## Freshman Lose JV Wins

The local Freshman and Junior Varsity football teams traveled to Idalou last Thursday afternoon and split wins with the Wildcats. The Abernathy freshmen lost 24-0, and the local JV team of coaches Ray Ater and Delbert Dearing chalked up their first win of the season, 28-8.

In the JV game, Idalou scored first after recovering a blocked punt on the Abernathy 6 yard line, then also ran over the extra points for an early 8-0 lead.

The Lopes didn't give up though, and on the first play of the 2nd quarter, Malcolm Dunn and Allen Lester teamed up on a half-back pass good for 39 yards and a TD, then Dunn ran the extra points to tie the score at 8-8.

Dunn scored again midway in the 2nd quarter on a 34 yard run following a fumble recovery by Ricky Powell. The extra point attempt was foiled, but Abernathy was ahead to stay.

The Idalou unit then put together a sustained drive just before halftime, but that threat was thwarted by a fumble recovery by Frank Castro.

A fumble recovery by Idalou early in the third quarter gave the home team new life, and the Idalou unit drove to the Abernathy 11 before being stopped on downs by good defensive play. From there, aided by an 18 yard run by Roger Gragg, the Abernathy lads moved out to the 43, then Dunn burst through the middle of the line and sped 57 yards for another Abernathy score. A pass from Cletus Irbeck to Gordon Havens tacked on the extras and Abernathy led 22-8.

## 'Lopes Win Over The Mules

Before a capacity Homecoming crowd, the Antelopes of Coach Larry Aldridge put it all together last Friday night and emerged victorious over the strong Muleshoe Mules. Mixed in between touchdowns (in the second and third quarters) halftime activities included the crowning of Miss Darla McGuire as Homecoming Queen.

The officials for the contest wore black arm bands on their left arms in memory of Curtis Barrett who died of cancer a few months ago. Mr. Barrett was an official who loved the sports played by young people and had contributed to the sports by officiating for the past 42 years. He had officiated football on all levels, and was a Southwest Conference official at the time of his death.

The Lopes put up a stout defense, allowing the visitors only 119 yards on the ground while the local offensive unit chalked up over 250. Sylvester Dunn was again the big gun for the Lopes, carrying the ball 31 times for 162 yards and one touchdown and was on the receiving end of 3 screen passes which netted a minus 1 yard. Quarterback Max Riley carried 9 times for 36 yards, including a 9 yard TD scamper, and fullback Russell Windham carried 12 times for a total of 28 yards. The remainder of the yardage on the ground was made up by John Ruiz with 19 yards on 6 carries and Tony Cox with 5 on 2 carries. Windham caught a screen pass from Riley, and behind good blocking picked his way 44 yards to the goal line, but the TD was nullified by a clipping penalty. End Rodney Cannon was also the recipient of a Riley pass, a 15-yarder on the first play of the third quarter.

The Antelope secondary played head-up football, picking off three Muleshoe passes. Always alert David Myatt intercepted two aeriels and Cannon stopped a Muleshoe threat with an interception just before halftime. The secondary played the pass receivers so well that they were charged twice with interference, aiding in their 85 yards in passing.

Abernathy picked up 16 first downs while holding the Mules to only 9, and pushed their season record to 3-2 while Muleshoe fell to 2-3.

David Davis, Darrick Stallings, Rick Houston, Stacey Mills and Windham played their usual fine defensive game as did Cody Connell, Albert Ortiz, Juan Gonzalez, Victor Dees, James Pace, Don Stone, Robby Sansom, Alan Pettit, Cannon, Myatt, Kenneth Moss and others.

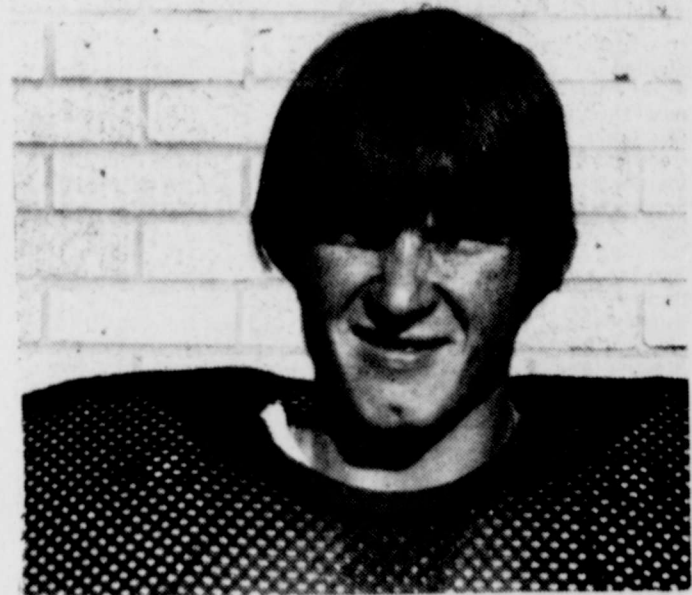
The Lopes began their first touchdown drive late in the first quarter, with Windham's run giving the Lopes momentum, even though the TD was called back. Then starting anew on the Muleshoe 43, the Lopes moved to the 9 yard line on 6 plays and Dunn carried it in from that point on the 2nd play of the 2nd quarter. Dee's extra point kick was partially blocked. The visitors had possession of the ball only 3 1/2 minutes during the rest of that period and provided no serious threat.

The Lopes put the second half kickoff in play at their own 35 and quickly moved to the Mules' 9 yard line, then lost 9 yards on a screen pass. The Lopes then faked a field goal, handed off to Dunn around right end but lacked 4 yards picking up the necessary yardage for a first down, and the Mules took over.

The Mules couldn't move and punted to Cannon who called for a fair catch on the 50 yard line, and from there the Lopes put together their final scoring drive. Windham, Dunn and Ruiz slashed off tackle and swept the ends for good yardage, moving the ball to the Mules' 7 where Dunn carried the final yards for TD, taking a "timed-just-right" pitchout from Riley. A clipping penalty nullified a try for the extra points.

The Lopes will get a well-deserved rest this weekend as they have open date prior to entering conference play. The following week they will travel to Idalou for an 8 p.m. matchup with the Wildcats of Coach Tom Ritchey.

Cooperatives Good For All America

COLLEGE STATION-- Farmer-owned and controlled cooperatives play a key role in making the family farm the highly productive system it has become. During October, which is "Cooperative Month," special recognition will be given to cooperatives for their roles in economic progress of this state and nation, points out Johnny Feagan, economist in organization with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. According to Feagan, Texas boasts more than 440 cooperatives that serve some 133,000 members. These cooperatives are doing a business volume of more than \$2 billion annually. Nationally, some 50 million Americans belong to about 40,000 cooperatives. "Cooperatives in Texas range from farmer-owned gins, elevators and compresses to marketing, supply and credit organizations," explains Feagan. "Health, housing, insurance, electric, telephone and other service cooperatives are becoming more and more important to all Texas citizens."
