

# Neighborhood Center Forced To Fold After 14 Years Service To Community

The Reagan budget cuts can be seen taking affect in all programs that are Federally funded on the national, state and local level.

The Abernathy Neighborhood Center has strived to continue service to the community even though it has suffered funding cut-backs. The latest cut-back has forced the Center to close as there is no more Federal funding available for the project.

After 14 years service to the community, the Center officially closed March 17. Here is how it all happened:

## The Early Years

Long time resident of Abernathy, Imogene Suttle, was the first to see the need for some type of Federally funded service for the less fortunate of Abernathy.

In 1967, with assistance from Dr. Lamb, of Texas Tech, she began receiving government commodities to distribute to the poor and hungry in Abernathy. Mrs. Suttle gave cooking demonstrations and showed less fortunate families how to take care of themselves.

But Imogene did not stop here, she saw further need for a government subsidized center where people could come and get the aid and assistance

they needed, but could not afford.

Therefore, in 1968, Mrs. Suttle and Glen Rosendale, a teacher at the time, but is presently a Catholic Priest, did a survey in Abernathy to see if there was a need for a community center. The survey revealed that there were many families in Abernathy, blacks, browns and whites that needed government aid.

## Neighborhood Center Started

In 1968, a neighborhood center was started and approximately 30 women would come and Mrs. Suttle would distribute government commodities and cook for them. She also advised them with their problems and taught them how to better themselves.

The Center was moved to several buildings between 1968 and 1970. Each time the rent got high, or cheaper rent could be found, the center was moved. Esther Sepeda was the first manager of the Center as a paid director for the first two years, 1968-1970.

The building that the Neighborhood Center would occupy for the next 12 years, the 300 block of Main Street, was rented in 1971 and became the permanent headquarters. Since then, \$50 is the highest that the Center has ever paid for rent.

Esther Sepeda completed two years

volunteer service to the Center, and in 1971, Alice Pace took over the paid director of the Center. She would continue as the manager for the next 12 years.

## Community Service

Alice Pace, with the ever-present guidance and help of Imogene Suttle, continued service to the less fortunate and elderly of Abernathy.

The Center became involved with many city organizations. The Center worked with and assisted local schools, churches and law enforcement officials, as well as businesses and organizations in Abernathy.

The Center has always maintained a low profile, but the extent of services that were carried out there directly or indirectly affected this entire area. People from towns all over this area were serviced or assisted through this center.

Meals on wheels to the elderly was administered through the local Center. Food was taken to the elderly citizens of Abernathy who were not able to leave their homes.

The Center provided transportation to those who needed medical services, worked with the CETA program, Plainview Day Care Center, gave weatherization programs (how to im-

prove heating and cooling conditions in homes, insulation, etc.), it was a warehouse for the needy (clothing and food were brought there and distributed to the needy), provided toys for youngsters at Christmas as well as provided many other services.

The Center was also used as a transfer and referral center. Manager Alice Pace worked with school, city and church officials when they needed information about someone. She was the go-between for ethnic groups and individuals who had problems and needed public assistance.

The Center was used as a referral office for those who needed services provided by state and county organizations such as the Social Security office, Texas Rehabilitation program, Health Department, Health Provider, M.E.T. Migrant Education Program, County Employment Agencies, Nursing Homes, Commission For The Blind and for those needing hospital care. The Center was involved with all of these programs and serviced Lubbock as well as Hale counties.

Mrs. Pace found baby sitters for people who needed them and housing for others. She also worked closely with the Department of Human Resources in both Lubbock and Plainview.

The Center worked with extension services, (who gave demonstrations), helped people enroll in the G.E.D. Program, and worked with Medicare and Food Stamp programs.

Alice also counseled and advised people with their problems. She has helped people with every problem imaginable, such as child abuse, prostitution, venereal disease, family conflicts, woman abuse, man abuse and many others.

"I learned the hard way, by experience," Pace said, "and I just thank the Lord for what I have been able to do," she ended.

## Administration

The Neighborhood Center was administered through the Central Plains Community Action Board in Plainview. The Center was Federally funded through this office. Robert Hernandez is the Executive Director and Imogene Suttle is one of the members of the board.

Locally, the Center is administered through Alice Pace, Imogene Suttle, and a local board, the Neighborhood Center Board.

The local Center is folding as well as the Centers in Hale Center because the parade honoring the Abernathy Riding Club and Garvin.

"The Abernathy Riding Club is an 'Old Timer' at the ABC parade. They haven't missed a parade since they organized in 1952, and have won a place every year except one, including many 1st place trophies. This year, the Club will celebrate it's 30th Anniversary.

The Club is carrying an 'Empty Saddle' for Robert D. Garvin, who was affectionately known as 'Pop'. 'Pop'

Federally funded administrative office in Plainview is \$37,000 in debt. By closing the centers, the debts can be resolved.

"The local Center can no longer be Federally funded. Unless the Texas Government will finance it, or money is raised locally to fund it, there will be no Neighborhood Center," Imogene Suttle stated.

The whole idea behind the Neighborhood Center was to assist and be of service to all the people in Abernathy as well as help make the community a better place to live.

Abernathy may possibly be losing one of its' most vital resources, the Neighborhood Center. Unless funding is provided, there will no longer be a place for the lonely, troubled and less fortunate people of Abernathy to gather and acquire assistance. The impact of the Center closing cannot be measured, the result will directly or indirectly affect the entire community.

Mrs. Pace and Mrs. Suttle pointed out that the Center provided for the needy. "Until there are no more needy in Abernathy, there is a need for the Neighborhood Center."

was 80 years old when his death came on Feb. 10th of this year.

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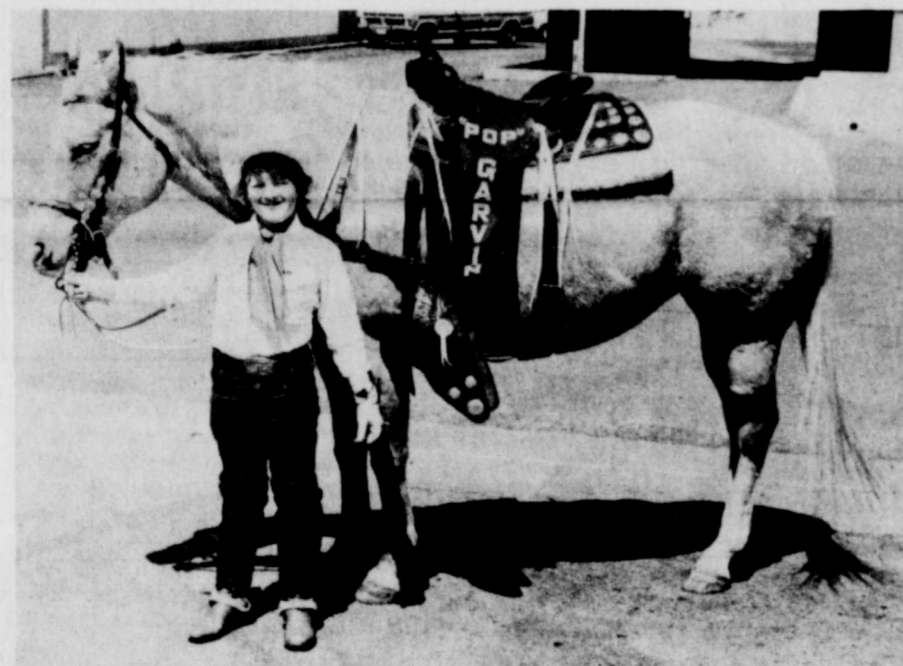

GOOD NEWS FOR CONSUMERS.. The price of gas is continually on a decline and may go down to \$1 a gallon soon. It wasn't long ago that gas was as high as \$1.35 a gallon. The other day I saw a gas station selling gas for \$1.08 a gallon.

This is extremely good news for those of us who live in a car. I put 20 thousand miles on my Fiesta this year. You figure on the average that I spent \$1.20 per gallon and averaged 27 miles to the gallon, it adds up to 740 gallons of gas my car consumed last year, and I have an economical car that will get 33 miles per gallon when I drive 55 mph.

Therefore, I spent \$888 for gas last year. It would be scary to figure the cost of gas for a gas guzzling V-8 engine for one year. And this is a commodity that everyone uses at one time or another. Every penny counts.

By the time this column is printed, gas may be down to \$1 a gallon. The supply vs. demand curve is in our favor and we hope the trend continues. It may even keep those rich Arabs out of Abernathy.

Following is the result of a questionnaire sent to city alderman candidates, published in an effort to educate local voters about councilman selections. Questions asked each of the candidates are as follows:

1. Please provide background information on yourself, including work and residency in Abernathy.
2. What qualifications do you have for this position and for what reasons do you seek it?
3. What is your assessment of the city at present and what do you diagnose as its immediate problem areas? (finances, tax rates, offerings, business sector, operations etc.)
4. What are your short term goals for the city?
5. What are your long term goals for the city?

I moved to Abernathy in 1950 and graduated from A.H.S. in 1955. I served in the Air Force and attended the University of Texas and Texas Tech.

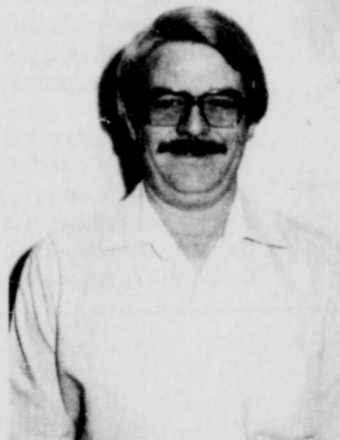

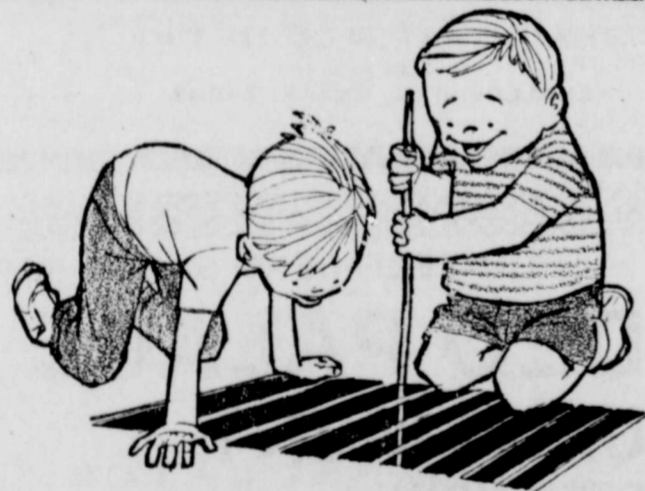

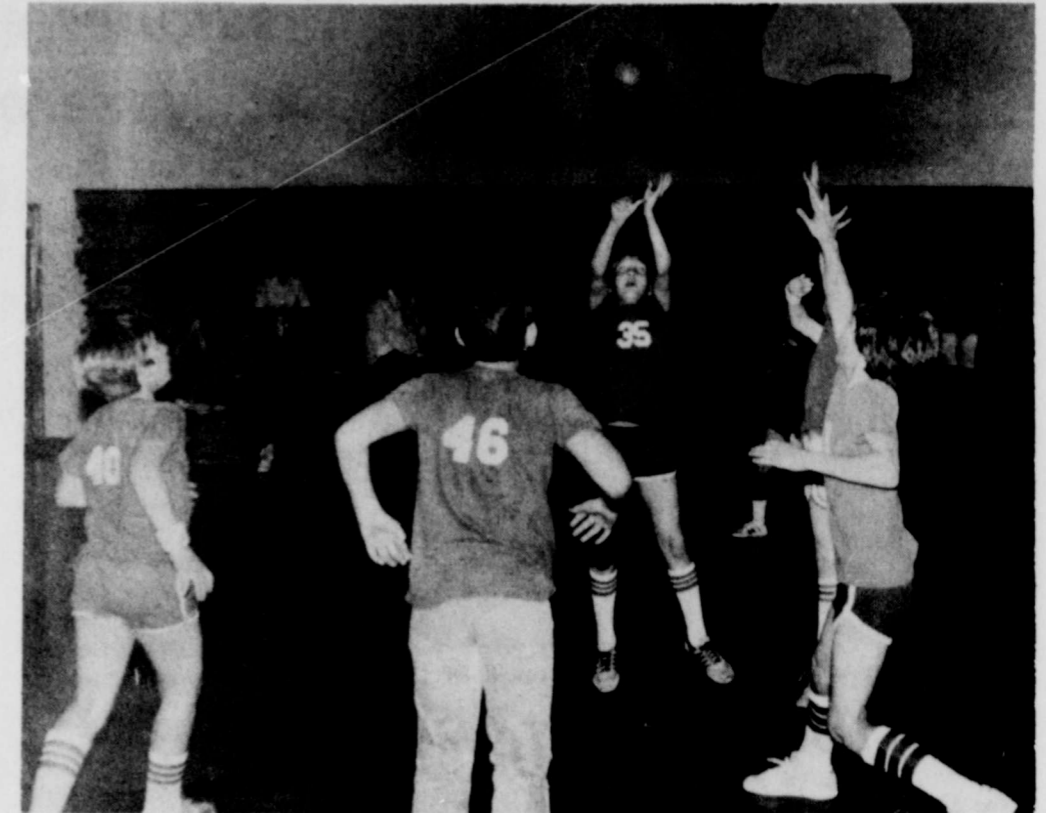

## IRS Says Child Care Credit Available For Working Families

These days it's common to find single parent families or families in which both parents work. Working often means leaving the children with a babysitter, housekeeper, or a day-care center during working hours, and that can be expensive. But the financial pinch can be

offset somewhat by taking advantage of a credit on your federal income taxes based on payments to provide care for children, a disabled spouse, or disabled dependent while you work.

Child & Disabled Dependent Care Credit can save you as much as \$800 on your taxes for 1981. You might be entitled to a credit of 20 percent of the expenses to care for your child, disabled dependent or disabled spouse that you paid in 1981.

You may use up to \$2,000 of these expenses to figure your credit if you have one qualifying dependent and up to \$4,000 if you have two or more qualifying dependents. Your credit, however is limited to \$400 for one, and \$800 for two or more qualifying dependents.

The new tax law will increase the maximum amount of expenses you can claim and will change other provisions of this credit in 1982. That may mean an even bigger savings for you on the return you will file on or before April 15, 1983.

**OVERSEAS SHIPMENTS BRISK:** Cotton export shipments during the week ended March 11 totaled 261,300 running bales. This brought accumulated shipments for the season to 3,736,000.

Gross new sales of 64,900 included 21,800 to Canada, 7,900 to South Korea, 7,100 to Japan, and 6,100 to Indonesia. The net sales increase was reduced to 34,300 after cancellations, which included transfers of 27,000 to 1982-83 marketing year.

**COTTON ENTERING LOAN:** The U.S. Department of Agriculture reports a total of 115,485 bales of 1981-82 crop cotton entered the CCC loan during the week ended March 10. Loans were repaid on 12,245 bales during week, leaving 5,056,903 still in the program. Loans remain outstanding on 107,100 bales of 1980 crop cotton.

## Tornado Safety Tips To Remember

As spring-like weather approaches, we are again reminded that tornado season is just around the corner.

The Abernathy Police Department and Volunteer Fire Department would like to review the citizens of Abernathy on a few safety tips which should be remembered during this dreaded season of the year.

When a tornado threatens, your immediate action can save your life.

**REMEMBER:**  
1. **TORNADO WATCH**-tornadoes and severe thunderstorms are possible.  
2. **TORNADO WARNING**-tornado detected; take shelter immediately.

3. In homes and small buildings, go to the basement or to an interior part on the lowest level - closets, bathrooms, or interior halls. Get under something sturdy.

4. In schools, nursing homes, hospitals, factories, and shopping centers, go to pre-designated shelter areas. Interior hallways on the lowest floor are usually best.

5. In high-rise buildings, go to interior small rooms or hallways.

6. In mobile homes or vehicles, leave them and go to a substantial structure. If there is no shelter nearby, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine, or culvert with your hands shielding your head.

7. Stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls.

8. Listen to radio, television, or NOAA weather radio for latest National Weather Service bulletins.

The Abernathy Police Department and Fire Department will have trained spotters observing the approach of threatening weather, should a watch for our area be issued by the National Weather Service.

In the event of possible danger to lives or property, the sirens will be sounded. A "take cover signal" is a high-to-low pitch cycled for three minutes. An "all-clear" signal is a constant pitch lasting for 3

minutes.

Our community warning network cannot be completely effective despite all efforts to improve its coverage and response time. There is always the chance that a tornado will not be detected or that a report will not get through to the National Weather Service.

Nevertheless, our community warning network - complete with spotters, a functional emergency warning center, and sirens - will go a long way toward protecting our community during a tornado emergency.

The journalism contest is sponsored by the Inter-scholastic League Press Conference (ILPC). The school newspaper sponsors submit entries from the

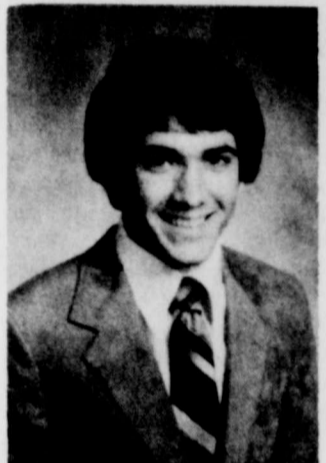
school newspapers in the different categories. Abernathy High School students compete only with Class AAA schools that publish newspapers by off-set press.

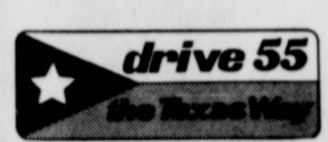

Headline: 255 Register Here For Civilian Defense. Abernathy's first baby for 1942, was Linda Joy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Furman Shipman, who was born at 12:28 a.m. January 1. Also, she was the first 1942 baby born in Lubbock County.

A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Smith January 5, 1942.

Dr. H.E. Williams estimated the number of cases of measles in this area to be near 200. Also, several in this area have the mumps.

Postmaster George W. Ragland, a veteran of World War I, was selected as captain of Abernathy's Home Guard unit. W.A. Richter, also a veteran of World War I, and Pete Renfro, who had served in the U.S. Navy, were named lieutenants of the guard organization.

L.M. Rankin announced for re-election as Commissioner of Precinct Three, Hale County.

Automobile owners must secure a Federal License sticker for their cars during January, from the local post office. Cost of the sticker is \$2.90. Then, on July 1, another sticker, costing \$5.00, must be purchased. This auto tax was included in the recent gigantic Federal tax bill passed late in 1941 by Congress.

Abernathy Volunteer Firemen met in joint session with the City Council to discuss the need for a meeting place for firemen. A planning committee composed of Lamar McKenzie, Herman Schulz, Frank Tanehill, and Frank Roberts was named to secure estimates on a tile and stucco building. Jack Hackler, Douglas Chapman and J.C. Hurst were named on a committee to solicit funds for construction of the building. (The building on the northwest corner of the city square is the result of that joint session of firemen and councilmen)
