## Nation's 22nd Census Of Agriculture Begins This Week

The 1982 Census of Agriculture gets underway this week with the mailing of report forms to farmers and ranchers in the 50 states, the Commerce Department's Census Bureau announced today.

Farmers and ranchers are being asked to report on their agricultural operations during 1982 and to return the form by Feb. 15, 1983. The 1982 census is the nation's 22nd agriculture census in a series that started in 1840.

For the first time in a mail agriculture census report forms will reflect regional cropping patterns to make reporting easier.

Farm and ranch operators will be asked to report the acreage in their operations, form of ownership, type of organization, location of the place, use made of the land, and when their operations began. Other questions will cover livestock and poultry inventories and sales, amount of government crop loans, crop acreage, amount harvest-

ed, and value of crops and livestock sold.

About 20 percent of farmers and ranchers will receive a form with an additional page which has inquiries on: selected production expenses, market value of land and buildings, machinery and equipment inventory and value, interest expenses and expenditures for petroleum and other energy sources.

Assistance in completing census forms is available locally from offices of the Cooperative Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, Vocational Agriculture Teachers, Production Credit Associations, and Farmers Home Administration.

A file copy of the report form is provided which operators can complete and keep for their own records.

A time extension can be granted farmers who request it. Census results will be published for each state, and

the nation. The first preliminary data will be released beginning in the fall of 1983.

The law which requires farmers and ranchers to report in the census also protects the privacy of their reports. Census report forms are confidential by law and they may be seen only by sworn Census employees and may be used only for statistical purposes. Even other government agencies cannot obtain or use the individual reports, and copies retained by the farmers are immune from the legal process.

Each report form will have a census file number (CFN) printed on the address label. If a report is not received for each file number, the Census Bureau will send out follow-up letters to all who have not responded.

Farmers and ranchers who have not received a form should request one from the Bureau of the Census, 1201 East 10th Street, Jeffersonville, Indiana 47133.

The Lady Lopes will play their first game at 7 p.m. Thursday against the New Deal fems. If they win this game, they will play the winner of the Floydada-Ralls game.

The teams to look out for in the girl's division are Hale Center and Ralls. The Ralls girls sport a winning record of 14-1, the one loss was handed to them by the Lady Lopes earlier this year. Hale Center has defeated the Lope fems twice this year, once by 3 points and the other time by 2 points. The Lope fems will

## Snow Storms Bring A Foot Of Snow, Cold Temperatures To Area

before last Friday evening. Abernathy had already received approximately 4 inches of snow, and most of this snow was still on the ground, when the first major storm of 1983 hit Abernathy and the area.

The snow storm hit new year's eve and dropped almost 9 more inches. Abernathy received 1/2 inch of snow Friday evening, 5 inches Saturday and 3 inches early Sunday. Abernathy received just a trace of

snow early Monday morning.

Snowfall for the past 1 1/2 weeks exceeded 13 inches and amounted to almost 1 inch of moisture. This moisture is welcomed by the farmers who have planted wheat as it will help give wheat a good boost in the early stages of growth. But too much snow, with the several nights of almost zero temperatures, could be detrimental to the wheat.

Total moisture for 1982 amounted to 21.78 inches. In 1981, this area received 19.32 inches of moisture. Abernathy has already received more snow and moisture, the 1st and 2nd of January, than this area usually gets the entire month of January.

Temperatures are expected to get warmer by the end of this week and melt the remaining snow, some of which has been on the ground for 2 weeks.

## Antelopes Win Second In Consolation Bracket At Caprock Tourney

The Abernathy Antelopes lost to highly rated San Angelo Central, a 5-A high school team, to take second place in the consolation bracket at the Caprock Tourney in Lubbock last week.

San Angelo Central is one of the toughest 5-A teams in the state. Earlier this year, San Angelo won first place in a 32 team tourney at San Antonio, but the Lopes played them a competitive game losing 57-66.

The Antelopes were put in the consolation bracket after having lost to Lubbock High by the slim margin of 53-57. This was a great effort for the Lopes as Lubbock High is one of the highest rated 5-A teams in this region.

It was a competitive first quarter for both teams as the Lopes scored 14 points to Lubbock's 16 to trail by 2 points going into the second quarter.

Lubbock High rallied in the second quarter to score 17 points, while shutting down the Lopes to 7 points, and Lubbock led comfortably 33-21 at halftime.

Being down by 12 points did not discourage the Lopes. They came back

to out-score Lubbock 15-13 in the third quarter and trailed by 10, 36-46 going into the fourth quarter.

The Lopes made the fourth quarter their best of the evening as they scored 17 points to Lubbock High's 11 to draw within 4 points of the lead. But time ran out on the Lopes and they were defeated by the slim margin of 53-57.

Larry Perkins was the leading scorer for the Lopes with 16 points followed by Sammy Galloway with 12.

In the second round, the Lopes faced another Lubbock team, Lubbock Christian High School. The Lopes performed well to defeat this team 64-60.

The Lopes obtained the lead in the first quarter 16-12. LCHS out-scored the Lopes in the second quarter 14-12 to draw within 2 points of the Lopes at halftime 26-28.

With only a 2 point lead, the Lopes went to work in the third quarter to increase their lead by 3 more points. They scored 18 points to LCHS's 15 to lead 46-41 going into the fourth quarter.

The Lopes added 18 more points in the final period to secure a 64-60 victory over Lubbock Christian High School.

Again the Lopes competed with a great team. Lubbock Christian High School is no push-over as they have been rated as one of the top teams in the region by the Texas Association of Private Schools.

Leading scorers for the Lopes in this game were Ed Teal with 16 points, Sammy Galloway 15 and Larry Perkins 13.

The Lopes advanced to the third round where they met 5-A Wichita Falls. There was not a poor team in the entire tourney.

The Lopes defeated Wichita Falls 72-65.

The Lopes exploded early in the game. They scored 23 points in the first quarter to Wichita Falls' 15. The Lopes rallied again in the second quarter scoring another incredible 23 points while shutting Wichita Falls down to only 6 points, and the Lopes led 46-21 at halftime.

The Lopes eased-up on Wichita

Falls in the second half allowing them to score 21 points in the third quarter and 23 in the fourth quarter, while the Lopes scored 9 and 17 to hold their lead, and the Lopes won by 7 points, 72-65.

Scoring in double figures were Larry Perkins and Allen Lester, with 16 points each, followed by Ed Teal with 15 and Chester Cooper 13.

The Lopes advanced to the fourth round, which was the finals of the

consolation bracket against San Angelo Central. The Lopes lost 57-66 and took second place in the consolation tourney.

The Lopes held the lead most of the game. They led 15-14 in the first quarter, fell behind by 1 point, 26-27 at halftime, but re-captured the lead in the third quarter by scoring 14 points to San Angelo's 11. The Lopes led 40-38 going into the fourth quarter.

San Angelo had a big fourth quarter

scoring 28 points while allowing the Lopes 17 to win 66-57. San Angelo improved their record to 11-5 on the year while Abernathy now has an 11-6 record.

Larry Perkins was the leading scorer for the Lopes with 18 and Ed Teal was second highest with 13 points.

There were 16 teams in the Caprock Tourney, most of which are larger schools than Abernathy. Larry Perkins was selected All-Tourney.

## Lady Lopes Win Third At Caprock Tourney

The Abernathy Lady Lopes competed against some tough teams at the Caprock Tourney last week, but prevailed to win third in the tourney.

The Lady Lopes picked on 5-A Lubbock Coronado in the first round of the tourney. There were eight teams entered in the girls tourney.

The Lope fems took the lead in the first quarter 13-11. They extended their

lead in the second quarter by scoring 21 convincing points, while holding Lubbock Coronado to only 14, to lead 34-25 at halftime.

The Lope fems continued to dominate the game in the second half. They increased their lead in the third quarter by scoring 11 points and led 45-35 going into the fourth quarter.

The Coronado fems struggled the entire game to catch the Lady Lopes. They

too soon for the Lopes to make their come-back and they lost 43-50.

ReGina Powell was the leading scorer with 12.

The Lady Lopes challenged Lubbock Monterey in the third round to play for third place. It was the Lope fems second 5-A team to play in the tourney and they knew they could more than compete on that level.


The Lope fems got off to a good start out-scoring Monterey 15-10 in the first quarter. They continued to apply pressure on defense in the second quarter allowing Monterey to score only 10 points, while they added another 18, to lead 33-20 at halftime.

The Lady Lopes were comfortable with their 13 point lead going into the third quarter. Monterey rallied in this quarter to score a high of 20 points while holding the Lope fems to 14. But the Lopes were still ahead 47-40 going into the fourth quarter.

The Lope fems added another 14 points in the fourth quarter to win third place, 61-51 over Monterey.

Vicky McKenzie, who was selected All-Tourney, scored the most points in this game with 20. ReGina Powell was the second highest scorer with 12.

The Lady Lopes have not lost a game to a 4-A or 5-A team this year.





### IRS Tax Help Available

"Although there is a new number to dial - 1-800-424-1040 - the service will be the same as in prior years," said Carlos Rojas, Director's Representative for the Internal Revenue Service Lubbock office in announcing the taxpayer assistance program for the 1983 filing period. "Taxpayers will be able to get answers to their tax questions, order forms and publications, get information regarding their accounts, and find out about the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site nearest their home from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each Monday through Friday."

Rojas noted that, while the Lubbock office will not provide walk-in tax assistance, IRS will be working with community agencies this filing period to conduct a series of group self-help sessions. He also mentioned that IRS has produced two films - one on the short forms, Form 1040A and Form 1040EZ, and one on Form 1040 and Schedule A&B - which are available to schools and civic groups beginning in February.

The Lubbock office will maintain a limited selection of forms and publications, but Rojas encourages taxpayers to use the order form contained within the tax package received in the mail. Certain post offices and banks will stock individual returns and local libraries will have a file of reproducible forms as well.

"Our VITA volunteers are attending training sessions right now and will be ready to do basic return preparations for low-income, handicapped, elderly and otherwise disadvantaged taxpayers by mid-January," said Rojas. Taxpayers may pick up a list of VITA sites and their schedules at the Lubbock office or may order a schedule



**TWO NEW REGULATIONS** have resulted from the recent nationwide drug product tampering, which claimed seven lives in the Chicago area, emphasizes Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. As of early November 1982, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) began requiring tamper-resistant packaging for certain over-the-counter

human drug and cosmetic products, and for contact lens solution and tablets. Additionally, each retail package must bear a prominent statement to alert consumers to the specific tamper-resistant features of the package. Purpose of these regulations is to assure package integrity and product security.

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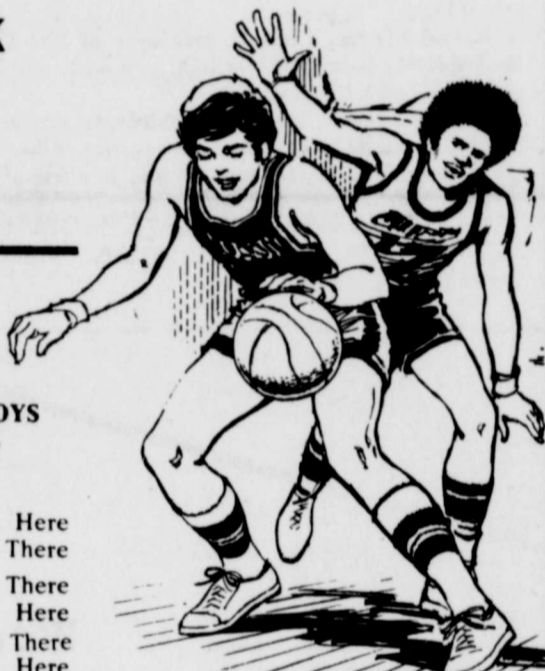

**Corporation To Make Funds Available To Small Businesses**

Small business in a 25 county area of West Texas will be eligible to receive financial help through the newly created Texas Panhandle Regional Development Corporation, U.S. Senator John Tower (R-Texas) announced today.

The corporation has been certified by the Small Business Administration and will be authorized to lend up to \$500,000 per qualifying business for fixed assets. To qualify, the borrower must provide 10 percent of the investment package and obtain financing for another 50 percent from a commercial lending institution. The remaining

40 percent would come from the Regional Development Corporation, Tower explained. The Regional Development Corporation portion of the loan can be for up to 25 years, although the commercial loan must be for at least half the period of that loan.

"Businesses should find it easier to get the required loan from a commercial institution because of the availability of long-term financing from the Regional Development Corporation," Tower said.

"This Small Business Administration program is particularly valuable because it establishes a partner-

ship between private and public resources. It will spur economic development in the Panhandle area, and is an excellent example of federal funds being used in the most effective manner possible," Tower concluded.

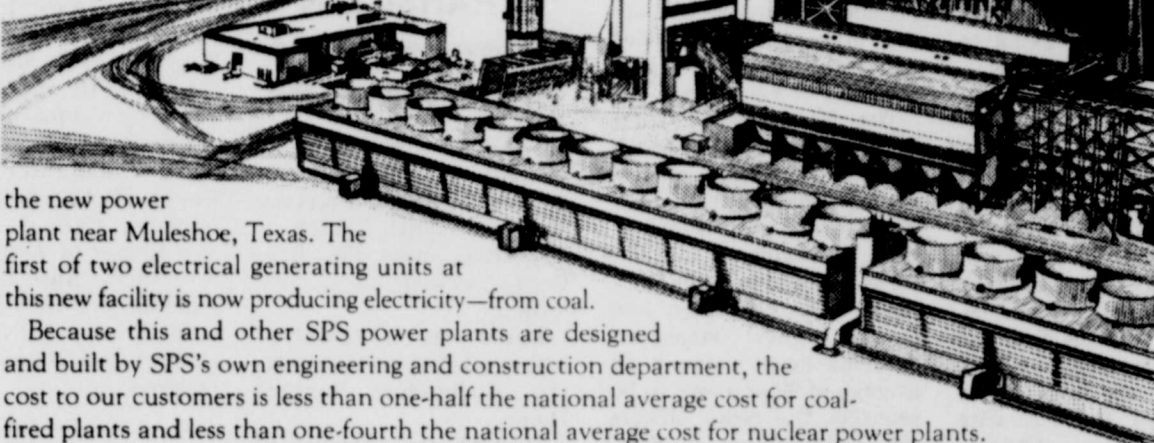

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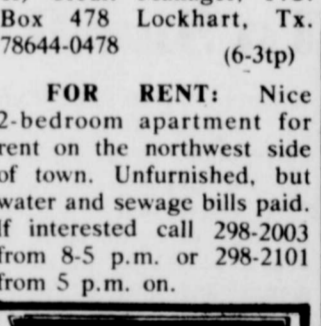

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If you've reached the point where you need bifocal corrective lenses to see well at a distance as well as close up, you don't have to opt for bifocal lenses.

If you've been wearing contact lenses and don't want to lose the comfortable feeling or natural look of your face, you can have separate contact lenses made for each eye. One will correct for distance vision, the other for near vision.

This may seem an unusual solution to bifocal needs, but it works. When you're looking at something, both eyes will see what you're looking at. But the eye that sees the object sharp and clear will dominate. This means that your brain will see a sharp and clear image.

And even though one eye will only transmit a blurred image, you won't be aware of it. You will, if you put one hand over the eye that has the lens for that kind of vision (farsighted or nearsighted, depending on where you're looking). Then the only image you get will be a blurred one. Otherwise you'll see clearly at all times and never be aware of the difference.

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
