Abernathy's 1970 census count was 2,625, said City Manager Rod Ellis, who received the current census report Monday. This figures gives Abernathy an increase of only 73 in 10 years.

The unofficial, first figures of the 1980 census report of 2,698 is divided 2,019 in Hale County and 679 in Lubbock County

DALLAS TX -- Bob Lilly the pride of Throckmorton, Texas, All-American from TCU, known as "The Purple one draft choice of the Dallas Cowboys in 1961, will be enshrined in the Football Hall of Fame this Saturday. Selected "Rookie of the Year in the NFL in 1961, he was the instrumental element in the Dallas Doomsday Defense and the best defen-sive tackle in the National Football League. Quick, strong, durable, he was a destroyer on the field, gendeman off the field. Lilly is the most decorated Dallas Cowboy of all time. He was selected "All Pro" 8 times, and 11 times for the "Pro Bowl." He also played 14 years without missing a game until his retirement in 1974 after 196

consecutive games. Head Coach Tom Landry of the Dallas Cowboys, a great influence in Lilly's life, said, "A man like this comes along just once in a generation. There won't be another Bob Lilly in our time . He's something more than great, Nobody is better than Bob Lilly, He's a man who'll

become a legend. Over and above his football accomplishments, Bob is active in business in Waco where he lives with his family. Bob also appears on the "celebrity circuit" making speeches and is seen on television for many sponsors including the Texas Ford Dealers. This Saturday, August 2, Texas' own Bob Lilly will be joined by 3 other former great NFL stars: David "Deacon" Jones, Jim Otto, and Herb Adderly, who will also be enshrined in pro football's immortal "Hall of Fame" in Canton, Ohio.




