crumble corn-bread add onion mixture, one teaspoon sage, 1 can cream of chicken soup. Add 2 cups milk mix well. Fold in squash, salt and pepper to taste. Bake in 350 degree oven about one hour.

TIPRO Goes To Bat For Royalty Owners On Windfall Taxes

Dallas, Texas— "Senator Bentsen's idea to exempt royalty owners from the so-called Windfall Profits Tax is right on target," said the president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association (TIPRO), L. Frank Pitts. Pitts commended the Senator for scheduling a Senate Finance Committee field hearing to examine the impact of the new excise tax on small royalty owners.

Bentsen announced earlier the hearing will be held on July 17, 1980, at the 18,000-seat University of Texas Special Events Center in Austin.

In a letter to the Senator, Pitts stated, "On behalf of the 4,300 members of TIPRO I commend you for your efforts to bring the ear of Washington to Texas to examine the impact of this ludicrous tax that is tragically affecting so many Texans. These hearings will provide hundreds of affected royalty owners who could not travel to Washington such as retired couples and small farmers and ranchers, the opportunity to express to the committee the hardships placed on them by the tax," stated Pitts.

The hearings will be convened as the Senate Finance Subcommittee on Taxation and Debt Management, with Bentsen presiding. They will focus on the Bentsen legislative proposal to exempt royalty owners from the Crude Oil Windfall Profits Tax Act of 1980. Other senators who may join Bentsen in the hearings include Senator David Boren (D-Okla.), Senator Robert Dole (R-Kans.) and Senator Russell Long (D-La.).

"We appreciate your concern for the hundreds of thousands of Texas royalty owners whose income has been drastically reduced by what in reality is an excise tax on Texas mineral rights," Pitts stated, "and we hope that royalty owners from every part of Texas will travel to Austin to listen and participate firsthand in these hearings."
