

## Teachers Given Pay Hike,

## More Hired

The Abernathy School Board met Monday night and approved a proposal to increase teacher salaries. Four teachers were also approved for 1981-82 school year.

All members of the board were present at the meeting, except Jerry Oswald. Lorin Prather opened the meeting with the invocation.

The board approved a pay hike for school employees. The recommendations made involved a \$150 a month raise for professional teachers, \$50 raise for para-professional teachers, and a \$70 to \$90 increase for secretaries, the amount depending on the position they hold.

Custodians and maintenance employees were given a 12 percent raise. Employees with these positions will be paid more by the hour.

Abernathy ranks in the top ten percent of Texas towns for having the highest paid teachers. Due to the pay raise, Abernathy teachers will be receiving \$5 thousand above the minimum state level of pay for teachers. Before the pay hike Abernathy already ranked higher than most all schools in the panhandle area.

Abernathy now ranks with the high paid teaching districts of Dallas and Houston area.

### Teachers Approved

Several teachers were recommended and later approved by the board after having gone into executive session.

Marilyn Vieregge will teach English at High School. She previously taught here several years ago.

Patricia McMenamy, from Shallo-

water, will teach Special Education. Roland Murray has been assigned to the job of Assistant Coach and Drivers Education at the High School level.

Janell Rice, of Lubbock, will teach Pre-Kindergarten students in the Elementary School.

Of the Seven positions to fill this year, one is left. The School is still looking for someone to teach High School English or Government.

James Crites was hired earlier this year as a Jr. High Vocational Education teacher and Janis Myatt as a High School Special Education teacher.

### Possible Tax Increase

There is a good possibility that school taxes will be increasing approximately 2 cents for this year raise to take affect, according to Delwin Webb, School Superintendent. "We won't know for sure until August 28, when the Board of Equalization has adjourned, if school taxes will be increased for sure, but there is a good chance they will," Webb said.

School Taxes were last increased in 1977, there hasn't been an increase since. "Taxes remaining the same level for the past 4 years can be attributed to school owned mineral rites," Webb added.

### Milk, Gas, Insurance Bids

A bid submitted to the board by Bell was accepted over a bid from Borden

for the 981-82 school year. The Bell bid was 1/2 cent lower for 1/2 pint milk, which will be served in the school cafeteria. The cost is 16 cents for 1/2 pint of milk.

A gasoline bid was accepted with Consumers Fuel, (Coop), at \$1.22 for gas expenses. A bid was also submitted to the board by Phillips 66 at \$1.25 a gallon. The lower bid was accepted and Coop will deliver gas to the school next year.

Fleet Insurance was accepted with Burl Hubbard Insurance Company of Abernathy. Hubbard registered a bid of \$4,499 to cover the 24 school vehicles and occupants of the vehicles. Wilkinson Insurance of Lubbock submitted a higher bid of \$4,645. This coverage is good for 9 months during the coming school year.

Unemployment insurance was accepted again with TABS, which is a state-wide school insurance coop.

This insurance covers Abernathy Schools against unemployment claims. The cost is \$8 for every teacher employed by the school system.

### 1981-82 School Budget

The 1981-82 school budget hearing date was set for August 20, the estimated budget for this year is \$2,800,000.

The Board of Equalization will go into its first session August 6. This is a time for discussion with the board before they meet August 24-28 to finalize budgets for this year.

## Drilling Ceases On Givens Farm

The drilling rig located on the Ercell Givens farm, located 1/2 mile west of Abernathy, ceased drilling recently after having reached a depth of 9,222 feet.

No oil table was found and the well was capped with cement.

Givens expressed disappointment at not striking oil at 9,000 feet as had been predicted.

A new drilling rig was set up on the Willie Dunn farm, just south of Abernathy and near Hi-Plains Drilling company, Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning.

Dunn hopes to strike oil at 6 to 7 thousand foot level. By Monday the drilling rig had reached a depth of 1,600 feet.

## Burglary Heads Police Report

A burglary at Anderson Grain was at the top of the list of crimes committed in Abernathy for the month of July.

Burglars broke the lock on a warehouse door at Anderson Grain sometime Saturday evening and took three 5 gallon cans of Round-up and a hand dolly. The loss was estimated to be approximately \$972.

Roy Brown discovered the break-in Sunday morning. The lock was broken and the warehouse door was open, according to Police Chief Raymond Naron. "There are no suspects at present for the crime, but it is still under investigation," Naron said.

### Wanted Man Arrested

Walter Lee Buchanan Jr. was arrested August 1 for parole violation, according to officer Naron.

Buchanan had been released from a penitentiary on parole. Since then he had acquired warrants for his arrest from Lubbock and Hale Counties for writing several hot checks. When arrested, Buchanan was carrying an unlawful weapon, Naron said.

His wife was also arrested because of a warrant for her arrest from Lubbock County, also for a bad check, Naron said.

### July Crime Totals

For the month of July, Abernathy Police Officers issued 75 citations. There were 33 arrests, 3 wrecks--all minor, 2 DWI's, and 21 public intoxications, as submitted to the Review by Chief Naron.

A Mexican American female, approximately 32 years of age, was arrested July 3 at 3 a.m. for discharging a firearm in the city.

Two arrests were made for disorderly conduct.

There were three arrests for making alcohol available to a minor. A 23 year old Mexican American male, an 18 year old white male and a 19 year old Mexican American male were all arrested for different incidents of contributing to a minor.

A 36 year old black male and a 27 year old black female companion, were caught shoplifting at Allsup's July 25 at 1:30 a.m. Both were from Sudan, Texas. They were found guilty and paid

their fines.

They had taken goods from Allsup's which amounted to \$5.10. Police Chief Naron just happen to be entering Allsup's as the shoplifters were leaving, when night worker Jerry Martin told Naron they had been shoplifting Allsup's. They were immediately arrested, Naron stated.

Monday, August 3rd, Hale County property owners began receiving appraisal notices as the county wide program comes to a close. The new state law requires each property to be valued at 100 percent of market value as well as have a single value for tax purposes.

A working luncheon was held on Thursday, August 30th, at the Holiday Inn in Plainview. Some 39 elected and appointed officials were on hand to hear a presentation from Associated Tax Services.

The presentation included how the work of the reappraisal was conducted and details of how the values were determined.

Larry Hamilton, Chief Appraiser of Hale County, urged that any property owner who has questions about their value after receiving the reappraisal notice should contact the Central Appraisal District office at 293-5120 and set up an appointment time to meet with the appraisers.

Appointments will be made beginning on Tuesday, August 4th and will run through August 21st.

**Davis And McKenzie Attend Texas 4--H Congress**

**Producers Prepare For Court Battle With USDA**

If Texas corn farmers destroyed one-third of this year's crop, the total 1981 Southwest corn supply would be about the same as if Commodity Credit Corpora-

tion had not imported 45 million bushels of corn from Minnesota, Iowa and Wisconsin to the area. Grain Sorghum Producers Association and Texas Corn

Growers Association (GSPA and TCGA) are opposing CCC's sale of this imported corn in the area. GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp stated, We believe CCC's sale of this corn in our area to be one of the most damaging actions USDA had ever taken in a regional market. We also believe it to be illegal."

(A "million pound" producer stands to lose up to \$5,000.00 because of these sales.) Checks should be mailed to: Legal Fund Grain Sorghum Producers Association, Box R, Abernathy, Texas 79311.

The two producers organizations have employed the firm of McWhorter, Cobb and Johnson of Lubbock, Texas to represent them. Primary attorneys in the case will be David Langston, Tom Johnson and Jack Driskill. Langston became widely known as assistant to Congressman George Mahon

Provisions of the 1982 farm bill, to be voted on by the Senate and House after the August congressional recess, miserably fail to meet the objectives set forth by the legislative policy of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

In fact, says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, Congressman Kent Hance was right on the money in a recent "Ag Update" letter when he said the bill "...as it is now written is one of the worst pieces of farm legislation I've ever seen."

PCG policy calls for a minimum loan level at 65 percent of parity (now about 76 cents) and retention of the current disaster program until federal crop insurance has proven itself as an acceptable substitute, Johnson points out. Both Senate and House bills now call for a minimum loan of 55 cents and both would eliminate disaster payments beginning in 1982.

Changes may or may not be made in the House Ag Committee bill before a full vote. But the Senate Committee bill is complete, Johnson notes, and along with its failure to meet the needs of all cotton producers "it contains a separate provision aimed straight at the throats of producers on the High Plains."

That provision, tacked on by Senator Howell Heflin (D-Ala.), would require the Secretary of Agriculture each year to set cotton quality differentials at the simple one-to-one average of the previous year's loan discounts and the August-March average of spot market quotation.

Traditionally USDA had

had authority to avoid drastic changes in quality premiums and discounts from year to year by giving additional weight to the previous year's loan discounts.

"If that authority is taken away from USDA," Johnson believes, "there will be no limit to the discounts that may be applied to below-base quality cottons over the next four years."

The Senate Committee report says USDA's discretionary authority in the setting of premiums and discounts has frequently resulted in "artificially high loan rates for lower quality cotton. Thus, in some instances, it may be more profitable to produce lower grade cotton to be used as collateral for a Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loan than it is to produce cotton for market consumption."

And, the report continues, the one-to-one amendment "could result the savings of millions of dollars each year in CCC budget exposure in the cotton program."

"All of which every High Plains producer knows is absurd," states Johnson. "We are supplying our Senators with CCC statistics going back to 1971 which, together with recent cost of production figures and loan values, will prove that absurdity."

"And," he adds, "we have the assurance of Senators Benton and Tower that our arguments will be presented against the Heflin amendment from the Senate floor."

**Plains Pest Management Report**

**RAIN**

Much needed rains fell over most of the area during the past few days. Amounts of 1 to 3 inches were recorded. This rain will be a great help to the dryland cotton farmers and those with irrigation may be able to shut down wells for a few days.

**CORN**

Corn is making rapid progress with many fields in the hard dough stage. Southwestern corn borer (SWCB) moths were collected in large numbers again this past week. Egg mass counts have been high in most fields, usually on 10 to 100 percent of the plants checked. A large percent of these eggs have already hatched (75 to 85 percent) and should only be used as a basis to determine potential infestation.

After initial insecticide treatment is made, additional treatments should be based on unhatched egg and larvae counts.

**COTTON**

Cotton is now blooming heavily and a few 1 inch diameter bolls can be found.

Aphid populations are increasing and the honeydew secretions may be alarming to some growers. Treatments for aphid can rarely be justified. The aphids are a source of food for several beneficial insects and their presence could help maintain beneficials.

Whiteflies are also being reported. These like, the aphids, are sucking pests and control is not usually recommended on cotton.

Bollworm activity has increased slightly over the past week. Egg counts have been ranging from 0 to 7,800 per acre. Worm counts are ranging from 0 to 1,800 per acre. Beneficials are apparently keeping these early flurries of eggs under control.

**SORGHUM**

Greenbugs continue to increase, but most fields have not reached an economic level.

False chinch bugs have been tentatively identified from the Seminole and Rails areas.
