

Antelopes Lose First District Game To The Idalou Wildcats Friday Night

The AHS Antelopes got a slow start last Friday night at Idalou, and went down in defeat, 21-0. Likewise, this gives them a slow start in the district race, at 0-1; they now have a 3-3 season mark.

The Lopes just couldn't seem to get untracked during the first half of play, managing only two first downs, that being during their first possession. And defensively, the Lopes were not able to contain the Wildcats, with the hometown lads scoring on each of their first two possessions. They did, how-ever, stop the 'Cats on the Antelopes 2 yard line just before halftime with a fumble recovery.

The beginning of the econd half was an entirely different story. The Lopes kicked off to the Wildcats and stopped them cold with a seemingly fired-up defense. And after forcing the 'Cats to punt, the Lopes took over their own 25 and drove to midfield before having to punt the ball back to the Wildcats.

A few minutes later the Lopes stopped the 'Cats again when Kennith Moss recovered the ball, knocked loose at the Antelopes' 30 when the Idalou ballcarrier

was popped hard by defen-sive end Tony Cox. The Lopes picked up another first down before giving the ball up on downs after a 4th down fake-puntbut-pass attempt from Sylvester Dunn to Bobby Sansom was out of reach. The Wildcats took possession on the Antelopes 49 and put together a quick 4-play scoring drive, capped by a 1 yard TD plung by quarter-

back Henry Vega. Following the ensuing kickoff, the Lopes appeared to be heading for paydirt.

With the aid of a 35 yard pass from quarterback Max Riley to Rodney Cannonthe Lopes drove to the Idalou 8 yard line. On the next play runningback Russell Windham neared the goal line before being brought down, apparently after he hit the ground, and Idalou recovered at the 1, and the officials fuled it their ball at that point. That ended Abernathy's only

serious threat. Idalou's first two TDs were scored on 4 and 3 yard plunges by fullback James Sherman, Gary Fabila, who kicked the extra point after the final TD, missed on his first try. Then following the second TD. Vega tossed a pass to scatback Skeeter Jones (a familiar combination during the contest) for the extra points.

According to statistician Jay Harrison, the Ante-lopes had 9 first downs, 7 penalties and 1 penetration, while Idalou had 20 first downs, 11 penalties and 4 penetration. The Lopes had only 25 rushes, for 96 yards, and completed 8 of 17 passes for another 85 for a total of 181 yards. The Wildcats had 50 carries for 221 yards rushing and completed 6 of 6 passes for an additional 110 yards for a

331 yard total. Sylvester Dunn was the Lopes leading rusher with 53 yards, having carried the ball only 12 times. punted 4 times for a 31.75 yard average. Riley had 7 pass completions for 77 yards. The Lopes will

entertain the Tulia Hornets here Friday night at 8 p.m. for their second conference game of the season. Tulia is coming off a 21-7 win over Lockney and boasts a well-balanced team.





the area cooperatives. Three of the organizations are in Abernathy: Coop Grain Company of Abernathy, Abernathy Farmers Co-op Gins and Abernathy Consumers Fuel Association. S. W. (Dub) Royal has

served as manager of Abernathy Consumers Fuel Association since 1965. The Board of Directors for Consumers Fuel includes Harold Thomas, President: Oliver Jackson, Vice President; Jack F. Jackson, Secretary: Joe B. Lovelace and Dan Thompson. Manager Royal is treasurer.







Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such




