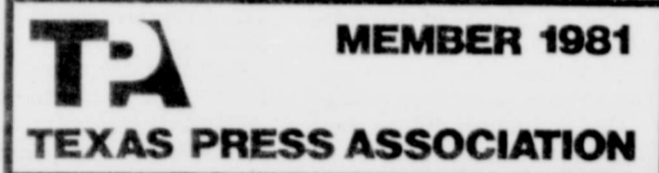

Public Notice Of Tax Exemptions Available To Homeowners

The Hale County Appraisal District is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions and open-space land valuation. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the property owner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in the Hale County Appraisal District on January of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of their homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"Disabled" in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exists in the national economy, or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to be drawing benefits from Social Security.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Owners of farm and ranch land on January 1, 1981 may make application for open-space valuation of their land and upon meeting the required conditions, may have their land valued according to its productivity instead of its market value.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the Hale County Appraisal District at 293-4226.

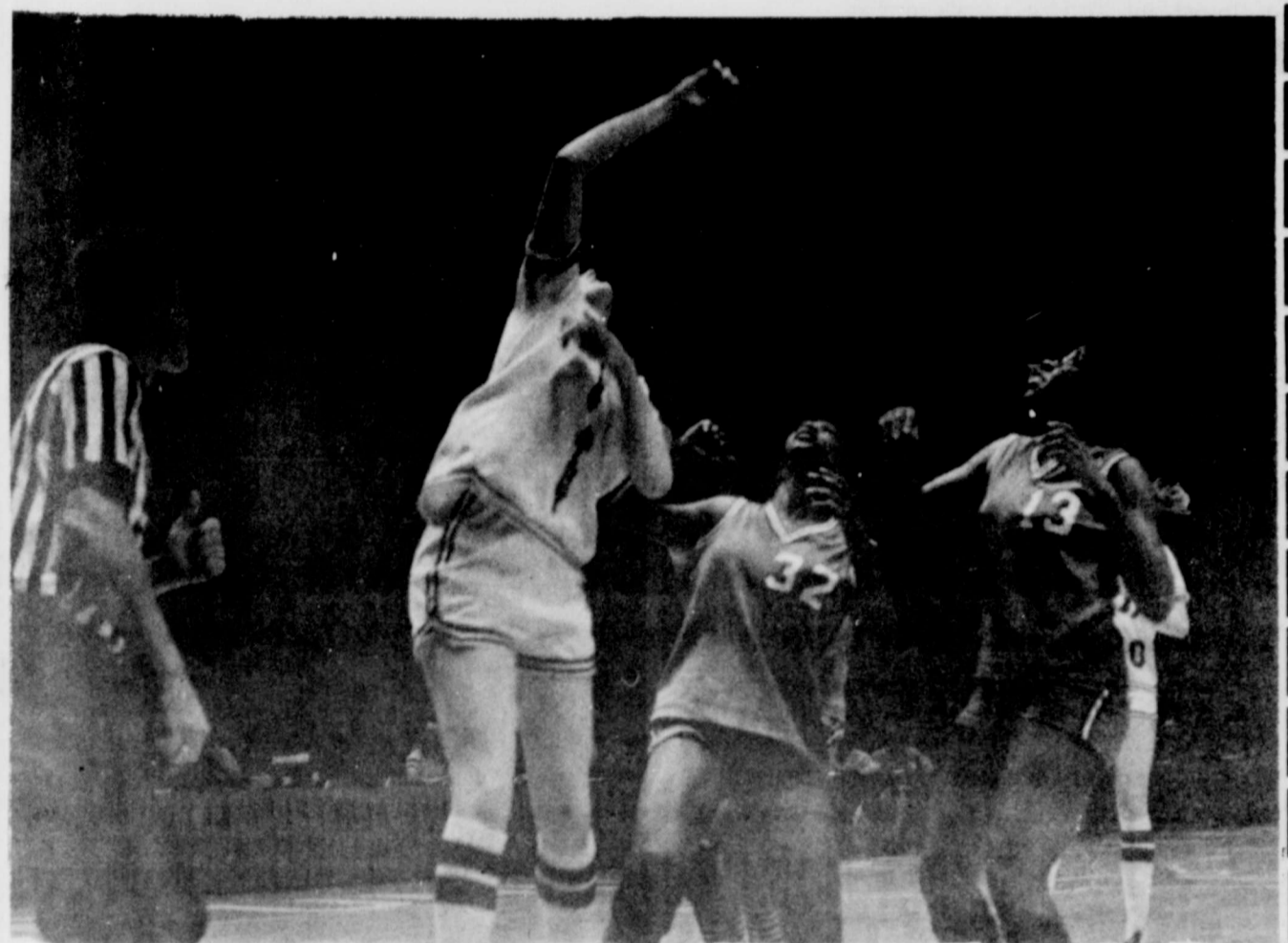

After nine minutes had ticked off, the Lions were trailing 23-12. The Sauger team at that point began to get into trouble with big Lee Ann Galbreath picking up two quick fouls within a minute of each other and

having to sit out the rest of the half. With 2:30 left to play in the half the Sauger Indians were still leading 32-23.

Renay Looney then made both ends of a one and one, then stole the inbounds pass and handed off to Juanita Abercrombie for a quick lay-up.

Next Vickie Teal stole an inbounds pass and made a lay-up and New Deal was back in the game at 32-29. With 5:22 left in the third quarter, Vickie Teal hit back to back jumpers to tie the score at 38-38, and with 4:20 left to play in the third quarter, the Lions took their first lead of the game at 43-40.

Sauger came right back to within a point, but New Deal put together a string of nine points in two minutes, with Vickie Teal scoring five of those points, two field goals and a free throw.

The margin for New Deal with 1:35 left in the third quarter was 10 points. Sauger again pulled within 4 points early in the 4th quarter, but was obviously at this point tired and running out of bench.

Peggy Emery came on in the 4th quarter and played fine basketball, making two crucial free throws with 1:05 remaining in the game. The game ended at 65-58 and many feeling New Deal had a good chance going into Saturday's final game.

The leading scorer for New Deal was Vickie Teal with 30 points. Melissa Mayo and Juanita Abercrombie each had 11 points.

Saturday afternoon the Lions met the Hardin

Hornets and were introduced to the Reescano sisters. Did New Deal meet their match? Some have said so. That could be the case, but from what this writer has observed - that point might be worth debating.

The Hornets are good and can certainly shoot the basketball. Turnovers and missed shots by New Deal were to be the key to the Hornet victory.

The Lions were behind by only 3 points with 6:43 remaining in the first half, and with a little over 4 minutes left, the score was close with the Hornets leading by only five points.

Turnovers then began for New Deal. They turned the ball over 4 times, leading to seven Hardin scores in the

last minutes before the half. At half time the score was 33-21.

The same things happened early in the second half and Lori Reescano hit the basket every time she had the ball.

Hardin continued to take advantage of New Deal mistakes and pulled out in front to stay there until the final buzzer sounded.

The final score read Hardin 61, New Deal 46.

Scoring in the game again saw Vickie Teal leading with 20 points, followed by Melissa Mayo with 13 and Juanita Abercrombie with 7.

The season has ended for the '80-'81 Lady Lions, but it was successful and certainly one that everyone can be proud of.

Leatherwork On Display At Library

The combined talents of Roy and Marilyn Stone are on display at the Abernathy Public Library during the month of March. The Stones specialize in custom leatherwork.

The Stones became interested in this art in 1977 and established a shop at their home.

Since that time, they have completed work on approximately 39 saddles, each saddle requiring at least one month's work.

Making tack (gear for horses and roping) for working cowboys and ropers is also part of their work.

They also make small leather items such as belts, purses, key chains and check

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book covers.
While Roy does the actual cutting and construction of the pieces, Marilyn does the design work called tooling. She relies on her free hand talent for the designs on saddles, but used commercial patterns for the work on the smaller items.

A special item created by the Stones is the trophy saddle. These are given as prizes at rodeos and roping associations.

While working as a cowboy in Hale Center and Lubbock, Roy began doing small leather repairs for other people. One day he decided he "didn't want to ride in the snow anymore" and enrolled at Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo for a course in saddle and tack making.

Marilyn, a native of Dimmitt, is a graduate of Texas Tech. She also studied tooling at TSTI. Presently, she teaches homemaking at AHS.

Editor's note: The Lakeview Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm tackles a Presidential problem this week, sort of.

Dear editor:
 As hard as inflation is on most of us, it's even harder on a President. I'll explain.

According to economists, inflation occurs when there's an overabundance of money chasing too few goods and services. Car manufacturers, with rows and rows of high-priced un-sold cars on their lots, have a hard time understanding this theory. And if there's an overabundance of money, the people with it are sure keeping quiet.

Inflation and economists are like bad colds and doctors. Doctors can tell you when you've got a cold but not what caused it, how to cure it or how to prevent the next one.

This gets me around to Presidents and inflation. Presidents have got to figure out some way, not how to cure inflation—nobody apparently can do that—but some way to stop being identified with it.

Like it is, a President in office gets

overtaken by inflation and everybody blames him, or he gets elected with inflation already boiling and if it doesn't simmer down he gets the blame.

Presidents have got to disassociate themselves with the problem or all of them will wind up being one-termers. This is un-fair. You spend years and all sorts of money seeking the office and then get to spend only four short years in the job because people equate you with skyrocketing prices. You no more than get the White House redecorated when it's time to move out.

If the Presidency is going to be an honored office you leave in triumph with colors flying and the prospect of having your picture on a postage stamp, some President has got to figure out how to shift the blame for inflation onto somebody besides himself. How about the Secretary of the Treasury? Congress? Foreigners? The Supreme Court? School busing? Newspaper editors? The dark of the moon?

If I were President, God save the country, that would be near the top of my priorities.


C. C. Williams
