Penalties And Owls Upset The Antelopes

The Abernathy Antelopes' 1980 season record fell to 1-2 last Friday night at the hands of the strong Hale Center Owls. The contest was marred by penalties, one of which cost the Antelopes a touchdown; thus the Lopes came up on the short end of a 7-0 score. Each team was penalized 13 times during the evening, with Abernathy being penalized 93 yards and Hale Center 102.

The Antelope offense had trouble all night, but especially during the first half, as they did not manage a first down until midway in the third quarter. The Lopes picked up 6 first downs to the Owls' 18, and had 56 yards rushing to Hale Center's 223. Via air, the Lopes connected on 2 of 5 passes for 24 yards, while the Owls had 60.

Sylvester Dunn was called on 6 times to punt, and ended the evening with a 40.3 yard average, the longest being a 62 yarder. Hale Center's 205-pound tailback Gordon Compton was the big gun in the Owls' offensive attack, picking up 159 yards for the night.

The Owls scored their TD on their second possession of the evening, after the Lopes had turned them away once before at the 16 yard line. The Lopes had taken over at that point, but with the aid of a penalty half the distance to the goal line and only 3 yards picked up on three plays, Dunn got off a 41 yard punt which was returned to the 47. However, another penalty against Abernathy at that point put the Owls in business on the Lopes' 28, and the Owls used 9 plays against stout defense, with Compton going the final 2 yards for the score. Kyle Carver kicked the extra point and that was all the scoring that counted.

The Owls managed only one other threat during the first half, moving to the Abernathy 19 where the Lopes took over on downs. Again, the Lopes appeared to be moving in the wrong direction, and Dunn got off his 62 yard punt from the 9.

On the second play of the second half, David Myatt apparently intercepted a pass, according one official, but that official was overruled and the Lopes had to stop the Owls on downs four plays later. After another exchange of punts, and an 8 yard return, the Lopes took over on their own 34 and began their best offensive drive of the night.

With the aid of a 5 yard penalty against Hale Center and a 20 yard pass completion from quarterback Max Riley to end Rodney Cannon, and a 5 yard pass completion to Bobby Ross, the Lopes picked up two first downs to the Owls' 27. Three running plays lost 2 yards, then pass

interference was called against Hale Center on a pass attempt to Cannon and the Lopes had new life on Owls' 15. From there Dunn skirted right end and crossed the double-stripe, but the Lopes were flagged for off-sides. So instead of 6 points for the Lopes, they faced 1st and 15 from the 20. Three plays later the Lopes had another first down on the 8 yard line, then things began to go wrong again. Dunn was tripped up behind the line of scrimmage for a 2 yard loss, Russell Windham picked up 4 yards, then a 5 yard penalty moved the ball back to the 11. Riley was then dropped for a 9 yard loss on a pass attempt, bringing up 4th down at the 20. Knowing the Owls would expect a pass, the Lopes ran a draw instead, but Dunn picked up only a couple of yards and the Owls took over on their own 18.

The Lopes put up a strong defense and forced the Owls to punt, then began another drive with Dunn picking up a quick 15 yards behind good blocking and a first down at the Owls 39. However, a couple of plays later, Compton took the ball away from an Antelope back after he was down and the officials called it a fumble and a recovery by Hale Center. The Lopes got the ball four plays later when Compton was hit hard and coughed up the ball at the Abernathy 31.

The Lopes picked up another 15 yards but fumbled and Hale Center recovered on the Abernathy 40. The Owls worked to the Abernathy 13, then the Lopes dug in to keep the Owls from scoring again. John Ruiz and Victor Dees teamed up to throw Compton for a 2 yard loss, then Kenneth Moss and a few others stopped Mitch Johnson for another 2 yard loss. An exchange of penalties put the ball on the 17, and on the final play of the game Freddy Palacios lost 4 more yards at the hands of David Davis, Stacey Mills and others. Other playing head-up defense included Ricky Powell, Darrick Stallings, James Pace, Rick Houston, Cody Connell, Rodney Cannon, David Myatt, Collins Miller, Alan Pettit, John Ruiz and Darrick Stallings.

The Lopes will host the Roosevelt Eagles Friday night at 8 o'clock on Antelope Field. The Eagles lost to Idalou last week, 27-7, and are currently 0-3 for the season.

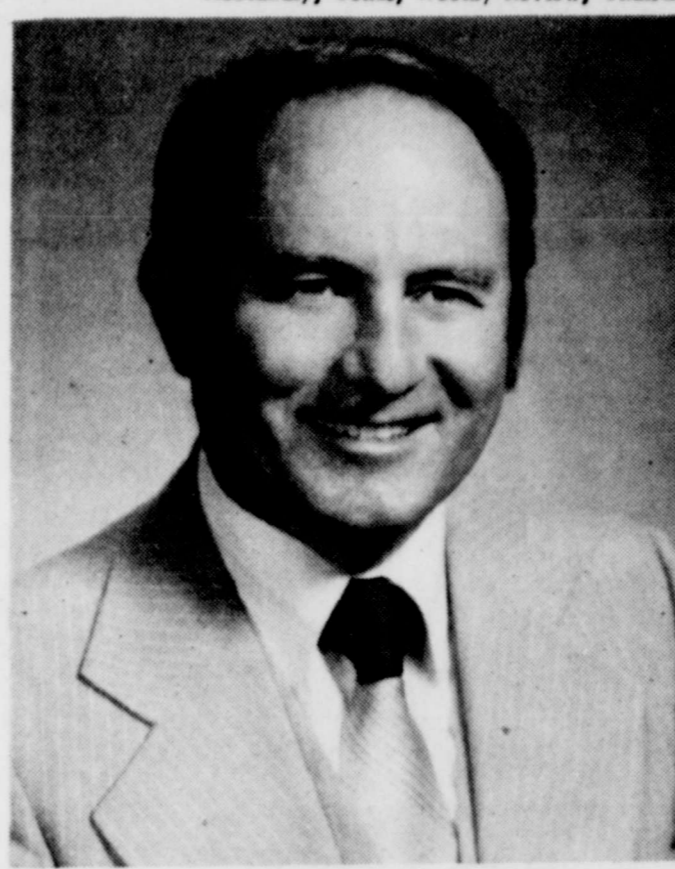

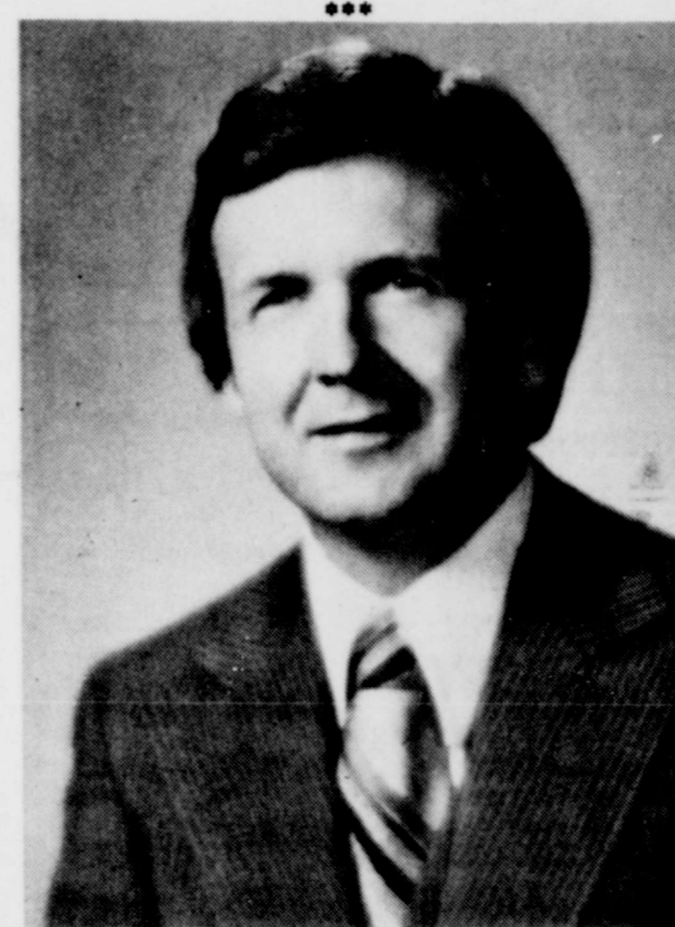

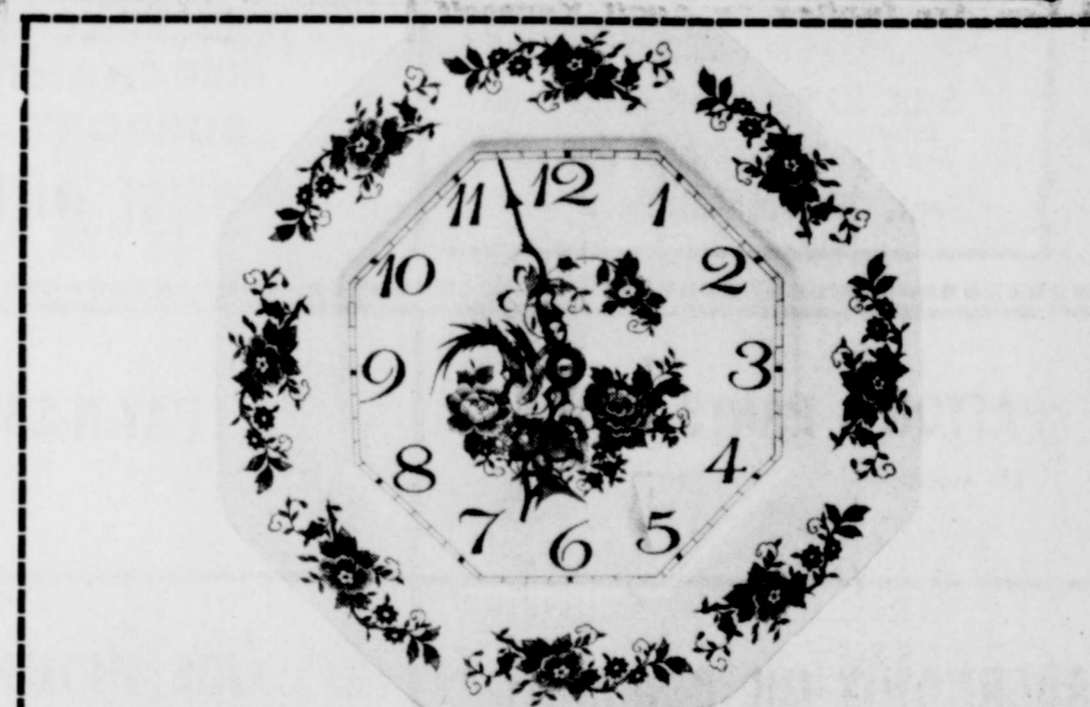
It was decided by the group to plan and implement a Community-Wide Crusade in the summer of 1981. Plans and details are in progress.

After appreciation was given Lillie Mae for the many years of service in the Home Missions program, the meeting adjourned.

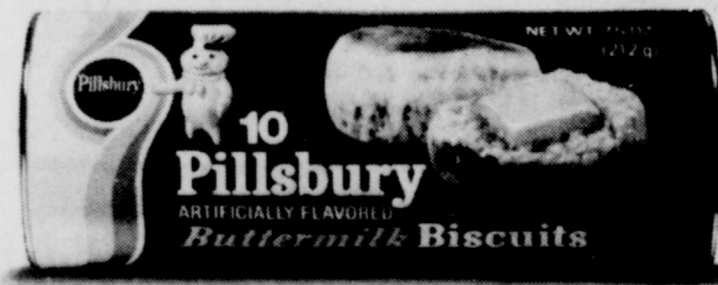
