Beginning January 1st, Abernathy residents will see a new face around the Abernathy Weekly Review office, as Keith Tooley of Lubbock takes over the position of managing editor.

The Review has been purchased from Richard and Vicki Havens by Keith and Brad Tooley. Keith is a 1977 graduate of Floydada High School and is a senior at Texas Tech University. His experience in the newspaper field dates back to his many years of learning experience in his father's newspaper in Floydada where he lived for 16 years.

While in high school, Keith worked with advertising, photography, composition and mail-out positions in the weekly newspaper. One of his high school achievements was in representing Floydada High Distributive Education program in the state advertising contest after winning first in Regional.

Keith has enlarged his knowledge in related fields with his study of journalism and news writing at Texas Tech and has recently resigned from the promotion department of Delta and Pine Cotton Company of Lubbock where he was in charge of advertising and photography for the past three months.

The future Review managing editor completed a summer internship in his chosen major of Park Administration for the City of Lake Jackson last summer where he designed and developed a Wilderness Park.

Keith's partner in the purchase, Brad, is the editor-publisher of the Slatonite, weekly newspaper in Slaton.

Dear Editor: We would like to ask you if you would republish this article that appeared in your paper in July of 1972.

WARNING GIVEN ON SHOOTING BB GUNS IN CITY AGAINST LAW
State law makes it illegal to discharge an air rifle (commonly called a B.B. gun) within the city limits of a town.

The reasoning behind this law is that an air rifle, if not properly used, can be both dangerous and destructive.

A child discharging an air rifle at a bird might seem safe enough, but suppose the bird strikes another child in the eye. It might strike a neighbor's window or his car's windshield. Even where there is no intent to do any damage, damage can occur.

Then, there are the incidents where a child deliberately aims his air rifle at a person or object and pulls the trigger. This is serious business.

To enforce the air rifle law, peace officers need the co-operation and assistance of parents. If a parent buys bb's for their child or allows the child to buy them, then it is up to that parent to caution the child against the dangers involved and to see that they are not used in town.

We have all seen the results of accidents with an air rifle as well as deliberate acts with them. One of the prime targets in Abernathy seems to be our street lights which are expensive to replace. Other areas of damage are utility meters, window glasses, etc.

The Abernathy Police Department would ask of parents to please see that your child is not allowed to shoot his bb gun in town. If your child accidentally put another child's eye out, would saying "I'm sorry" really comfort that child, I doubt it, don't you? THINK ABOUT IT.

SELECTIVE SERVICE REGISTRATION

Selective Service registration for men born in 1962 will take place during the week of January 5th, 1981. Men born in 1963 (and later) should register within 30 days of their 18th birthdays. This is a continuation of the program begun last summer, whereby men born in 1960 and 1961 visited post offices across the nation to fill in the registration form.

The purpose of registration is to build a pool of names and addresses from which Selective Service could draw in an emergency. According to Dr. Bernard P. Rogers, Director of the Selective Service System: "Registration directly improves our capability to respond, actually reducing lead time by at least four weeks. We think that provides a significant advantage, especially when matched with the very low cost of the registration effort. The direct costs of registration are less than \$2 per registrant."

By way of background, one of the basic underlying assumptions of the All-Volunteer Force concept was the country should always maintain a stand-by Selective Service, with an on-going system of registration.

When the draft was ended in 1972, registration was in fact continued until suspended in 1975. Over the next few years, the capabilities of Selective Service steadily declined to an unacceptable level, prompting a total revitalization which began in November 1979.

This program--of which registration is a part--is designed to return the Selective Service System to the readiness level required for an emergency back-up to our peace time volunteer armed forces. Other actions underway include the development of greatly improved computer support, and the development of a training program for potential draft board members.

REGISTRATION GUIDELINES:

WHO MUST REGISTER
--Male citizens and aliens residing in the United States born in 1960, 1961 or 1962 except those on student or visas or who are members of trade or diplomatic missions and men already serving on active duty with the Armed Forces. Members of reserve components not on active duty must register. Men born in 1963 and later years will be required to register within 30 days of their 18th birthdays.

WHEN: Men born in 1962: during the week of January 5th. To help avoid lines, individuals are encouraged to register on a day of the week keyed to the month of birth: on Monday, January 5, for those born in January, February, and March; on Tuesday, January 6, for those born in April, May and June; on Wednesday, January 7, for those born in July, August, and September; and on Thursday, January 8, for those born in October, November, and December. Friday and Saturday may be used as "make-up" days for those who are unable to register on the suggested day.

Men born in 1963: within 30 days of their 18th birthdays.
Men born in 1960 and 1961 should already have registered this year; those who have not are encouraged to do so as soon as possible.

WHERE: At any of more than 34,500 U.S. Post Offices throughout the nation, or at embassies or consular offices overseas.

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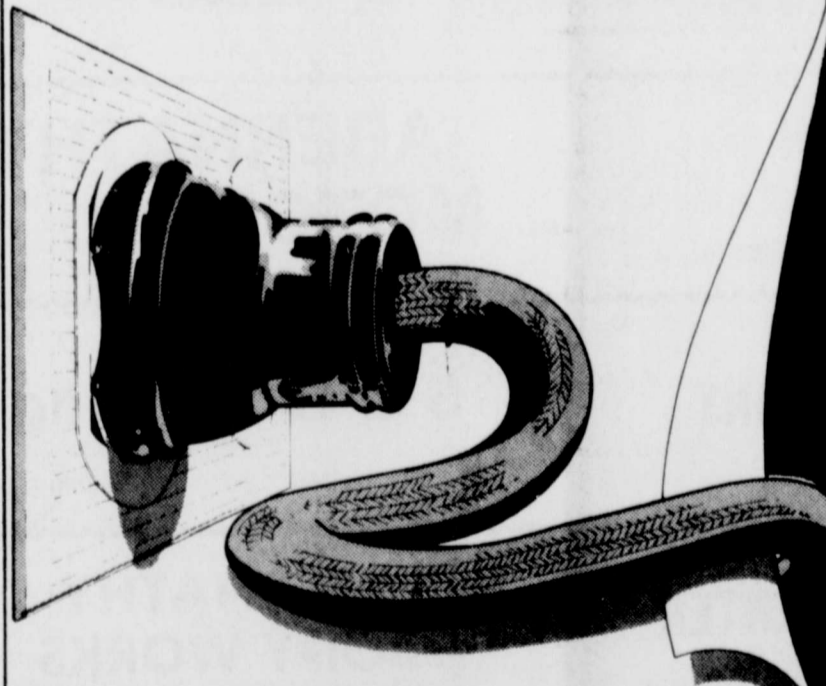
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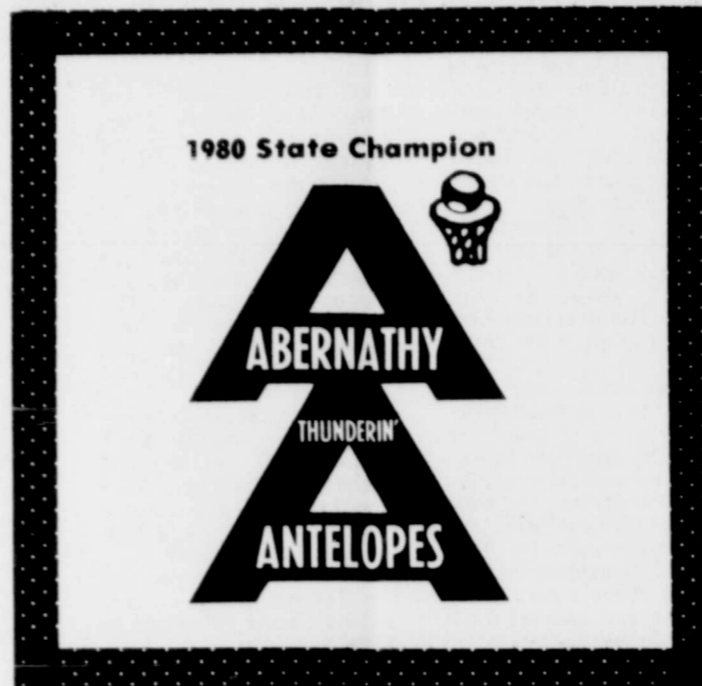
