School Board Discuss Taxes, Leases and Open House

The Abernathy School Board met Monday night to discuss several items concerning school business operations. Leases

The first topic of business was for members of the board to pass a final draft to lease school land.

The Texas Oil and Gas Corporations' bid to lease the land belonging to the Abernathy Independent School System (33.6 acres) is as follows:

The ten acre tract of land which takes in blocks 112, 113, 130 and 131 in the O.T. of Abernathy - 10 acres at \$125.00 an acre. The total will be \$1,250.00.

The 18.07 acre tract of land which takes in blocks 103, 114, 115, 116, 127, 128 and 129 in the O.T. of Abernathy -18.07 acres at \$125.00 an acre. The total will be \$2,260.00

The 5.55 acre tract which takes in blocks 104, 105 and the east 100' of block 106. The school only owns one half of the minerals in this tract of land, the other one half was retained by J.P. Barton of Abernathy. 2.8 acres (the school's half interest) will lease at \$125.00 an acre. The total for this tract will be \$350.00

Grand total for the three tracts of land is \$3,860.00.

The lease offered will be a five year, paid-up lease with a pooling clause. A 3/16ths royalty will also be offered. This will be a non-drilling lease to safeguard lessors property.

This draft was okayed and will be sent to the State Commissioner of Education, Alton Bowen. These leases have to be passed by Bowen before put

into operation. The next order of business dealt with whether the Abernathy School Board would remain a member of the South Plains Association of School Boards. 90% of the schools in our area are members. The membership was continued for another year and a membership fee of \$200 will be paid.

Overdue Taxes The board then discussed a tax suit that will become effective January 1, 1982. The suit will entail a 4% delin-

quincy tax increase on school property. School property having taxes against it more than 20 years old will be erased at this time unless a suit is pending. There has never been a suit filed against anyone by the Abernathy School District for not paying these taxes. If these taxes are not collected by January 1, 1982, then they will be considered payed. Presently, there are 35 pieces of property owned by the school that are delinquent in taxes.

Board Election

The board decided on Saturday, April 4, as the date to elect new board members and appoint judges. Places 4 and 6 on the board will be open at this time. These seats belong to Richard Howard and Bob Riley. The election will be at City Hall, the same day city elections are usually held.

Public School Week Public School Week will be the 2-6 of March as decided by the board. School open house will be the first week of March for the lower level and upper level school students. Abernathy

The present coverage does not keep up with the increasing rate of inflation. Therefore it was decided there needed to be an increase in coverage.

The school is presently insured for almost 4 million dollars.

Other business discussed involved the salvage bid on a 1972 school bus. The bid was approved and the bus will be

There was a proposal made and a presentation given by Gid Adkisson for future playground developments and new playground equipment for the elementary students.

After Adkisson made reccommendations to fence the area south of the tennis courts and acquire trees to plant along this fencing, it was decided bids would be taken to improve this area. The three bids will include 6 ft. fencing for this area, trees to border the fence, and playground equipment for the area west of the elementary school.

The proposal included a number of other improvements and details with an estimated cost of \$30,000 for the


The telephone company was then discussed by the board. It is hoped a more efficient telephone system could be adopted for the school. The school has five lines and they get an average of 90-125 phone calls a day.

The Junior High Athletics guidelines proposed by the State Board of Education were exemined by board members. Enrollment dropped in January to 995 students. This is the first time enrollment has dropped below 1,000 in approximately 20 years.

Lunchroom finances were discussed and the school remained stable in that area. It was estimated that 111 students eat breakfast every day at school and 650 eat lunch.

The board then observed Senate Bill II which involves clearing up unnecessary violations of the intent of the Unemployment Act for school employ-

The final business of the night concerned recent correspondence to Abernathy schools. A letter was received from the Childress School system acknowledging our school rules in district 3-3A. Since Childress moved from another district, they have to adapt to new scholastic rules. Two such rules they did not have in their old district is that we have a victory line and a sold to A-1 Liquidators in Abernathy for public address system for announcing players before basketball games.

Abernathy Students To Take Assessment of Basic Skills Test

Third, fifth, and ninth grade students from the Abernathy Independent School District will participate in the second Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program scheduled for February 10, 1981

The assessment plan, first of its kind in this state, is scheduled once each year under requirements set by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session. The Abernathy ISD students will be

among 700,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests during the February 2-20 statewide testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete.

The Abernathy ISD will report its district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the board of trustees, according to Dr. Delwin Webb, district superintendent. "However, individual student scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian, and the school personnel directly involved," Webb adds.

"This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement," Charles Bowen, the District Coordinator, points out. "For this reason, results will be reported in a manner that will help everyone become more effective."

"Third grade students were added to the annual testing sequence for the first time this year. The three tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services," Bowen says.

Overall student performance, both by campus and by district, will be reported each year to the public by the local board of trustees.

CTB/ McGraw-Hill of Monterey, California will help administer the 1981 test program and develop and field test new items for the 1981-82 series under contract to the State Board of Education. The california firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at all

Each test question will relate to a specific objective or skill students are expected to learn by the time they complete the particular grade," Bowen points out.

'We use the term 'criterion-referenced' simply because it is a short way of saying the answer to each question must lead back to a specific objective," Bowen explains.

Ninth grade students who do not make a satisfactory "exit level" score will re-take the test each year they remain in high school.

The annual test program will be administered by specially-trained personnel in each school district under the guidelines and supervision of the Texas

Taxpayers Should Check On Late Forms

Taxpayers who want to file an earlier tax return for 1980 should take steps now to obtain statements of income, such as Forms W-2, for wages, or Forms 1099, for interest or dividends. Oftentimes taxpayers find themselves filing closer to the April 15 deadline than they had originally intended when they could have avoided delay by contacting the issuer of the statements to make sure they were being sent. Receiving these statements earlier and filing before the deadline normally speeds up the issuance of refund checks.

A copy of Form W-2 from each of the taxpayer's employers must accompany his or her return. After February 2, taxpayers who have not received their Forms W-2 should contact their employers and request the form. If taxpayers have not received statements by February 17 they should call their local IRS for assistance.

While Forms 1099 need not accompany the return, the payment information on them is generally necessary for the taxpayer to complete the return. Taxpayers who are otherwise ready to file should call the issuers of the Forms 1099 to verify the amounts. Taxpayers can rely on their own records, if kept




James Elston

Elston's wife, Loretta, attended Howard College where she took courses in Criminal Justice for two vears. The couple is expecting a child in March.








