Abernathy Police Target Of Complaints

Approximately 200 people gathered at the American Legion Hall in Abernathy Monday night to voice their complaints against officers of the Abernathy Police Department. Many stood in the packed building for two hours until the meeting ended.

Several persons attending got up in front of the crowd, individually, and recited incidents of alleged harassment by Abernathy Police Officers. Complaints voiced included unnecessary harassment, being stopped for no apparent reason, beating and harsh words while being arrested and basically that their rights were being abused by police officers.

Spokesman for the group was Brown Baret leader Gilbert Herrera, who presently lives in Lubbock. There were three other Brown Baret members also present at the meeting. Esther Sepeda, once a resident of Abernathy and a member of the Lulax Organization, was also a spokesman at the meeting.

A number of out-of-town officials were presented at the meeting, including Hale County Sheriff Charles Tue, County Attorney Ron Felty and several representatives of West Texas Legal

The crowd was predominantly made up of blacks and Mexican-Americans. Approximately seven anglos attended.

Most locals believe that it is not a racial argument, but that several people are dissatisfied with the way they are allegedly being treated by police officers.

Another meeting on this matter will probably be held in the near future.
