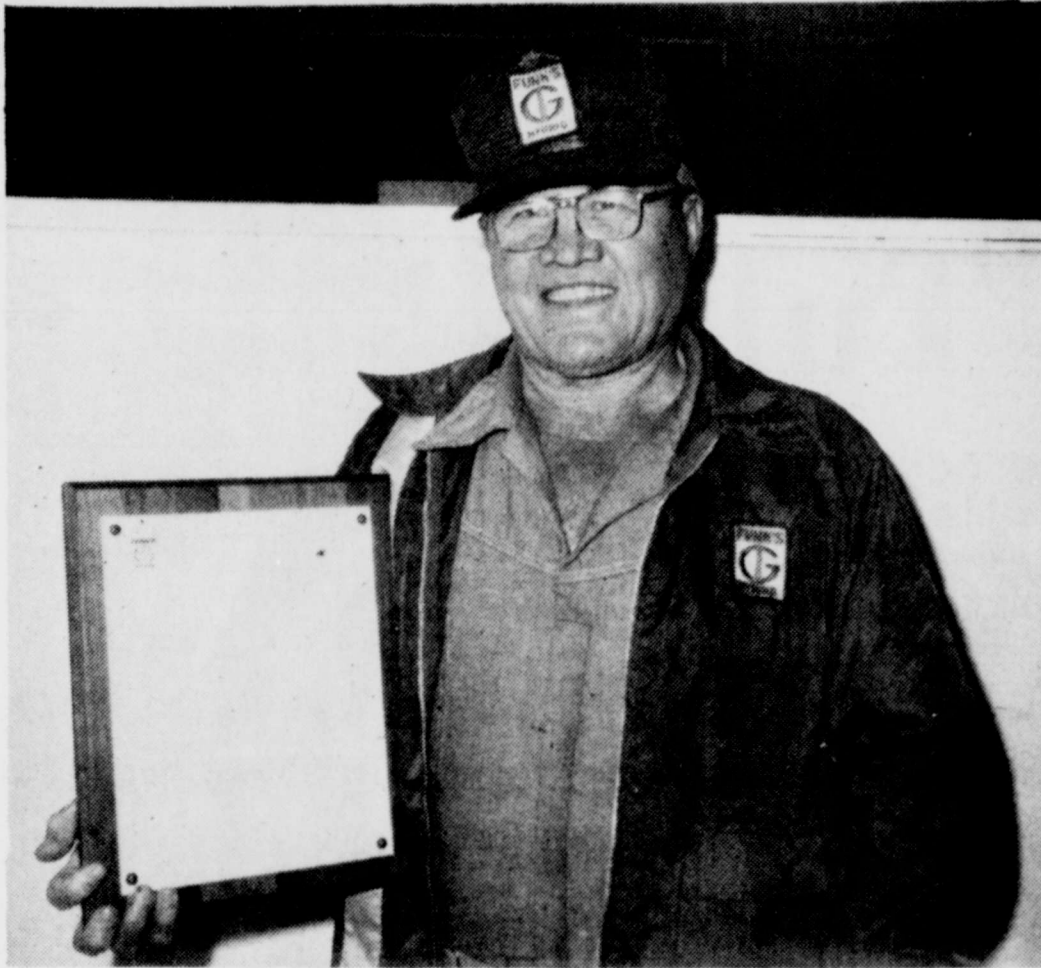

The Lopes just couldn't seem to get untracked during the first half of play, managing only two first downs, that being during their first possession. And defensively, the Lopes were not able to contain the Wildcats, with the hometown lads scoring on each of their first two possessions. They did, however, stop the Cats on the Antelopes 2 yard line just before halftime with a fumble recovery.

The beginning of the second half was an entirely different story. The Lopes kicked off to the Wildcats and stopped them cold with a seemingly fired-up defense. And after forcing the Cats to punt, the Lopes took over on their own 25 and drove to midfield before having to punt the ball back to the Wildcats.

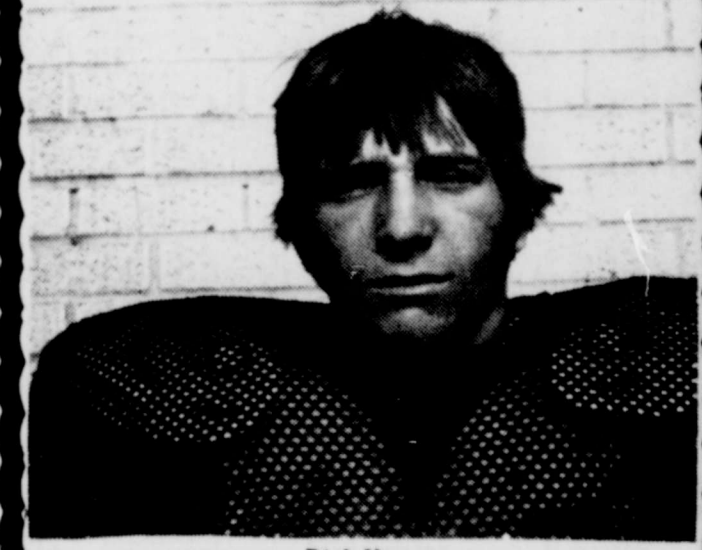
A few minutes later the Lopes stopped the Cats again when Kenneth Moss recovered the ball, knocked loose at the Antelopes' 30 when the Idalou ballcarrier was popped hard by defensive end Tony Cox.

The Lopes picked up another first down before giving the ball up on downs after a 4th down fake-punt-but-pas attempt from Sylvester Dunn to Bobby Sansom was out of reach. The Wildcats took possession on the Antelopes' 49 and put together a quick 4-play scoring drive, capped by a 1 yard TD plumb by quarterback Henry Vega.

Following the ensuing kickoff, the Lopes appeared to be heading for paydirt.

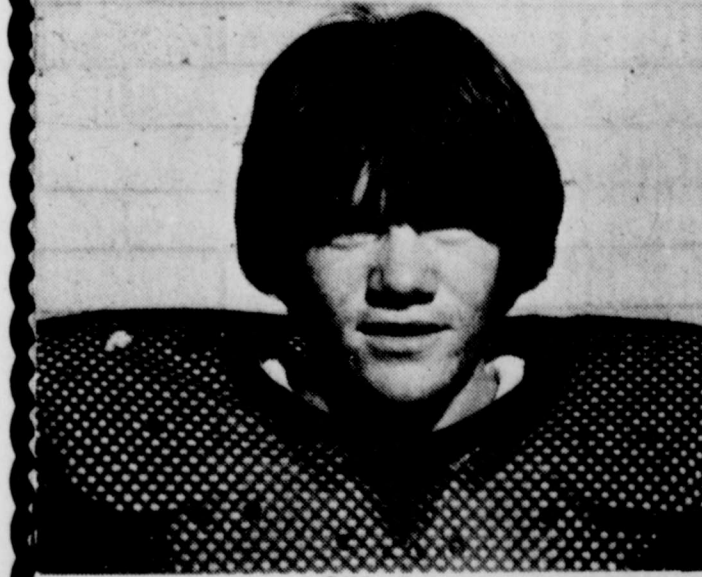
Rick Houston

## "Program" Safety Into Farm, Ranch Operations

COLLEGE STATION—Although poor work practices cause many farm and ranch accidents, poorly designed equipment and facilities can also create hazardous conditions that lead to accidents. "Therefore, it's important to 'program' safety into your farming and ranching operation," contends Dr. Gary Nelson, an agricultural engineer in safety for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Hazardous conditions represent conditions of risk which could cause human and financial loss due to injury or damage to equipment. In addition, such conditions can also stifle agricultural productivity and lead to inefficient operations," points out Nelson.

"Farm and ranch workers should be on the constant lookout for hazardous physical or environmental conditions," emphasizes the Texas University System engineer. "Such conditions should be corrected on the spot or as soon as possible to reduce the potential for accidents. Special attention should also be given to the safe design of equipment and facilities when purchased or installed."

Among hazardous conditions that lead to accidents include unsafe basic designs; worn equipment; protruding objects; lack of storage space; poor arrangement, placement or storage of equipment; objects which may move unexpectedly; exposed sources of electricity; congestion and insufficient clearance; improper or loose clothing; presence of flammable, corrosive or toxic substances; excessive noise; inadequate illumination or ventilation; or the presence of such atmospheric substances as dusts, gases or vapors.

"Be conscious of accident risks at all times, whether planning, purchasing or working with facilities or equipment," cautions Nelson.

October is "Cooperative Month" in Texas and across the country. And, it is being observed by five cooperative organizations in the Abernathy/County Line/New Deal area. October is special month for the officers and the hundreds of members of the area cooperatives. Three of the organizations are in Abernathy: Co-op Grain Company of Abernathy, Abernathy Farmers Co-op Gins and Abernathy Consumers Fuel Association. S.W. (Dub) Royal has served as manager of Abernathy Consumers Fuel Association since 1965. The Board of Directors for Consumers Fuel includes Harold Thomas, President; Oliver Jackson, Vice President; Jack F. Jackson, Secretary; Joe B. Lovelace and Dan Thompson, Manager Royal is treasurer. Setting a record in Abernathy for cooperative managers' tenure is Leland Phillips, who is in his 30th year as manager of Abernathy Farmers Co-op Gins. This may be a state record, too. Members of the Board of Directors on the cotton gin organization are: Harvey Lutrick, President; Ralph E. Davis, Vice President; Billie Harrison, Secretary; J.F. Buske, A.L. Stone, Jr., Guy Bartlett and Coy Phillips. Manager Phillips also serves as treasurer.

Ted Major has served more than five years as manager of Co-op Grain Company of Abernathy. Members of the Board of Directors are: Lewis Lutrick, President; Lindy Neis, Vice President; Ronnie Hamilton, Secretary; Wendell Barrick and Walter (Spec) Cox. Ike Bennett is in his fourth year as manager of County Line Co-op Gins. Members of the Board of Directors are: Charles Coats, President; Leroy Grawander, Vice President; Tommy Myatt, Secretary; Y.F. Snodgrass, and Roger Pettit. John McNew has been manager of New Deal Co-op fourteen years. Members of the Board of Directors are: Carroll Teeter, President; Roy Don Stephenson, Vice President; Sam Stiers, Secretary; W.A. Covey and C.L. (Red) Phillips. In addition to normal cotton gin operations, New Deal Co-op Gins also has farm fuels, lubricants and supplies.

Two other cooperatives also serve this area. They are South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc., and South Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative (locally Hollandville and County Line exchanges). Abernathy/County Line/New Deal are in the service area of other cooperatives: Plains Co-op Mill and Plains Cotton Co-operative Association, Lubbock, and Plain-view Co-op Compress, Inc.

**Recipe**

**APRICOT POUND CAKE**  
 1 c. butter or margarine  
 3 c. sugar  
 6 eggs  
 1/2 t. rum extract  
 1 t. orange extract  
 1/4 t. almond  
 1/2 t. lemon extract  
 1 t. vanilla  
 1 t. butter extract  
 3 c. flour (sifted)  
 1/4 t. soda  
 1/2 t. salt  
 1 c. sour cream  
 1/2 c. apricot nectar  
 Cream butter/margarine; gradually adding sugar and continue to cream until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add flavorings. Sift flour with soda and salt. Add dry ingredients alternately with sour cream and nectar. Pour into greased and tube pan, bake at 325 degree 60 to 70 minutes. Cool before serving.

I've seen highway construction in a number of States, but none compares with the extra strength of the construction of Interstate 27 from Lubbock, through New Deal, Abernathy, Hale Center and on north. 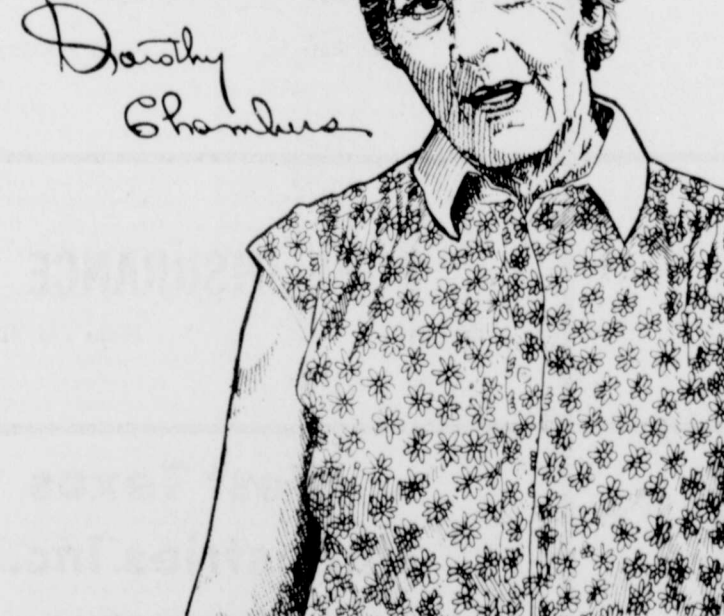

Read These Proposed Constitutional Amendments Which Will Be On The General Election Ballot November 4, 1980.

**Vote As You Please, But, PLEASE VOTE**

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pre-trial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The constitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

**PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

**PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the approval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

**PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

**PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

**PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts."

**PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."
