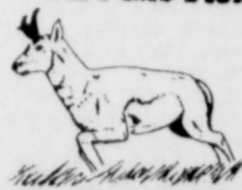

Antelopes Victorious Over Eagles

The Antelopes of Abernathy High put together an 80 yard scoring drive on their first possession of the game last Friday night, then went on to slip and slide to a 22-0 victory over the visiting Roosevelt Eagles.

With rain falling throughout the contest, the game was marred by numerous miscues as each team had trouble finding the handle on various occasions. But for the sparse crowd of hometown fans it was something to cheer about as the Lopes evened their record at 2-2.

The Lopes' defense was outstanding at times, in spite of the weather, and good enough the rest of the time to limit the visitors to only 3 first downs and forcing them into their own end zone and one occasion for a two-point safety.

Quarterback Max Riley teamed up with the end Rodney Cannon from the five yard line to cap the 80 yard TD march late in the first quarter, and Victor Dees kicked the extra point to give the Lopes a 7-0 lead. That score stood until late in the third quarter when the whole front wall of the Antelope defense forced the visitors into the end zone for the 2-point safety, making the score 9-0.

The Eagles then kicked from the 20 yard line, with Bobby Ross returning the ball from the Abernathy 42 to the Eagles' 44. However, a clipping penalty moved the ball back to the Abernathy 37. The Lopes picked up two first downs but bogged down, and the Lopes' leading rusher Sylvester Dunn got off a 36 yard quick kick to the Roosevelt 5 yard line. The Lopes allowed the visitors only 2 yards on 3 plays, then smothered the would be kicker on fourth down when he received a bad snap, and took possession on the 1 yard line. Following a fumble and recovery on first down, Dunn carried the ball over on the next play for the TD. Dees' extra point try was blocked, but the Lopes were out front 15-0 and still had almost a full quarter to play.

The visitors ran only one play following the kickoff as Arrellano fumbled and Cody Connell fell on the ball to give Abernathy possession on the Roosevelt 28. However, the Lopes managed only 9 yards in four plays and Roosevelt took over. The Eagles moved out to the 34, then lost 8 yards when tailback Tony Manahan was met by a host of Antelopes. Two passes

fell incomplete then Roosevelt punted to Bobby Sansom who called for a fair catch at his own 49. From that point, the Lopes began their final scoring drive of the evening. Dunn, Tony Cox, Kenneth Moss, Alan Pettit and John Ruiz all had a hand at the ball carrying duties during the drive, with Ruiz going the final yard for the TD. Dees kicked the point-after and the final score stood at 22-0. Even though he wasn't carrying the ball during the final drive, runningback Russell Windham picked up good yardage for the Lopes during the contest, and was also all over the field as a defensive starter.

The defensive unit looked good with Darrick Stallings, Rick Houston, Connell and Dees plugging up the middle of the line. Also doing a fine job were Stacey Mills, David Davis, Don Stone, Juan Gonzales, James Pace and Alan Neils, along with others in the lineup. The Lopes will square-off against the Muleshoe Mules in a homecoming bout Friday night at Antelope Field. Both teams will carry identical 2-2 records into the contest. The Mules won their first two games handily, then lost to Tulsa 20-7 two weeks ago, then 7-3 Idalou last Friday night. The Mules always play well against Abernathy, and this week's contest is expected to be no exception.

Abernathy had a total of 178 yards rushing, with Dunn carrying the ball 26 times for 88 yards. Windham had 9 carries for 28 yards. In the passing department, Riley connected on 3 of 6 for 38 yards, with Cannon being the recipient of 2 for 33 yards, one good for a TD.

The Lopes rolled up 16 first downs to the Eagles' 4, and the Antelope defense held the visitors to 87 yards rushing. Abernathy was penalized 5 times for 25 yards, while Roosevelt had 45 yards stepped off on 6 penalties. The Lopes fumbled 3 times and the visitors 4. Dunn punted 3 times for a 35.3 average during the contest.

How Did You Get Your Information Is Question Asked

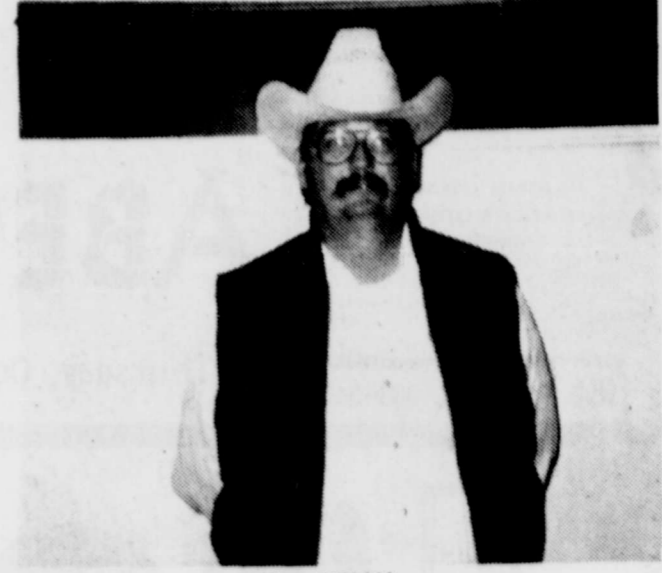



ORDINANCE NO. 44
AN ORDINANCE LEVYING AND ASSESSING, AND PROVIDING A METHOD OF COLLECTION FOR TAXES ON ALL PROPERTY LOCATED AND SITUATED WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF NEW DEAL, TEXAS, SETTING THE TAX RATE THEREON, PROVIDING A REPEALING CLAUSE AND OTHER MATTERS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEW DEAL, TEXAS THAT:

1. All taxable property located within the City of New Deal, Texas on January 1, 1980, shall be taxed by the City of New Deal, Texas at a rate of 27% for each \$100.00 valuation of such property.

2. That such tax rate does not exceed the limitations imposed by Article 1026, V.A.T.S., Amortized of the State of Texas.

3. The tax hereby imposed is levied against such taxable property located within the City of New Deal, Texas, and a lien is imposed on such taxable property until such tax is paid.

4. Such taxes shall be entered upon the tax rolls of the City of New Deal, Texas, and when such tax roll is approved by the City Council of the City of New Deal, Texas, shall constitute the official tax roll of the City of New Deal, Texas.

5. The City Secretary of the City of New Deal, Texas is hereby designated the tax collector for the City of New Deal, Texas. Such official shall send notices to the various owners of such property, at the owner's last known address, advising such owner of the taxes levied against the respective property of each such owner.

6. Taxes levied hereby shall be paid not later than January 31, 1981, and if paid after that date, shall be subject to the highest legal penalty and interest charges as allowed by the Statutes of the State of Texas.

7. The tax collector for the City of New Deal, Texas shall, upon such payment of such taxes, issue a receipt showing the payment of such taxes, and the property on which such taxes were levied. Taxes so collected by this ordinance by the City of New Deal, Texas shall be placed in the general fund to be expended upon appropriation by the City Council of the City of New Deal, Texas.

8. All ordinances in conflict therewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Done and passed by the unanimous vote of the City Council of the City of New Deal, Texas, this 1st day of September, 1980.

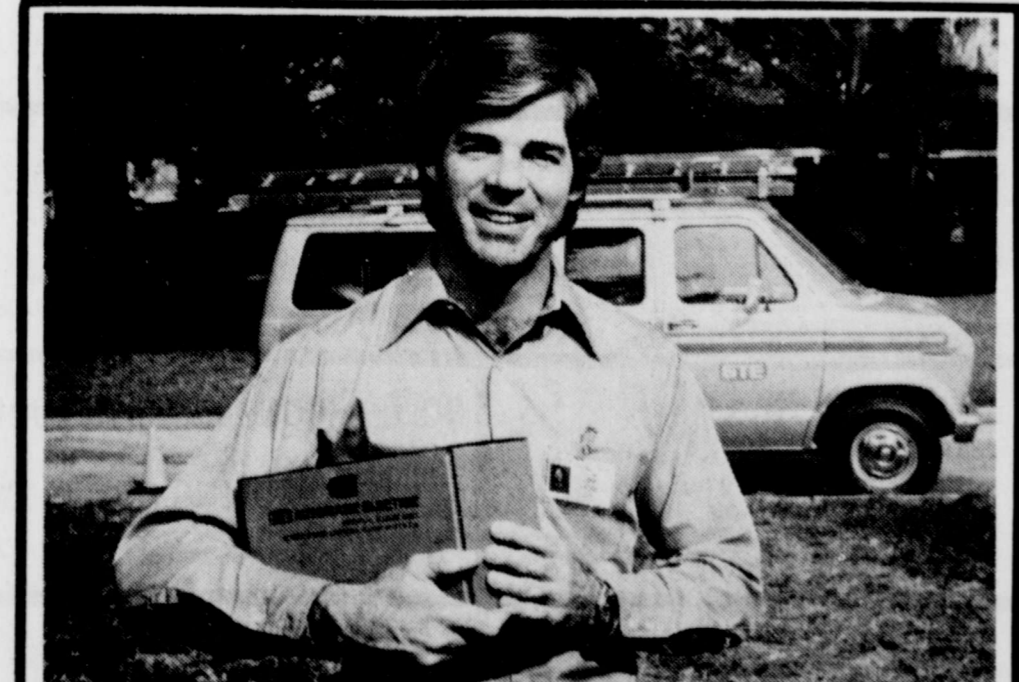
The Abernathy unit played heads-up football and appeared to have control of the game until late in the final quarter when the momentum changed and costly penalties kept the Lopes off balance.

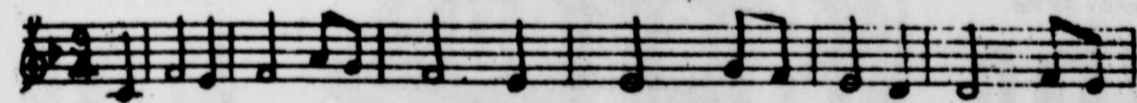

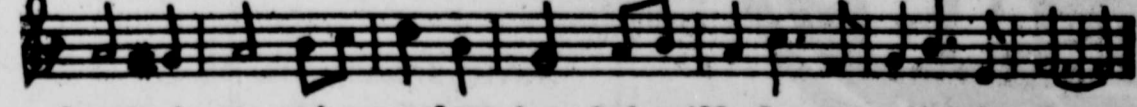
