

Australia Exchange Student Graduates From New Deal High

Reviews Past Year In Texas

Julie Rohan, a 17 year old exchange student from Australia, graduated from New Deal High Wednesday, May 27.

For the past year she resided at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Kveton who live six miles outside of Abernathy.

Julie arrived at Abernathy August 22, 1980 and began attending New Deal High School. She attended this school because the Kvetons are located in the New Deal school district.

She was able to live in America on the exchange program. In this program, Australia seniors are allowed to attend school in America their senior year and live with an American family.

The Kvetons had requested an exchange student to reside at their home. After interviewing several exchange students, they decided on Julie. Mrs. Kveton stated that she had always wanted a red-headed daughter.

Exchange students are allowed to pick three states they prefer to live in. Julie selected Texas first, then Hawaii and Canada. When asked why she picked Canada, Julie had these words: "I picked Texas first because I wanted to live in Texas more than anywhere. I picked Hawaii second knowing it would be a long shot, and that I would probably get to live in Texas. I knew Canada wasn't a state, and therefore I was almost sure I would be sent to Texas, but I didn't know where in Texas."

Julie was very happy with the family she ended up with. "The Kvetons are my newly adopted American parents

and I love them as my own. America is my second home now and I wouldn't mind living here some day," Julie said.

When asked what she thought of the people here, Julie stated that most everyone in New Deal and Abernathy were extremely friendly. She also visited California, New Mexico and other parts of Texas while in America.

Julie grew up in a town smaller than Abernathy on the Australia coastline. "I miss scuba diving, surfing, horseback riding and swimming, but as a whole, I don't miss home severely," Julie stated.

Julie will not be given credit for her senior year at New Deal or graduating. She will repeat her senior year again in Australia where she will be given credit for graduating on the Australia school level.

When asked what she thought of our schools and education system in America, Julie said, "The classes I took and observed were very easy and I had no trouble with them at all."

She also stated that there was no discipline in our schools as compared to Australian schools. "Also," Julie said, "I have noticed that educational standards have been lowered to the level students are at. Students in Australia are pushed to a higher level and standard of education."

Julie stated that she did enjoy her accelerated English class and journalism class though.

Julie remembered some events that took place this year that she will never

forget, such as the first time she saw snow, the terrible dust storms, and the time a horse rolled over on her and she was in the hospital for three days.

She will be leaving June 30 to head back to Australia. "I will be back to America and Abernathy to see my parents here and possibly live in America," Julie ended.

Australian Exchange Program

A colorful year of international living "down under" is available to American high school students this winter. Registration for this year's Australian exchange program was announced this week.

Students chosen for the program will start classes in January when the Australian school year begins and will return to the U.S. in time for Christmas. They will live as members of Australian families, attend school, and experience Australia's richly varied culture first hand.

Approximately 125 students will be selected for the program on the basis of academic achievement and personal interviews. Applicants must have birthdates between October 1, 1963 and December 31, 1967, and a grade point average of 3.0.

To apply, students should call the YFU Regional Office at (713) 932-0066. The program fee of \$3695 includes round trip air fare from San Francisco. Students will pay their own way to and from the departure point. A limited number of partial scholarships are available, with awards ranging from \$250-\$1,000.

Chris Wilson, Tracy Bradley Injured In Car Wreck

Chris Wilson and Tracy Bradley were injured in a car wreck early Saturday morning when a pick-up collided into the car they were driving.

The wreck occurred around 3:30 a.m. Saturday morning when Wilson and Bradley were leaving a senior party held at the Darrell McGuire residence three miles southwest of the County Line community.

Wilson and Bradley were taken to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock following the accident. Wilson sustained a broken leg, two broken fingers, a break in his lower back-bone and several cuts and bruises.

Bradley, who was thrown from the car on impact, sustained several cuts and bruises and was later released from Methodist. She was admitted for treatment Monday after other health complications surfaced as a result of the wreck.

Wilson and Bradley were leaving the

senior party when a pick-up driven by Bobby Gough hit them on the driver's side as they were pulling onto the road. The pick-up hit the driver's side which was the side of Chris Wilson, and Tracy Bradley, the passenger, was thrown from the car.

Warren Stribling was riding as a passenger in the pick-up with Gough when the accident occurred. Both young men sustained minor cuts and scratches mainly on the forehead.

Wilson was driving the Cadillac owned by Victor Dees. Both vehicles in the wreck were totalled.

Wilson was reported in stable condition at press time. His sister, Pat Wilson, also stated that he was improving. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Wilson.

There was no further information on Bradley's condition at press time, only that she was being treated at Methodist Hospital.

Wheat Field Day June 5

The Feed Grain and Other Crops Committee will be hosting a Wheat Field Day June 5, 1981 starting at 9:30 a.m. according to Billy E. Warrick, County Extension Agent-Agriculture.

The tour will leave from the intersection of FM Road 400 and FM Road 37 running west off of 400 at 9:30 a.m. The tour will be conducted on the Dan Houchin farm. All farmers and businessmen

are encouraged to attend. This tour is open to all people regardless of age, socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

This is a dryland variety test with 5 different varieties included. With more emphasis being placed on wheat in our area, we feel that this will be a very informative meeting.

Plant Disease And Insect Clinic Monday

Plans have been made by County Agent Ollie Linder, to have a Plant Disease and Insect Clinic in Plainview on Monday, June 8. The Clinic is sponsored by the Extension Service with the Agriculture Committee of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce cooperating. It will be held in the Meeting Room of the Chamber of Commerce in Plainview from 3:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m.

On hand for the clinic will

be specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Dr. Robert W. Berry, Plant Pathologist; Dr. Dale Pennington, Area Soil Chemist and Dr. Roland Roberts, Area Vegetable Specialist, all of Lubbock; and Greg Cronholm, Hale County Agent-Entomology and County Agent Ollie Linder.

Attendance at this clinic will be on a come and go basis. Men and women living on the farm or in town are

invited to take advantage of this clinic by bringing in their plant specimens that are not growing just right, including house plants, yard, field crop or vegetables, or if they have insect trouble, get them identified within a few minutes and be on their way home in a short time.

Everyone is encouraged by the County Agent and Bill Quattlebaum, Chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the Plainview Chamber of

Commerce to bring in their diseased plants and their insects for identification and control recommendations to the Meeting Room of the Chamber of Commerce on Monday, June 8.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.



When Congress has an omnibus farm bill under consideration there is always the danger that attention to lesser legislative matters important to agriculture may be neglected.

Currently, action is lagging on the 1981 farm law, awaiting either arrival of the Senate Agriculture Committee's version on the floor or the resumption of House Committee work on final revisions of its bill, not expected now for several weeks.

But in this instance the wide-awake National Council of Agricultural Employers (NCAE) is utilizing the lull to call on Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. of Lubbock and some 490 other organizations and individuals who make up its membership for support of its effort to get relief in two troublesome areas of farm labor relations.

"One of the really hot battles in Congress centers on funding the Legal Services Corporation," NCAE says, noting that President Reagan's budget calls for zero funds, which would "wipe out" the agency. High Plains producers last

year blamed the Rural Legal Service office at Hereford for what they considered frivolous lawsuits, strikes and general unrest in farm labor circles. And Legal Services offices in several Eastern states have begun to harass growers this year by instituting civil damage suits under the Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act (FLCRA), the amendment of which is the second NCAE objective.

"At this writing," NCAE reported in a recent newsletter, "it looks as if the Legal Services Corporation will be funded at \$200 million, down only \$120 million from the current year."

But, the NCAE publication continues, "If zero funding is your idea of a proper solution to a serious problem, let your Congressional delegation know now."

And that, says PCG Field Services Director Ed Dean, "is precisely what we are doing."

Both NCAE and PCG for over a year now have been working for amendments that would clarify sections of the FLCRA under which the Department of Labor has sought to force registration

of farmers, ginners and others who only hire labor for their own use.

Senator David Boren (D-Okla.) has introduced an amendment to FLCRA, S-922, which it is thought would accomplish NCAE and PCG objectives.

And, the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources has called hearings June 2 and 3 to "explore how the Act has been administered over the past few years and whether that administration has been consistent with Congressional intent."

So NCAE is calling on its members to do two things - contact their senators and urge them to co-sponsor S-922 and where possible to testify at the hearings.

BILL DELAYED: The House Energy and Commerce Committee has delayed consideration of legislation reauthorizing the Consumer Product Safety Commission. The bill, which incorporates regulatory reform measures sought by the National Cotton Council, has cleared a subcommittee, but now is bogged down in a dispute over efforts to transfer the agency to the Department of Commerce. The Administration-backed proposal is being pushed by Rep. Phil Gramm (D-Tex.).

FOOD SHORTAGE

LOOMS AS 'TIME BOMB' - World food shortages loom as a "time bomb" that threatens to go off in the near future, says a spokesman for the U.S. red meat industry. Our food production system was developed because we placed a high priority on it, and supported research to improve our technology. Agricultural research funds have dwindled from 39 percent of the overall research budget some 40 years ago to only 2.2 percent presently. More funds are needed for food and nutrition research which can help prevent global food shortages, he said.

A NATIONAL COTTON COUNCIL SERVICE

The USDA, in its first forecast of the 1981-82 season, estimates world cotton production in a range of 65.5-72.5 million bales. 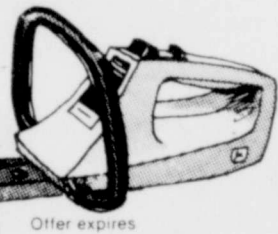
