City Council Sets Tax Rate

In a special meeting, held November 3rd, the Abernathy City Council set the tax rate for the 1981 tax roll at fortyfive cents per \$100 valuation.

Normally, the tax rate is set in September with tax statements being mailed in October, however, this year the City Council was unable to set a rate earlier due to incomplete tax valuation information that was to be provided by Associated Tax Services, INC., a Tax Reappraisal company located in Irving, Texas.

For this reason, the City Tax Statements which are usually mailed on the First of October have not been mailed this year. The City is hopeful that the statements can be printed and mailed in November.

After discussing the State law which

establishes the Discounts given on Property Taxes paid in advance, the City Council set a discount rate of 2% on Taxes Paid in November and 1% on all Taxes paid in December. No discount will be given in January and in February, taxes become delinquent with penalty and interest added.

The city regrets that the 3 % Discount which is normally provided for taxes paid in October will not be given this year due to the provisions of the State Property Tax Code. The City was advised by the State Property Tax Board in Austin that under the present state law, the standard discount rate of 3% on taxes paid ninety days before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent cannot be altered legally by a local taxing authority.

In other business, the City Council agreed to request that the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation paint a crosswalk and install appropriate signs to slow the traffic on Avenue D near the intersection of 6th Street. In a survey requested by the City, the Highway department found that school children were crossing Avenue D at 6th and 7th Streets. For this reason, the City Council has asked the State to take Steps to provide a designated school crossing in this area.

The State has advised that at some future date, the area between 6th Street and 7th Street on Avenue D might be included in the 20 MPH Reduced Speed Zone, which is presently controlled by Automatic Flashing Lights along Ave.

The Council also approved the purchase of Emergency Medical Services Radio Equipment. The City's estimated cost for the equipment is \$5,350.00. The total cost for the equipment will be approximately \$10,700.00, however, the city will only be required to pay for 50% of the total cost. The other 50% will be paid for with grant funds provided to the South Plains Emergency Medical Services.

The radio equipment is specifically designed to be used by Emergency Ambulance Services in the treatment of cardiac arrest victims by Paramedic ambulance personnel. It is expected that this new equipment will enable our EMS Technicians to provide better service to cardiac arrest victims.


Abernathy **Votes For Water Trust**

Abernathy voted for defeated Proposition 4 on the election ballot last Tuesday at the Community Center.

A total of 313 people voted for Proposition 4, compared to 8 Abernathians who voted against it.

Fewer than 20% of Hale County's voters turned-out to vote in Tuesday's election. Hale voters gave 93 % support to the water trust fund proposal, but the amendment was defeated statewide with 57% of the state's voters against it.

Abernathy voted 196 for and 109 against Proposition 1,226 for and 78 against Proposition 2,134 for and 168 against Proposition 3,248 for and 67 against Proposition 5, Proposition 6 had 204 for and 99 against it, and Proposition 7 received a 196 Abernathy votes for it and 109 against.

Winds Squirm By Lopes 20-15

The Floydada Whirlwinds scored a touchdown with less than two minutes left in the fourth quarter to defeat the Abernathy Antelopes 20-15.

The Lopes had been ahead 15-14 with 4:50 left in the fourth, but Abernathy was plagued with mistakes having two fumbles and three passes intercepted throughout the game.

The statistics did not give an accurate account of the scoring that took place. Floydada took advantage of two fumbles in Lope territory and scored, but the Lopes had the better stats.

The Lopes had 13 first downs to Floydada's 12, 73 yards passing to Floydada's 23, and 205 yards rushing to Floydada's 147. The Lopes had 278 total yards to Floydada's 170.

First Half

The Lopes took the opening kick-off and put together a 15 play scoring drive. The first score was produced from a 1 yard run by Max Riley. Mark Riddell made the PAT and the Lopes were ahead 7-0.

The Whirlwinds were stopped on their first drive and were forced to punt. The Lopes took the ball on the 20 yard line.
