Thornton Attends Lost Battalion Reunion in Austin

H. C. Thornton of Abernathy is scheduled to attend the 36th Annual Reunion of members of the World War I Lost Battalion. It is being held in Austin Thursday through Saturday of this week. Jesse Webb is Abernathy's other member of the Lost Battalion, but he is not attending the reunion in Austin. From the Avalanche-Journal: The Lost Battalion consists of the 2nd Battalion, 131st Field Artillery, which was snared in Java when the Dutch Army surrendered to the Japanese on March 8, 1942, and survivors of the U.S.S. Houston, a heavy cruiser which was sunk in a fierce firefight in the Sunda Strait a week earlier.

These young men--many of them teen-agers--from the Great Depression had challenged the Japanese with 1918 Springfield rifles and, in the case of the Houston, mounted guns that ran out of ammunition near the end.

They came together in a POW camp known as Bicycle Camp in Batavia, Java. They seemingly had disappeared.

Beatings, hard labor and starvation took their toll as 166 of the 912 prisoners died in 3 1/2 years of captivity in POW camps throughout Asia, Java, Samatra, Borneo, Singapore, Thailand, Burma, French Indochina and Japan. Many of the men worked on "Death Railway" in Burma and Thailand.

A public meeting was held July 29, 1980, at Abernathy City Hall for the purpose of obtaining public consultation regarding the development of the preliminary workshop plan of the public participation program. Facts concerning the existing sewage collection, treatment and disposal methods as well as existing and future problems associated with the treatment works were also discussed. Copies of the fact sheet and workshop were distributed to all those attending and had been previously sent to those on the mailing list.

The basic matters discussed included those items in the preliminary workshop plan with particular attention given to the scheduling of public meetings and public hearings. COLEMAN RECALLS POTENTIALLY LEAKING STOVE AND LANTERN FUEL
WICHITA, Kan., June 27--The Coleman Company, Inc. reported today that approximately 7,000 one-gallon containers of liquid camping fuel marketed by it in Texas and areas of Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico bordering on Texas may leak.

Leakage of the fuel, which is extremely flammable, could cause a fire hazard. The fuel was packaged during early February 1980. Each container may contain a few drops of water which could eventually cause rust and leakage from the affected containers. Affected containers are identified by the brand Coleman and by the code 1020 stamped in ink on the container bottom.

Persons who find they have these containers should remove them to the outdoors and call their local fire department for disposal instructions. The containers should not be returned to place of purchase or transported in motor vehicle until emptied. Empty containers marked as mentioned above will be exchanged free of charge if returned empty to the place of purchase.

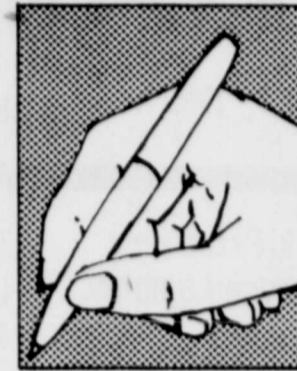

MEXICAN CORNBREAD
1 cup cornmeal
2 eggs
1 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon soda
3/4 teaspoon salt
1 can cream style corn
1/2 cup bacon drippings

Mix the above ingredients and set aside.

Brown 1 lb. hamburger meat. Fold in 1 can green chili salsa. Chop 1 large onion, grate 1/2 lb. Longhorn Style Cheese. Grease large iron skillet, heat, sprinkle lightly with corn meal. Pour in 1/2 corn mix; sprinkle cheese over corn mix, then add meat, sprinkle onions over meat, then add rest of corn mix. Bake 50 minutes at 350 degrees.

To ripen tomatoes, place in brown paper bag. Fold down top. Place in dark pantry, will ripen overnight.

To remove onion odor from hands, rub with mixture of salt and vinegar. Rinse in cold water. Then wash well in soap and warm water.

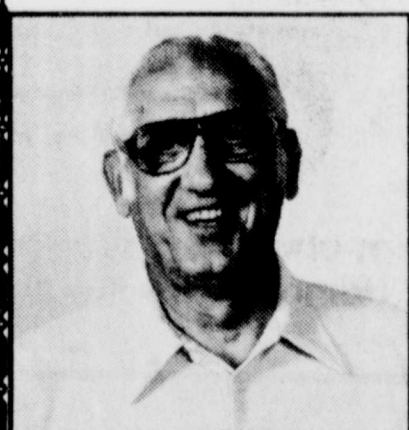

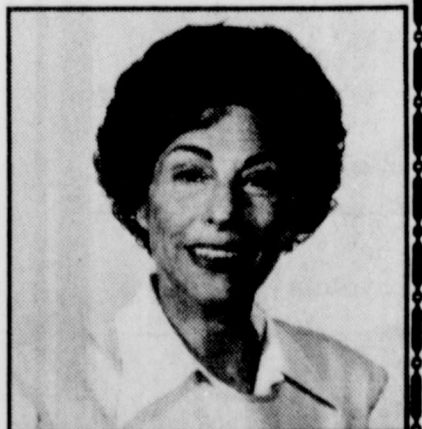

Immunization Requirements

For several years, state laws have required all students to be immunized against certain diseases before entering school. Beginning with the 1980-81 school term, this will be strictly enforced.

Students entering school next fall must have on file, or bring to school, medical certification certifying that they have received the required immunizations. Students will not be allowed to enroll without this certification.

The following are the legal requirements for students entering school next fall.

Section 2.09 of the Texas Education Code requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools must have been immunized against certain diseases. The following is a list of required immunizations:

(a) Children less than five years of age enrolled in pre-school programs:

Three doses of oral polio.

Three doses of DTP vaccines.

One dose each of measles, rubella and mumps vaccine.

(b) Children enrolled in kindergarten through grade five:

At least three doses of oral polio vaccine with the provision that one dose must have been received after age 4.

At least three doses of DTP but one dose must have

been received after age 4.

All students must have received measles vaccine after age 1 or provide a history of measles illness.

Mumps vaccine is required for all students through seven years of age.

(c) Students in grade six through twelve:

All students must have received at least three doses of oral polio vaccine provided one or more doses has been received after age 4.

All students must have received at least three doses of DTP with at least one dose having been received after age 4.

Effective September 1, 1979, students twelve years of age, and all students enrolled in the sixth grade, will be required to have received measles vaccine on or after their first birthday or provide a history of measles illness. On September the first of each year thereafter, students one year older or one grade higher must meet these requirements.

Rubella vaccine is required for students through age 11. (Not after the 12th birthday)

Tetanus-diphtheria (TD) boosters are required every 10 years.

In addition to these required immunizations, a new law requires that each student must have on file, or furnish, an official birth certificate from the Health Department. Baptismal records or birth registration cards (Blue cards) will no longer be acceptable.
