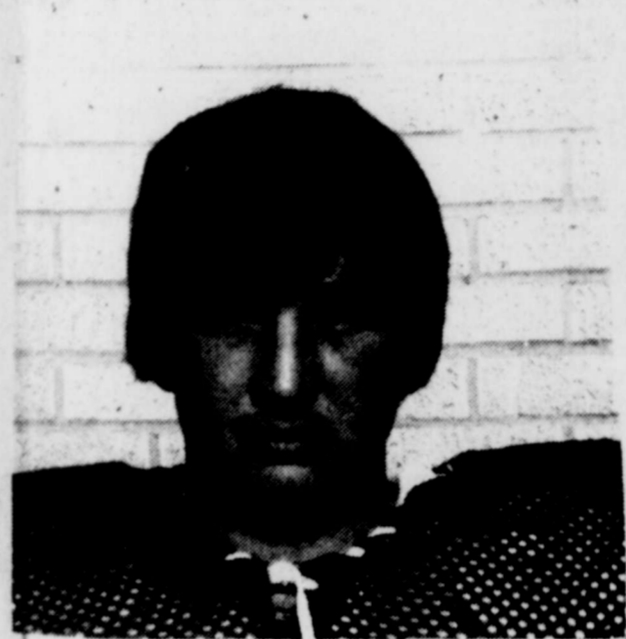
MAX RILEY

### Abernathy Antelopes Have Big Victory Over The Tulia Hornets

The Abernathy football team made a clean sweep last week as all five teams were victorious over their opponents. The 7th and 8th grade teams defeated Lockney's units 30 and 22, respectively, last Thursday at Lockney, while the local freshmen and junior varsity teams were playing at home, beating Lockney 26 and 35, respectively.

Then Friday night the AHS Antelopes put the finishing touches on a successful week by soundly defeating the Tulia Hornets 22-12. And the game was no closer than the score indicated, as the Lopes completely dominated, both defensively and offensively.

Defensively, the Lopes contained the Hornet running attack, and allowed only 3 pass completions (including an interference call). Gang tackling was the rule rather than the exception, as every player who saw action played with aggressiveness and determination which were not seen in their previous game the week before. And the Lopes picked off 3 Hornet passes, the first interception setting up Abernathy's first score of the evening.

The offensive unit also played well, opening holes for the runners, showing aggressive blocking both on the line and downfield. The running attack was again paced by Sylvester Dunn who carried 27 times for 235 yards and 3 TDs. Quarterback Max Riley had a good night, completing 3 of 4 passes for 20 yards, and himself adding 57 yards on the ground.

End Rodney Cannon drew 2 passes, the first drawing an interference call for a 25 yard gain, and the next, 3 plays later, a 36 yard strike to flanker Ray Ortiz who lacked less than a foot making it to the double stripes.

The two teams started off sparring, testing each other's strengths and trying to find their weaknesses. Each team had the ball 4 times before either could put together a scoring drive. On Abernathy's second possession, however, they had driven to Tulia's 19 before a 5 yard penalty and an incomplete 4th down pass gave the ball back to the Hornets on the Tulia 24. The visitors moved to the Abernathy 34, then got off only a 12 yard punt and the Lopes took over on their own 22.

Dunn ran up the middle for 14 yards, then burst through the middle again for 31 yards but fumbled the ball and the Hornets took possession at their own 33.

Tulia had the ball only one play, as linebacker Russell Windham intercepted and returned the ball to the Tulia 36. That seemed to put extra spark into the Lopes, and they put together a scoring drive that climaxed exactly midway in the second quarter. Windham carried for 9 yards on first down, but a penalty against the Lopes nullified the play and moved the ball back to Tulia's 41. Dunn then regained that 5 yards on a pitchout around end, and a 15 yard penalty against the Hornets was tacked onto that, moving the ball to the 19. Dunn hit the middle for only a yard, then took a pitch out around right end, cut back against the grain and upfield for his initial TD of the night. Big 230-pound guard, Victor Dees, who probably played the best game of his career, kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead.

The Lopes kicked off to Tulia, who received a penalty back to their own 12 yard line for an illegal forward on the kickoff return. From

there the Hornets moved out to the 35 against stout resistance before being forced to punt. Thompson got off a 44 yarder and the Lopes took possession on their own 21.

On their first play of series, the Lopes faked an end-around run and Cannon's throw was intended for Bobby Sansom. The pass was incomplete, but interference was called against Tulia, and the Lopes had a 1st down on the 50 yard line.

Windham hit the middle of the line for 3 yards, then Dunn carried to the Tulia 36 for 11 yards. Then Cannon teamed up with Ortiz to put the ball on the 1 foot line. Dunn then crashed over for the TD and Dees added the point after. Score, 14-0.

The Hornets were unable to move against the Lopes on their next series and punted out of bounds at the Abernathy 37. Dunn shot through the middle for a 20 yard gain, then Riley hit Sansom for a 15 yard gainer to the Tulia 25. Then with just one second showing on the clock, Dees attempted a 46 yard field goal which headed straight for the uprights but was short.

The visitors started the second half with more

determination and put together a scoring drive on their first possession, driving 66 yards for their initial TD. The Lopes were stubborn though, and it took Tulia 16 plays and over 6 minutes to cover the distance. Stacey Mills recovered a Tulia fumble on the extra point attempt, and Abernathy still led, 14-6.

After an exchange of punts, the Lopes again set out to counter the visitors' TD. Taking over on their own 32, Riley ran the option twice, picking up 24 yards and a first down at the Tulia 44. Then Dunn ran for 9, with 15 yards added to that for a Tulia infraction, putting the ball on the 20. Tulia regained that 15 yards on the next play, however, as Abernathy was called for holding. With a 1st and 25 situation at the 35, Riley kept up the middle for 13 yards, then Cannon picked 7 more on an end-around. Then Dunn took a pitch out around end, and with second effort surged over the goal line for a 17 yard gain and his third TD of the night. The Lopes lined up for the extra point attempt, but the ball rolled through Riley's hands and on between Dees' legs, Riley quickly grabbed the ball, headed toward his left then spotted Ortiz near the goal line and tossed him the ball for a two-point conversion, putting the Lopes out front 22-6.

Again the Lopes were outstanding on defense, and forced the Hornets to punt. The Lopes appeared to have picked up a quick first down, but a 15 yard penalty nullified an 8 yard gain by Dunn, and the next play netted only 2 yards. Facing 4th down, Dunn was standing on the 5 yard marker to punt, got a bad snap but picked up and ran but made it only to the 18 yard line, where Tulia took possession. Tulia's outstanding quarterback Wade Littlefield then threw two passes, the first almost intercepted by Alan Pettit and the second picked off by David Davis and Abernathy had possession again at the 10.

The Lopes picked up a first down and moved out to the 25 before being forced to punt, and Dunn got off only a 13 yarder. Taking over on the Abernathy 38, the Hornets used 12 plays to cover the distance for their final score. Cannon and David Myatt broke up one pass in the end zone but pass interference against Myatt on the next play put the ball on the Abernathy 13. Four plays later Littlefield sneaked over from a yard out for the TD. Littlefield wanted to pass on the extra point attempt, but his receivers were covered and he was forced out of bounds by Tony Cox and Cody Connell.

Following an on-side kick attempt, the Lopes took possession at the Tulia 49. With just over four minutes left in the game, the

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County 4-H Food Show Set Nov. 8

4-H'ers will match foods and nutrition expertise against each other in the Hale County 4-H Food Show November 8.

Approximately 50 youth will compete in senior and junior divisions, according to Melissa Roberson, County Extension agent.

Immediately following an awards program at 1:00 p.m., entries will be on display for viewing and tasting from 1:30-2:00 p.m. at the Hale County Agriculture Center in Plainview.

Senior-division entrants are ages 14-19, while junior-division youth are ages 9-13. For the contest, each 4-H entrant will compete in one of four classes, including main dish, side dish, breads and desserts, or snacks and beverages.

Because the foods and nutrition program focuses on nutrition, each contestant will have to demonstrate what she or he knows about nutrition, meal planning, food buying and meal service, as well as preparation techniques.

The Hale County 4-H Club will host the County Food Show this year. Hale County 4-H Food Show is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M System and The Morrison Milling Company of Denton, Texas.

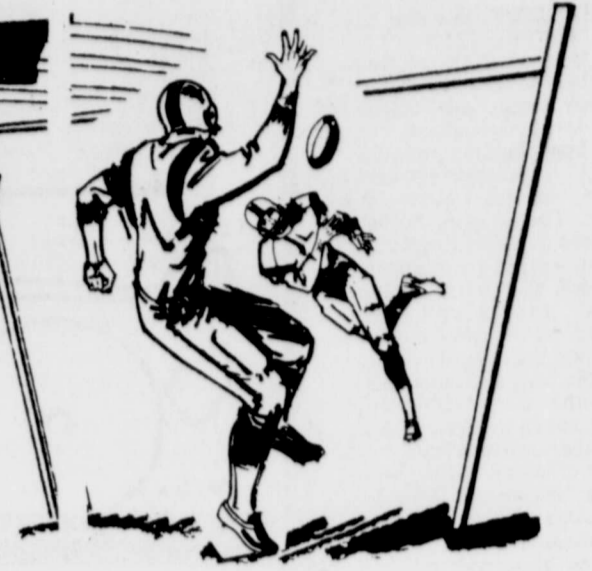

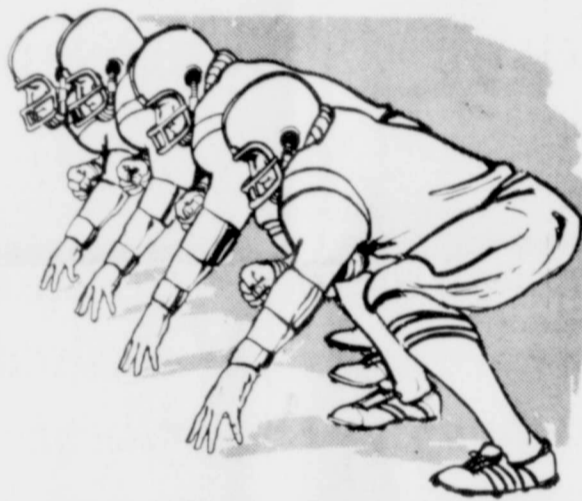

### Halloween—Tragedy Or Treat

**LUBBOCK**—This year, appropriately, Halloween falls within Pedestrian Safety Week. The following pedestrian safety tips can help keep your trick-or-treater from becoming a tragic statistic:

1. Insure that all costumes are easily seen by motorists. Many commercially produced costumes have glow-in-the-dark or reflectorized trim. Homemade costumes can be made more visible by attaching strips of reflectorized adhesive. Masks and other parts of costumes should not obstruct the child's vision.
  2. Have each child carry a flashlight as he goes from door to door. Sneaking up on a neighbor's house in the dark may be fun, but sneaking up on a vehicle can be deadly.
  3. Adults should accompany small children.
  4. Instruct your children to cross the street only at corners. Be sure each child knows to check all directions for oncoming traffic.
  5. Do not allow your children to "horse around" in or near the street while trick-or-treating. Instruct them to walk on the sidewalk whenever possible.
  6. If you decide to drive your children to another neighborhood to trick-or-treat, park the car in a safe location and walk the area with your kids. Don't drive your car from door to door. This creates an unnecessary hazard for other trick-or-treaters.
- Have a ghoulishly fun-AND SAFE-HALLOWEEN.

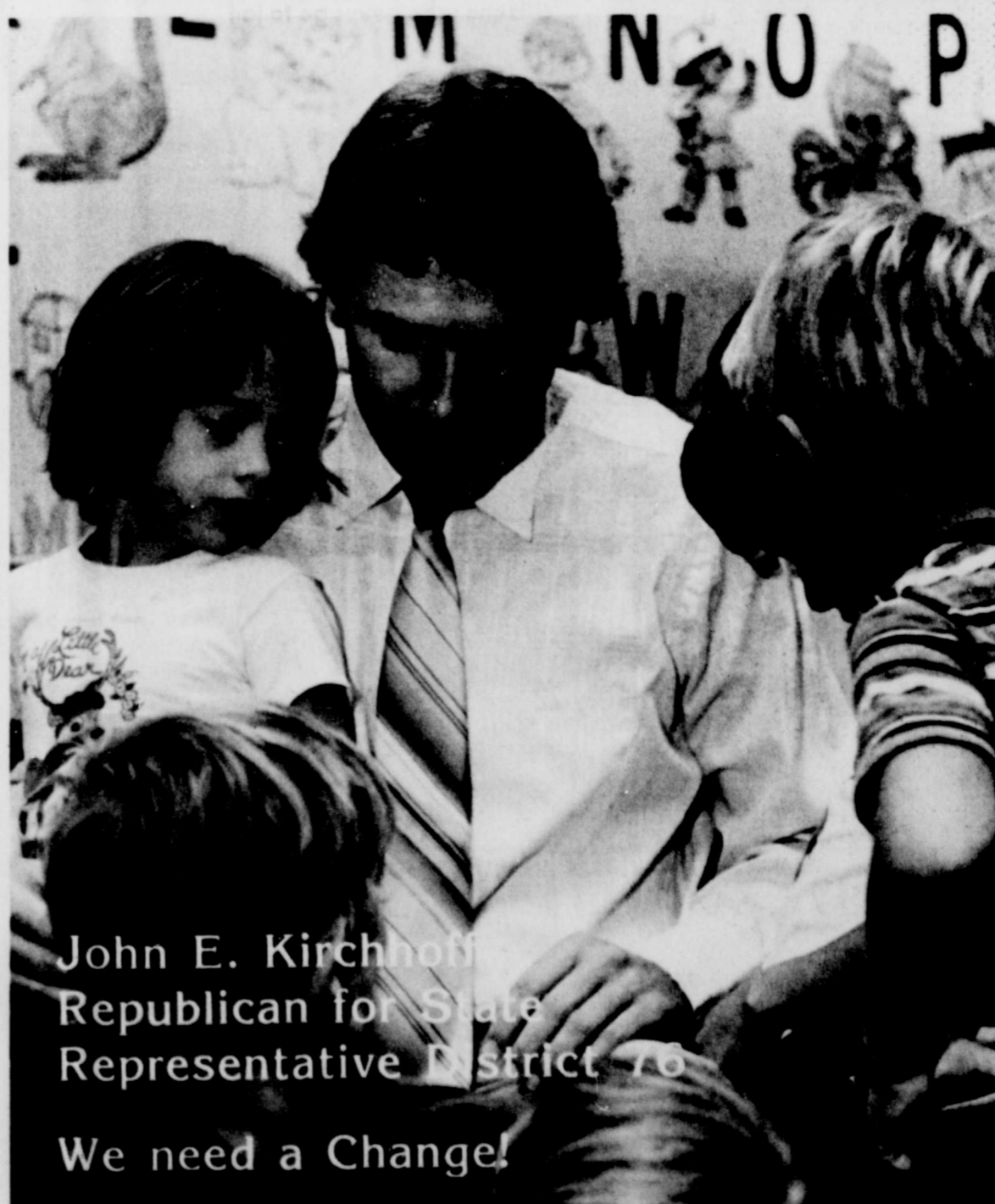

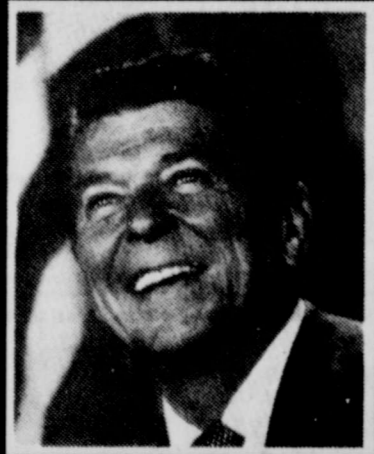

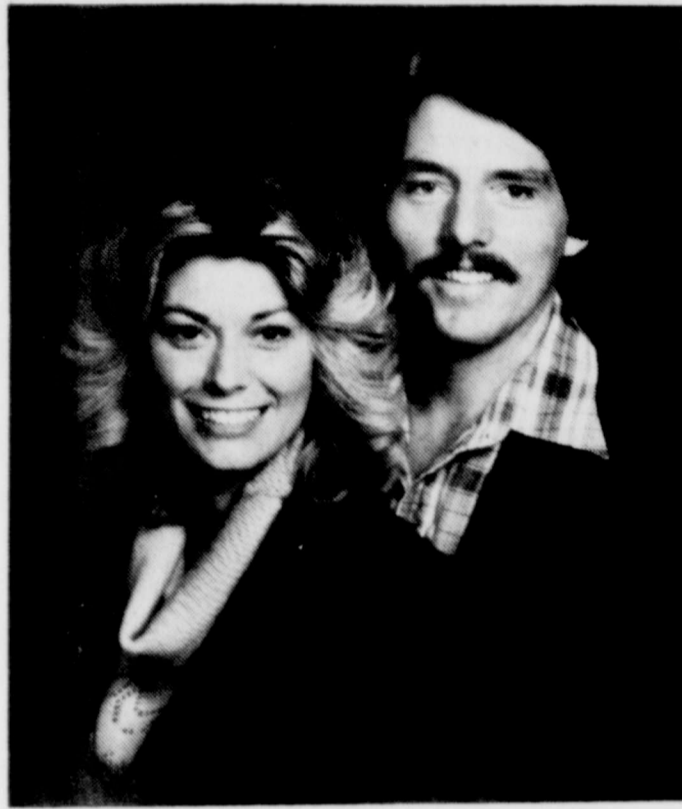

**Pedestrian Safety - Rules of the Road**

LUBBOCK--October 26 through November 1 is Pedestrian Safety Week in Texas. Though pedestrian safety is important throughout the year, the last week in October has traditionally provided an opportunity for statewide emphasis of a facet of traffic safety that affects nearly everyone.

Adults and children alike should be aware of the rules for safe walking. Following are some of these rules:

1. Cross streets at corners only. Crossing in the middle of the block is called "jaywalking" and may result in the walker receiving a ticket. If crosswalks are available, use them.
2. Uncontrolled intersections account for one-fourth of all pedestrian deaths in cities. Look in all directions and make sure the intersection is clear before starting across a street. Watch for cars turning corners. At intersections controlled by a traffic light, cross on green only. At intersections where there is a "Walk/Don't Walk" signal, cross on "Walk" only.
3. Be sure to cross streets in the open. Crossing from between parked cars or from behind other obstructions is often a deadly mistake.
4. Walk-don't run-across streets. If the need to run exists, chances are you shouldn't have started to cross the street in the first place.
5. Walk on the sidewalk. If there are no sidewalks, walk on the left, facing traffic. This allows you to see oncoming vehicles as well as make sure they see you.
6. School children-obey school crossing guards. They will tell you when it is safe to cross the street.
7. Wear bright clothing and be extra careful on rainy days and at night. Carry an operable flashlight during hours of darkness is a good idea. Another good idea-attach reflectorized adhesive strips to strategic points of outerwear (cuffs of coats and jackets, around the top rim of galoshes).
8. Avoid wearing leather soles and heels on slippery surfaces. They reduce traction and may cause you to slip or fall.
9. Be a courteous walker. Respect the rights and wishes of others who use the same roads you use. Don't dawdle or "goof off" while crossing streets. Remember-in a collision between vehicle and a pedestrian, the pedestrian always loses.
10. Above all, obey the cardinal rule of traffic safety-SEE AND BE SEEN.

Pedestrian safety is a matter of courtesy and common sense. The walker who displays both is the walker who survives in traffic.
