

# Texas Looking At Houston, 21 Other Schools Interested

Rick Houston, a 6 foot, 5 inch, 215 pound lineman, joined other college recruits and was flown to Austin to talk with representatives of the University of Texas football team.

Houston was escorted to Austin last Saturday and returned Sunday after meeting with the team coaches and looking over the campus. He has been offered a full scholarship to play for Texas but has not officially signed on to play for them.

Texas is not the only college or university interested in Houston. He has been offered scholarships at Baylor, Texas Tech, Colorado and Oklahoma State, as well as many other smaller universities.

Houston visited Oklahoma January 16, Texas January 23 and in the future he will tour Texas Tech January 30, Colorado February 5 and possibly Baylor at a later date.

Representatives from these five major universities have interviewed Houston in Abernathy at school and at his home. He has been offered full scholarships from each one.

Coaches have been writing and calling Houston since last spring following his Junior year. As a Junior at Abernathy High School, Houston made 123 tackles, 58 of which he was the first man to the carrier, 18 unassisted and 3 quarterback sacks. He was also attributed with knocking down 2 passes and

recovering 2 fumbles. After the 1980 season, he was selected first team All-District defensive tackle.

The following year, 1981, Houston bettered his already outstanding Junior year performance. He made 154 tackles, 70 in which he was the first man to the carrier, 22 unassisted and 6 quarterback sacks. He also knocked down 3 passes, blocked 2 punts and recovered 3 fumbles.

In 1981 Houston was selected first team All-District defensive tackle once again, along with being named to the first team All South Plains for his performance as an offensive and defensive tackle. He was also selected first team All State defensive tackle in

3-A competition.

Houston's accomplishments his Junior and Senior years made him one of the state's top schoolboy prospects for university play. Houston has received letters of inquiry from some 15 universities all over the United States, including U.C.L.A. and Cornell Universities.

He made the state "Blue Chip" list in four sports magazines and two newspapers, the Fort Worth Star Telegram and the Dallas Morning News.

In a recent interview with Houston, he stated that he has not officially signed with Texas, but he was very interested in the school.

"The size of the school is not a factor

and will not determine which university I choose," Houston said. "I was surprised to see how large the University of Texas campus is." "It's a huge place," Houston added.

Houston stated that he is ready to play for a university. He is mentally prepared, but is not sure if he is physically ready to play. "I need to gain 40 more pounds before I will be ready to play the position of defensive tackle for a university," Houston said. "I will probably play either defensive end or tackle depending on my weight at the time," Houston said.

He attributes his success as an Antelope to the other members of the team. "We were like one happy family this year," Houston said. "Everyone was a leader, there were no arguments and the team pulled together. We played as much for each other as we did for ourselves," Houston ended.

Houston will make a decision within the next two weeks on whether or not to play for Texas.

Rick is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mac Houston and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Houston.

## Prather Selected To Lubbock County Hospital Board

Laurin Prather was recently selected to be on the Lubbock County Hospital District Board. Prather was installed on the board following the department of board chairman W.B. "Dub" Rushing last Tuesday.

Rushing served on the board since 1979 and was reappointed to a term that would have expired next January. But Rushing recently informed Lubbock County Commissioners he would serve only until this month.

Prather was appointed to the board by the County Commissioners Court because they felt it was necessary to have a rural resident on the board. Most board members are from Lub-

bock.

Prather is an Abernathy school board member and has farmed in Lubbock County since 1970. He is a partner in the International Harvester dealership in Lubbock.

Prather, 35, said he considers board membership "a very important responsibility to be shared all across the country."

He said he feels the current board has done a good job, but added that many persons in Lubbock could qualify as board members and if not monitored, the board easily could be made up of city residents only.

Prather has served as a trustee for

the Abernathy Independent School District for two years and was formerly on the board of directors of the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce. He currently serves on the board of deacons of First Presbyterian Church in Lubbock and has been on a district committee for Boy Scouts.

He is a 1965 graduate of Lubbock High School and received his BS degree from Angelo State University in 1970.

Prather and three other board members were sworn in to new terms at a hospital district board of managers meeting last Monday.

## Dora Talbott Hears Books And Magazines On Special Recording Equipment For The Blind

Dora Talbott of 610 2nd Abernathy, has discovered an unique way to continue enjoying her favorite magazines and books since she is no longer able to read them as they are printed.

Dora's eyesight is continuously getting worse and she has problems even reading large type with a magnifying glass.

Recently, Dora found out that the State Library has record players and cassette players for those who cannot see to read. These players are specially designed for sight impaired people having operation instructions etched in brail on them.

The cassette and record players have different speed controls from your average players. The speeds can be varied depending on your comprehension of the material. Record speeds can be varied from 8 RPM's to 33 RPM's. The cassettes are three hours long each and the cassette players also have variable speeds.

The material: Magazines, books, the bible, etc., are recorded by organizations such as Dallas Taping For The Blind. These organizations hire and accept volunteers to read magazines and books while recording their voices.

Dora can order just about any book or magazine she wants, which will be recorded on either a cassette tape or record. Monthly she gets Good Housekeeping, U.S. News and World Report and Travel/Holiday. She has also ordered several books, also recorded on tapes and records in which she listens to. Her favorite is scriptures recorded from the Bible.

She orders the magazines directly from the publishers, who also have a taping service for the blind. Books are ordered from the State Library. The order catalogues are typed in very large print and Dora uses her magnifying glass to select the material she will order.

Dora stated that she has talked to several locals who are interested in

obtaining this special equipment for the blind. She applied at the Abernathy Library when this service was brought to her attention by Mrs. Hackler.

Dora also said that those interested could write the Texas State Library, Box 12927 Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711, or they can have an application blank sent to them by calling 1-800-252-9605.

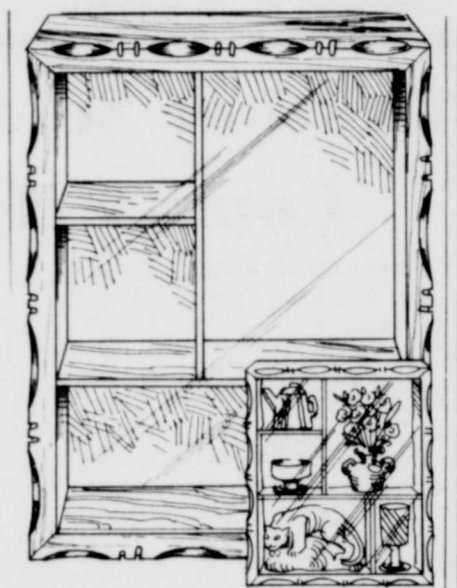

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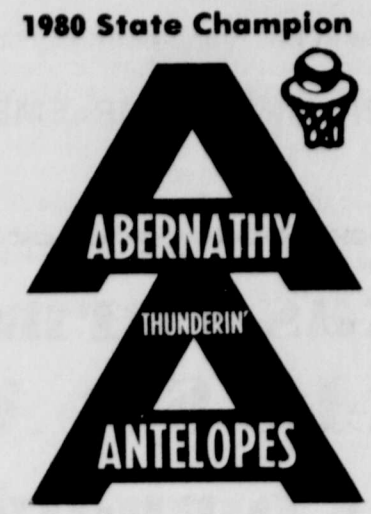

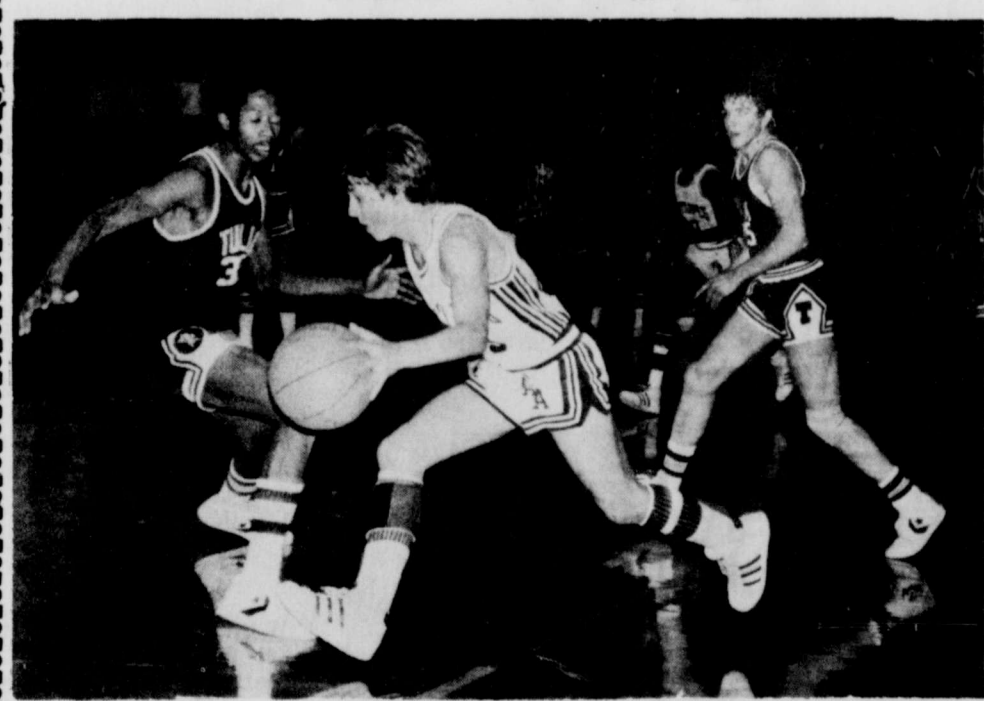

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## Texas Farmers Union Seeks Set Asides For Commodities

With commodity prices hitting rock bottom and with a large surplus of wheat, feed grains and cotton saturating the market, Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller is urging support of voluntary acreage "set asides" in 1982. "By voluntarily agreeing to remove a percentage of our 1982 acreage from production, we hope to convince the Reagan Administration that a mandatory set aside is absolutely essential in order to provide uniform supply management for all farm crops."

Currently, all commodity prices are at 59 percent, the lowest level on the parity index since 1932. "Anytime prices fall below 75 percent of parity, TFU policy states a mandatory set aside should be established to control production and maintain prices," Moeller stated. "When wheat, cotton, feed grains or any commodity falls to a price which is costing the producer more to grow his crop than he can expect in return, both the farmer and ultimately the consumer will suffer. We need to have an orderly program which will benefit both producers and the consumers of this country," Moeller said.

Because the USDA has yet

to call for any mandatory set asides, Moeller said it is up to producers to band together and exercise supply management techniques. "Ultimately, we hope the voluntary set aside will lead to a mandatory one enforced by the government. Only with the uniform participation of producers from across the country can we expect to have a workable program."

Moeller said the current problem of oversupply and low prices was due to the lack of an organized planting and marketing system, high production costs and excessive interest rates. "We need to have a system where the producers can democratically control their supply through a direct referendum. We also need a direct voice in setting the prices we are receiving and in the import/export market on agricultural commodities," he stated.

"If the Reagan Administration is really interested in getting government off the backs of producers, they will give us the chance to democratically control our own destiny with these supply management and cost control techniques," he confirmed. "Otherwise, with continuing high interest rates, trade restrictions, and

increasing production costs, we will be losing thousands of irreplaceable family farmers in 1982," Moeller concluded.

### Lutrick Named To Honors List

Carrie L. Lutrick, a student at Howard College, was named to the Howard County Junior College District Honors List in the Cum Laude Ampla Et Magna division, announced Dr. Charles Hays, president of the District.

Lutrick was among 83 students at Howard College to make the honors list. In order to qualify for the honors list, a student must be enrolled in at least 15 solid hours, which excludes physical education and orientation. In addition, the student must have 57 or more grade points and no grade below a B.

## COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

LUBBOCK, Friday, January 22, 1982

The perennial fight for more equitable loan program discounts on Texas High Plains cotton qualities already is heating up for 1982 as preparations are made for moving to a new battleground, say officials of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

For more than two decades PCG has confronted USDA with facts and figures to prove that micronaire, grade and staple discounts in the government loan schedule consistently discriminate against West Texas and Oklahoma cottons.

"And since discounts, especially those applied to low micronaire cottons, almost every year have been lower than they would have been without our efforts," states PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, "we have been well rewarded. But," he continues, "we can't say we've 'won the war' because discounts still reflect values for our cotton well below actual market prices and relative demand."

In the past PCG has argued its case one-on-one with USDA against the opposing views of other interest groups and other cotton producing areas. The results, Johnson says, have always been a compromise that afforded some relief to the High Plains but always fell short of rendering true justice.

In 1982 the debate will move to a "study committee" established by the Agriculture and Food Act of 1981. Tilting for their respective special interests in committee meetings will be two producer representatives from each of the four major U. S. cotton producing areas and one representative each from the merchant and textile manufacturing sectors. They are to be appointed, along with an alternate for each, by the Secretary of Agriculture.

From the Texas-Oklahoma region, the Texas Association of Cotton Producer Organizations and the Texas Farm Bureau have joined PCG in submitting to USDA a single slate of four people to serve as committee members and alternates.

Lloyd Cline of Lamesa and current PCG President Gary Ivey of Ralls have been nominated to represent the High Plains as member and alternate, respectively. Wiley Felty of Altus, Oklahoma, and A. D. May of Rule, in the Rolling Plains, were nominated to represent those areas as member and alternate.

"These people have the background, the knowledge and the ability to speak for the short staple cottons," Johnson states, "and while actual appointments are yet to be made, we will be disappointed and a little surprised if the Secretary does not agree to our selections."

PCG, however, expects to work closely with whoever the committee members may be, Johnson adds, "supplying all the data we can gather to support our case for more equitable treatment."

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

**Tax Preparer An Important Decision**

The choosing of a paid preparer by taxpayers to do their federal income tax returns should be done carefully, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Most tax return preparers are honest and do not deliberately attempt to defraud either their clients or the IRS. However, a few abuse the responsibility of preparing a tax return for someone else, and the IRS has suggestions on how to identify these preparers.

Taxpayers should not sign a blank return, or one which is partially completed, or one prepared in pencil. These could be altered by the preparer. Preparers should be asked to sign the return in the taxpayer's presence, and give his or her identification number, as required by law. The taxpayer must be given a copy of the completed return.

Preparers who promise a refund, claim a special relationship with the IRS or boast of ways to beat the tax system should be avoided.
