## Council Approves 1981 Financial Audit Report

Two representatives from Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss, Certified Public Accountants, attended the City Council meeting Monday night to discuss the 1981 financial audit report for the City of Abernathy.

The audit was discussed and approved by the council. The representatives, Jack Moss and Carol Holley, both of Lubbock, explained to the council that Abernathy is in good shape financially.

The financial stability stems from a section of City land being leased to oil companies for \$70 thousand and a comfortable \$50 thousand on reserve in the water and sewer fund.

W.C. Bryant was at the meeting to discuss the possibility of tapping into a City water line. Bryant lives 1 mile east of Abernathy and is in need of water.

Bryant agreed to pay the expenses of installing a water line to a City meter, which presently supplies three other residences, Jim Odom, Roland Murray,

and White Gold Gin. This meter is located near the railroad on the east side of town. The council agreed to let Bryant run a line from this meter to his residence.

The Council will allow 1.3 acres to be annexed within the Abernathy City limits. A public hearing was held on this issue earlier and there were no complaints. Therefore this plot of land, owned by Jerry Givens, will be added to the City limits.

The Library Committee requested that a sixth member be added to the presently five member Library Advisory Board. The board is presently composed of Lelaine Waits, Mrs. Hacker, Minnie Struve, Mrs. Rhodes and Dan Ward. The Board suggested that Jackie Smyers be added as the sixth member of and the Council agreed.

## Antelopes And Lady Lopes Place Second In Abernathy Tourney

The Abernathy Antelopes and Lady Lopes both placed second in the Abernathy Basketball Tournament held here last Thursday through Saturday.

In the first game of the varsity boys division, Littlefield easily defeated Whitharral 91-39, and in the second game Tahoka edged Muleshoe 51-48.

The next two games, Tulia defeated Cooper 63-41 followed by the Abernathy-Springlake-Earth game.

The Antelopes crushed Springlake-Earth 85-42 in their first game of the tourney. In this game, Malcolm Dunn scored 12 points, Sammy Galloway 11 points, Rodney Cannon 11 and the leading scorer was Rick Houston with 19.

The second day of play, Friday, in the second round of the winners bracket, Littlefield defeated Tulia by the close score of 64-58. Littlefield would next play the winner of the Abernathy-Tahoka game in the finals.

This was not an easy game for the Lopes as the Tahoka Bulldogs were prepared to play the Lopes a game, and did.

Tahoka completely controlled the first quarter offensively and defensively scoring 19 points and allowing Abernathy only 9. The second quarter was almost identical with the Lopes scoring only 8 points to Tahoka's 14 and at intermission Tahoka led 33-17.

At this point it looked as if Tahoka was going to dominate the game, but just the opposite happened. The Lopes exploded in the third scoring 21 points and holding Tahoka to only 8 and reduced the Bulldog lead to 41-38.

The Lopes rallied again in the fourth to go ahead of Tahoka for the first time and stayed on top by scoring 19 points to Tahoka's 13 and the Lopes won 57-54.

Rodney Cannon was the leading scorer in this game with 25 points.

Saturday, the Antelopes faced a tough Littlefield team in the finals of the tourney. It was a high scoring game with 173 points made between the two teams.

Abernathy scored the fewer points and lost to Littlefield 81-92 to take second place.

By quarters, the Antelopes scored 13 to Littlefield's 25 in the first and 18 to Littlefields 22 in the second and at intermission it was Littlefield 47, Abernathy 31.

It looked as if Littlefield was going to run away with the game at this point. In the third quarter, the Antelopes held their own scoring 21 points to Littlefields 21, but the Lopes could not catch

up unless they prevented Littlefield from scoring just as high.

The Lopes scored a high of 29 points in the fourth quarter to Littlefield's 24, but time had run out for the Lopes.

It had been a toul game as there were 58 fouls in all. 32 of the fouls were against Abernathy and two players were thrown out of the game, one on each team.

Rodney Cannon was the leading scorer with 27 points followed by Malcolm Dunn, Cletus Irlbeck and Sammy Galloway all with 10 each.

## Lady Lopes Win Second Place

The Abernathy Lady Lopes won second place after losing to Greenwood 50-52 in the finals.

The first day of play, the Littlefield girls lost to Greenwood 42-55, Whitharral defeated Muleshoe 43-40, and the Lady Lopes stomped Tahoka 64-24.

In this game, Vicky McKenzie was the leading scorer with 17 followed by Regina Powell with 12 and Margaret Cooper 10.

The second day it was Greenwood over Cooper 46-44 in the winners bracket followed by the Abernathy-Whitharral game.

The Lady Lopes edged Whitharral 53-51 in a thriller. The Lady Lopes got off to a slow start scoring only 4 points in the first quarter to Whitharral's 9. The Lady Lopes came back to almost shut out the Whitharral fems in the second quarter scoring 14 points to their 2. At halftime the Lady Lopes led 18-11.

By the end of the third quarter, Whitharral had come back to tie the game 31-31. Both teams became very accurate in the fourth. The Lady Lopes out-scored Whitharral 22-20 to secure the 53-51 victory.

The final day of the tourney, the Lady Lopes faced Greenwood. Greenwood squeezed out two more points than the Lady Lopes and won 52-50 in overtime.

It was all Greenwood in the first half scoring 8 in the first quarter and 20 more in the second to lead comfortably 28-12 at halftime.

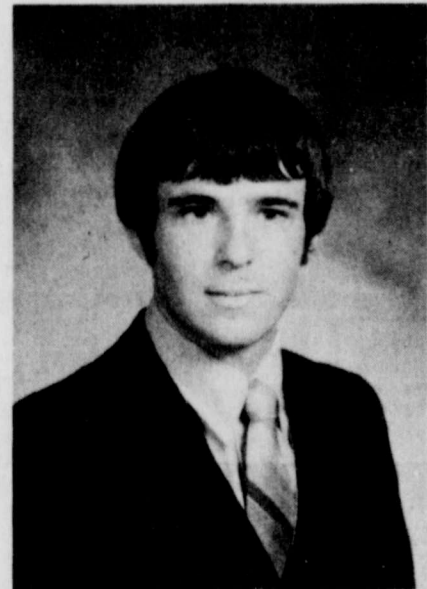
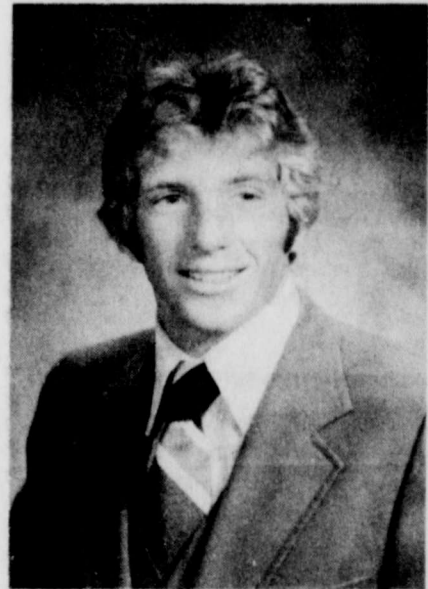

## On The County Line

IF YOU EVER DECIDE TO GIVE BLOOD, make sure there is no one around to give you a hard time, especially if it is your first time to give blood.

This is what happened to me last week when I decided to have a little of the red stuff pumped from my veins during the Abernathy Blood Drive.

It is a scary enough experience as it is, much less when Mitch LeMoine and Larry Aldridge go ahead and plan your funeral for you.

I got in there thinking positively about giving blood until these two started deteriorating my attitude and the state of my stomach.

First they told me I was going to turn blue, then white and pass out. Comforting? Not really...and then they informed me that you have to get sick the first time.

Well, the nurse stabbed my finger to draw some blood and I knew this was the big one. I was already getting light headed and the pleasant jokes continued from the fading Aldridge-LeMoine background.

The blood pressure, pulse etc. were okay and I was ready to be put on the machine.

Before they stick the needle in to pump the blood, LeMoine warns me that with the tourniquet tied to my upper arm, blood would shoot out when

the needle entered my arm. Fun Huh! And he stressed the fact the needle was not a toy from the "Mr. Doctor Play Set".

And Aldridge was having more fun trying to turn my stomach than worrying about filling his bag. He kept saying pump harder and as I did LeMoine was pointing out how weak and pale I looked.

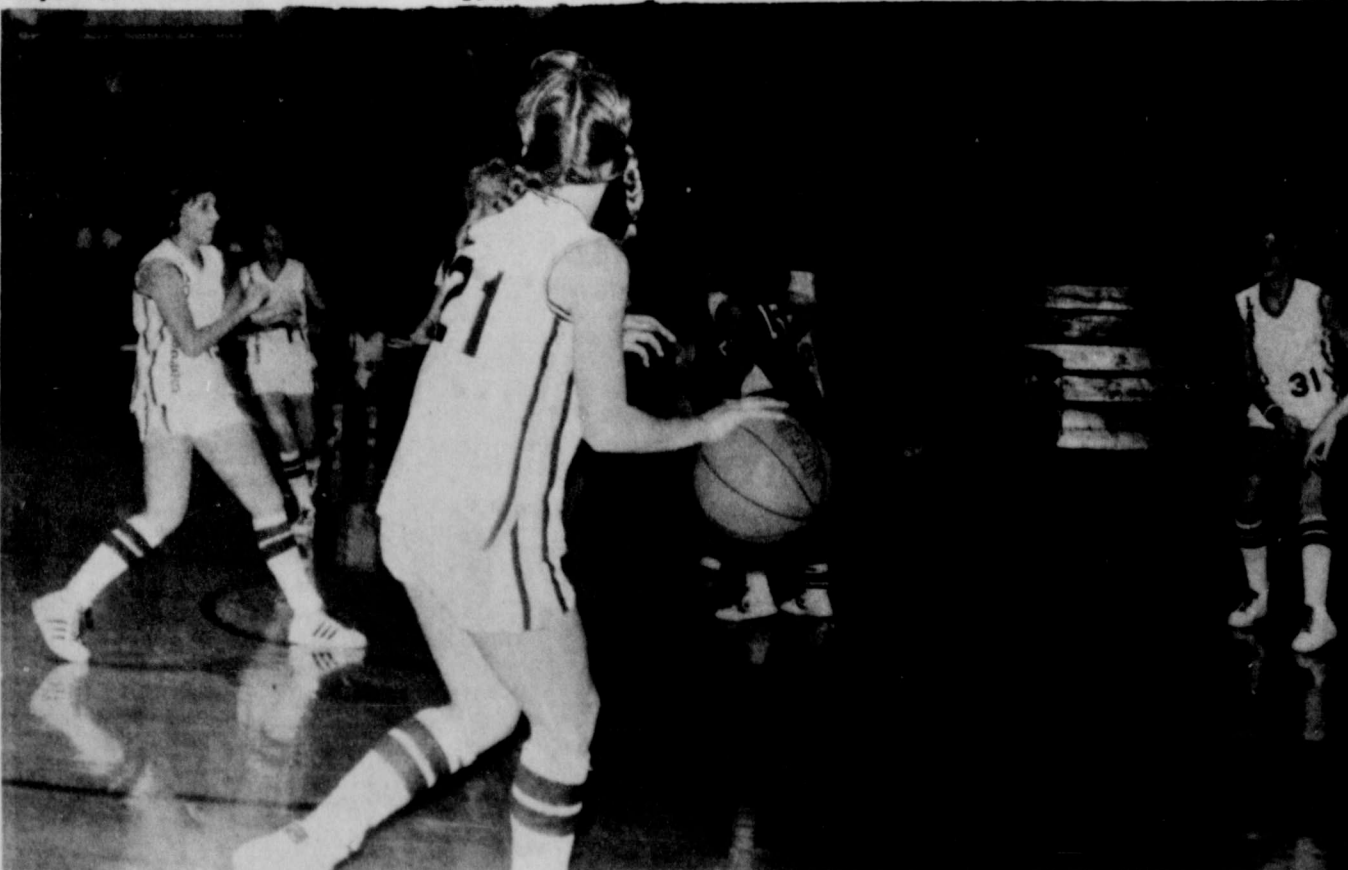
I quickly filled the bag as my blood pressure was way up at this time and I was taken off the machine. Aldridge and LeMoine through in a few more kind remarks and walked out the door.

I wasn't sick, (close), I was still conscious, (barely), and I was on the road to recuperating from a traumatic experience.

And there are those that give blood all the time because it makes them feel better. After all, it takes the old run-down blood cells from the body which are replenished by the heart with new ones.

And I felt much better the next few days. Excluding the LeMoine-Aldridge depression syndrome, giving blood was not bad at all and I will probably give again next year.

One note of caution to those who decide to give for the first time, if you see Aldridge or LeMoine anywhere near Blood Services, wait until they leave. Giving blood should then prove to be a fulfilling and pleasant experience.

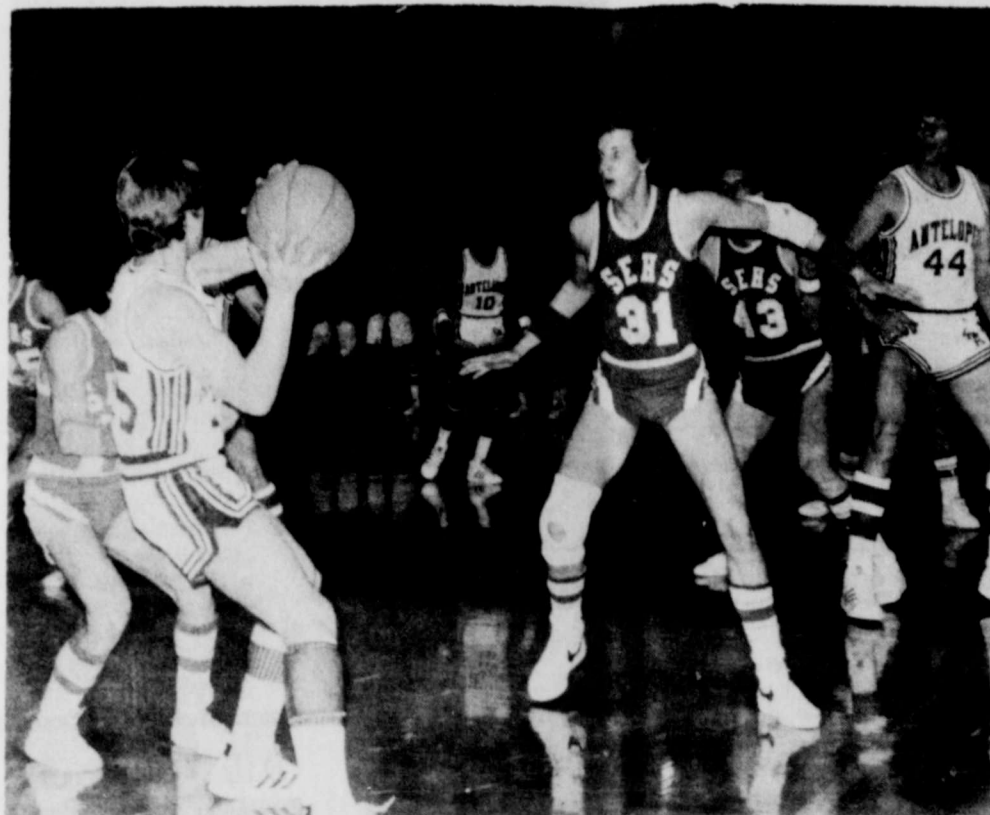

The interest rate on government commodity loans dropped from 14.5 percent to 12.25 percent as of January 1 this year.

Officials of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. have been informed that this lower rate will apply through December 31, 1982, to all loans outstanding on January 1 and all loans made during January 1982. The interest rate will be reviewed again on February 1 and on the first of each succeeding month according to PCG's source. The rate set on February 1 will remain constant for the remainder of 1982 on loans made during February, and the same procedure will be followed for each month of the year.

Interest rates on all outstanding loans, however, will be subject to change on January 1, 1983. The rate set for each month of 1982 and on January 1, 1983 is required by law to move up or down in concert with the cost of money to government, PCG officials say.

Meanwhile, as producers ponder planting decisions for the coming crop year, most of the pertinent details of the 1982 cotton program have been announced. But speculation continues as to whether there will be an acreage reduction program for cotton and on the size of the price deficiency payment due farmers under the 1981 program.

With regard to the latter, the per-pound payment must equal the difference between the weighted average price paid to all farmers for cotton during calendar 1981 and the 1981 target price of 70.87 cents per pound. Most observers now expect a payment of around seven cents. The per-pound rate will be multiplied times each farmer's total projected yield, as earlier determined by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, to arrive at his total payment. Aggregate payments to any one farmer on all crops, however, cannot exceed \$50,000.

The target price for 1982 has been set at 71 cents per pound and any deficiency payment due will be calculated in the same manner as in 1981.

Government loans will be available to farmers in 1982 at the rate of 57.08 cents per pound, basis Strict Low Middling (grade 41) 1-1/16 inches (staple 34). Premiums and discounts that will apply to qualities above and below this base, however, will not be announced before May or June.

Under the new 1981 farm law there can be no mandatory cotton "set-aside" program as known in years prior to 1978. USDA can attempt to reduce cotton plantings only by (1) offering a voluntary paid acreage diversion program or (2) requiring that 1982 acreage be reduced by a specified percentage of previous plantings as a condition of eligibility for commodity loans, payments or other program benefits.

all youth between the ages of 9 and 19. It is for all currently enrolled 4-H'ers and those interested in joining.

4-H'ers will register between 9:00 and 9:30 a.m. and each will bring a sack lunch for the noon meal. A craft will be offered at \$5.00 per 4-H'er, but is not required to complete the project.

## FFA Animal Clipper Maintenance Clinic Held

The Abernathy FFA and Hale County Agriculture Extension Agents recently co-sponsored an animal clipper maintenance clinic.

The clinic was conducted by Charlie Swain World Champion Sheep Shearer and two other representa-

tives of Sunbeam Clipper Company.

Approximately 60 people were in attendance to have their clippers repaired and blades sharpened.

## Grain Sorghum Team Works With Mexican Livestock Industry

A team of livestock research scientists and sorghum farmers is meeting with livestock producers in the rapidly expanding feedlot industry of Mexico.

The seven-man team is under the direction of U.S. Feed Grain Council and

Grain Sorghum Producers Association and is jointly sponsored by Funk Seeds, International; Ciba Geigy, Agricultural Division and Pioneer Hi-Bred Seeds, International. The purpose of the project is to examine ways to continue the expan-

sion of sales of U.S. grain sorghum to Mexico.

Mexico was the second largest customer for U.S. grain sorghum in 1979 and 1980. Sales have dropped because the Mexican domestic crop of feed grains was large in 1981. Increased

sales are expected later this year.

Jim Myrick, Latin American Director of U.S. Feed Grains Council, in Mexico City, planned the itinerary and will be working with the team. John Brethour, Beef Research Scientist from the Ft. Hays Experiment Station in Hays Kansas, will conduct a nutrition seminar in Torreon and consult with livestock producers in Torreon, Guadalajara and Mexico City. The trip will conclude with conferences with Mexican Government and railroad officials in Mexico City.

GSPA President Mabry Foreman and Executive Director Elbert Harp are leading the team. Donald Epperson of Hutchinson, Kansas; Walter Cox of Abernathy, Texas and H.H. Deaver of Bishop, Texas are representing U.S. sorghum producers.

"We are grateful to our commercial sponsors: Funk Seeds, Ciba Geigy and Pioneer Seeds, for their support and encouragement," said Foreman. "Our market development program depends on this kind of cooperation between producers and agri-business."

## Arbor Day Friday

Jan. 15 is an important day for every Texas citizen-it's Arbor Day.

Arbor Day is a day set aside each year to remember one of our most valuable resources-the tree, says Ted Fisher of Austin, Travis County horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Arbor Day began in Nebraska on April 10, 1972, and is now observed across the country during the month of April. However, Texas Arbor Day was set for the third Friday in January by the Texas Legislature in 1949 because January is an ideal time for planting trees.

As to the importance of trees, Fisher cites a number of contributions.

"In addition to providing lumber and paper, trees also purify and beautify," he says. "They cleanse the air we breathe by absorbing carbon dioxide and returning oxygen to the air. They cool and humidify the air, reduce soil erosion, beautify our neighborhoods and communities, provide cover for soil and wildlife, and offer a natural challenge for youthful climbers."

Planting a tree in the home landscape can be a family project while schools and other groups can be involved in tree planting at community parks and playgrounds.

# Struve Trip To China Concludes

Cigarettes. There is a high degree of smoking in China. When we attended banquets, there were packages of cigarettes provided on the tables along with the "white lightning" used for toasts, and the wine that was provided in continuously filled glasses. The best way to handle all these provisions was to leave all vessels full.

We saw few if any women smokers, but the men seemed to be widely addicted. Heavy burdens carried by persons: The traditional method of carrying heavy things is by means of a stick or bar across the shoulders with a pair of baskets or pails suspended on the ends of the sticks. One hand was used to balance and control the bar leaving the other hand free. We would be happier to carry a bucket or basket in each hand. This method is universal. Respect for life: It is

different in China. They seemed to be fatalistic and have no fear of personal hazard. Sitting on highways at night is not uncommon. We saw a child pushing a primitive wheelchair among heavy traffic conditions where coal trucks and some buses were meeting and passing on a very narrow highway.

Our tour group consisted of 26 travelers and one American guide who apparently spoke and understood Chinese well. We had a doctor (thank goodness) and his wife; three was a farmer-rancher and his wife; a lawyer and his wife; a brewery worker (single male); a dental equipment supplier and his wife; a dental technician; two bankers (New York) husband and wife; two investor-entrepreneurs; one retired military person (female/single); one citrus

orchard owner (female/single); one mystery writer (single/female); one coal mine owner (male/single); a concert pianist and University piano teacher of Temple University and his wife; one ex-teacher and her husband; one Canadian government worker (an incurable ham); and an American government worker (Shirley Ward; two loaders (Minnie and I) plus one recent high school graduate, Shelley Toler.

States represented in our group: California had 8 people; Nevada 1; Texas 3; Florida 1; New York 2; Massachusetts 2; Maine 1; Colorado 2; Canada 2; Pennsylvania 2; and Ohio 2. Incidentally 6 members of the group were born in Texas. Our tour company was Linblad. The tour was well organized. All arrangements were firm and there were no

hiccups. The only change that came about was due to weather that was beyond anybody's control. We had no complaints whatever. We might make some suggestions to Linblad for improvement but they would be very minor.

Suggestions to travelers (especially to China): Take plenty of film—about twice as much as you think you'll need. I wish I had taken two cameras. One to use with fast film and one for high quality film, such as Kodachrome 25. Lighting situations as well as situations where you're moving will make fast film very desirable. Also a flash attachment would be very important. Take plenty of batteries. Had a fellow traveler not given me four cells for my flash, I'd have missed lots of good pictures. A small pair of binoculars would be nice if there are two people together to help in carrying the equipment.

Carry only simple washable clothing and take as few as possible. Certainly needed would be a pair of sturdy walking shoes. Some shoe polish and a butter would be worth taking.

An umbrella is worth the trouble to take along and a raincoat can help a lot at times depending on the particular climate. Don't forget your required medication and addition take some anti-diarrheal medicine of some kind. We were lucky to have had a doctor in our group who carried along his pill case.

I always forget to take a hat so that I've come home with a collection of strange headgear over the years. Bought a straw hardhat in Urumqi China. It's a good hat. It cost about 45 cents in U.S. money.

A dual-voltage electric razor is a good travel item. The voltage in China was 220, but in Tokyo it was 120.

Took extra eye-glasses. Minnie had a new duplication made of her prescription.

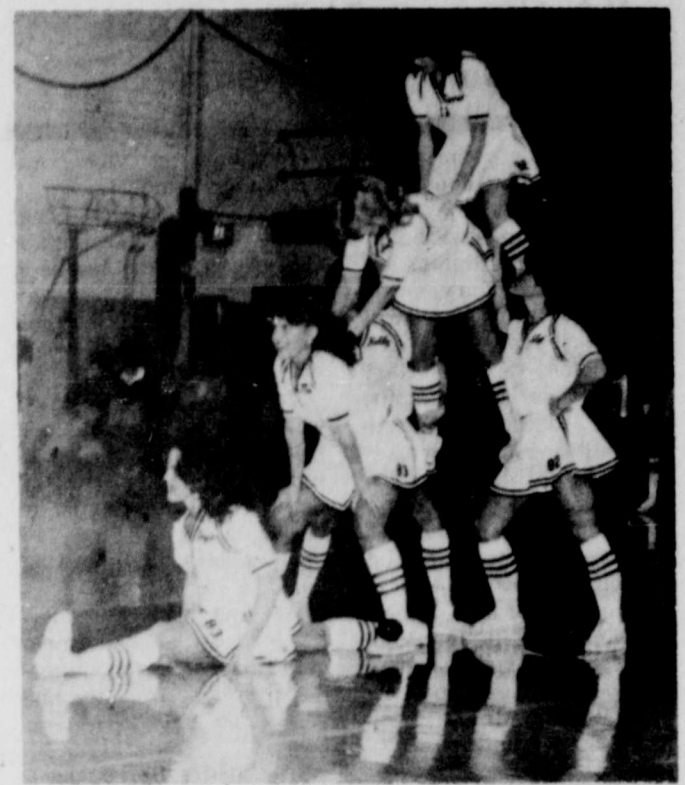
I took an old pair.

It is important to have a few coat-hangers for use when washing clothes in the hotel rooms. It's good to have a small piece of toilet soap. Towels are always provided by the hotels, but a wash rag is rarely at hand.

We took some food: tea bags (in China?—yes!), packaged sugar, dairy creamer substitute (if you want it), plain cookies of some kind in an emergency (we were glad to have some along), an electric cup-size water heater, and instant coffee.

These items don't take up much space but are so good to have along.

Lastly, we wished for a compact tape recorder so we could hear again some of the very good music we were privileged to hear at the schools for the performing arts that entertained us. Now we have one we purchased in Tokyo, so we're ready for the next trip.

**"A Glance At The Past"**  
By Buford F. Davenport

From The Abernathy Weekly Review dated November 11, 1965:

A home was under construction in the Phillips Addition for the Gary Grant family. (Construction started late last year (1981) on a new home for the Gary Grants. It is located in the Pinson Addition of North Abernathy.
