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





Immunization Requirements

For several years, state laws have required all students to be immunized against certain diseases before entering school. Beginning with the 1980-81 school term, this will be strictly enforced.

Students entering school next fall must have on file, or bring to school, medical certification certifying that they have received the required immunizations. Students will not be allowed to enroll without this certification.

The following are the legal requirements for stud-ents entering school next fall.

Section 2.09 of the Texas Education Code requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools must have been immunized against certain diseases. The following is a list of required mmunizations:

(a) Children less than five years of age enrolled in pre-school programs: Three doses of oral

polio.
Three doses of DTP vaccines. One dose each of

measles, rubella and mumps vaccine. (b) Children enrolled in kindergarten through grade

At least three doses of

oral polio vaccine with the provision that one dose must have been received after age 4. At least three doses of

DPT but one dose must have

been received after age 4. All students must have received measles vaccine after age 1 or provide a history of measles illness.

Mumps vaccine is required for all students through seven years of age. (c)Students in grade six

through twelve:
All students must have received at least three doses of oral polio vaccine provided one or more doses has been received after age 4.

All students must have received at least three doses of DPT with at least one dose having been received after

age 4.

Effective September 1, 1979, students twelve years of age, and all students of age. enrolled in the sixth grade. will be required to have received measles vaccine on or after their first birthday or provide a history of measles illness. On September the first of each year thereafter, students one year older or one grade higher must meet these require-

Rubella vaccine is required for students through age 11. (Not after the 12th birthday)

Tetanus-diptheria (TD) boosters are required every 10 years.

In addition to these required immunizations, a new law requires that each student must have on file or furnish, an official birth certificate from the Health Department. Baptismal records or birth registration cards (Blue cards) will no longer be acceptable.

TRUTH IN TAXATION" The language and wording of House Bill 18 "Truth in Taxation" has raised many question Section 26.06 is one of the most confusing to many people. -- For example -- on August 14th, the local board of education must hold a hearing to quote:"increase your property taxes by 26%. House Bill 18 mandates this ambiguous wording. It doe not mean that the local taxpayers will have an increase in property taxes. It means that tax income will be increased because of increases in mineral

valuves and oil prices.

The purpose of the language in the bill is to call attention to taxes. Local homeowners and local businesses will not be affected -- the (proposed) rate and ratio of assessment (50%) will be the same as in previous years. Some school district far mers will actually receive a decrease under the new "productivity" clause of the law. Personal vehicles wi 11 be removed from the tax rolls this year giving most taxpayers an additional decrease, Other decreases will again be given; these include homestea exemption, disabled veterans exemptions, and the 65 years

of age exemption.
The local school is fortunate to have more than one source of ad valorem revenue-In spite of inflation, local taxes on home, farms, and businesses have not changed for three years. All increased operational costs of the local school have been off-set by increases in oil, minerals, and utilities
