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## Council Hears Concerned Citizens Voice Complaints

The local group "Concerned Citizens of the Community" met with the Abernathy City Council at the regular meeting of the Council Monday, September 13 at 7:30 p.m. in the large City Hall meeting room. The larger room was used for the meeting as 25 guests attended.

Approximately 21 people from the local organization "Concerned Citizens

of the Community", accompanied by their attorney, Tomas Garza of Lubbock, were at the meeting to discuss the Abernathy Police Department.

The organizations attorney, Tomas Garza, presented nine written complaints to the Council all dealing basically with alleged harassment by Police Officers Raymond Naron, Johnny Clayton, and former police officers Jack Taylor and Taffy Naron. Those attending from "Concerned Citizens of the Community" were from Petersburg, Lubbock and most of them from Abernathy.

Those voicing their complaint or a complaint filed by someone they knew, were: Jesse Dominguez, Sr., B.T. Garcia, Donna Ledesma, Mary Lopez, Cecil Garcia, Jr., Muhammed (representing the Abernathy black community), and Lydia Dominguez. Each of these citizens made statements to the Council that either they, or the person they were speaking for, was allegedly harassed by Abernathy Police Officers.

The Council heard all the complaints and members took notes while listening to each one. The meeting went on for three hours and adjourned

WHAT IS PROPOSITION? Proposition 3 is the proposed constitutional amendment that would exempt farm and ranch equipment from ad valorem taxes.

Jim Hightower, Democratic nominee for Agriculture Commissioner, is endorsing proposition 3. He recently made the following statement:

"The taxes currently collected on agricultural tools and machinery amount to only one-eighth of one percent of all tax revenues, but the collection of the tax from the individual farmer can be enough to put a depressing red blotch on the debit side of his balance sheet," Hightower said. "In other words, government is not getting enough from the tax to do them any good, but the tax taken from the individual farmer can do them real harm."

"It is tremendously expensive to try to farm these days - a standard tractor costs about \$40,000, a combine will run you around \$85,000, a round baler will cost you \$9,500, and you'll put down \$5,500 for a planter. These are no simple 'implements of husbandry' as the tax code calls them, and application of this tax to a modern incorporated farm family could take as much as \$3,000 a year out of the family's pocket," Hightower said. Those of you who agree with Mr.

Hightower may want to vote for Proposition 3 November 2. It seems to me that this would be a very popular thing to vote for, especially in a farming community such as Abernathy.

As a result, greater flexibility will be expected from employers, along with a more dedicated effort from company insurers to make "pick-and-choose" employee-benefit packages available, she says.

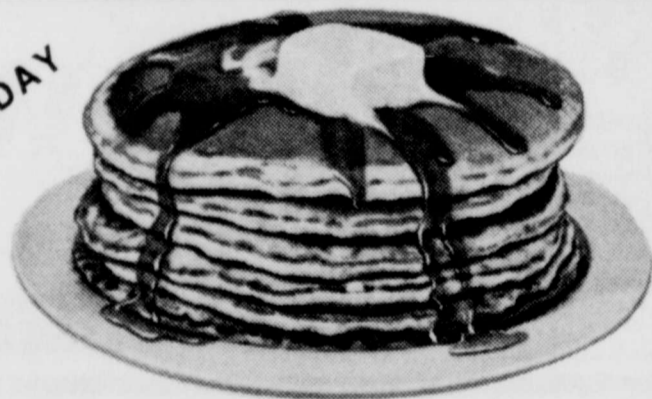
