Harold Gene Davis Family Farm Family of the Week

"Nothing is sweeter than the smell of new mown hay."

The Harold Gene Davis family farm 480 acres of alphalfa on their land southeast of Petersburg.

Harold Gene was born in Abernathy in 1943 to farm parents. He was graduated from Abernathy High School in 1962 and then attended Texas Tech University in Lubbock

Billie, his wife, was reared in Abernathy also and was graduated from Abernathy High in 1962.

The couple went all through school together, ut their only date during their school years was during twirp week. "She asked me for the

first date," Harold

laughed. "When we were in high school, twirp week was the week set aside for girls to ask boys for dates. During all of our school days we were just

friends." After graduation Billie attended beauty school in Lubbock while Harold was in Tech. They started dating seriously and were married in November of 1963.

The Davises started farming in Petersburg in 1971. At that time they were growing cotton and maize, but the land became so badly overtaken with johnson grass that they decided to begin growing alphalfa commercially in 1975.

Alphalfa will choke out johnson grass and other weeds.

When an alphalfa farm is started, it is planted from seed the first time, and then it matures and averages about five cuttings a season beginning in the middle of May through about the middle of November. "It takes a lot of water,"

said Harold. "Moisture is the most critical part of alphalfa farming. Most of the cutting is done early in the morning. When the weather begins to get hotter and dryer, cutting begins sometimes at 3 a.m. while the dew is still on the crop," explained

Harold. "It's nice at 3 in the morning, very calm and quiet, there are no interruptions, no visitors, and you're all by

yourself," he said. Afternoons are spent repairing and getting equipment ready for the next day's work.

The Davis farm uses Zimmatic sprinklers to irrigate the alphalfa.

"Before the sprinkler system came along, the whole family changed water together," said

Billie is owner and manager of Billie's Clip Joint in Petersburg, and she says sometimes the family doesn't see much of each other, especially during the busy months of summer

A large part of the

alphalfa crop is sold to dairies in the area and to ranches in South Texas. However, one load has

been shipped as far away as Disney World, Florida. The Harold Davis family along with Harold's parents do all the work themselves on their farm. At one time recently they were pulling four hay bailers

behind one tractor. They raise beef cattle and during winter months the cattle graze the alphalfa. The crops usually last about fifteen years without replanting if they are well taken care

Harold and Billie have two daughters, Alicia, 14, a freshman next year at Petersburg High School and Amy, 11, who will be a sixth grader. They have one son Audie, 8, and a third grader.

The whole family is very involved in the community. Lisa will be a high school twirler next

year. Amy and Audie like to sing together for different social functions. Billie teaches a junior high Sunday School class at the local First United Methodist Church. She and her husband are both members of the church's administrative board. They play adult volleyball and are sponsoring a little league baseball team this summer.

The family likes going to the lake together in the summer.




