

Cotton Crop Is Estimated

will total 12.8 million bales harvested from 13.3 million acres, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's

August 1 estimate. The expected crop is 12 percent below the crop of 14.6 million bales harvested in 1979. Per-acre yield is expected to average 461 pounds, a 16 percent drop from the 548-pound average last year. Texas leads with an

estimated production of 4.3 million bales. California is next with 3 million, followed by Arizona with 1, 3 million. The estimate for Oklahoma is 390,000 bales, a sizable drop from the 1979 production of 522,000 bales.

Under USDA's estimate these four states -- Texas, California, Arizona, and Oklahoma--would produce 9 million of the 12.8 million seen for 1980,

EXPORTS REPORTED: Export sales of 73,700 running bales of cotton during the week ended August brought the new season's total to 3,253,400. The largest purchasers were Japan, 24,200, and Korea, 23,500. Export shipments for the week were 97,500

TAES Field Day

Since 1909, the Texas Agricultural Experiment station has been working in Lubbock and on the South Plains to help the farmer and rancher find better ways of producing his crops and

"And each year, we've had an annual field day to show the public what the scientists are doing, and why,' said Ollie Liner, agricultural Extension agent for Hale County. For many years the field days have alternated between the TAES research facilities at Lubbock and Halfway.

This year's field day will be at Halfway on Tuesday, Sept. 9, Liner said. The facility is 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Hwy. 70. The program will begin

at 1:00 p.m. and continue until 5:00 p.m. Visitors will be conducted on motorized tours of the research plots and see demonstrations of work being done on crop varieties, irrigation, cultural practices and other research. as well as new equipment.

Key stops on the tour will feature work with low energy precision application of irrigation water, furrow diking, weed control and control of mites in corn and other crops.
Visitors will have an

opportunity to discuss specific concerns with the researchers and with agents and specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Serv-

ice, the county agent said.




