## ON THE COUNTY LINE

THE TORNADO IS THE MOST VIOLENT of all the winds that sweep this planet's surface, according to a brochure I picked up at City Hall recently which is sent out by the U.S. Department of Commerce.

The brochure states that tornadoes rotate in a counterclockwise direction. The funnel is initially composed of nothing more than condensed water vapor and is itself a cloud. When the funnel reaches the ground, it picks up dust and debris which makes it darker.

Tornadoes are formed when an unseasonably warm and humid air mass at the earth's surface, meets a cold air mass which is usually at middle atmospheric levels. This combined with strong upper level "jet stream" winds causes tornadoes.

The brochure points out that tornado paths are, on the average, a quarter of a mile wide and seldom more than 15 miles long. They usually move from the south, southwest or west about 30 mph.

I have seen several small funnels in the past, but never one of the big black ones. Thank goodness!

It would be wise to be on the alert if

dark clouds should gather around Abernathy. In the upper portion of Texas alone, 950 tornadoes were sighted from 1953-1976 and in this same period, 112 people died from these tornadoes.

## Australians Visit Minnie And Arno Struve

Friends from Australia visited Mr. and Mrs. Arno Struve this week. They are from Port Macquarie in New South Wales, a resort town on the east coast of Australia about halfway between Sydney and Brisbane. The Struves visited in Port Macquarie a couple of times in 1970.

Mr. and Mrs. V.H. Polley arrived in Abernathy Wednesday May 19 and will be here a week. They have seen the cotton fields, the oil field and the points of interest around the town. In addition, they have seen the city of Lubbock and its high points: Texas Tech University, the Ranching Heritage Center, the Museum, the Prairie Dog Town and the general features of the city.

Mrs. Polley, whom the Struves knew in Albuquerque, N.M. in the late forties as Mrs. Mary Else, was their hostess when they went to Port Macquarie in 1970. Since then, her husband of

that day has died. She lived in the U.S. for many years. Her husband, Nemo Else, was an American citizen, but Mary retained her Australian citizenship. When Mr. Else retired, they went to Australia to live. Mrs. Polley has visited the Struves twice since they visited in Australia.

Mr. Polley is a retired airline pilot with 40 years and 30,000 hours of flying experience. He spent five years in the Royal Australian Air Force and continued his flying career with civilian airlines in Australia for 10 years flying, often between his homeland and Hawaii and San Francisco.

From here, the Polleys will fly to New Orleans and continue on their tour from there to Mexico City, eventually coming back to San Francisco where they will depart for Australia.

Mr. Polley has one son living in London who has been hospitalized. To check on his son's condition, he called London Monday night. The Struves were amazed that the call went through as quickly as it would have to any point in the U.S.

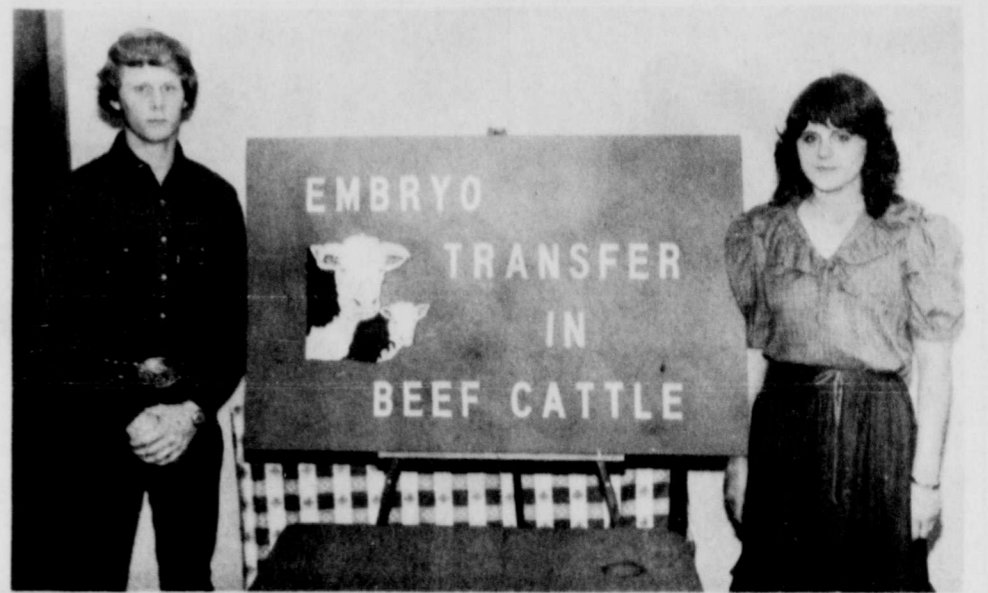

Congressman Charles Stenholm of Stamford May 12 told a gathering of cotton producers and producer representatives in Huntsville, Alabama that considerable difficulty can be expected in passing the recently introduced Farm Crisis Act during this session of Congress.

Stenholm is a leader of a coalition called "The Farm Crisis Group" in Washington and one of the principal authors of the Farm Crisis Act, meant to "bring relief to the embattled family farmers of America."

Reference to the congressman's remarks was included in a report from Tommy Fondren of Lorenzo and Donald Johnson, President and Executive Vice President, respectively, of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Both attended a meeting of the National Cotton Council's Producer Steering Committee May 11 and 12. Committee Vice Chair-

man Frank Jones of Lamesa also attended the meeting but was unavailable for comment at this writing.

The PCG officials said Stenholm cited pressure on Congress to reach agreement on a budget, plus the fact that only about 90 days remain before Congress recesses for 1982 elections, as major stumbling blocks to any effort toward improving the current farm law.

If passed the Farm Crisis Act would offer cotton producers in 1982 a direct payment of 20 cents per pound for reducing acreage an additional five percent above the 15 percent voluntary reduction already in effect. And, if approved by farmers voting in a nationwide July referendum, the Act would give farmers a 10 percent increase in the respective base loan rates for cotton, food and feed grains in return for devoting 15 percent of total cropland to conservation practices. If the referendum carried, producers who failed to comply with its provisions would be denied access to all farm programs for three years.

The congressman did not ask the Steering Committee to take a position on the Act and none was taken. However after responding to questions that indicated some committee members had doubts about the proposal, Stenholm in effect challenged them to come forward with an alternative solution to agriculture's urgent financial problems.

Among other items on the committee agenda were a "cotton outlook" report from USDA official Charles Cunningham and a discussion of the all-risk Federal Crop Insurance program for cotton by James Johnson, Special Assistant to Secretary of Agriculture John Block.

Cunningham said USDA would soon be calling for public comment on proposed 1982 farm program provisions in hopes they can be announced by November 1 this year. Under consideration, Cunningham said, are various alternative acreage reduction plans, including the possible use of a paid diversion program.

James Johnson said survival of the Federal Crop Insurance program will depend on revisions in rate structure to bring premiums more into line with loss payments. Only 11 percent of eligible acres were insured in 1981, he said, and the loss/premium ratio was about 1.12 to one. Of 13,135 units insured, Johnson reported, 5,168 suffered payable losses.

## Committee Of Texas Cities Recommends 9% Electricity Rate Increase

Southwestern Public Service Company today announced it would accept a 9 percent rate increase recommended by the Steering Committee which represents

66 Texas municipalities served by the electric utility, including Abernathy.

The agreement was reached following a study by the cities' rate study committee, and represents 71 percent of the 12.7 percent Texas retail rate increase requested by the Company.

If approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), the new rate would be effective July 1, 1982, and would be expected to provide additional revenues of approximately \$13.6 million annually from customers inside the cities. The agreement only covers the rates for service supplies within city jurisdictions. Rates outside the cities, which are regulated by the PUCT, would generate approximately an additional \$15.8 million annually at the 71 percent figure.

Company president Bert Ballengee said "SPS agreed reluctantly because the combined revenues of \$29.4 million from city and rural customers is less than had been requested, less than is needed, and less than is justified by today's high money costs and the commitment the Company had made to its customers to change to coal as the fuel source in new power plants."

Ballengee said the "SPS would go along with the reduced increase because of the current economic situation which is affecting everyone. I guess we'll hurt just like everyone else," he added.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric utility service to a population of more than 1 million in a 45,000 square mile area of the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

## Crop And Livestock Reports From Farmers And Ranchers Needed

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin interviewing Texas farmers and ranchers in mid-May on 1982 crop acreage and midyear livestock inventories, State Statistician Doug Murfield

has announced.

Results of the confidential interviews, conducted through the mail or in person by field enumerators, will be published in June.

Murfield is urging farm-

ers and ranchers to complete and return mail questionnaires promptly. Information will be combined for state and county estimates.

Murfield said estimates give Texas farmers and ranchers planning information for planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing, and marketing. "Without these reports, most producers would have to depend on trade and other sources for information on crop and livestock prospects," he said.

Reports are also used by farm organizations and legislatures to plan and develop farm programs, extension economists and farm

and ranch management consultants to advise farmers and ranchers, and exporters to plan and promote sales of Texas agricultural products in foreign markets.

Estimates are published annually for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, small grains, vegetables, fruits and pecans, and cash receipts from the sale of Texas farm commodities.

**CREDIT WILL BOOST EXPORTS:** The U.S. Department of Agriculture has authorized \$100 million in credit guarantees to South Korea for purchase of U.S. cotton, according to the National Cotton Council.

All shipments under the new credit backing must be completed by December 31.

The new authorization is in addition to the \$300 million previously announced. A delegation from the Spinners and Weavers Association of Korea (SWAK) visited the U.S. in March to make an official request for the additional credit backing.

National Cotton Council President Ed Breihan and Council staff members accompanied the group to a meeting with Agriculture Secretary John Block.

Korea bought about 1.5 million bales of U.S. cotton last year, and SWAK representatives say purchases this year may reach 1.7

million. **HOUSE PASSES WATER BILL:** The House has approved a National Cotton Council supported bill amended the 1902 Reclamation Act. The measure now goes to the Senate where a similar bill is pending.

As approved by the House, the bill would: (1) allow water districts to decide either to retain 160-acre ownership limit per family member or amend the contract to allow 960 owned acres with the individual paying the full cost of water for lands leased in excess of 960 acres; (2) give individual farmers in districts which do not amend contracts the option of coming under the new law on an individual basis; (3) repeal the residency requirement; and (4) exempt Corps of Engineers projects.

# Farm Crisis Act Of 1982

In response to the depression-level income facing agriculture, Tom Daschle (D-South Dakota) and Kent Hance formed the Farm Crisis Group to focus attention on the situation caused by low farm prices, high interest rates and an inadequate 1981 Farm Bill. Since that time, the national news media has documented the growing plight of the American farmer.

Recently the Farm Crisis Group offered legislation designed to ease the crisis conditions. The major provisions of our eight-point program are:

1. Producers of feed grains, wheat, cotton, and rice who have already signed up to participate in the existing 1982 diversion program would have the additional option of diverting another 5 percent of their acreage and being paid for that diversion. This would lessen demands on the federal budget, since it is cheaper to avoid producing additional units of commodities that are already in surplus supply than it is to make payments -- price sup-

ports, storage, or otherwise -- after the commodities have been produced.

In addition, the effect of reduced supplies would stimulate prices, thus reducing required target prices. Because of the late date in the 1982 season, the sign-up would be open until the end of the certification period. Haying and grazing would also be available to those farmers who have already planted.

The levels of diversion payments would be: Corn \$1.25 per bushel; Wheat \$2 per bushel; Rice \$2.20 per hundredweight; Cotton 20 cents per pound. These would be calculated as follows: Normal production x acreage diverted (equal to 5 percent of historically planted acres.)

2. A nationwide referendum would be held in July on whether farmers will lay aside 15 percent of their crop land for conservation purposes. Not included in the referendum would be crop acres under marketing order allotment. An affirmative vote by 55 percent of the farmers participating would

be required for approval. If the referendum passed, loan rates would increase by 10 percent. Failure to comply with the referendum provisions would mean denial of access to farm programs for three years.

3. If the referendum should be defeated, the Secretary of Agriculture would be required to establish a voluntary set-aside program when carryover reached certain levels:

For wheat, if domestic carryover grew to more than 5 percent of world wheat utilization, a minimum 15 percent acreage set-aside program would be implemented, and farmers would receive a 5 percent loan rate increase. Farmers would also have the option to set aside 30 percent of the previous year's plantings in return for a 15 percent increase in the wheat loan. The set-aside acreage could be devoted to haying and grazing.

For feed grains, if domestic carryover grew to more than 18 percent of total domestic and export use, a minimum 15 percent set-

aside program would be implemented, and farmers would receive a 5 percent loan rate increase. Farmers would have the option to set aside 25 percent of the previous year's plantings in return for a 10 percent increase in the loan rate.

For cotton, if total domestic carryover stocks of upland cotton at the end of the marketing year exceeded 4.2 million bales, the Secretary of Agriculture would provide for a minimum 15 percent set-aside, and farmers would receive an increase of 10 percent in loan rates. Farmers would have the option to set aside 25 percent of acreage, in which case the loan rate would be increased by 20 percent.

4. It is the sense of Congress that at least one billion dollars could be made available for the Agricultural Credit Revolving Fund. In addition it is the sense of Congress that the Administration should take immediate action to begin negotiations with the government of the U.S.S.R. for a multi-year trade agreement.

5. The government would guarantee up to \$250 million in loans for construction of on-farm storage facilities. This would make storage available for 500-600 million bushels of grain.

6. Use of the Economic Emergency Loan Program would be mandated, retaining the current \$600 million cap. The program would be extended until September 30, 1983, and the cap on loan size would be lowered from \$400,000 to \$200,000.

7. The President would be directed to call a White House Conference on Agriculture to provide a forum for in-depth and long-range examination of agriculture's problems, solutions, and future potential.

8. The Secretary of Agriculture would be directed to survey and expedite bartering of U.S. Government-owned agricultural commodities for strategic materials.

Since the items proposed in the Farm Crisis of 1982 have been thoroughly considered in previous hearings and meetings, it will be possible to refer the bill directly to the House Agriculture Committee for action. I anticipate that the chairman would take action on the bill before May 15 and while an exact date for

the House floor consideration is not possible to project, the Speaker has indicated his interest and willingness to provide assistance in expediting the bill.

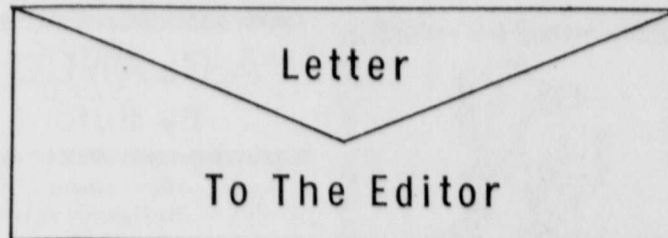
**4-H Method Demonstration Supper Re-Scheduled For Tuesday**

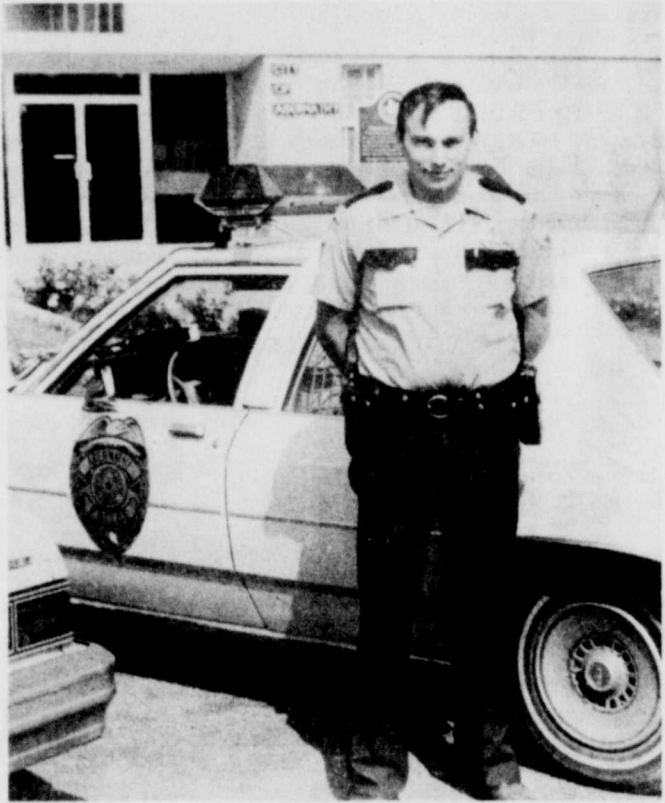

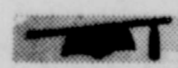
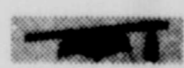

These students deserve special recognition for their outstanding achievements.

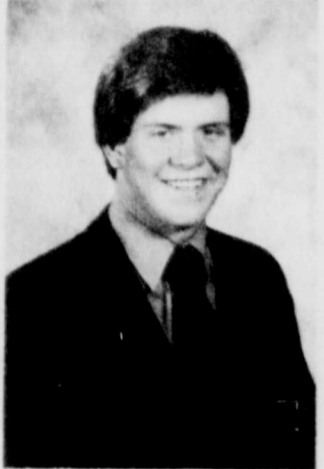
