

L.S. Chen Re-United With Sister After 32 Years

A Happy, Sad Occasion

L.S. Chen, of Abernathy, has not set eyes on his sister, Suefong, for a period of 32 years. Monday April 20, at 5:30 p.m., Mrs. Suefong Chen landed at the Lubbock Airport to stage a dramatic reunion with her brother, one of laughs and tears.

L.S. recalls when he last saw Suefong 32 years ago. It was in Hong Kong, Suefong and her husband Mr. Ku made a brief visit to see L.S. and his family living in Hong Kong and then returned back to China.

L.S. had moved from China to Hong Kong as a young textile engineer to work in a pioneer mill in that British Crown colony. He has never set his foot in his mother land since leaving China in 1949.

After that get-together, L.S. Chen and his sister endured long separation, and for a timely period, they didn't dare dream they would ever see each other again.

On each side of the border, they went their own way of facing birth and death, joy and sorrow, with their only connection being sparse correspondence.

America in 1968. They moved to Abernathy in 1970, and Mr. Chen began to work at Southwest Textiles. His wife, Grace, started the well-known restaurant, Hong Lou, in Lubbock in 1971.

Their four children, Minnie, Doris, Daniel and Stanley practically grew up in this area. Minnie, 31, was an architecture student at Texas Tech. She married another Tech-san, Dr. William Chang, a micro-biologist specialist. They live in Elkhart, Indiana, having three sons.

Doris, 29, earned a B.S. in pharmacy at the University of Texas at Austin and a M.S.C. degree at the University of Maryland. Doris and her husband, Dr. James Peng, are currently working in hospitals in Cleveland, Ohio, but are moving to Lubbock to assume their jobs at Lubbock General Hospital in June.

The Chen's next youngest is Daniel, 26, who was a physics graduate from Texas Tech. He is currently the program manager at Texas Instruments in Lubbock. His wife, Jean, acquired her master's degree in library science at Brigham Young and later attended business school at Tech. They have an infant daughter.

The youngest of Chen's children is Stanley, 20, who graduated from Abernathy High in 1979. He presently is a

sophomore in the cadet program at Texas A&M University, the only Aggie in the family.

The visiting aunt, Suefong, spoke of her nephews and nieces. "Although this is the first time I've seen these children, I feel so close to them as if they were born and brought up under my eyes. Seeing all of them well educated, and the older ones well-established in their careers, I feel these successes are my own too."

Suefong has two girls and two boys of her own. All were raised in China and are presently living there.

Suefong has been in America the past four months. She has been staying in New York with her sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. W.T. Teng. Suefong came to this country on a visiting visa, initially for six months.

Asked how long she intends to stay, she said, "You understand, this is kind of a once in a life time thing. We are no longer young people. Once we say goodbye again, heaven only knows whether we'll see each other again. I definitely wish to stay as long as your government permits."

Therefore, Suefong will be in the city of Abernathy for some time. Go by and see her at Chen's house on 13th St. or say hi to her if you see her on the streets of Abernathy.

City Sales And Use Tax Collected

Approximately \$18,000 city sales and use taxes have been collected for the period ending April 3. The statement, authorized by Bob Bullock, the state comptroller of public accounts, revealed that the percent change to date was a negative 8%.

Last year at this time over \$19,000 had been collected. The net rebate this year is \$2,421.63. The net rebate this same period the prior year was zero.

City Acquires Dispatch Service

The City of Abernathy recently purchased the equipment necessary to install a dispatching service for city police, ambulance and fire calls.

Calls are dispatched from Plainview where they are received from Abernathy, from 5p.m. to 8a.m. every day. The city switched over to this system four weeks ago.

All towns in Hale County have already switched to dispatch lines out of Plainview. "Calls go through more efficiently and dispatchers are not

needed from 5p.m. to 8a.m. to receive calls," City Manager Rod Ellis said.

Before the city acquired the dispatch equipment, they were paying two local dispatchers to receive calls. These two dispatchers worked a total of 128 hours a week. "By acquiring this dispatch service, the city will be saving the wages paid to keep two local dispatchers," Ellis said.

The cost of the dispatch service equipment is \$25,000. At the last city council meeting the council authorized payment to General Electric for the Mobile Equipment purchased. The city will borrow money from the airport fund. These funds will be paid back to the airport in a period of two years.

The phone line to Plainview will cost the city \$187 a month for service charges.

Rod Ellis stated that the dispatch service will save the city more money in the long run.

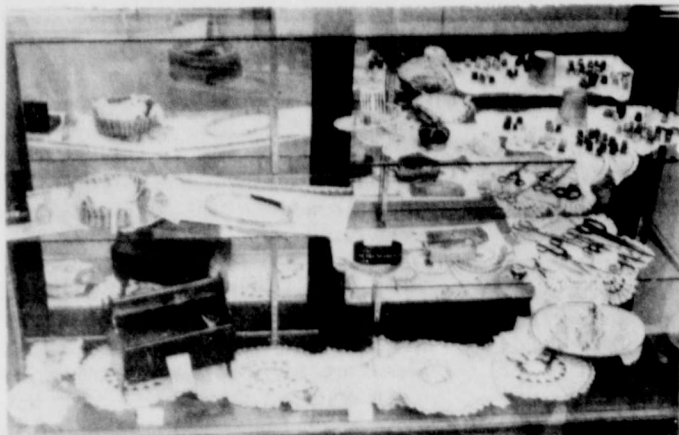
Bobby won't be back until Saturday. He and his wife decided to tour that part of the United States while they're up that way.

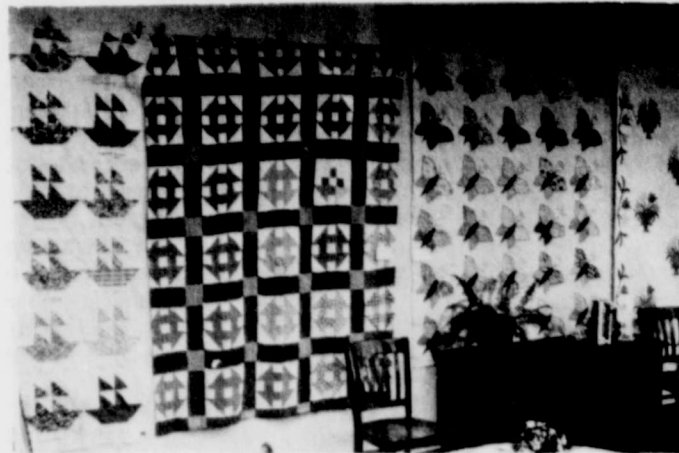
and Margaret will run in the 200 meter run. We are behind them and hope they will go on to win state. Ramona will be playing in the regional tennis tourney this weekend also.

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COTTON TODAY

A NATIONAL COTTON COUNCIL SERVICE

The 50-man Board of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. April 15 tentatively approved Andrews County as a new PCG member, elected 1981-82 Executive and Nominating Committee members and discussed the organization's efforts to influence both administrative and legislative actions now being deliberated in Washington.

The expansion of PCG's territory was the first since 1969 when Martin and Midland were added to the 23 counties listed as charter members in 1956.

Phil Wallace of Andrews County, speaking for what he termed a substantial number of producers, petitioned the Board for membership, noting that Andrews County is now planting from 60 to 70 thousand acres of cotton each year.

Andrews County has only one gin, and the PCG Board voted unanimously to accept the county for membership "contingent on receipt of an agreement from the Andrews County gin to participate in PCG's dues collection program." The addition of Andrews County, when completed, will bring to 26 the number of counties represented by PCG.

PCG has one elected member on its Executive Committee from each of six districts. Elected to represent producers in District 1 (Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Swisher and Briscoe Counties) was Charles Axtell of Springlake, replacing W.L. Edelman of Friona, now deceased.

Rennie Claunch of Bula was re-elected from District 2 (Bailey, Cochran and Hockley) and Henry Kveton of Petersburg was re-elected from District 3 (Lamb, Hale, Floyd and Motley).

Representing District 4 (Lubbock, Crosby and Dickens) will be Tommy Fondren, also re-elected to the committee. D.C. Newson of Plains was elected from District 5 (Yoakum, Terry, Lynn and Garza Counties) taking the place of Gerald Caswell of Brownfield who was recently elected Secretary-Treasurer of the organization. Frank Jones of Lamesa was returned to the committee from District 6 (Gaines, Dawson, Borden, Martin, Howard and Midland Counties).

The complete Executive Committee is made up of these elected members plus the two immediate past presidents and all PCG elective officers.

The PCG Nominating Committee, which is charged with presenting to the Board at least one nominee for each of PCG's elective offices prior to annual elections, is made up of the

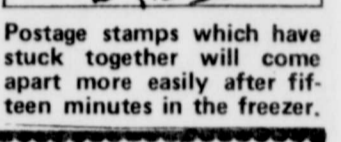

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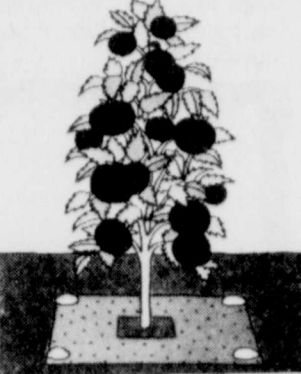

Vic Lamb of Sedona, Ariz., a former Abernathian, is writing a book. Included will be his experiences on newspapers in Florida, Mexia, Lamesa, Abernathy, Hale Center, Plainview and Ruidoso, N.M. Lamb was editor of The Abernathy Weekly Review in the early to mid-1930's.

A note from former Abernathian Mrs. Mary Ann (Hurst) Pitts of Citrus Heights, Calif., said that she will search out more old issues of The Abernathy Weekly Review for us to share with Review readers. Her father, the late J.C. Hurst, was an early-day owner and editor of The Review. Mary Ann sent us the 1927 Reviews from which we have been quoting for the past several weeks. After this week, we have only two more 1927 Reviews to fill this column. Then we'll write about the 1925 Abernathy telephone directory. It was sent to the local telephone man, Wayne Arthur, by a Houston man who picked it up while he was attending Texas Tech that year.

Current news: Former Abernathians Mr. and Mrs. Ray Willis of Oceanside, Calif., arrived here Friday to visit friends. They will also visit in Quanah, Wichita Falls and Garland before returning to California.

Nelda Henley was a patient in Central Plains Regional Hospital in Plainview.

Abernathy is about the only town of its size on the South Plains that does not have a "Jaws of Life"...it might save a life. Hale Center staged a successful "Jaws of Life" drive last year after a young farmer in that area died after being drawn into a corn harvester. Had a "Jaws of Life" been immediately available, it would have cut down on the

time it took to extricate the victim from the machine.

Pete Knox is a part-time salesman at Abernathy Motor Co. His main employment is at Southwestern Public Service Jones Station east of Lubbock.

From the Abernathy Weekly Review dated Sept. 1, 1927:

The oil test wells west of Abernathy brought excitement over a "Big Water Strata That Might Prove Valuable for Irrigation of Crops."

Ten years later, in 1937, Douglas Chapman had an irrigation well drilled a mile or so east of the oil test wells, on the section owned by his parents, Mrs. and Mrs. W.V. Chapman. Currently, Mrs. Leo Konesko owns that section. The Chapman well was the second drilled in this immediate area for use as crop irrigation water. Earlier, Wesley Hardesty, who farmed what is now the Phillips Addition, brought in a good irrigation well in the approximate location of the current 16th Street and Ave. H.
