Boys Tennis Team Takes District

4 Players To Compete At Regional

The Abernathy Antelopes boys varsity tennis team won district honors last Wednesday. Abernathy took first and second places in the singles division and first place in the doubles division.

Winning first place in district singles competition was Ray Ortiz by defeating three opponents. In the quarterfinals, Ortiz easily defeated Laurentree of Idalou, 6-1, 6-0. Then he crushed Alan of Floydada, 6-0, 6-0 in the semifinal match. And in the finals, he defeated fellow teammate, Keith Robertson, by a score of 6-1, 6-4.

Second singles player for Abernathy, Keith Robertson, won two matches before confronting Ortiz in the district singles final. First he cruised by Nippert, of Childress, 6-3, 6-3 in the quarters. Robertson then won a hard-fought match against Galvan, of Floydada, by a score of 6-3, 5-7, 6-3, in the semifinals. He lost to Ortiz in the finals.

Roger Pinson and Cletus Irlbeck, Abernathy's first doubles team, won first place in the district doubles competition.

In the quarterfinals, they easily defeated Sanchez and Betts, of Tulia,

6-1, 6-0. The competition got tougher in the semifinal match against McCormick and Racy, of Floydada, but Pinson and Irlbeck came out on top by a score of 6-4, 5-7, 6-3.

The finals didn't get any easier for the doubles team. They then confronted Floydada's number one team of Galvan and Rodriguez. Pinson and Irlbeck lost the first set 4-6. They came back to win a tie breaker and the second set 7-6. The third set was a drawn-out battle that ended in victory for Pinson and Irlbeck, winning it by a score of 8-6.

Abernathy's second doubles team, Chuck Wilson and Albert Ortiz, won their first match against Tulia's doubles team by a score of 6-3, 6-1. In the semifinals they were defeated 6-1, 6-0 by Galvan and Rodriguez of Floydada. They won fourth place in district.

Junior Varsity players, Hector Eamos and Ronnie Taylor placed second and third, respectively, in the JV singles.

Ray Ortiz, Keith Robertson, Roger Pinson and Cletus Irlbeck will be competing in the regional tennis tournament this Friday and Saturday in Lubbock.

Tulia came in first place in district acquiring a total of 133 1/2 points. Abernathy was second with 122 points. Then it was Floydada third with 104, Childress fourth with 90 1/2, Lockney fifth with 36, and Idalou sixth with 33 points.

Windham To Compete In 4 Events

Russell Windham will be competing in four events at the Regional track meet next week.

Windham won first place in the 110 meter high hurdles with a time of 14.26. He won first in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles timed at 37.92 and second in the long jump after jumping 21 ft. 4 3/4 inches. He was beat by only 1/2 inch by Johnson of Childress with a jump of 21 ft. 5 inches.

In his final event, coupled with Bobby Ross, Sylvester Dunn, and John Ruiz, the 1600 meter relay team won first place.

Cox follows Ralph E. Davis, who was first elected in 1944 as a director, and who chose not to be a candidate for reelection. Davis is not currently engaged in farming.

In the pole vault division, Allen Lester came in fourth and Smiley Lopez sixth.

The JV team had several tracksters to place in district. Randy Houston won first in the pole vault, Jimmy Salinas took fourth place in the discus and Abel Cuevas won sixth in the long jump.

In the running events, Peter Ruiz won third in the 800 meter, Tom Conway fifth in the 100 meter, Robbie Fowler came in sixth in the 300 hurdles, and in the 200 meter run, Darren Knox won fifth and Abel Cuevas sixth.

The 400 meter relay team won fourth place and the 1600 meter relay team took sixth place.

Ruben Garcia and COMA Endorses GOP Budget Plan

After visiting with President Reagan recently, local Ruben Garcia, the Lubbock Mexican-American Chamber of Commerce (C.O.M.A.) president, announced that COMA endorses Reagan's economic proposals to help curb inflation and unemployment. Ruben is a graduate of Abernathy High and is presently employed as a supervisor with the postal service in Lubbock.

The local COMA president said more than 125 national Hispanic organization presidents met with Vice President George Bush to agree on the economic proposals after Bush pledged not to forget the poor and truly needy.

"We want to continue to fulfill obligations to those, who, through no fault of their own, must depend on the rest of us," Garcia said.

The COMA president said four points were established by the administration to help businesses, which in turn would stimulate the economy and help with jobs.

They are: substantial reduction in federal spending; 10 percent across-the-board tax cuts each year for the next three years; prudent elimination of excessive regulations; and a new federal monetary policy to assist the economic program.

"The government will reduce some programs, such as food stamps and extended unemployment benefits," Garcia noted. He added the new program cuts could save \$9 billion in one year, and as much as \$19 billion over the next three years. "and still meet the needs of those who deserve our help."

Garcia praised what he called the "genius" of the American economic system and the incentives offered by the system for economic growth.

Garcia also noted the U.S. government had gotten away from the idea that "government's function is to protect the people."

RAMONA IRLBECK TO COMPETE IN TWO EVENTS AT STATE

Representing girls track and tennis for Abernathy at the State Tournament will be Ramona Irlbeck after winning first place in Regional tennis and second place in the 1600 meter run in Lubbock this past weekend.

In the Region 1 Class 3A tennis tournament, Ramona defeated Lunn Jacques of Littlefield, 6-1, 6-1. Her semi-finals match was more challenging, but Ramona came out on top again by defeating Rochelle Cox, of Seminole, by a score of 6-4, 6-3.

It was not until the Regional finals that Ramona had to struggle for a victory. She defeated Gloria Gonzales of Crane by a score of 6-1, 5-7, 6-4 to win the Regional tennis title.

Ramona then went to the Regional track field at Tech to compete in the 1600 meter run. She qualified for the 800 meter race also, but tennis match interfered with her participation in this event.

In the 1600 meter race, Ramona won second place with her personal best time of 5:34.99 behind first place Painter of Tulia with a winning time of 5:10.07. Painter is the defending State champion in the 1600 meter run.

In the past, Ramona has won the State crown in 3A tennis for the past two years as well as winning second place her freshman year. She also won State in the mile run her freshman and sophomore years.

Interest Rates To Increase

Abernathy borrowers may only have a week to put their credit lives in order before new interest rates become effective, according to the Texas Consumer Association.

The House of Representatives approved the bill increasing interest rate ceilings, effective immediately upon the governor's signature. Lenders have stated that as soon as the bill becomes law, they will immediately increase interest rates on consumer loans.

The new rate ceiling will be 24% on most consumer loans - that means that new car purchases, credit card purchases, personal loans, etc. will have higher interest rates possibly as early as next week.

The Texas Consumer Association wants to alert borrowers of the effect of the bill. If consumers wait until their next paycheck to buy a car, the rate may be as high as a prohibitive 24%.

With their next bill, credit card users may get a notice that on all future purchases, the interest on them could be as high as 24%, and if they use their card, the new rate can be charged on amounts already owed. Consumers,

however, can avoid paying the higher rate on outstanding balances by notifying the creditor that they do not wish to pay the new rates.

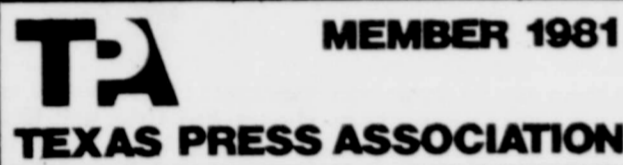

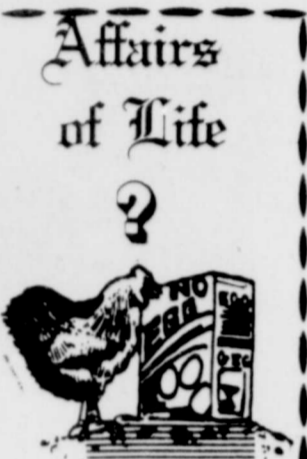

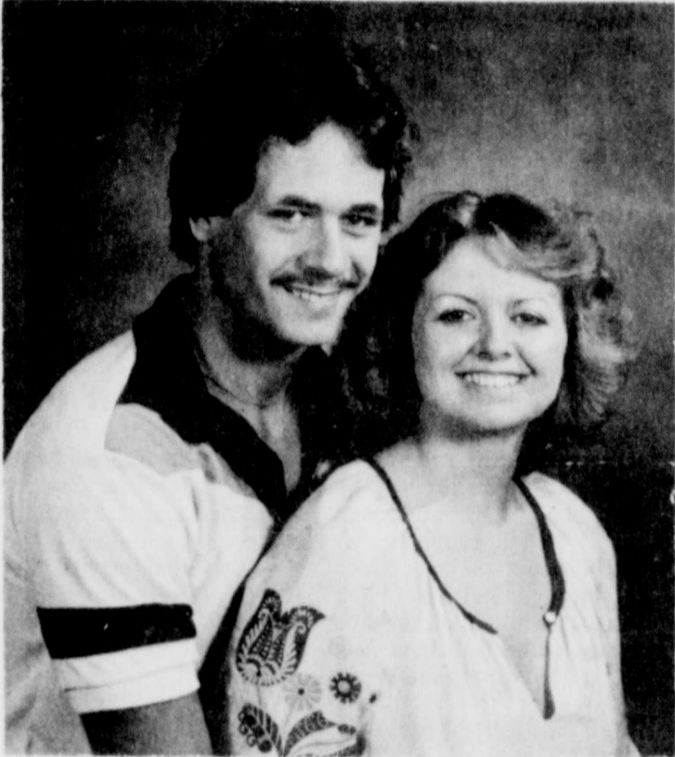

Accent On Health

Diabetes is more than daily insulin shots or watching your diet closely.

"Diabetes is a chronic disease in which the body cannot make use of sugars and starches in the normal way," according to Rose Manson, R.N., Chronic Disease Division, Texas Department of Health.

"It's a disease of the pancreas, which is the organ producing insulin. It's the insulin which helps the body use sugars, and with diabetes, the body does not produce or use insulin properly," added Manson.

"It's a more serious disease than many people think," warns the Health Department nurse. "Diabetes is the seventh leading cause of death in Texas and the leading cause of new cases of blindness." At least 650,000 Texans have diabetes, and we estimate that half of them don't even know it," added Manson.

There are two types of diabetes. The most serious is the insulin-dependent, formerly called juvenile onset diabetes. The latter

term is misleading since this form of the disease can strike anyone, though it is most common from childhood through middle age. These persons must have daily insulin injections, combined with proper diet and exercise to control their diabetes.

The second form of diabetes is non-insulin dependent, or maturity-onset, since it occurs most frequently among people who are 55 years of age or more at diagnosis. With the latter form, treatment is usually limited to management of the diet and body weight, and possibly oral medication.

But diabetes is more than a disease of the pancreas. Since it affects the blood vessels, it is a major contributor to kidney trouble, gangrene, and severe visual loss. It also increases the chances of heart attack, stroke, and problems of the nervous system. From onset, diabetes reduces life expectancy about 30 percent.

The cost of diabetes in America is more than \$7 billion each year in lost wages, disability payments, and medical costs, to say nothing of the human suffering involved.

Diabetes is the third leading cause of death by disease, behind only heart disease and cancer. During pregnancy, diabetes increases the chances of premature delivery and fetal mortality.

Symptoms of diabetes can include excessive thirst, frequent urination, increased appetite, weight loss, tiredness, vision changes, itching, and slow healing of cuts. Presently, it can be treated but not cured.

The incidence of diabetes is going up 6 percent each year. An American baby born today has a better than 20 percent chance of contracting diabetes over its 70-year life expectancy.

Fortunately, medical research is working to combat this chronic malady.

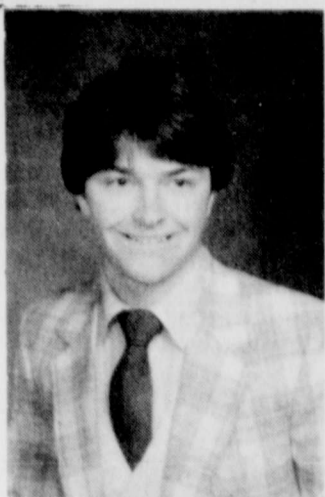

COTTON TALKS
FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., testifying in a 1981 farm bill hearing in Lubbock April 21, singled out a higher base loan, more equitable quality discounts and continuation of the disaster program as the three most urgent legislative needs of Plains cotton producers in years to come.

Hearing the hearing was Congressman Charles Stenholm of Stamford, Accompanying Agriculture Committee member, Arlan Strangeland of Minnesota, Lubbock's Congressman Kent Hance, member of the influential Ways and Means Committee, and by Congressman Jack Hightower of Vernon, member of the House Appropriations Committee and the

Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee.

PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson gave PCG's legislative policy, as it did four years ago, still calls for a loan program that will promote orderly marketing, assist in crop financing and assure adequate U.S. production without unduly encouraging increases in foreign production.

But, he said "What is new is this: our policy this year calls for a minimum loan at 65% of parity."

"This part of our policy, he said, "is an expression of the firm belief in the necessity for price supports tied to an index which will assure producers that support prices

COTTON TODAY

TENAN TO SPEAK: House Agriculture Committee Chairman Kika de la Garza (D-Tex.) will be the luncheon speaker at the National Cotton Council Board of Directors meeting May 6 at Washington's Mayflower Hotel. Industry leaders and staff will report on current issues during an open session that morning, and individual contacts will be made on Capitol Hill in the afternoon. A Congressional reception will be sponsored by the Council that evening. The board will meet in executive session on the morning of May 7.

EXPORTS REPORTED: Cotton textile exports in January and February were equivalent to an annual rate of 777,000 bales, down 29 percent from the same months in 1980. Shipments of 95,700 bales of upland raw cotton during the week ended April 10 brought the season's total exports to 4,293,500.

TAIWAN SHOPS: A Taiwanese trade team currently touring this country has signed letters of intent to purchase at least 400,000 bales of U.S. cotton. The letters do not constitute a specific contract, however, and no shipment dates were set. No actual cotton was purchased by the team dur-

ing its tour, which started March 27, but the Taiwanese bought some soybeans and other products.

SPACE BOUND COTTON: Cotton went along on the recent historic flight by the space shuttle Columbia. Astronauts John Young and Robert Crippen wore in-flight space suits of Fire-Stop cotton. Cotton incorporated ran a full-page ad in the New York Times April 15 calling attention to the fact and pointing out desirable qualities of the fabric. The ad lists "blue chip" companies using Fire-Stop for workers' protective clothing and states that a dozen manufacturers are now making the cotton fabric.

Cattle Industry Survival Keys: Taking a tough look at the cattle industry, a nationally recognized livestock market analyst said during the Beef Cattle Short Course at Texas A&M University this week that keys for survival of the cattle business in the decade ahead will be flexibility, discipline, or having an advance plan which allows producers to take advantage of volatility in the marketplace, and cost control, or equity preservation. From the middle of 1982 through 1986, the agricultural economist said cost of production as it relates to owning and raising a cow and calf will exceed the value received.

will keep pace with galloping inflation and runaway production costs. And when we look for such an index - one that will keep up with increasing costs - it seems parity is the only practical answer."

On the inequities in grade, staple and micronaire discounts that apply to the base loan, Johnson first expressed gratitude to the congressmen for their help in PCG's efforts to minimize proposed increases in 1980 and 1981 quality discounts, then exhorted them to work with PCG to get an equitable formula for setting loan differentials written into "either new legislation itself or committee reports that will prevent the same problem from recurring year after year."

Departing from his prepared text, Johnson also expressed strong opposition to a proposal, made in the Soybean, Wheat and Feed Grain Subcommittee, to limit producer use of loan programs to an aggregate of \$150,000 for all commodities.

The disaster section of the 1963 and 1977 farm acts, Johnson stressed, plays an essential role in the overall program concept and should be retained in any new legislation. "Literally," he went on, "it has been a financial savior to thousands of farmers unfortunate enough to suffer crop losses on two, three or even four consecutive years." And, he added, "Unlike the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation disaster program requires government expenditures when and where, and only when and where, such expenditures are desperately needed."

Along with many other witnesses at the hearing, Johnson expressed dissatisfaction with the FCIC program in its present form, noting that FCIC has been unable to find a single producer who believes he can obtain adequate protection with FCIC insurance.

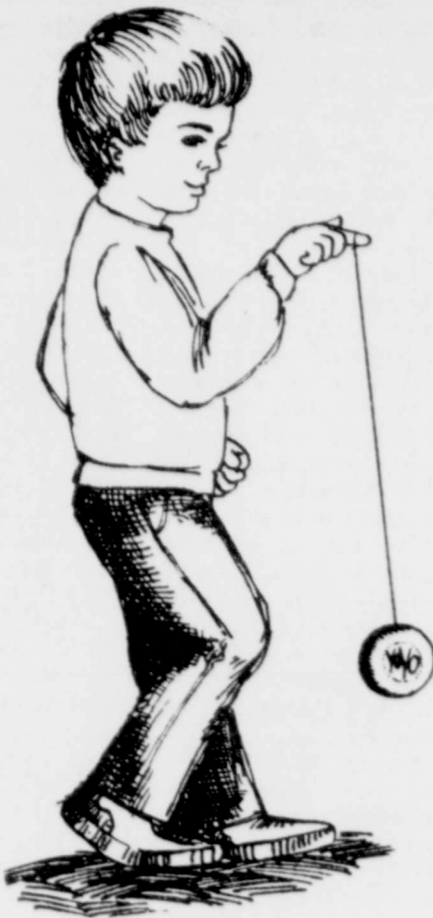

Winston Berriman from Broadview Steel discussed the proposal of a new band hall.

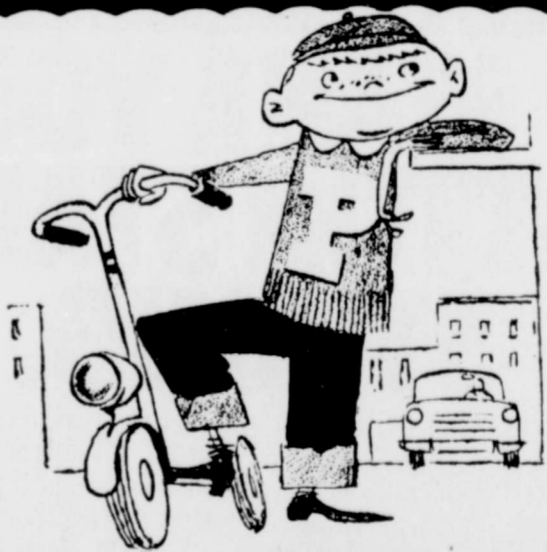

"Fortunately, only a small percentage of these irradiated patients have developed thyroid tumors. Most are benign (non-cancerous), and even the cancerous ones usually can be removed successfully by surgery," he adds.

News and Comments

BY RUFORD DAVENPORT

LOOKING BACK... to the Abernathy Weekly Review dated September 22, 1927: A.G. Goldwater, farmer 2 1/2 miles southeast of County Line brought the first 1927 bale of cotton at the T.B. Stone Gin in Abernathy Sept. 14.
