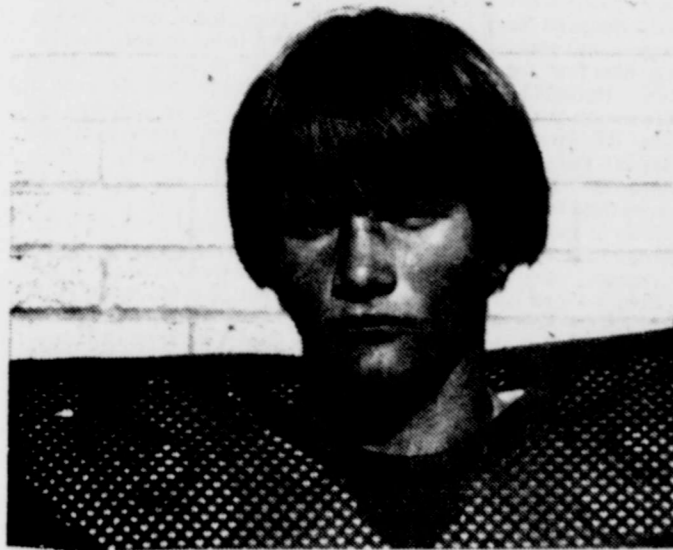

THE ANTELOPES UPSET THE BUFFS 21-0

It's probably no deep, dark secret what AHS head football coach Larry Aldridge said to his 1980 Antelopes during halftime last Friday night, but whatever it was, the results were phenomenal.

After sparring with the Petersburg Buffaloes for a 0-0 standoff during the first two quarters of play here last Friday night, the Antelopes literally exploded at the opening of the second half, and danced to a 21-0 season-opener victory.

Neither team really threatened during the first half, with Abernathy stopping the Buffs on the Antelope 24 on the visitors' deepest penetration. That action was set up when the Buffs recovered an Antelope fumble on Abernathy's first possession of the game.

Early in the second quarter, the Lopes drove to the Buffs' 23, where a fourth down running try failed to net the needed yardage for a first down. That drive had started on the Lopes' own 1 yard line following a 38-yard Buffs punt which went out of bounds at that point.

The Antelopes took the second half kickoff on their own 41, and on the first play from scrimmage, on a fake end-around, junior end Rodney Cannon threw a 54 yard bomb to senior right end Joey Garcia who was dragged down from behind by Petersburg's Mike Willis on the Buffs' 5 yard line. From that point it took Abernathy's leading rusher Sylvester Dunn four tries at the line, going the final half yard on a dive up the middle for the initial TD. Then big senior guard Victor Dees kicked his first of 3 perfect extra points.

The Lopes scored again the next time they got the ball. Against a strong defense and aided by a 15 yard holding penalty against Petersburg, the Buffs had been forced to punt, and the Lopes took over on the Petersburg 44. A penalty set AHS back to their own 48, then quarterback Max Riley, who had alternated on series of downs with Kenneth Moss, threw one of his five completions, connecting on a 14 yarder to Dunn to keep the drive alive. Two additional 8 yard passes aided in the drive, one to junior running back John Ruiz, and the other to senior back Russell Windham, an all-around athlete who moved here this summer from Lazbuddie. Dunn went the final 7 yards off left tackle for the score.

Following the ensuing kickoff, which the Buffs returned to their own 45, the visitors put together a sustained drive, moving to the Abernathy 29 where they faced a fourth-and-six. Then on a pass attempt, quarterback Doug Fullington was

thrown for an 8-yard loss by hard charging Stacey Mills to end the threat. The Lopes couldn't move the ball, and Garcia got off a 35-yard punt. Three plays later the Lopes got the ball again when hard-playing junior Alan Pettit intercepted on a diving catch at the Petersburg 39. Three plays later, following a 16-yard Riley-to-Garcia pass, Dunn shot up the middle, then outstepped the defenders to the goal line 20 yards away for the final TD.

On the ensuing kickoff, Buff Terry Martin managed only a 6 yard return when Pettit nailed him at the 18, arriving downfield almost by the time the ball did. Three plays later, Don Stone rushed through and blocked a Petersburg punt which put Abernathy in business on the Buffs' 20 yard marker. The Lopes and Buffs again exchanged possession twice each before the game ended, but neither team could get a drive underway. The Lopes ground out 182 yards on 52 carries, with Dunn stepping off 94 yards on 26 trips, Windham had 42 yards on 7 carries. The home team added 115 yards through the air, completing 6 of 12 passes. Others doing well at the ball carrying chores included seniors Bobby Sansom, Tony Cox and Ray Ortiz, and junior backs John Ruiz and Ronnie Taylor.

The Buffs had a total of 107 yards rushing and 4 of 14 passes for another 40 yards. The Lopes picked up 15 first downs to Petersburg's 7, and Riley was the leading passer, completing 5 of 7 for 61 yards. Garcia punted 3 times for a 47 yard average, the longest a 61 yarder. He also averaged 45 yards per kick on 4 kickoffs. Defensively, the Lopes worked as a unit, with those in the trenches doing a fine job, including Cody Connell, Rick Houston, Darrick Stallings, James Pace, Luis Lopez, Don Stone, Victor Dees and others. Windham, Mills, Sansom, Garcia, David Davis, David Myatt, Pettit and others also played heads-up ball.

The Lopes will travel to Olton Friday night for their first out-of-town game of the new season. The Mustangs were 29-0 victors last week over a strong Hale Center unit, and the contest slated for 8 o'clock Friday night promises to be a good one.

Changes in HONDA (Hale Center, Olton, New Deal, and Abernathy) Special Education Personnel Assignments highlighted the September meeting of the Abernathy Board of Trustees. 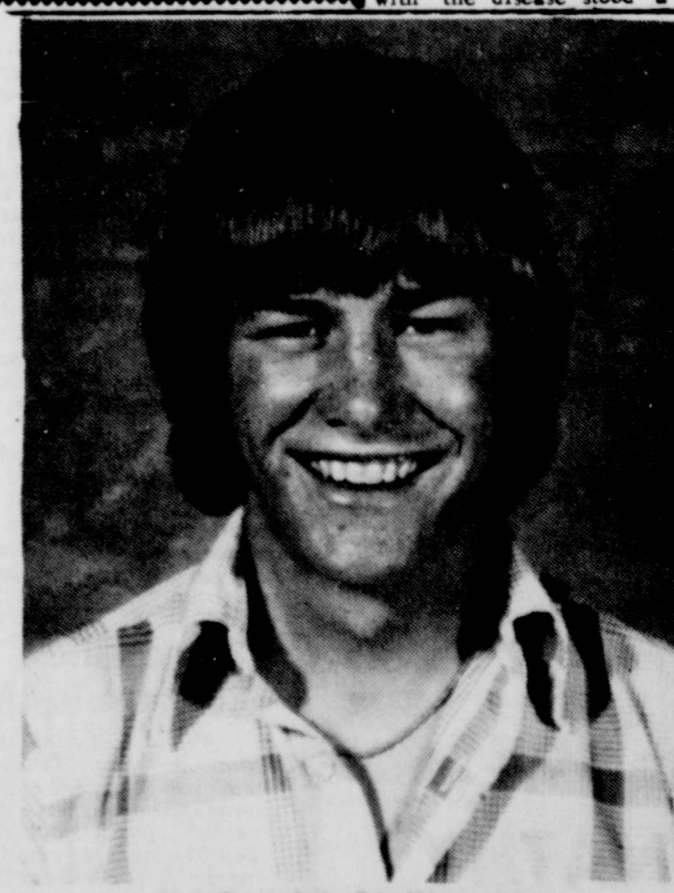
Scout Troop 481 Court of Honor Is Held Here

It never hurts, either, to be in the right frame of mind. The summer of 1980 may be long remembered but it won't no way compare to what was termed as the "Terrible Summer of 1846." No, we don't remember it and we doubt if Frank English does, but our neighbors, Mildred and Gusta Maxwell, passed along this clipping from the Maiden, Mo. paper that their sister, Mrs. Hersell Kendrick, sent to them:

"The year of 1846 was without a summer. The weather was so cold that ice was frozen every day in June and every month experienced frost and freezing weather. June 17 was a memorable date as a big snow fell to the depth of 10 inches and many people were frozen to death. The mean temperature of the summer months was 45 degrees and the crops were failures, the weather being too cold for vegetation of any kind. July and August were colder than June and ice was an inch thick or more. On Aug. 30 another snow fell and the entire summer was as bleak and dreary as November. There was very bitter rain the entire season; farm work was done with heavy wraps and mittens on, and it was necessary to consume a lot of fuel for heating purposes. In September the thermometer reached 70 degrees and for a time the cold was dispelled, but for a short time only, when the winter set in again. The wind blew a gale from the north most of the time and it was fierce and cold."

"The general opinion of the people was that the rapid cooling of the sun had caused the cold, and many believed the end of all things had come. This unusual cold weather was experienced more severely in the Eastern states, but it is a matter of record that it was extremely cold through the middle and Western states."

Jim McIntire, Texas Tech football recruit from New Deal was injured in scrimmage at Tech. Knee surgery was required, placing him on the "injured" list. He will be redshirted this season but will participate in spring training.

Coach Rex Dockery said McIntire had been doing exceptionally well as an offensive guard in workouts, advancing to 2nd team alternate, and would have probably seen some varsity this year. He works extra hard and is a smart ball player, Dockery said.

McIntire was the only area Class-A football recruit for South-West-Conference. In high school he was named to the Class-A-All-State team as offensive tackle and noseguard. He was All-South Plains-Play-

er-of-the-Year. Two way All-District for 3 years. Helped his team to State Quarter finals and 11-1-1 record in his senior year. He had 437 tackles, 31 sacks, 18 recovered fumbles, and 2 blocked punts during his high school career. Lettered 3 years in football, 3 in basketball and 4 years in track.

Jim went to State Meet 3 times in track. His senior year he was State Class A Shotput Champion and 2nd in discus winning 6th place at State for New Deal as a one-man-team with 18 points. He was among the "Top Ten" in all classes with a best throw of 61'10" shotput and a 177'9" in discus. If possible McIntire will also participate in track at Tech.

Local Citizens Express Concerns

(By Vicki) I have had several concerns expressed to me by concerned citizens in the past week. I was in the grocery store one day and a lady stopped me and asked me if I would write something about the people who drive around with their little children hanging out car windows. She said she had seen a child fall out a car window several years ago which caused it's death and this is a concern to her that people let their children hang out windows when they are driving. It bothers me also and I was glad she brought it up. I know that little children like to see where they are going but it is dangerous and a bad habit. If you are guilty of letting your child hang out the window, stop and think of the danger there are and get that precious child to sit down. Good riding habits are important to you and your family. I know that when my children were small I didn't like for them to hang out the windows and be rough and rowdy in the car because it takes your attention from the road and driving.

Another concern is that there are some people on motorcycles and cars that don't seem to know that we have speed limits in town. Also that they have noticed that people are not stopping at the stop signs. One person told me that the saw a young man go through a stop sign on one of our local streets recently going about 60 miles an hour. At the location I am telling about, small children live around there and if one of them had run out in the street it would have been too bad. Also, if another car had been coming from the direction that there is no stop sign someone would have been killed. Let's be aware of the stop and yield signs in our town, they are there for our protection.

I have already written about this concern at the beginning of school and a lady told me this morning that she had seen this going on more than this morning. That is the ONE WAY streets at the school. People are entering them the WRONG WAY, especially in front of the 4th and 5th grade buildings. This lady said, that there was a car almost got hit by the one that came in on the wrong way. Please take the extra time and go around and come in the right way.

Remember the children from the elementary and 4th and 5th grade buildings know that the streets are one way and they expect the cars to drive right and they may not see you if you are entering the one way streets wrong. Please take the extra time and obey the signs. Also remember the speed limit around the school is 20 miles an hour. Also on Ave. D the school zone is 20 miles an hour. You may not have children in school that cross these streets but, we are all just as responsible for their lives. If you are in that big of a hurry to get there start earlier.

Another complaint is about people who park motor homes or any big car, truck, etc., at corners and they cannot see if there is a car coming unless they drive out into the middle of the street. If you have a large unit parked like this please move them.

Decision On Future

The 1980-81 school year is just beginning, but juniors and seniors at Abernathy High School and other schools across the country are already facing some big decisions.

One of these decisions is what to do after graduation—whether to go on to school, get a job, or try to do both.

Playing an important role in the students' post-secondary education and career planning will be guidance counselors, parents, friends, and a national service called the ACT Assessment Program. Designed to provide guidance information for education and career planning, the widely used program is recommended for use by student applicants at more than 2,700 colleges and universities.

Abernathy High School students will have five opportunities during the 1980-81 school year to make use of the national program, which consists of four tests and two-part questionnaire. Students complete the questionnaire at home as part of the registration process, and then take the battery of tests at area test centers on any of five weekend national test dates, explained Charles Bowen, Director of Guidance.

The five 1980-81 national test dates and the corresponding registration deadlines are: TEST DATE: October 18, 1980; December 13, 1980; February 14, 1981; March 28, 1981; June 13, 1981.

REGISTRATION DEADLINES: September 19; November 14; January 16; February 27; May 15.

The basic student fee for using the ACT Assessment is \$50.

It takes students about three hours to complete the ACT Assessment's four exams, which cover four subject areas: English, Math, social studies, and natural sciences. On any of the test dates, most local students will take the tests at Texas Tech University or Lubbock Christian College.

Mr. Bowen said the test scores provide an assessment of general educational development, while the questionnaire information focuses on academic and nonacademic accomplishments and interests, as well as career and educational plans.

In addition to being used by students and their high school counselors, information provided by the ACT Assessment is also used by colleges for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. Students' ACT Assessment reports are sent to only those colleges specifically designated by the respective students.

One of several educational services provided by the American College Testing Program (ACT), the ACT Assessment Program is used each year by more than 900,000 students as part of their education and career planning.

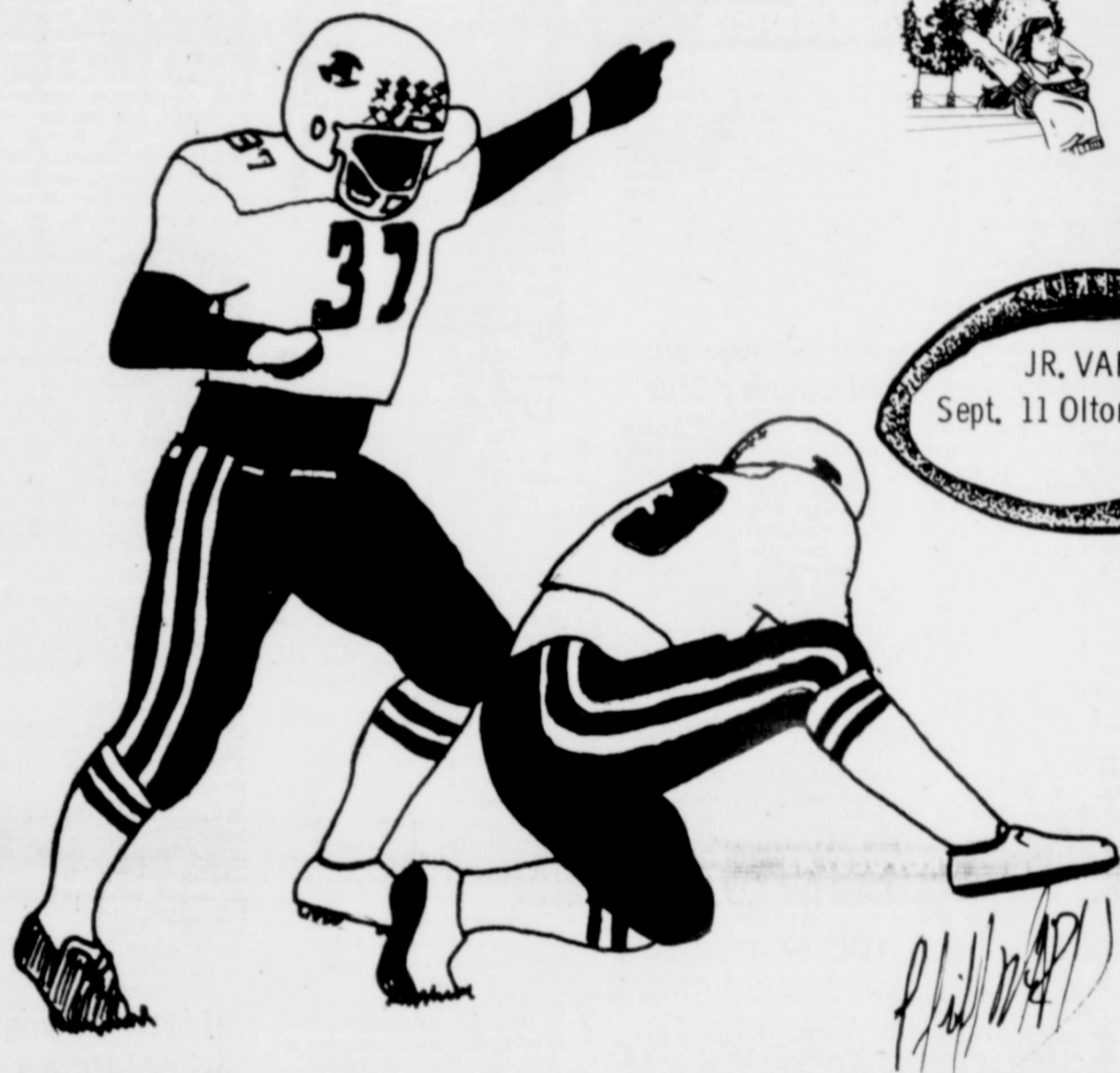

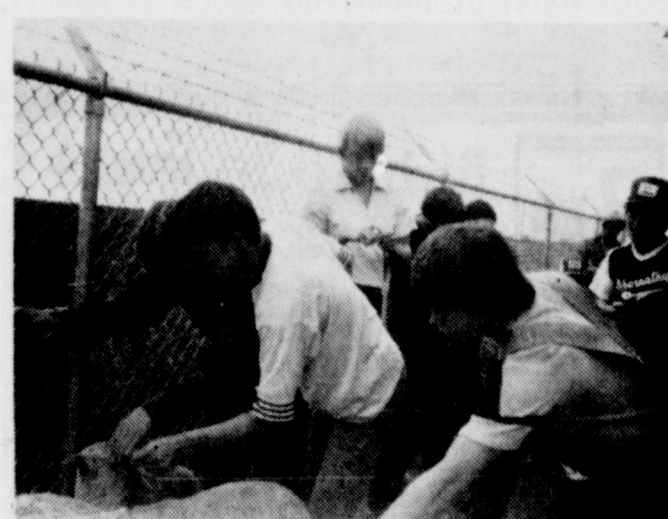

Lamb projects for the 1980-81 year in Vocational Agriculture at Abernathy High School are underway. On the weekend of September 6-7, the vo-ag teachers travelled to Mullin, Texas where they picked up 54 lambs. The lambs are from a variety of different places including Colorado, the Dakotas and the San Angelo-San Antonio ranchland of Texas.

On Monday, September 8th, the Vocational Agriculture Classes prepared the lambs for the coming year. They vaccinated them and ear tagged them.

Approximately 30-vo-ag students will have these lambs as their projects this year.

Unofficial 2,906 For City Census Is 208 Increase

City Manager Rod Ellis reported that the district census office in Lubbock has come up with an additional 208 to give Abernathy an unofficial population count of 2,906. Ellis expects the original "100 vacant houses in Abernathy" census report to be lowered in a second unofficial statement from Lubbock.

The initial unofficial report from the district census office listed Abernathy's population at 2,698, which was only a 73 increase over the 2,625 as listed on the highway signs giving population. After the 2,698 unofficial report was received, Ellis started working to have it increased to a figure nearer the 3000 mark as indicated by the number of water meters, SPS meters and other indicators. Wayne Arthur says that General has from 2000 to 2200 telephones in the Abernathy exchange.

When the initial unofficial census figures were released in Texas, hundreds of cities and towns (even Houston) challenged the population reports.

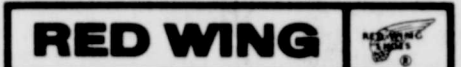

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate un-manned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The constitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the approval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."

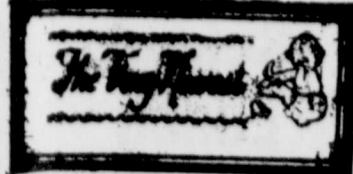
