

Irene Walker Honored For 23 Years Service With Reception

A reception honoring Irene Walker was held Tuesday, May 11 at 4 p.m. in the large meeting room of the school administration building.

The reception was held in honor of Irene and her 23 years service to Abernathy Elementary School as a fourth grade teacher.

A large group of teachers and school administrators attending the event in which Irene was presented a bell of appreciation from Superintendent Gid Adkisson. Refreshments and visiting followed the presentation.

Irene Walker was born at Wellington, Texas. As a child her family moved to Texaco, New Mexico, where she spent her grade school years.

In 1930, she moved with her family to Portales, New Mexico. She married Tella Walker in 1938 and they remained in Portales until 1942, when he was drafted into the service.

When Tella went overseas, Irene moved to Bethany, Oklahoma to live with her parents in 1943. She attended Bathany Nazarene College there. Tella joined her in Bethany following the

war and in 1949 they moved to Abernathy.

Irene continued her education at Texas Tech University attending summer school for five years. In 1959, she became a fourth grade teacher at Abernathy Elementary School and has been for the past 23 years.

When asked what motivated her to teach for so many years, Irene stated that she loves children. "Children see you for what you are. If you show them that you care for them, they will care for you in return," she said.

Irene stated that she always strived to create an atmosphere conducive for learning.

She also summed up the years by saying, "the people here have been very good to me. Abernathy is an excellent place to work and teaching here has been an enjoyable and pleasant experience," she ended.

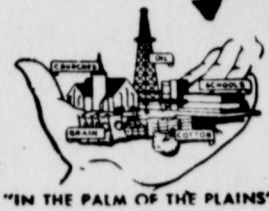

Abernathy Police Target Of Complaints

Approximately 200 people gathered at the American Legion Hall in Abernathy Monday night to voice their complaints against officers of the Abernathy Police Department. Many stood in the packed building for two hours until the meeting ended.

Several persons attending got up in front of the crowd, individually, and recited incidents of alleged harassment by Abernathy Police Officers. Complaints voiced included unnecessary harassment, being stopped for no apparent reason, beating and harsh words while being arrested and basically that their rights were being abused by police officers.

Spokesman for the group was Brown Baret leader Gilbert Herrera, who presently lives in Lubbock. There were three other Brown Baret members also

present at the meeting. Esther Sepeda, once a resident of Abernathy and a member of the Lulax Organization, was also a spokesman at the meeting.

A number of out-of-town officials were presented at the meeting, including Hale County Sheriff Charles Tue, County Attorney Ron Felty and several representatives of West Texas Legal Services.

The crowd was predominantly made up of blacks and Mexican-Americans. Approximately seven anglos attended.

Most locals believe that it is not a racial argument, but that several people are dissatisfied with the way they are allegedly being treated by police officers.

Another meeting on this matter will probably be held in the near future.

Ramos Awarded Scholarship To WTSU

Hector Ramos, a graduating senior at Abernathy High School, has been awarded a Campus Services \$800 scholarship to attend West Texas State University during the 1982-83 academic year.

As one of 10 freshman students who receive the scholarships, Ramos will serve as an official host of the university to take visiting students on campus tours and to assist with campus activities. They will work in the office of Keith Winter, director of development.

Winter interviewed more than 100 high school seniors from Texas, New

Mexico, Kansas and Oklahoma for the 10 scholarships.

To be eligible for the scholarships, students must have a score of 21 or above on the American College Test or 902 or above on the Scholastic Aptitude Test college entrance examinations, must have exhibited leadership qualities, have a record of participation in extracurricular activities, a "B" average or above in high school and two letters of recommendation with one of the letters from the high school counselor.

A competitive scholarship of \$200 or more at WTSU waives out-of-state tuition which often is 10 times higher

than in-state costs.

At Abernathy High School, Ramos has been active as a member of the Science Club, yearbook staff, University Interscholastic League science and math team, football, cross country and track teams and National Honor Society.

He has served as a section leader of the alto saxophone section of the Antelope Band and earned a first chair in All-Region Band. He has served as a class officer and qualified for state solo and ensemble contest.

Ramos plans to major in computer science and business at WTSU. He is the son of Jose and Magdalena Ramos of 711 4th in Abernathy.

Sheriff Says Arrest Solves Thefts

At least four Abernathy area burglaries have been cleared with the arrest of a 17-year-old Lubbock man, Hale County Sheriff Charles Tue said Wednesday.

Donnie Earl Robinson was arrested at his Lubbock home Tuesday night by Hale County deputies assisted by Lubbock authorities, Tue said.

The sheriff said the arrest cleared three burglaries committed on May 8. Those break-ins occurred at the Don Stone residence and at barns owned by Wade Attebury and Johnny Megna. The fourth burglary occurred at the A.W. Hamnit barn near Abernathy on

May 2.

Also cleared was a house burglary in Cochran County, Tue said.

Robinson remained in Hale County Jail Wednesday night in lieu of \$3,500 bonds. A statement by Robinson has indicated that a Lamb County man, now in Lubbock County Jail, was involved in at least two other break-ins, Tue said. *Avalanche Journal*

Text "I have played the fool" I Samuel 26: 21 "I have kept the faith" II Timothy 4: 7.

These two scriptures describe for us the epitaphs of two gifted men of long ago. Each of these men bearing the name of Saul made his statement concerning the status of his life as it was drawing to a close. Making these statements they were evaluating their careers relative to what they had done with the Lord and fellow

man. 1. "I have played the fool" was the solemn finding of Saul, the first king of Israel. God had richly endowed him with the gifts and talents becoming of a great king. A magnificent physique, a pleasing personality, a great physical courage. He has all the attributes of a born leader. Yet, because of his inability to conquer himself he became one of the greatest failures of biblical history. Looking back over wasted opportunities and un-governed impulses, he faces

the bitter realization that he has played the fool.

2. "I have kept the faith" were among the last words of a man who began as Saul of Tarsus but ended as Paul the first missionary. Looking through the bars of a Roman dungeon he reviews his life filled with hardships and sacrifices. Now, as he awaits death, he is sure that it has all been worthwhile. Whatever he had done for the Lord cannot compare with what the Lord has done and is going to do for him. I can imagine with pride and joy he shouts to the world, "I have kept the faith."

Jan, an Abernathy Junior High teacher and owner of Abernathy Floral and Gift Shop, and her son Kelly, visited two families, close friends of theirs, at Alco and Modder River in the Eastern Transvaal.

Kelly's big adventure was the hunting expedition on which he shot a springbok, an animal similar to an antelope. Jan enjoyed visiting a diamond mine, which was quite different from her expectations, and buying diamonds from a De Beers representative. These, by the way, are not on display at the library.

They experienced Africa, as we know it from movies, on a visit to Kruger Game Park, a huge bush area where the animals run free and the humans are caged, at night anyway. They stayed in rondavals, round mud huts with stray roofs, in a camping area enclosed by a 10 foot fence.

Visitors must reach the camp by 6 p.m. or leave the park. They spend the night listening to animals of all kinds roam the dark countryside. Elephants, lions, wildebeests, and all other others sometimes come right up to the camp fence. Humans stay in the confines of the camp until the gate is unlocked at 5 a.m.

Jan says it's hard to imagine that those are everyday life to some people. Her hosts were farmers who had fences to keep the kudu out of the cotton (kudu are also like antelope). She felt right at home when one friend showed her his pivot sprinkler system manufactured in Amarillo, Texas.

Jan spoke to students at two South African schools at Kimberly and at Barely, distributing scrapbooks made by her Abernathy students. Now the African students are making scrapbooks to send to Abernathy and several have written to AJHS kids.

A regular exchange program is now underway. Several African families plan to visit Abernathy next year in August, which is their slow time in farming.

Since this may be the beginning of a great friendship between South Africa and Abernathy, be sure to see the display at the library through June.

Also on display is an Ethiopian goat skin baby carrier and doll belonging to Diane Peoples' mother. The carrier is decorated with shells and fertility beads. The crude handmade doll is wearing a similar baby carrier.

Diane laughed when the library display committee asked to display her souvenirs. "It's like putting a Canadian maple leaf in an exhibit of Texas items. The

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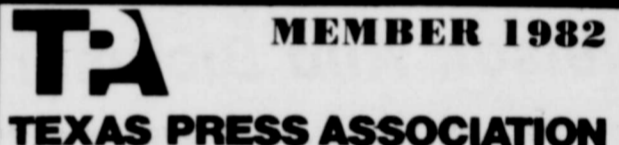

Teachers have been enlisted and plans are being made for different projects in VBS.

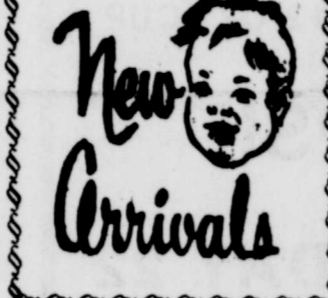

They each gave a testimony how it was working in their lives and how many pounds they had lost. They use the same motto as alcoholic anonymous uses.

(God Grant me the etc.) Their dues are \$1.75 yearly and they use a handbook called "Twelve Steps".

I really enjoy meeting new people and seeing that problems are not just individual, but we all share problems and "Let Go and Let God".

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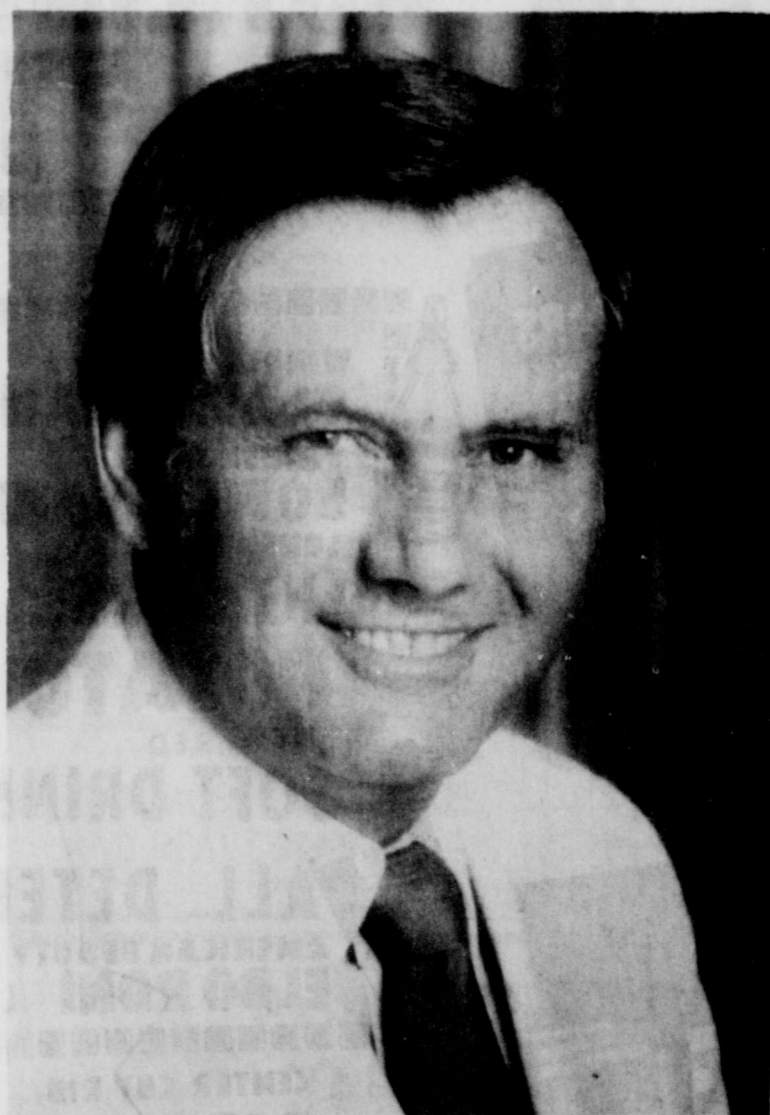

Section 1: Whenever any accounts for delinquent taxes owned the City of Abernathy are given its tax attorney for collection, on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City of Abernathy shall be entitled to, and shall collect, an additional penalty of fifteen (15%) percent of the delinquent taxes and penalty (including any interest owed) due on each delinquent property at the time of collection, either before or after suit and/or foreclosure sale is provided by Section 33.07 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

Section 2: In addition to the collection expenses provided for in Section 1 above, the City of Abernathy shall be entitled to collect the actual expenses incurred by the City of Abernathy in providing all data and information as to the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and the legal description of property necessary to the filing of any suit for delinquent taxes.

Section 3: This ordinance shall become effective immediately after its publication in the manner and for the length of time required by law.

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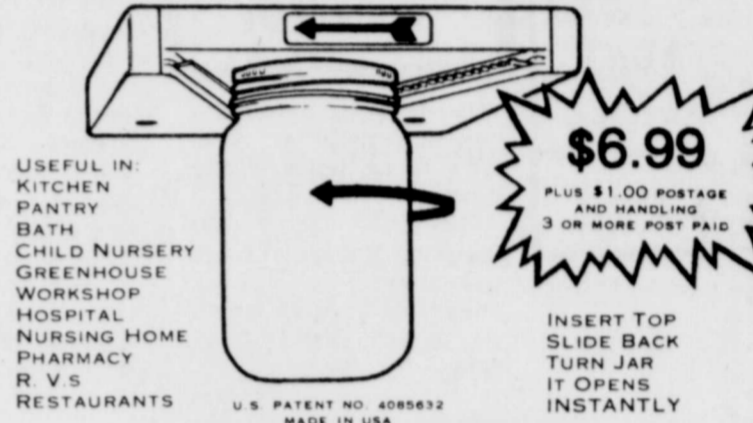
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
