

Antelopes Tame The Wildcats 28-8

The Abernathy Antelopes tamed the Idalou Wildcats Friday night 28-8 at Antelope field. Idalou had been picked to beat Abernathy, but the Lopes proved to be the better team Friday night.

The Lopes were put to their first important test and passed with flying colors. They defeated the only district team with a 5-0 record and put an end to their two-game losing streak.

The game began with Abernathy winning the toss and starting from their own 24 yard line. Two plays later the Lopes fumbled and the Wildcats got the ball. The Wildcats then fumbled on their first play and the Lopes recovered it. The rest of the game would be decided by the numerous turn-overs which would occur. But fortunately, it would be the Wildcats making the mistakes.

The Lopes moved the ball down the field as Rodney Cannon caught an 8 yard pass, followed by several good runs by Ronnie Taylor, Max Riley and John Ruiz. Ruiz ran into the end zone

from 9 yards out to score the first touchdown, and new PAT kicker Mark Riddell made the extra point good. The Lopes led 7-0.

The Wildcats bounced right back. In their next drive, they rushed 12 times down to the Lope 1 yard line. The next play put them on the score board with 6 points following by a successful attempt for two more. The Wildcats were now in the lead 8-7.

On their third possession of the game, the Lopes were stopped and had to punt for the first time. Riley booted the ball 40 yards and the Wildcats took over. This turned out to be the most important drive of the game putting the Lope defense to the test. The Lopes were penalized two times for late hits, which were worth 30 yards against Abernathy. This coupled with an 18 yard pass play, took the Wildcats within the Lope 20 yard line.

The Lopes would not let them advance further and stopped the Wildcats for no gain on the next 3 plays. On fourth down, Rodney Cannon inter-

cepted a pass and the Lopes took over.

Their next drive was short and sweet. The Lopes went 88 yards in 3 plays, one of which was an 80 yard pass from Max Riley to Malcolm Dunn. The Lopes went ahead 13-8 and two more points were added when Kenneth Moss took a pitch and went into the end zone. The half would end 15-8.

Second Half

The Wildcats got the ball first in the second half on their 38 yard line. Nine plays later they had rushed down to the Lope 20 yard line, but only to be stopped abruptly when Rodney Cannon intercepted his second pass of the night. The Lopes were stopped on their next attempt as were the Wildcats on their next drive. The Lopes had one more chance to put together a scoring drive before the end of the third quarter, but they were stopped and had to punt.

The fourth quarter opened with the Wildcats who put together an impressive drive by making two first downs.

They would not make a third down. Kenneth Moss intercepted the next pass on the Wildcat 32 yard line.

Ruiz, Riley and Taylor ran the ball down to the Wildcat three yard line. Riley ran into the end zone from 3 yards out to up the Lopes lead 21-8.

Kenneth Moss intercepted his second pass of the night on the Wildcats next drive. Five plays later Riley made another touchdown from 5 yards out and the Lopes took a commanding 27-8 lead. Riddell made the extra PAT good. Rodney Cannon intercepted a pass on the next Wildcat drive and the Lopes ran out the clock on their next drive.

The Wildcats played a good game and it was much closer than the score revealed. They were plagued with 5 interceptions and three fumbles. The Lopes had 294 yards to Idalou's 265. Idalou made 16 first downs to Abernathy's 15. Penetrations equaled 4 for each team. The outcome of the game was depicted largely by Wildcat errors forced by the Lope defense.

Antelopes To Play Hornets

The Abernathy Antelopes will face the Tulia Hornets this Friday night at 7:30 p.m. at Tulia.

The Hornets are coming off a three-game winning streak. They won their first district game against Lockney last week 28-15 and have an overall record of 4-2.

The two losses were handed to Tulia from two good teams. Littlefield and Muleshoe are the only two teams that have defeated Tulia, and at that time the Hornets had several valuable

players on the injured list. They were picked to win this district at the beginning of the season.

Tulia's quarterback, Chris Sperry is an explosive runner and can generate a passing game when needed, much like Abernathy's Max Riley.

The 9th grade and Jr. Varsity teams will play Lockney at Lockney at 5 p.m. Thursday. The 7th and 8th grade teams will play Lockney at Antelope Field with play beginning at 5 p.m. Thursday.

With the completion of this section, Interstate 27 is complete from Lubbock to approximately 9 miles north of Abernathy.

Abernathy And New Deal

Rebates Up From 1980

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office Thursday issued checks totaling \$37.9 million to Texas cities as their share of the one percent city sales tax for October.

This month's payment is about \$9 million more than the cities received during a comparable period in 1980.

The October payments push the 1981 yearly total of city sales tax payments to \$518.3 million, up 16 percent over the

same 10-month period in 1980.

Abernathy's check this month will be for \$2,950, bringing the city's 1981 payments to date to \$42,721 an increase of 15.73 percent over 1980 payments.

New Deal will not receive a check this month. New Deal has received \$2,109 this year, an increase of 6.21 percent over 1980 payments.

Colonel Montgomery Honored Guest At Lions Meeting

Colonel Monte D. Montgomery, Wing Commander of Reese Air Force Base, was the honored guest at the Lions Club meeting this last Tuesday. He was accompanied by Captain Michael Sherman, a T-33 Instructor Pilot and Assistant Wing Executive, and Bill Tynan, a Public Affairs Officer.

Program director for the month, Arno Struve, made arrangements with Montgomery to give the Lions program. Colonel Montgomery was commissioned into the Air Force 25 years ago and has served as the Wing Commander the past several years. Born in Oklahoma City, he obtained his masters degree at Central Michigan University. He got his commission from the ROTC reserve in 1956 at Rutgers.

Michael Tynan presented a Reese Air Force Base slide show. It informed the group that Reese is one of six air force training bases and the third largest of these. It has been used as a major training base since 1943, when it was first developed.

Reese turns out over 400 pilots each year. It costs \$212 thousand to train each student to become capable pilots. Since 1943, Reese has graduated 20 thousand students.

Undergraduate pilot training takes 49 weeks and a flying instructor will have a minimum of 1 thousand hours flying experience.

The base employs 3,400 persons and it takes \$405 thousand a day to operate it. This amounts to over \$106 million each year spent just to operate Reese. This is truly one of the largest industries in the entire panhandle.

Fuel costs to operate the more than 200 planes at Reese each year amounts to 60 million gallons. There are approximately 350 training flights a day out

of Reese, which is 450 thousand take-offs and landings each year.

Colonel Montgomery was asked several questions after the slide show. He was asked if women were accepted in the training program. Montgomery stated that there are presently 12 women in the program and more are encouraged to participate.

When asked how much more prepared Russia's military is, Montgomery said, "We are way behind as far as military man power. Russia presently has four million men to our 2 million in the armed forces." But he stated that if there is another war, this will not play a vital role because there will be little strategic land combat.

Burglary Heads Police Report

The Abernathy Police Department has been busy since October 1 making 24 arrests and issuing 22 citations.

Charged with burglary was Malcolm Woods, of 1402 Jerome, the day after he burglarized the Joe Brown residence. The burglary took place October 10 at 5 a.m. on the corner of 13th and Ave. J when Abernathy Police Officers noticed a car stopped in the middle of the street with two doors open, according to police officers.

Police officers spotted Woods walking from 812 13th street. They stopped and arrested him for public intoxication. He was later charged for the theft of Joe Brown's tools, which were found in Woods car, police officers reported.

Pranksters

After the City Council met September 14 to discuss charges against Abernathy Police Officer Taffy Naron, the police department was found wrapped in toilet paper. Twelve dead rabbits were also left in front of the police department that same night. The rabbits had all been shot through the head, according to police officer Taffy Naron. The pranksters responsible for this act have not been declared yet, officer Naron stated.

Fire Started In Jail

A 20 year old Mexican American male was arrested October 1 and charged with public intoxication, terroristic threats and disorderly conduct, officers said.

The prisoner attempted to start a major fire in his jail cell at the Abernathy Police Department. A mattress and some newspapers were discovered burning in the cell, officers stated.

The prisoner also damaged the commode and everything else that was accessible in the cell. Police officers were forced to restrain him, officers said.

Wrecks

Four wrecks have been reported the past three weeks. All of the wrecks were minor and no injuries.

Thus far this month 24 arrests have been made. Two for possession of marijuana which were misdemeanor offenses, 1 DPS warrant arrest, 1 attempted escape, 1 interfering with an arrest, 2 disorderly conducts, 1 carrying an unlawful weapon, 1 burglary, and 17 public intoxication arrests.

Bike Thefts

Several bike thefts have been reported recently. According to police officers, approximately eight bikes have been taken recently. Police officers suggest that everyone owning bikes should keep them chained or out of sight.

New Cages

The police department recently purchased two cages for their patrol cars. These steel cages were installed behind the front seat of both police cars.

They will allow protection for police officers while driving prisoners to and from the jail. The cages cost \$90 a piece.

MAJOR CRIMES IN TEXAS are on the rise 3.3 percent over last year for the first six months of 1981, according to a recent report submitted to the Review by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Major crimes recorded for the first half of this year totaled over 431 thousand. Burglary showed the largest increase, rising 8.2 percent to 133,621 cases. A burglary which occurred in Abernathy this week can be added to this list.

The number of murders for the first half of this year is down from last year. From January through June there were only 1,143 murders in Texas, a decrease of 2.1 percent from last year. Isn't that a comforting thought? It's good that murders are down, but seriously, 1,143 is a lot of murders, (at least 40% of the population of Abernathy) and this is only for a six month period.

Aggravated assaults are up 3.8 percent. Rape and robbery are up 3.5 percent. Makes you want to consider hiding in a closet or moving to Alaska.

Total property loss attributed to major index crime in the first half of 1981 was estimated at \$400 million. Police investigated 3,941 arson cases which resulted in estimated property losses of \$50 million in Texas.

Three police officers were killed in the line of duty by criminal action and three perished in duty-related accidents.

These are just the major crimes reported by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Misdemeanors are probably considered to be too numerous to even estimate.

And it's not just the big cities, three murders have occurred in Slaton the past two years. Makes you wonder if Abernathy is such a safe place to live after all.

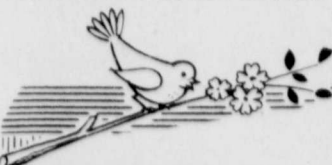

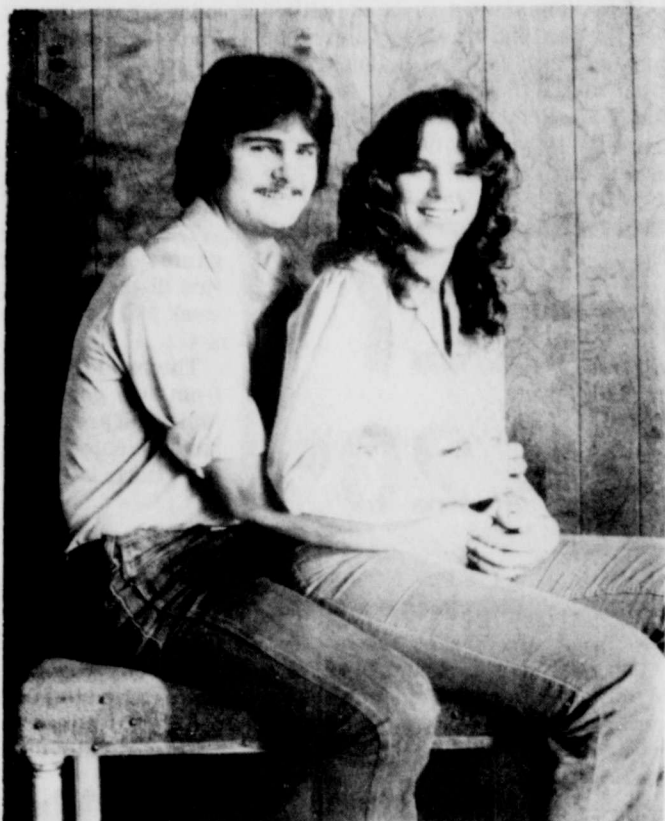
Teston-Parks Engagement Announced

Struve's Trip To China

Old women with misshapen feet. We were able to photograph as unobtrusively as possible several of these women who had had their feet "bound" as babies. The feet are small, but they have very thick in-steps that reveal that they were once bound. Also these ladies often had pierced ears, but without jewelry present, indicating that they were of the upper classes in pre-liberation days.

Round cloth hats. Women, girls and small children wear round brimmed hats made of cloth. The brim is edged by a spring ring of wire thickness. The brim is always stretched when being worn. A quick twist of the wrist folds the hat into a smaller ring like folding a radiator fan belt.

The hats can be tucked away in a drawer. They can be made out of any kind of cloth. I liked the plain white ones but the patterned ones were cute, too.

Vacuum bottles. In every hotel room we had hot, very hot, water furnished to us in quart vacuum bottles. These bottles were so efficient that the water would be hot enough for tea, twelve or more hours later. Our "Thermos" bottles will not hold the heat like these Chinese counterparts.

We wished after we got home that we'd brought some of these vacuum bottles home. Granddaughter Shelley and Niece Shirley each brought one home.

Meat being transported. We saw several loads of fresh meat being carried in open trucks or bicycle carts—all in the hot sun. When I was young, we would always wait until the coldest day of the winter to "kill hogs," but in China we saw loads of meat standing in the hot sun. Incidentally, we saw a hog killing on a hot day in Martinique in 1977.

Little boys' pants. Little boys up to three years of age wore pants with a slit in the crotch that stayed open all the time. Very handy and practical. They wore no underwear.

Numbering system. Just like ours: Arabic numerals.

Written language. Ancient characters. It is said that these characters have changed little in 10 centuries or more. Stone stelae, with characters engraved on them in time before Christ, can still be read by Chinese scholars as easily as they read everyday printing.

However, we noticed that many signs are printed in Latin letters (like ours). A train station will have the name of the town in Chinese

characters and under that will be the name in Latin letters. This isn't universal, but it happens often. It is my belief that the alphabet system is so much easier than the character system, that eventually in a century or two they will use the ABC system entirely. Learned that the Mongolians, a neighboring people to the north, have always used alphabet(s).

Mongolians. At Hohehoate, (Hohhot), we were in a community of predominantly Mongolian peoples. The Mongolians are one of many ethnic minorities in China. The ethnic minorities are granted more freedom by the central government than are the Chinese vast majority.

It is of interest to note that the Mongolians were the ancient and constant enemy of the Chinese invading China again and again over the centuries, and these invasions were the reason for the Great Wall's existence. The Mongolians are larger people than the Chinese; they have a distinct art of their own (most beautiful); they're extremely harder. We were surprised to learn how advanced the Mongolians have always been as a civilization.

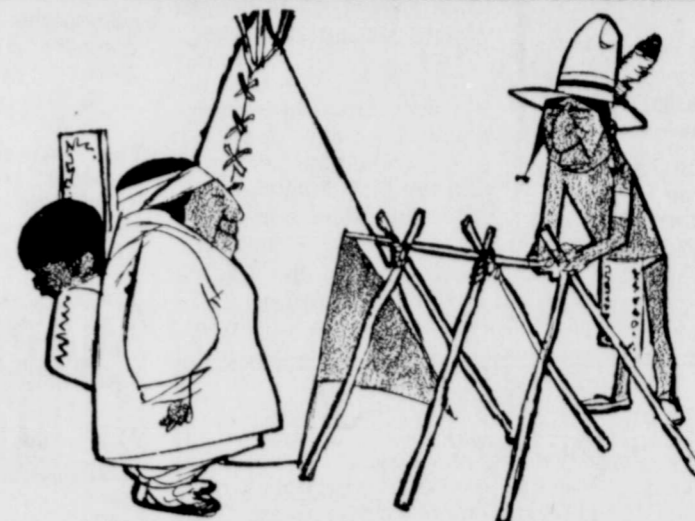
New Deal Community Bazaar Oct. 30 And 31
