## SWINE DIVISION

Vickie McKenzie took the grand champion trophy home after presenting her 235-pound cross Wednesday after the swine portion of the show came to an end.

The reserve championship trophy went to another Abernathy youth, Russell Windham, winning with his 236-pound Hampshire. Windham is an FFA member that just recently moved to Abernathy this past fall.

Tom Richerson received the coveted showmanship award for the swine

division. Richerson is also an FFA member and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Truman Richerson.

David Myatt claimed the breed champion in the Chester White division. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. PeeWee Myatt. Russell Windham had the Hampshire breed champion. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Scotty Windham. The final breed champion was Vickie McKenzie for her cross. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don McKenzie.

The reserve breed champions from Abernathy were also numerous. Randal Stillwell claimed reserve breed champion in the Chester White division. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold

Stillwell. Everett Irlbeck, a member of 4-H and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Irlbeck, received the reserve breed award for his Poland China.

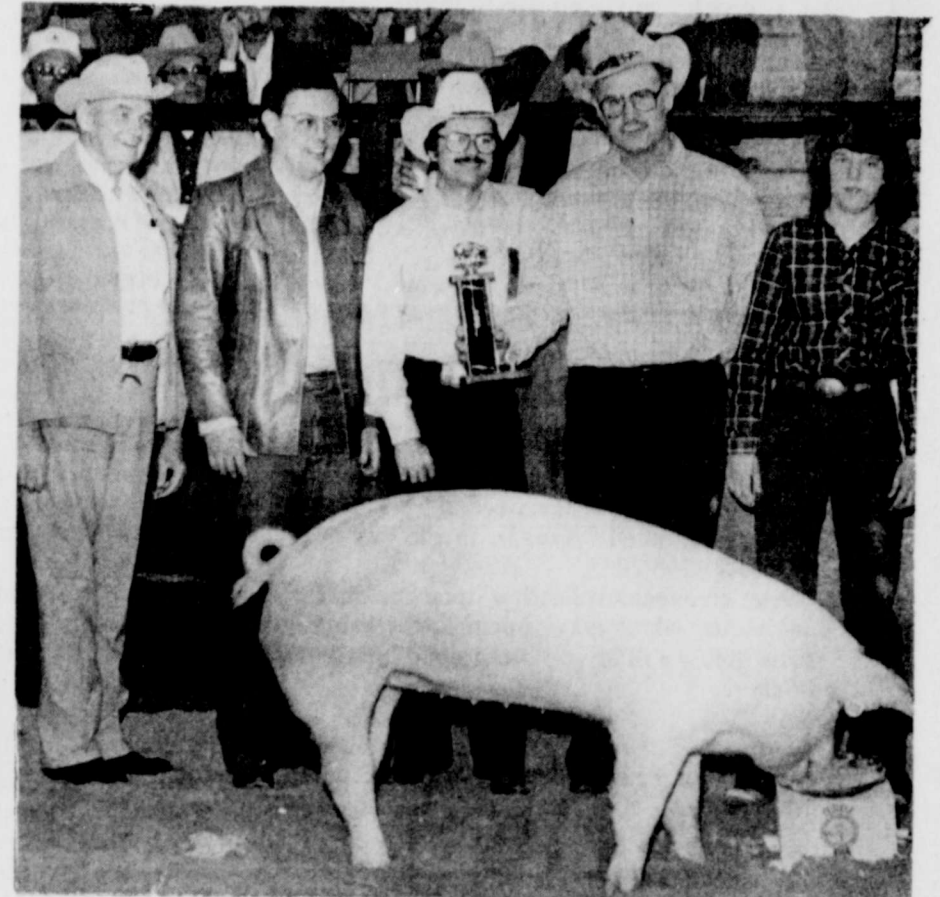
## BEEF CATTLE DIVISION

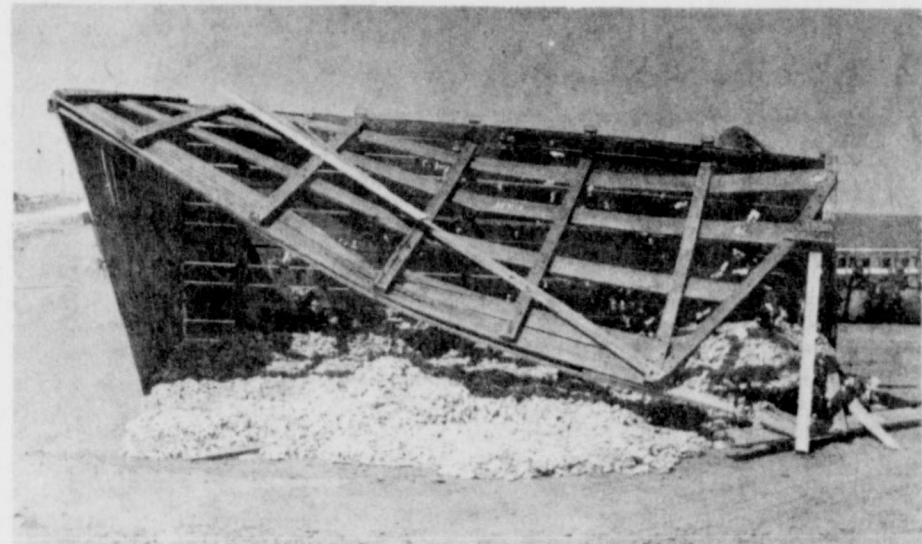

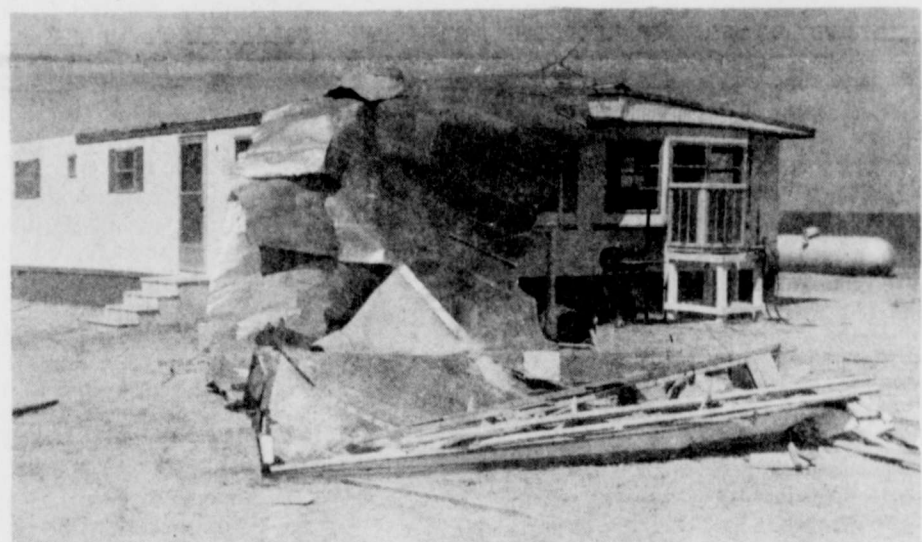

## Three Arrested In Narcotics Raid

Late Thursday night, March 12, 10:30 p.m., Abernathy Police Officer Jim Hicks received a complaint from a person about loud noises coming from a house trailer at 1011 4th Street.

Officer Jim Hicks contacted Police Chief Jimmy Williams and officer James Elston to back him up on the call. Williams knocked on the front door to see what the disturbance was about while Elston covered the back of the house, police officers said.

A 21 year old white woman answered the door and at that time police officers smelled a strong odor coming from inside the house. The smell was marijuana and officers then had probable cause to enter the house, police officers said.

When asked if they had been smoking marijuana, the woman stated that they had smoked a joint or two, police officers said.

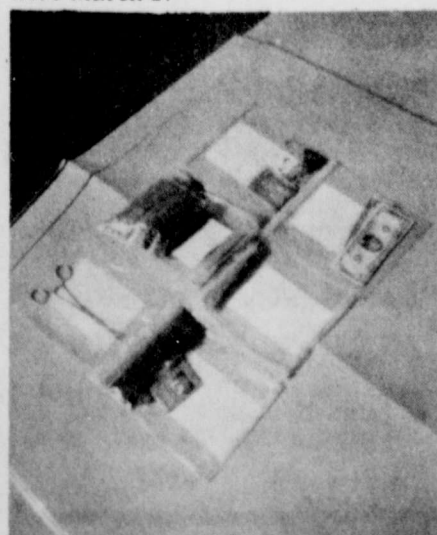
In the house they found two other young women, a 20 year old white woman sitting on an easy chair and a 19 year old Mexican-American female sitting on a couch. Marijuana was found in plain view on the kitchen table, officers said.

Another 4 lids of marijuana were found in plain view in the bedroom. According to police officers, they tagged the marijuana and placed the three women under arrest. They were then taken to the Lubbock County Jail. They are presently all out on bond, officers said. The case is presently

waiting to be confronted by a Grand Jury.

### Police Chief Charged For Alleged Oppression

Police Chief Jimmy Williams, 34, turned himself in at the Lubbock County Sheriff's office after having found out that he was being charged for allegedly subjecting two young women to sexual mistreatment while on duty here March 2.

The charge of official oppression is a Class A misdemeanor, punishable by up to a year in jail and a \$2,000 fine. Williams was booked into the Lubbock County Jail Friday evening, but was released immediately on two personal recognizance bonds.

Williams recently stated that he had not entered the trailer house until March 12 when the narcotics bust was made with officers Elston and Jim Hicks. One of the women busted in the raid pressed charges against Williams March 13 one day after the bust had been made.

### Williams To Be Suspended

The Abernathy City Council held a meeting at 5:00 p.m. Monday to determine what action should be taken with Jimmy Williams after the incident. Williams and his attorney met with the city executive committee for a period of almost an hour before the council went into a private discussion session without Williams present. Fifteen minutes later Williams was confronted with a decision by the council that he should be suspended from active duty with full pay until a decision had been reached in the trial pending on the sexual oppression charge. Williams is presently awaiting a trial date to be set for the case.

Williams made a brief statement following the decision saying that he had hoped he would have been reinstated as Chief of Police and was surprised at the suspension decision.

### Lutrick Inducted Into Phi Theta Kappa

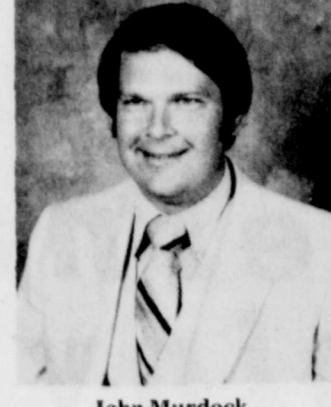

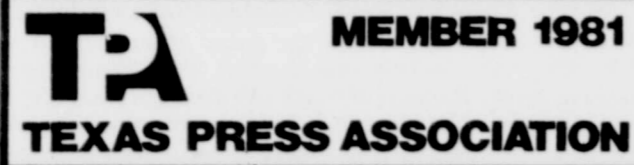

## Public Notice Of Tax Exemptions Available To Homeowners

The Hale County Appraisal District is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions and open-space land valuation. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the property owner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in the Hale County Appraisal District on January of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of their homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"Disabled" in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exists in the national economy, or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to be drawing benefits from Social Security.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Owners of farm and ranch land on January 1, 1981 may make application for open-space valuation of their land and upon meeting the required conditions, may have their land valued according to it's productivity instead of it's market value.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the Hale County Appraisal District at 293-4226.

Application forms may also be picked up at the Central office at 302 W. 8th Street in Plainview.

There is still a lot to be done so if you want to take part in an old fashioned "church raising" come on along and we'll share our neighborly feelings with you.

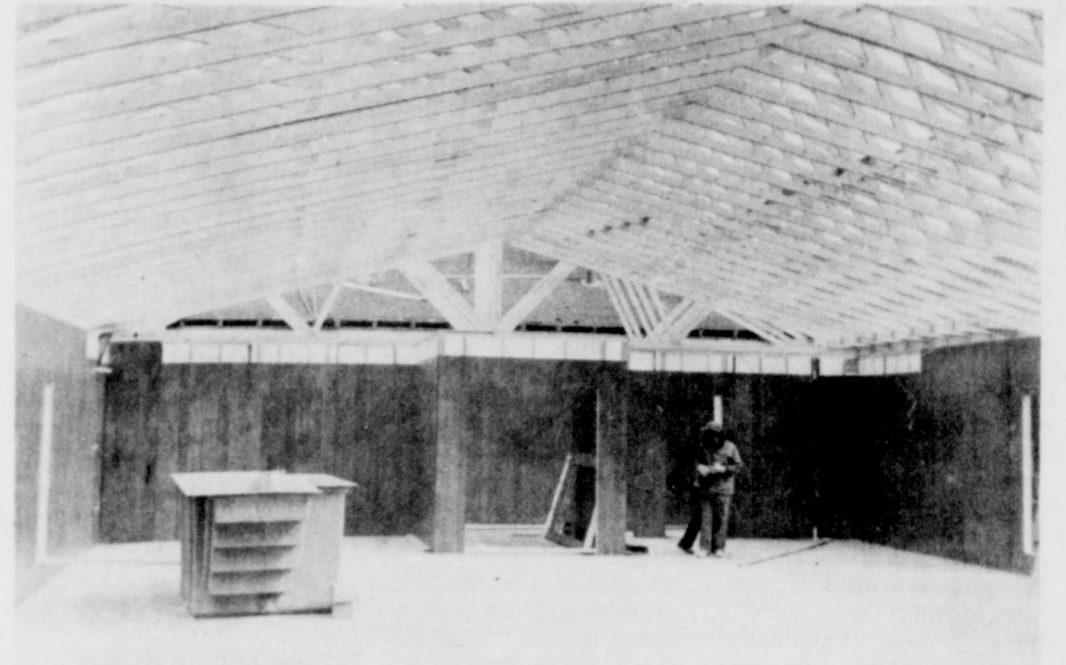

Survivors include two sons, a sister, three brothers, 10 grandchildren, 21 great-grandchildren, and five great-great-grandchildren.

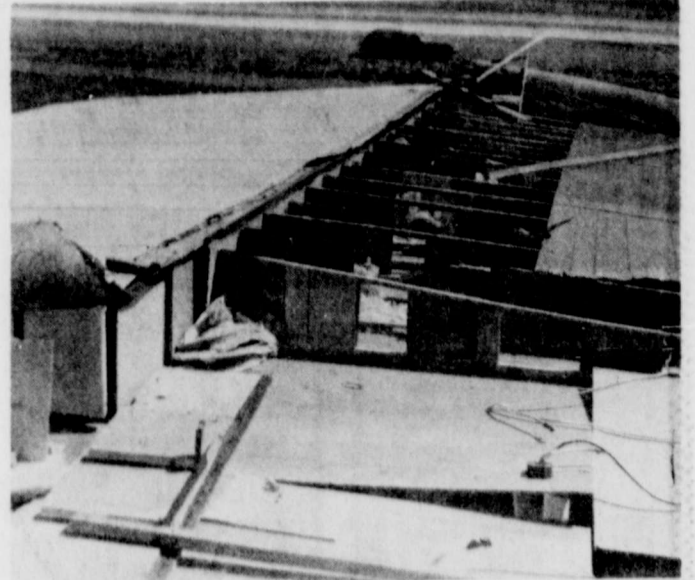
