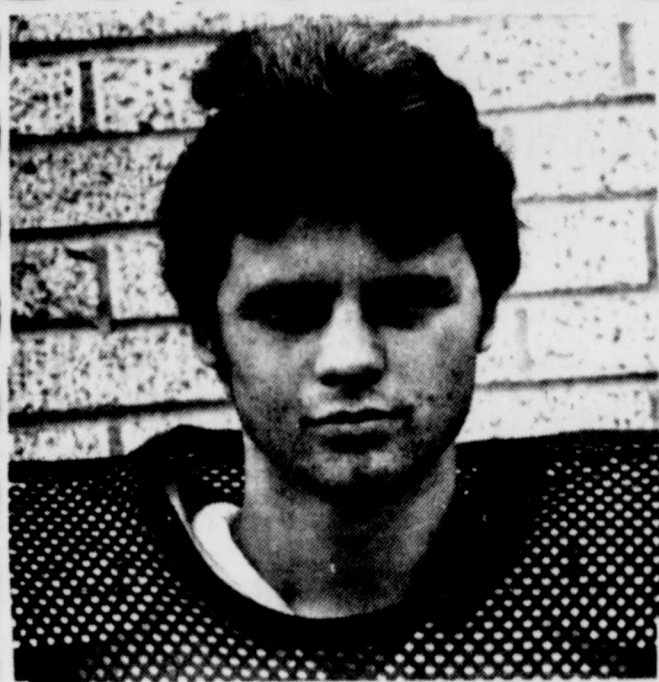
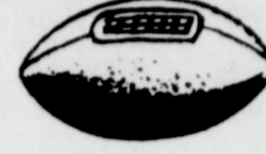

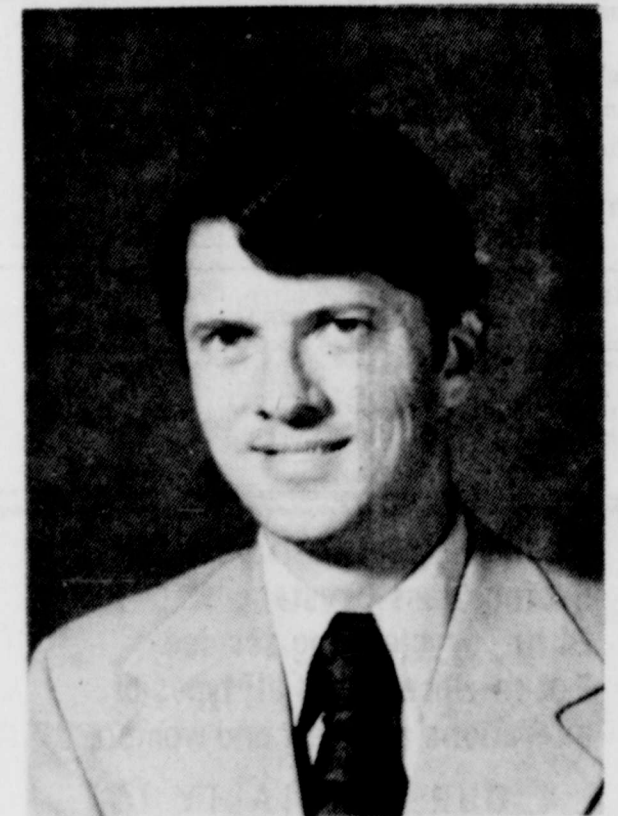
**BOBBY SANSON**

### Antelopes Lose To Olton After The Battle

The Abernathy Antelopes tasted defeat for the first time in the young 1980 season last Friday night at the hands of the undefeated Olton Mustangs, but not before they gave the Mustangs a good scare early in the contest. Not only did it appear as though the Lopes of Coach Larry Aldridge would run at will against the big defenders, but they also contained the powerful running attack until late in the second quarter.

On the other hand, the Antelopes' "big burst" in the opening phase of the game fizzled out, and they came up on the short end of a 12-0 score.

The Lopes took the opening kickoff, and put their offensive machine to work at their own 45 yard line after a fine 34 yard runback by John Ruiz. On the first play from scrimmage, quarterback Max Riley burst through the middle of the line on a keeper for a 17 yard gain, then running back Sylvester Dunn slanted off tackle for a 12 yard to the Olton 26.

Three plays and one 5 yard penalty later, the Lopes faced fourth and 6 at 22. That's when they sent Dunn around left end on a pitchout for 11 yards and a first down. Runningback Russell Windham hit the middle of the line for 4 yards, then Dunn got 5 more off-tackle before Windham carried it in on the next play from 2 yards out, Victor Dees' extra point attempt was low and off to the right, but Abernathy held a 6-0 lead until just under 5 minutes remained in the half.

The Lopes kicked off to the Mustangs, then put up a stout defense that allowed the Mustangs only 2 net yards on 3 plays, forcing them to punt. Smith's punt went out of bounds at the Abernathy 14, and the Lopes began what appeared to be another drive. With Dunn, Ruiz and Tony Cox carrying the mail, the Lopes picked up 11 yards and a first down on three plays, but then Dunn fumbled and Olton recovered on the Abernathy 26.

It looked bad for the Lopes as Olton picked up 2 quick first downs, with Olton's power runner Danny Garcia carrying to the 1 yard line. Olton then drew a five yard offensive penalty, then a 1 yard gain, a 3 yard loss, and a 4 yard gain brought up 4th and goal at the 4 yard line. On the next play a 15 yard clipping penalty cost the Mustangs a touchdown, moving the ball back to the 19. That's when Abernathy defender Kenneth Moss tried of the Mustangs flanking with

paydirt and picked off Gregg Smith's pass in the end zone, giving the Lopes possession on the 20.

The Lopes were unable to get untracked, and Joey Garcia got off his best punt of the evening, a booming 62 yarder that sailed over the deep back's head and rolled to the Olton 22. Olton picked up a first down out to the 36, then 2 incomplete passes, and a 4 yard gain preceded a 35 yard punt. A 15 yard penalty against Abernathy put the Lopes in business on their own 16. Quarterback Moss picked up 4 yards, then 5 more by Dunn gave the Lopes a first down at the 27. However, 3 plays later the Lopes found themselves in a punting situation, and Garcia got off a 40 yarder.

The Mustangs set up shop on their own 33, and from that point put together a 67-yard, 5-yard scoring drive, with a Smith-to-Henry Perez pass covering the final 60 yards. The extra point try failed, and the score read 6-6.

With 4:58 remaining in the first half, neither team could muster a successful drive, and one Olton surge was stopped when David Myatt intercepted on his own 26 and returned it to the 40. Myatt got his second interception of the night shortly after the second half kickoff, returning the ball from his own 36 to the Olton 42. However, Abernathy could not get a drive moving, and after an exchange of punts, the Lopes appeared to be in gear once again. Cox hit the middle of the line for a 12 yard gain, then Ruiz picked up another first down on a 13 yard pick up, then things began to go wrong. After a 4 yard gain by Dunn, the Lopes were penalized 15 yards for holding. Then a screen pass from Garcia to Dunn lost 2 yards, and Moss lost 4 more on a pass attempt. Garcia got off a 34 yard punt, which was returned to the 50 yard marker, and from there the Mustangs marched in for their final score. Olton's Garcia, who gained 155 yards on 23 carries, went the final 22 yards for the TD. The point-after try again failed.

With a full quarter remaining, the teams played eye-saw with punts and pass interceptions being the rule rather than the exception. In addition, Olton tried a field goal from the 23 yard line which fell way short of its intended mark.

The Lopes managed only 10 first downs to the Mustangs' 15, and had only 128 yards on 38 carries to 211 yards on the ground for Olton. In addition to the screen pass, the Lopes completed only one other pass, an 18 yard toss from Moss to flanker Bobby Sansom. Olton's only pass completion

### Mayor Issues Proclamation

Mayor Pete Thompson declared September 24 as "Kiss Your Baby" Day in Abernathy by signing an official proclamation today.

"Kiss Your Baby" Day will be held as part of National Cystic Fibrosis Week and the local CF Breath of Life Campaign.

Stressing the need for greater public health education in Abernathy, the Mayor said that "Kiss Your Baby" Day is designed to help parents recognize the symptoms of Cystic Fibrosis in their children.

One of the signs of CF is a salty taste to the skin. Mothers have sometimes alerted doctors to the possibility of CF when kissing their babies and tasting salt, explained Mayor Thompson.

Cystic Fibrosis is inherited by approximately one of every 1,600 American babies. It occurs when a child receives a gene for the disease from each parent. So far, there's no cure for CF, but early diagnosis and treatment are helping to lengthen lives. Today, 50 percent of CF patients can be expected to live past age 19, where once few survived to school age.

The signs of Cystic Fibrosis include: recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing with excessive mucus, pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite with poor weight gain and clubbing (enlarging of fingertips). Cystic Fibrosis signs also include a salty taste of the skin, persistent bulky diarrhea and nasal polyps.

The mayor joins the Lone Star Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation in urging every one to "Kiss Your Baby" and watch for the signs of Cystic Fibrosis in all children.

### PARENTAL EDUCATION DRIVE

In its first meeting of the year, the Parent Advisory Council decided to sponsor a home study campaign that would reinforce the work introduced at school. Entitled the "Parental Education Drive", the program would work as follows:

Council members will be contacting parents of school children and encouraging them to take an active part in getting their child (or children) to study at home. It was suggested that parents of young children could read to their children or let their children read to them, give out spelling words, and help their children learn addition and multiplication facts. It was also suggested that if a certain place and certain time each day was set aside for homework, it would tend to develop good study habits for our children. If a child does not have homework on a given day, the time could be spent on reading, since this is the most important thing he will learn in the lower grades. Parents of older students will be encouraged to provide a time and place for their children to do their homework without distraction and to talk with their children about school work and what they are learning at school. It was pointed out that the important thing is for parents to leave their children with the impression that school work is important and good study habits at home will help their work at school.

Each member of the Advisory Council agreed to contact three parents and ask each of them to contact three more parents until it becomes a community wide campaign. Parents are the most important teachers that children have. If you, as a parent, can help your child learn the basic educational skills and help him or her develop good study habits at an early age, you will have done a lot towards insuring that he, or she, receives a good education.

**Chicken and Broccoli with Mushroom Sauce**

1 10-ounce package frozen broccoli  
 3 Tablespoons margarine  
 3 Tablespoons flour  
 1 Cup chicken broth

1 4-ounce can mushroom slices, with liquid  
 1 Pound cooked chicken, sliced  
 2 Tablespoons chopped parsley  
 2 Tablespoons bread crumbs

Preheat oven to 375° F.  
 Cook broccoli according to package directions. Mix margarine and flour together in saucepan. Cook briefly over medium heat. Blend in chicken broth, stirring constantly until thickened and smooth. Stir in mushrooms and their liquid. Season to taste. Place broccoli pieces in a shallow baking pan. Cover with sliced chicken and pour mushroom sauce over all. Top with parsley and bread crumbs. Bake, uncovered, 15-25 minutes, or until bubbly and brown on top.

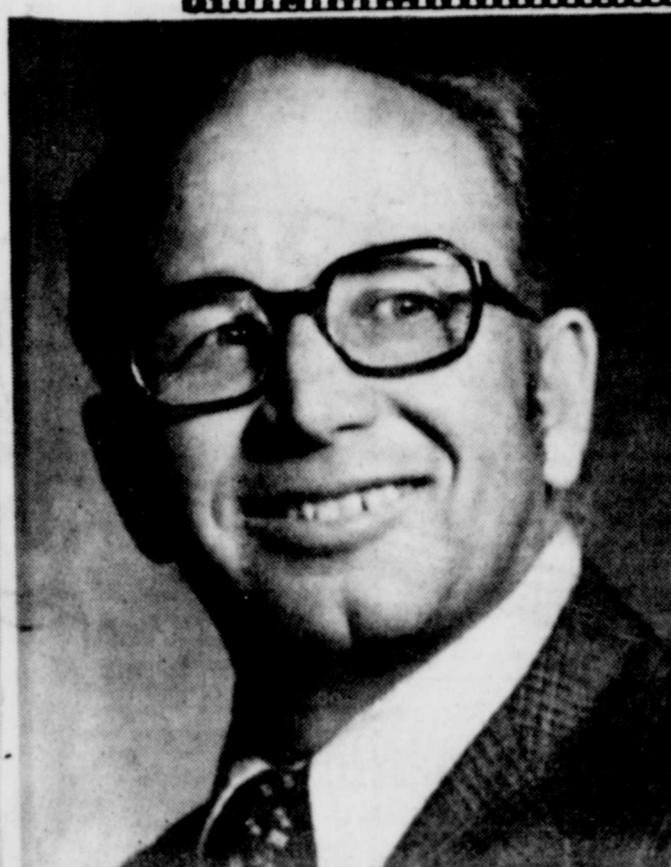

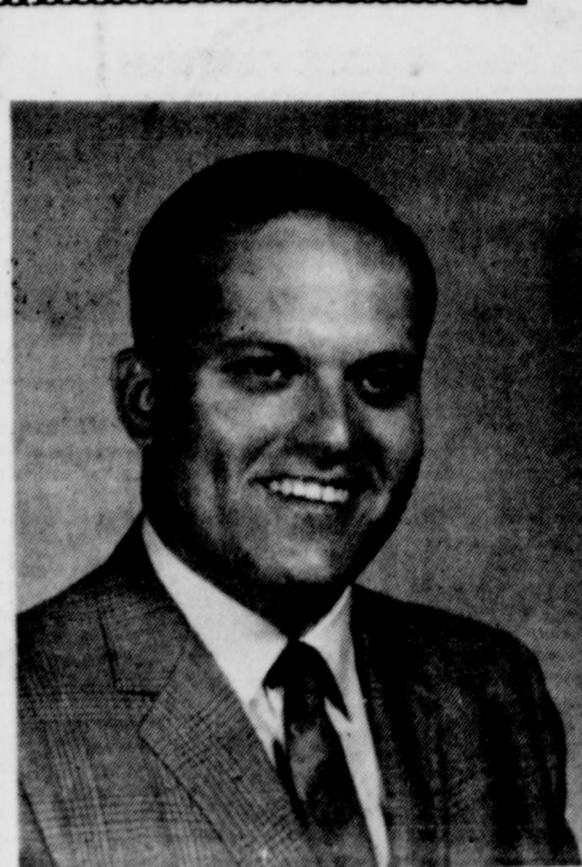

COURSE TEACHES STUDENTS PRACTICAL TAX INFORMATION

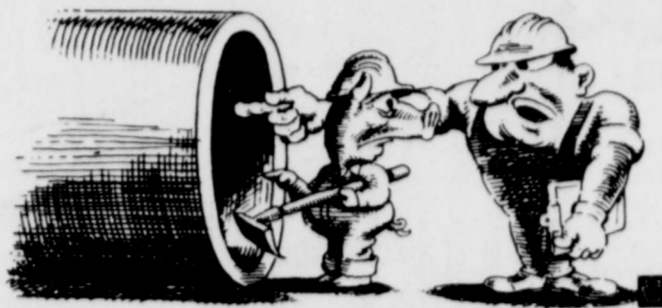
LUBBOCK, TX---Many high school students are graduating these days knowing pretty much the basics of English grammar, math, and history, but they probably can't balance a checkbook, comparison price shop, or fill out an income tax return.

"Understanding Taxes"--an Internal Revenue Service-sponsored course offered to interested high schools for their students--the tide is turning as far as filling out a tax return is concerned.

"Understanding Taxes" is a free instructional program which nearly 24,000 schools incorporated into their curriculum in the 1980 school year--reaching almost five million students. Among Lubbock area schools participating are New Deal and Idalou.

Oil Field "Slanguage"



Boll weevils have invaded oil rigs, even rigs found miles out to sea.

Don't get too upset, however, these boll weevils are extremely productive instead of destroying valuable cropland like the varmints you are used to hearing about.

"Boll weevil is just a slang expression for an inexperienced rig or oil field worker," explains J. J. Rouse, public relations manager for Exxon Company, U.S.A.

The colorful "oil-patch slang-usage" is so extensive, Rouse notes, "that entire dictionaries have been devoted to it."

The list of oil industry terms holds a fascination for animals. A pig, for example, is not a four-legged farm animal but a scraping tool forced through a pipeline to clean out accumulations such as wax or scale from the inside walls.

Dogs have found a happy home in the industry's dictionary. A doghouse is a small enclosure on the rig floor used as an office for the driller or as a storehouse for small objects. A dogleg is a sharp bend put into any object.

And what about a boom dog? That's a ratchet device

on a crane which prevents the boom of the crane from being lowered but still permits it to be raised. "It also is called a boom ratchet," the Exxon official explains.

A mousehole is an opening through the rig floor and plays a role in the process of lengthening the pipes which make up the "drill string." "The mousehole, however, shouldn't be confused with the mouse-trap, which is a tool used to recover pipe which may be accidentally dropped into a well bore," Rouse says.

Doodlebugs are various devices used in searching for petroleum deposits. And, once the doodlebugs do their job, the spot is marked with a Christmas tree, the terms used to describe the valves, pressure gauges and other hardware to control the flow after a well has been completed.

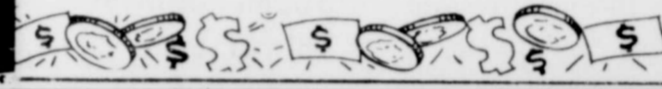

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unattended teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unattended teller machines within the county or city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pre-trial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

Limer stated this brings up the question of defoliating mature cotton. He has scheduled a meeting with the Hale County Chamber of Commerce cooperating. This meeting will be held on Monday, September 22 beginning at 9:30 a.m. at the American Legion Hall in Hale Center. Coffee will be served by the Hale Center Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. James Supak, Cotton Specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock, will be on hand to discuss cotton defoliation. Roy Childers, Cotton Gin Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, will be available to discuss harvesting methods.

Limer stated that this can be a mature crop of cotton if it is handled right and these specialists should be able to give some guides in the handling of cotton defoliation and cotton harvest.

Limer urges all cotton farmers and growers interested to attend. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

## Veteran SPEC executive retiring, another Tech grad taking helm

The board of directors of South Plains Electric Cooperative has announced the retirement of its long time manager, W.G. (Glen) Newton, and the selection of J.C. Roberts, general manager of San Bernard Electric Cooperative at Bellville, to succeed Newton.

Effective date of the leadership change is September 1. Newton will continue as a consultant until the change is completed but expects to be in full retirement by the end of this year.

Newton is a pioneer in rural electrification at area, state, and national levels. His career began shortly after graduation from Texas Tech with an engineering degree. He then did engineering work on a rural electric system being organized at Tahoka, and later, one at Mineola, before becoming manager of South Plains Electric in October, 1959.

Newton was one of the incorporators of the Association of Texas Electric Cooperatives and was president of the statewide organization in 1957-58. From 1963 to 1979 he represented Texas on the board of directors of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association.

The Lubbock executive was a leader in securing passage of the Texas Rural Telephone Enabling Act in 1949 and in obtaining financing for the newly organized South Plains Telephone Cooperative of Lubbock in October, 1950. He managed both the telephone and electric systems until the telephone system became operational.

Newton was an incorporating director of West Texas Savings Association in 1973 and has served on its board since. He is a member of the Lubbock Kiwanis Club.

Newton was on military leave from the Cooperative in 1943-46 to serve as a lieutenant in the USNR Civil Engineering Corps. He is married to the former Hazel Millican, member of

a pioneer area family. They have a married daughter and two grandsons. In announcing the management change, South Plains Electric board president R.D. McCallister observed: "Of the more than 1,000 rural electric systems in the nation, few have

been blessed with the depth and stability of management we have enjoyed here at Lubbock. During Mr. Newton's 41 years as general manager, SPEC has grown to be a \$25-million enterprise serving 20,000 meters. And the Cooperative has returned more than \$7 million to the members by cash retirement of capital credits (operating margins)."

Roberts, Newton's successor, is a Texas Tech graduate also, and while a student he worked part-time at South Plains Electric. Following graduation in 1962 he continued with the Cooperative as office engineer until he went to the Bellville-based Cooperative in 1966. He became general manager there in 1974. Last year, Roberts was elected to succeed Newton on the NRECA board of directors.

Newton, looking back over his lengthy involvement in rural electrification, says:

"I know of no career that could have offered me greater personal satisfaction nor opportunity for greater service to this area. I grew up on a farm in the Liberty community of Lubbock County without electricity or running water. During my last three public school years, I drove 17 miles over dirt roads to Lubbock to graduate from an accredited high school, and I continued commuting to Texas Tech for four years during the bitterest 'Great Depression' years. Being allowed to have a career devoted to the uplift of rural life and to see agriculture take its rightful place in the American economic system has been a unique privilege and highlight of my life."

## J. E. Kirchoff Of Plainview, Candidate For 76th District State Representative

Slaton-John Kirchoff, Republican candidate for State Representative, District 76, strongly criticized his opponent for failure to support the repeal of the state's prevailing wage law.

This law, more commonly called a "mini Davis-Bacon Act," requires that a local governing body establish the mandatory pay scale for all classifications of construction workers on taxpayer-financed jobs. "In practice, prevailing wage rates have come to mean union rates," Kirchoff told a group of supporters Wednesday afternoon in Slaton. This forced waste of taxpayer dollars affects school districts, water districts, cities, counties, and the state.

As far back as 1971 a study done by the United States General Accounting Office indicates that the inflationary impact of union wage rates is approximately 15% of the total public construction dollar. Kirchoff said, adding, "Today 20% is a more realistic figure." In effect this law is wasting 20% of all taxpayers dollars spent on construction. The construction industry is the only business or industry in the United States which is forced to comply with separate wage laws for public construction. "It is the taxpayer who pays the bill," stated Kirchoff.

The prevailing wage law forces governmental bodies to interject themselves into labor/management relations.

"I think free market forces--not public officials--should determine the wages paid in the market place," said Kirchoff.

It was the AFL-CIO that applied the strongest pressure on legislators to oppose the repeal of the prevailing wage law.

Texas is one of only 20 states left which still has a prevailing wage law. "Unlike my opponent I believe the Texas legislature should do as others states have done and abolish the prevailing wage law in its entirety, in any shape, form, or fashion," Kirchoff explained. "The effect of this would be that market forces would control competition on public projects just as they presently do on private construction work and the taxpayer would save money," Kirchoff said.

Newton was one of the incorporators of the Association of Texas Electric Cooperatives and was president of the statewide organization in 1957-58. From 1963 to 1979 he represented Texas on the board of directors of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association.

The Lubbock executive was a leader in securing passage of the Texas Rural Telephone Enabling Act in 1949 and in obtaining financing for the newly organized South Plains Telephone Cooperative of Lubbock in October, 1950. He managed both the telephone and electric systems until the telephone system became operational.

Newton was an incorporating director of West Texas Savings Association in 1973 and has served on its board since. He is a member of the Lubbock Kiwanis Club.

Newton was on military leave from the Cooperative in 1943-46 to serve as a lieutenant in the USNR Civil Engineering Corps. He is married to the former Hazel Millican, member of

## J. E. Kirchoff Of Plainview, Candidate For 76th District State Representative

Slaton-John Kirchoff, Republican candidate for State Representative, District 76, strongly criticized his opponent for failure to support the repeal of the state's prevailing wage law.

This law, more commonly called a "mini Davis-Bacon Act," requires that a local governing body establish the mandatory pay scale for all classifications of construction workers on taxpayer-financed jobs. "In practice, prevailing wage rates have come to mean union rates," Kirchoff told a group of supporters Wednesday afternoon in Slaton. This forced waste of taxpayer dollars affects school districts, water districts, cities, counties, and the state.

As far back as 1971 a study done by the United States General Accounting Office indicates the inflationary impact of union wage rates is approximately 15% of the total public construction dollar. Kirchoff said, adding, "Today 20% is a more realistic figure." In effect this law is wasting 20% of all taxpayers dollars spent on construction. The construction industry is the only business or industry in the United States which is forced to comply with separate wage laws for public construction. "It is the taxpayer who pays the bill," stated Kirchoff.

The prevailing wage law forces governmental bodies to interject themselves into labor/management relations.

"I think free market forces--not public officials--should determine the wages paid in the market place," said Kirchoff.

It was the AFL-CIO that applied the strongest pressure on legislators to oppose the repeal of the prevailing wage law.

Texas is one of only 20 states left which still has a prevailing wage law. "Unlike my opponent I believe the Texas legislature should do as others states have done and abolish the prevailing wage law in its entirety, in any shape, form, or fashion," Kirchoff explained.

The effect of this would be that market forces would control competition on public projects just as they presently do on private construction work and the taxpayer would save money," Kirchoff said.

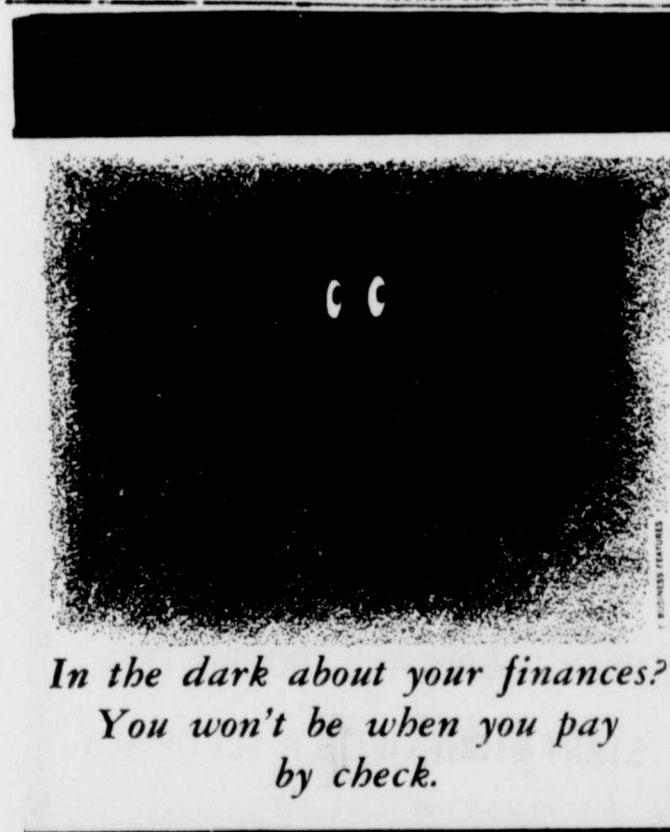
