

Bobby Cunningham Ranks With Best Runners In Texas, Nation

Local runner Bobby Cunningham has been ranked as one of the best runners in Texas and the nation.

Inside Running, a state running magazine, recently ranked Cunningham as one of the best male runners in the 40-49 year old category in the state of Texas. He was selected along with six others as being the best.

Following his performance in the Boston Marathon earlier this year, Cunningham was rated in the top 25 in the nation in the 40-49 year old division.

The following article about Bobby, was printed in a recent issue of "Inside Running" which is a magazine that focuses on the sport of running.

About 15 miles outside of Lubbock resides one of the premier marathon runners in Texas. The owner of a Phillips 66 Fertilizer Company in

Abernathy, Bobby Cunningham may not look like the top athlete he really is, but his peers will verify he will beat you hands-down at a 10K or a marathon most any day. He currently holds the best 10K time for a Texas master, and he easily ranks close to the top nationally at both the 10K and the marathon.

Cunningham's talent first surfaced back when he attended Littlefield High School and ran the mile. His freshman year he finished third in the State Championships, improved to second the following year, then won it in his junior year - his determination to constantly improve was evident even then. He won a track scholarship to East Texas State, but lost interest in running shortly thereafter and didn't get back into it until just three and one half years ago.

"I started in January 1979 to lose weight," Cunningham says. "I was all the way up to 192 pounds, and six weeks after I began a running

program I began to lose weight. I did get my weight down to 155, ran a race at Brownsville and did pretty well, then decided I could really do well if I worked at it."

In April, Cunningham traveled to Austin to run in the Capitol 10,000 and finished 55th overall in a field of 10,000. Such a performance put a light under the North Texan's feet, and he decided to run his first marathon at Clovis, New Mexico just eight months after his return to running.

I should have waited," Cunningham admits, despite an excellent 2:36.54 time. "The race sidelined me for six weeks with Achilles injuries, and this kept me drifting along pretty much until this year."

By "drifting," Cunningham means that he had to settle for winning his age group in just about every race he entered near Amarillo and West Texas. At club-races, IR correspondent Henry Galpin notes, Cunningham would come out and "warm up" by

winning the two milers, then go out and take the 10K's.

In 1981, Cunningham returned to the Capital 10,000 and was the fifth master in 33:52, the top five finishing within 11 seconds of each other. That meant that his 1982 age group win at the Capital 10,000 this past year was that much more thrilling.

"The 1982 race was a personal record in the 10K for me," Cunningham says. "My time was 32:32 and was probably the highlight of my running career because I finished 21st overall in a field estimated between 17 to 20,000."

But while Cunningham considers the 10K his best event, other people are probably more impressed with his dramatic marathon times. While Tom Mayfield's sub-2:30 is probably the best time for a master in the state, Cunningham has come close to the breaking point on several occasions. At Boston this year Cunningham recorded a 2:33.39 to put him among the top

dozen masters and place him 249th overall in the nationally prestigious race. "I couldn't have run a better marathon that day considering the heat," Cunningham recalls, "and I think I could have broken 2:30 if it wasn't so hot because I was running a 2:27 pace at 17 miles."

If Cunningham sets his focus on something, however, you can bet he'll keep at it until he gets it. He has run eight marathons, all but one of them under 2:40, and he feels the sub-2:30 is within reach. He also feels he can break 32 minutes in the 10K. His 5K personal best of 15:44 indicates he should be able to do just that.

"My biggest problem is still my diet," the small-boned Cunningham confesses.

Weight-watching is something that is a real effort for him. Far less so, it seems, than his training. The Abernathy runner puts in 60-75 miles per week, alternating his mileage between short runs of eight, medium runs of 12 and weekend long runs of from 16 to 22 miles.

Cunningham says he does little speedwork because he feels he hasn't lost much since high school ("I was able to do a 4:34 mile two years ago") and he is content to "do sprints between telephone poles" during his road workouts.

Cunningham still haunts Amarillo-area races, occasionally bringing along his son Shane, a 2:56 marathoner who attends Texas Tech, and his wife and other son, Scott, a college senior at San Marcos, who cheer them both on. Yet look to a certified course in Texas to see Cunningham really shine. The national recordbooks await.

Allsup's Marathon

The most recent race Bobby participated in was the 8th annual Allsup's Marathon held in Clovis, New Mexico. The race attracted over 350 runners from New Mexico, Texas, Colorado, Oklahoma, California, Louisiana and Washington, D.C.

The annual event was sponsored by Allsup's Convenience Store, Inc. and is certified by the Amateur Athletic Union.

In this marathon, Bobby placed first in the 40-49 year old division and 11th overall. He also set a record in the 40-49 year old division with a time of 35:04.7 in the 6.2 mile run. He beat the old record by almost 2 minutes.

Bobby's 19 year old son, Shane, placed 30th in the 16-29 year old division of the marathon with a time of 39:54.

Antelopes To Take On Tulia Hornets Friday

The Abernathy Antelopes will take on the Tulia Hornets at Tulia this Friday night at 7:30.

The Hornets are in about the same shape as the Antelopes. They have little depth and experience and a lot of young players. They only have two offensive and two defensive starters who returned from last year's squad, that ended up with a 4-6 record.

The Hornets who returned are Chris Sperry, Bill Borchardt and Mark Hill. Sperry, a 6-0, 170 pound senior starts at running back and defensive back. He started at quarterback earlier in the year, but suffered a hand injury and was moved to running back. Last year he finished fifth in the 100 meter dash at the state track meet.

Bill Borchardt, a 6-0, 170 pound senior, is back and returns from a season during which he earned all-district honors at center and defensive end. Mark Hill returns as a defensive back and the Hornet's punter.

Junior Chad Swinburn, took Sperry's place at quarterback. He is a 6-0, 150 pounder who is a good passer and capable runner.

Swinburn will be looking for one of several receivers. They are: 6-0, 190 pound senior, Mark Willis, 5-10, 150 pound sophomore Clifford Jackson, 5-11, 150 pound sophomore Ricky Rodriguez, 5-10, 155 pound senior Tracey Thompson and 6-2, 140 pound junior Jim Bob Gleason.

The Hornets have been using a multiple wing-T offense. Hornet Coach Mike Sullivan, in his first year at Tulia, reported that team speed is one of Tulia's strengths this season. The Lopes will have to watch running back Chris Sperry and 5-10, 165 pound fullback Rusty Hooper.

The Lopes should also look for a lot of passes Friday night as Coach Swinburn has worked on the Hornet's passing game considerably.

Tulia has a district record of 0-2 and an overall season record of 2-5.

TEXAS TECH will get their biggest test of the entire season this coming Saturday when they will play the Washington Huskies, the No. 1 ranked team in the country. Kickoff will be 3:30 p.m. (CST).

Texas Tech is 3-3 overall and 2-2 in conference play. Washington is 6-0 overall and 4-0 in their conference play.

Thus far, Washington has defeated UT-EL Paso 55-0, Arizona 23-13, Oregon 37-21, San Diego St. 46-25, California 50-7 and Oregon St. 34-17.

TIGHTER CONTROLS are being established on food stamps to prevent food stamp abuse, according to the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Recipients of food stamps in Texas will have to sign each book of food stamps as soon as it is received so no one else can use them. They will also be required to have their food stamp ID card with them and be prepared to show it to their grocer whenever buying food with food stamps.

In addition, the department has redesigned the food stamp ID cards using special serial numbers and a new code to verify that the authorized family representative or family member is the only user of the card. All food stamp recipients will have the new cards by Nov. 1.

It is good that the food stamp system is being examined to make sure that stamps are being used by the people they are issued to and that they will not be getting them unless they truly need them.

We know that the local businesses that accept food stamps will be on the look-out for violators of the food stamp program.

camping. The following is Shari's recipe, which she had made and taken to the Young Homemakers covered dish dinner.

CHICKEN ENCHILADA CASSEROLE

1 (3 lb.) fryer or 3 cans chunk chicken, 1 small can carnation evaporated milk, 1 can cream mushroom soup, 1 can cream chicken soup, 1 large onion, chopped, 1 (4 oz.) can chopped green chilies, 1 large package flour tortillas, 1 lb. Velveeta Cheese, and 1 large jar

pimientos.

Combine chicken, milk, soups, onions and chilies. Tear tortillas in pieces and line bottom of large greased casserole dish. Spread layer chicken topped with cheese. Continue to layer ending with tortillas. Pour pimientos over top cover and bake at 350 for 35 minutes, or until bubbly. Serves 8.

She is originally from Deming, New Mexico, and has lived in Abernathy for 7 years.

Since Pat enjoys baking breads, she has given us one of her favorite bread recipes.

CINNAMON SWIRL BREAD

3 c. Wheat Chex Cereal, 1 1/4 c. milk, 3/4 c. water, 1/2 c. vegetable shortening, 6-7 c. all-purpose flour, 2 packages active dry yeast, 1/2 c. sugar, 2 t. salt, 1 t. ground cinnamon, 2 eggs, 1 1/2 c. raisins, Cinnamon-sugar (1/2 c. sugar 2 t. ground cinnamon), 2 t. butter or margarine melted.

In large saucepan heat cereal, milk, water and shortening to very warm (120-130 degrees) shortening does not need to melt.

Meanwhile, in large mixer, combine 2 cups flour, yeast, sugar, salt and cinnamon. Add liquids.

Place in greased bowl. Turn to grease top. Cover, let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled, about 1 hour.

Knead 1 minute Cover let rise until almost double, 45-60 minutes. Brush tops with melted butter. Sprinkle each with 1 teaspoon reserved cinnamon-sugar. Bake in preheated 375 degrees oven 35-40 minutes or until done. Remove from pans immediately. Cool.

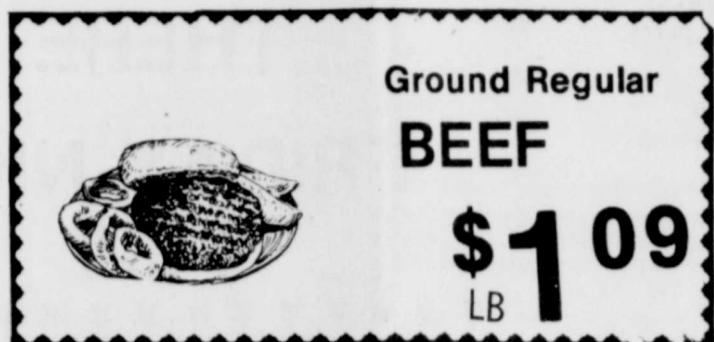

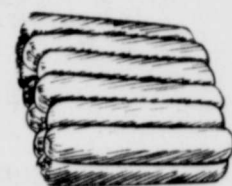

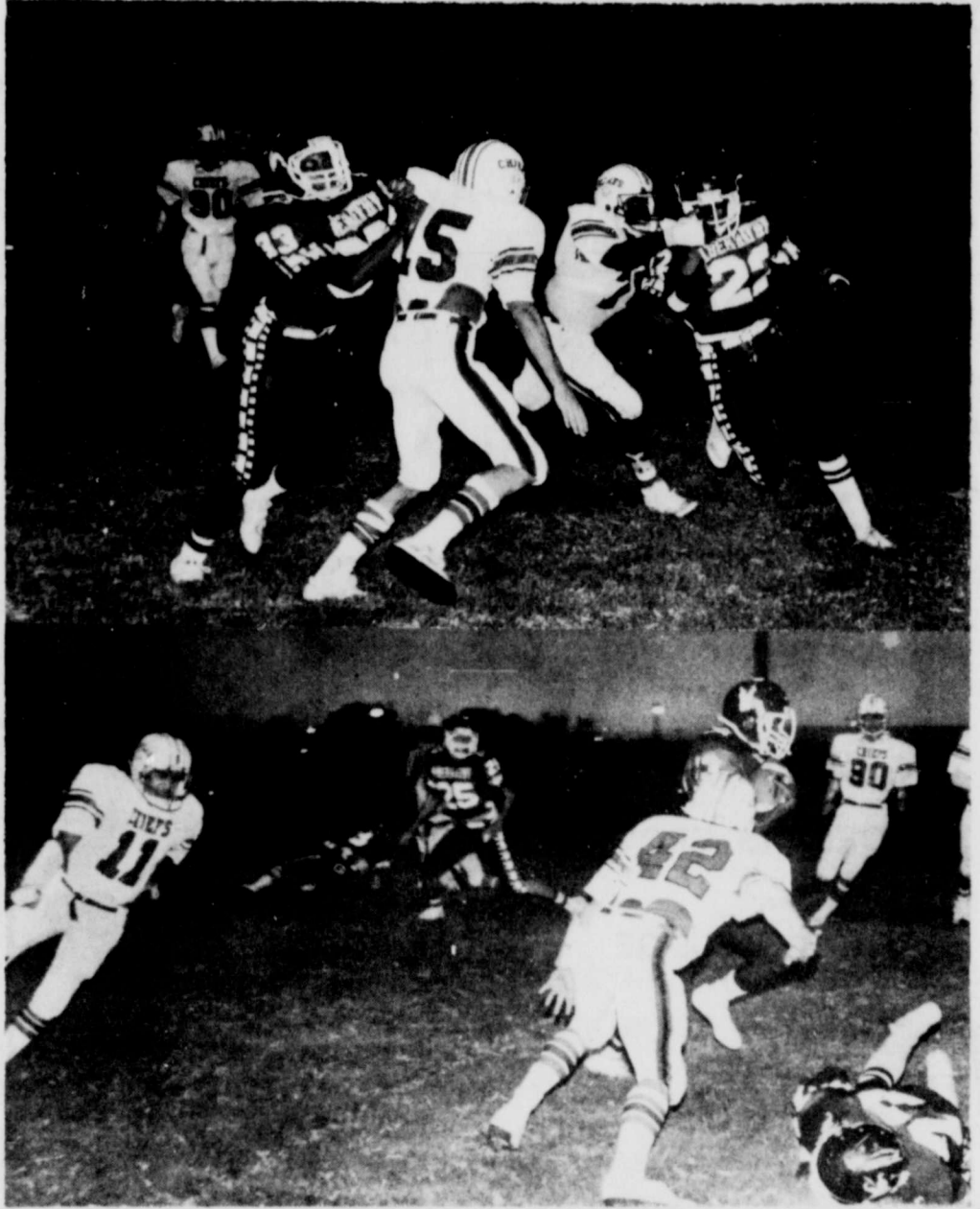
score was Friona 20, Abernathy 6. The Lopes were not able to produce any more points and the game ended.

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

West Texas area was alcohol abuse because there are more people who consume various forms of alcohol than abuse drugs.

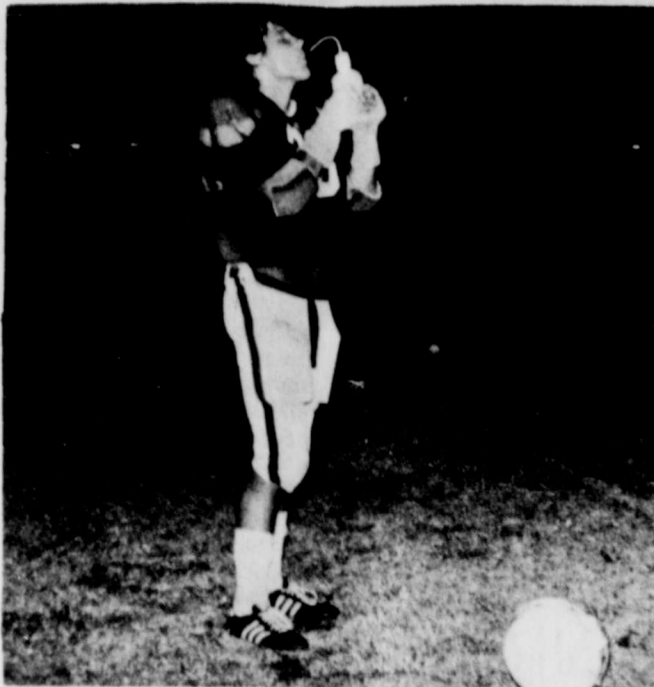
Both alcohol and drugs continue to infiltrate the young people of this area.

DECA Programs Distributive Education is a program which provides

instruction in marketing and pre-employment skills. Directed by Craig Garner, Second year students are employed in fields of retail sales. First year students enroll in Pre-Lab and receive instruction in job-related skills.

A PACKAGING PROCEDURE known as "aseptic processing" -- which has just recently been given approval for use by the federal government in the United States -- allows consumers to store perishable products for months without the use of refrigeration.

The process is not new, but has been used in more than 50 other countries for a decade or more, reports Beverly A. Rhoades, consumer information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The process allows milk, fruit juices and other liquids that are perishable in nature to be sterilized and stored in bacteria-free protective containers, after being heated to ultra-high temperatures for a short time and the moving under bacteria-free conditions to the package to be sealed. The liquids then may be stored at room temperature in the grocery store or at home.

A NEW NATIONAL SAFETY campaign keying to the use of automobile safety belts and child auto safety has just been initiated and will continue until mid-1983 under the name, "Get It Together." The Extension Service is cosponsoring the educational effort in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the National Extension Homemakers Council, Inc., and the nation's Department of Transportation, according to Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, health education specialist with the Extension Service. Goal of the educational program is to help reduce death and disability statistics from automobile accidents. Many people do not believe they will be involved in an automobile accident, yet national statistics show that almost everyone can expect to be in a car crash every 10 years, she adds. For one of every 20 persons, the crash will be serious.



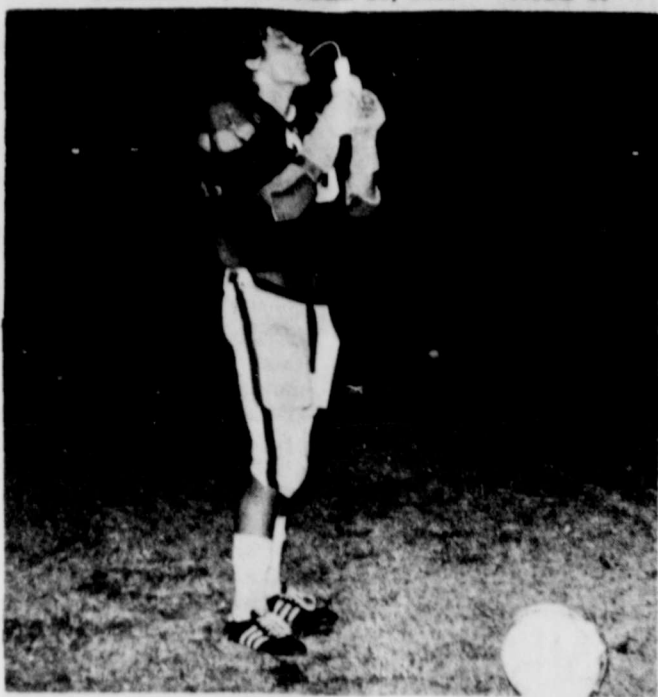

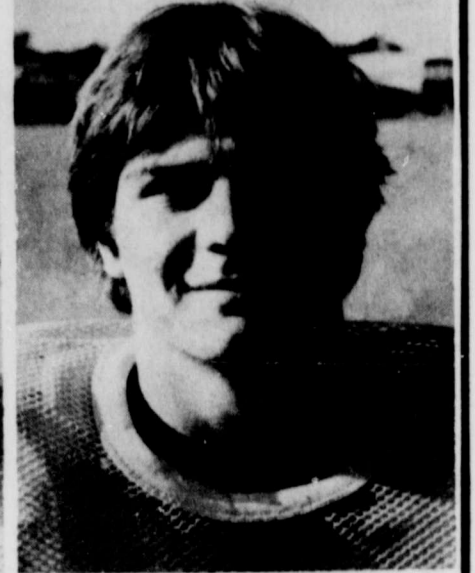
