City To Charter Senior Citizens Center

The Abernathy City Council met Monday night at 7:30 p.m. for their March meeting. All members were present, excluding Charles Nelson and Harold Stillwell, who were not able to

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Pete Thompson. The minutes of the February 14 meeting and the emergency meeting March 9 were reviewed and approved.

Aerial Spraying Service

The first item on the agenda was to look at two bids sent to the Council concerning aerial spraying service for Abernathy during the summer months.

Two spraying bids were given, one by Southwest Aerial Services, Inc. of Plainview and one by the local spraying company, Rawlings and Associates, Inc.

Bob Rawlings, of Rawlings and Associates, and James Horton, a representative from Southwest Aerial, were present to explain their bids. The bids were as follows:

Rawlings - application price per acre .46 1/2 cents; insecticide price per acre (no price given). Southwest application price .48 cents per acre; insecticide price .38 cents; total price

per acre .86 cents. After a discussion period, the bid given by Southwest was accepted for .86 cents per acre per spraying.

The Council went with Southwest because they bid what the specifications required. Rawlings did not submit a bid for insecticides or a total bid. The Council explained that they prefer to contract with local people, but that it would not be fair to Southwest, or any other company, not to take their bid when it was given to meet City specs outlined when bids

were being taken. Southwest has done the spraying for the City the past several summers.

Monthly Aerial Spraying Charge

The monthly aerial spraying charge was increased to \$1.25 last year. During the six months in which mosquito spraying takes place, \$1.25 extra is charged to each City meter monthly to pay for the spraying.

Last year the City was sprayed seven times for mosquitoes. Each application was on a basis of 1,100 City acres at a cost of .84 cents per acre. Last year the City spent \$6,468 on spraying but brought in \$7,128 from the \$1.25 fee charged to each household. Therefore, the City netted \$660 last year after mosquito season.

Out-Of-City Water Extension

The Council considered at a request made by Jesse Knight to tap onto the City water supply. Knight wants the City water transported to 3 1/2 acres of land he purchased 1 1/2 miles north

Knight would be responsible for all expenses in having a water line installed to this new location.

Presently, the fartherest taps connected to the City water system extend one mile out of town. The tap requested would be a distance of 1 1/2 miles from town.

The Council decided they would need more time to think about this water request due to other complications they can foresee taking place if a City water tap is allowed at this distance from the City.

City To Charter Center

The City Council decided to be the chartering organization of the Abernathy Senior Citizens Center. The Council authorized City Manager Rod Ellis to apply for grant funds from the SPAG aging program, of which \$225 thousand have been made available by the government for senior citizens projects. If acquired, the funds will be

used for establishing a senior citizens center in Abernathy.

City Takes Ownership Of Property The Abernathy Chamber of Commerce started the Abernathy Industrial

Foundation in 1968. The Industrial Foundation was granted the property that is now know as Chamber of Commerce Park, located on Avenue D on the north side of town.

The Chamber recently made a request that the City accept ownership of this property so that it could be properly maintained and the Chamber would no longer have to pay taxes on it. The Council agreed to take the City by a Chamber representative.

Ballot Serial Numbers Assigned

Ballot serial numbers were assigned for the up-coming City election April Ballots 1-50 will be used for absentee voting and ballots 51-750 will be used for the election April 2.

Extended Area Service

Extended area service to Lubbock was discussed. The Council passed a resolution asking the phone company to make a feasibility study as to providing extended service between service would allow locals to call Lubbock without it being long distance. The meeting adjourned.



"Probably not much" sums up the answers from High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program officials when asked what effect 1983 government acreage reduction programs will have on the size or cost of the 1983 weevil control effort.

"In fact," says Ed Dean, Field Service Director for program sponsor Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., "instead of a reduction we are expecting and gearing up for a 1983 program roughly twice the size of the one carried out in 1983."

In 1982, even with cotton acreage reduced by weather factors, an aggregate of about 450,000 weevil-infested acres required spraying at a cost of about \$1 million.

Planted acreage will be cut to about the same or even a greater percentage below normal by government programs in 1983 if farmers go along with the acreage reduction and payment-in-kind programs to the extent now anticipated, Dean admits. "But every other factor influencing weevil numbers points to 1983 infestations heavier and more widespread than those experienced last year."

Indications that weevil infestation in 1983 may rival the all-time highs seen in 1977 include subnormal control efforts during the 1982 growing season in counties adjoining the PCG program control zone, plus winter snows that provided overwintering weevils with the moisture and insulation necessary to an extremely high winter survival rate both in and out of the control zone

"Our inspections of ground trash from traditional hibernation sites are turning up abnormally high numbers of weevils, which substantiates our projections that weevil emergence this Spring will be above anything seen in recent years," Dean continues. "And if early season growing conditions are right, that sets the stage for explosive population growth and massive migration."

The PCG program control zone last year covered all or parts of 16 counties, including Andrews, Borden, Briscoe, Crosby, Dawson, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hall, Howard, Kent, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Motley and Scurry.

The PCG program, initiated in 1964, is jointly financed by High Plains producers, the U.S. and Texas Departments of Agriculture. Its 19 years of success in preventing the establishment of weevils in the vast cotton fields between the Caprock and Eastern New Mexico is widely hailed as an unparalleled example of long-term agricultural insect control.

WEATHER FUNDS REQUESTED: National Cotton Council President Ger-

ald B. Brewer asked the House Science and Technology subcommittee to continue funding the Agricultural Weather Program after the Administration's budget deleted it. The action was requested by Brewer in a letter to Subcommittee Chairman James H. Scheuer (D-N.Y.).
