TAES Field Day

Since 1909, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has been working in Lubbock and on the South Plains to help the farmer and rancher find better ways of producing his crops and livestock. "And each year, we've had an annual field day to show the public what the scientists are doing, and why," said Ollie Linder, agricultural Extension agent for Hale County. For many years the field days have alternated between the TAES research facilities at Lubbock and Halfway. This year's field day will be at Halfway on Tuesday, Sept. 9, Linder said. The facility is 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Hwy. 70. The program will begin at 1:00 p.m., and continue until 5:00 p.m. Visitors will be conducted on motorized tours of the research plots and see demonstrations of work being done on crop varieties, irrigation, cultural practices and other research, as well as new equipment. Key stops on the tour will feature work with low energy precision application of irrigation water, furrow diking, weed control and control of mites in corn and other crops. Visitors will have an opportunity to discuss specific concerns with the researchers and with agents and specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the county agent said. The annual field day is cooperative presentation of the Experiment Station, the Extension Service, High Plains Research Foundation, USDA Science and Education Administration, and the National Weather Service. In a climactic moment of despair, Joan was invited by a "chance" phone call to attend a Billy Graham crusade. It was here that she first discovered her worth as an individual and began her long struggle to piece her shattered life back together.

Those who have followed Billy Graham's ministry will be interested to know that Dr. Graham appears in the film in some of the footage of his 1954 London Crusade, and also in the introduction and conclusion to the film, photographed recently for this special version.

According to William E. Brown, President of World Wide Pictures, **NO LONGER ALONE** was presented with the "Award of Excellence" from the Film Advisory Board of Hollywood, as well as the "Angel" award from Religion in Media in America, as the outstanding religion film of the year. It also received the "Silver Halo Award" from the Southern California Motion Picture Council.

'Jesus Wept' Bridges Grief

"Thankfully, before my time of grief arrived I had come to depend on the Bible for strength through regular study of the Scriptures.

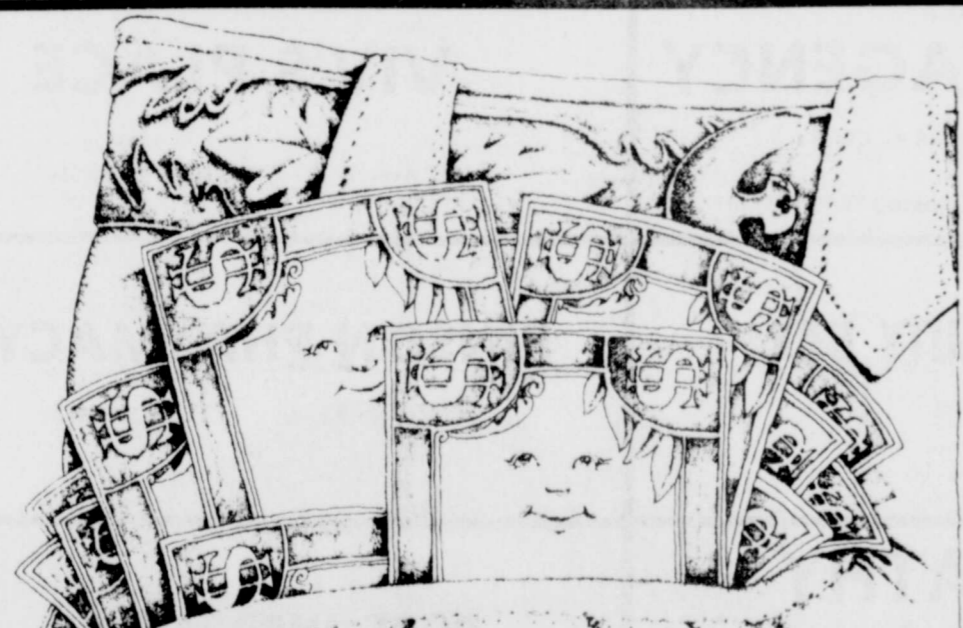

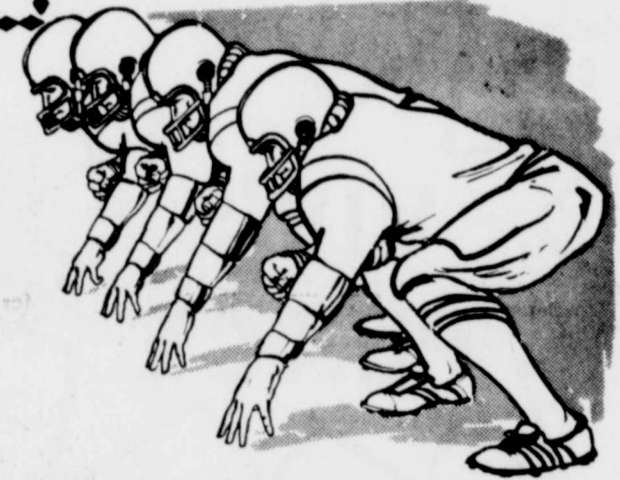

MEXICANI MEAT LOAVES

(Microwave)

1 1/2 lb. ground beef
1/2 C. oatmeal, uncooked
1 egg
1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
2 cans (4 oz.) chopped green chilies, drained
1 T instant onion
2 T. chili powder
1/2 t. salt
Dash pepper & garlic salt

Combine meat, oatmeal, egg, 1/4 C. tomato sauce, 2 cans green chilies, onion, chili powder and salt; mix well. Shape to form four loaves; place in 8" square baking dish. Cook in microwave on high 6 to 7 minutes or until desired doneness; roasting 1/4 turn after each 2 minutes of cooking.

Combine re-maintomato sauce, green chilies, pepper and garlic salt in glass measuring cup and microwave on high about 1 minute. To serve, spoon sauce over meat; sprinkle with cheese. Serves 4.

Note: Conventional oven: 350 degrees for about 1 hour.

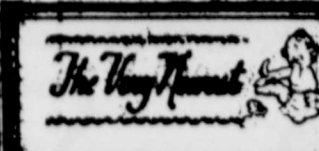
