Callahan County Judge, A.E. Dyer, Jr. states that he or the Commissioners have had no further word from Mr. Smith since he undertook the task of making a survey, to see if the hospital could be run at a profit last week.

There is still the prospect of the Texas Medical Assistants Inc. also, who say that they would like further time to look over the contract. The next meeting of the Commissioners and Hospital Board has been set for the second Monday in December, and nothing further will be decided until then; unless an earlier meeting is called.

Cross Plains Bank Robbed Early Tuesday Morning

CROSS PLAINS — At approximately 10:15 a.m. Tuesday, November 19, two 19 year old men, holding the bank officials at gun point robbed the Citizens State Bank of Cross Plains. Danny Lee Wise,

of Brownwood and Doyle W. Howe, from the state of Oregon, used a twelve gauge shot gun to hold off officials while they escaped with a substantial amount of the banks money, making their

get-away in a reportedly stolen, 1971 red mustang.

It was business as usual before the two men walked in the bank. Several eye-witnesses saw the men make their get-away, and no one was hurt. Callahan County Sheriff, Grayson Miller reported that his phones and radios had been busy all morning with people calling in information, descriptions of the men and the car.

The two men were captured about 10:30 a.m. only one quarter of a mile west of the Rowden Store, all of the money was recovered.

Their captors were Lt. Ronald Barrett and E.G. Allen, two Texas Department of Public Safety License, Weight and Measure men from Lubbock and Texas Highway Patrolman Mack Kniffen from Clyde. These men just happened to be in the area in route to a funeral.

At this time the two armed robbers are being held in the Callahan County Jail in Baird, in lieu of \$25,000 bond

Hunting Safety Urged As Deer

Some millions of American males—along with more than a few females—are taking to the woods this month, firearms in hand, in search of live targets. These are hunters among us.

The Texas Medical Association has a note of caution for those who are planning a fall safari into the fields and woods in search of deer and other game.

Know what you're firing at before you pull the trigger.

The hunter who blazes away rapidly at everything that moves is a highly dangerous animal. His quarry might well be another hunter.

The wise Texas hunter will be wearing a "hunter orange" vest or, at the very least, a cap made in this glowing bright fluorescent color. The color blind game such as deer, when it distinguishes motion, when it distinguishes motion, sound, or scent.

Each year several hunters return from fall outings via hearse. Many others return with a load of bird sotor a rifle bullet to be dug out by a doctor. Behind almost every hunting accident is one cause:

carelessness. Never cross over or through a fence or climb a tree with a loaded gun. It might fall and discharge. Don't shoot at a hard, flat surface. Glancing bullets can carry long distances. Even a small bore rifle has considerable range. Know where your bullet will stop before pulling the trigger.

Keep guns away from children. Never leave a weapon unattended without unloading it. Store guns and ammunition beyond the reach of youngsters, preferably under lock and key. Always carry a gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle if you stumble. Keep the safety catch on until ready to shoot. Be sure the barrel is clear of mud, snow or other obstructions. A clogged barrel may burst.

Leave your liquor bottle at camp, and wait until you're through with the day's hunting and the guns are unloaded to take the first drink. And don't overdo it. You want to have a clear head for the next day's hunt.

Good luck on a successful—and safe—hunt.

Regardless of the word that has been going around lately, Putnam is still working on a permanent water system. It was only a few months ago that everyone here was crying for water and seemed to be ready to do anything to get it. Everyone who signed, either knowingly or unknowingly, the petition that was circulated recently has put this project in jeopardy.

We have received rain and our tanks are full, and we felt that this gave us time to work on some type of permanent situation. The City Council members met with the City of Baird, who agreed to furnish water to Putnam. We would have to finance the laying of the line, which would involve getting our own loan, or in other words, vote a bond for a water line.

We were advised by Bob Gallagher, of the West Central Council of Governments, to wait until he contacted Austin before we withdrew from the Eastland project. As soon as some definite information was

received, the City Council planned to call a meeting to let everyone know the status of the project. John D. Isenhower, Mayor, was not contacted prior to getting signature on the petition or else a meeting would have been called anyway.

The State of Texas has laws and regulations which apply to the City of Putnam, and when enforced, will be so expensive that we will have trouble maintaining a water system at the present rates. The \$100 deposit which is still in the Corporation fund, should be considered a very small temporary loan toward the future of Putnam. Chances are if the money is refunded now and Putnam somehow gets water it will cost more than \$100 to get back in.

It would seem that anyone who believes a permanent water source is needed would be willing to do their part by not withdrawing at such a critical time.



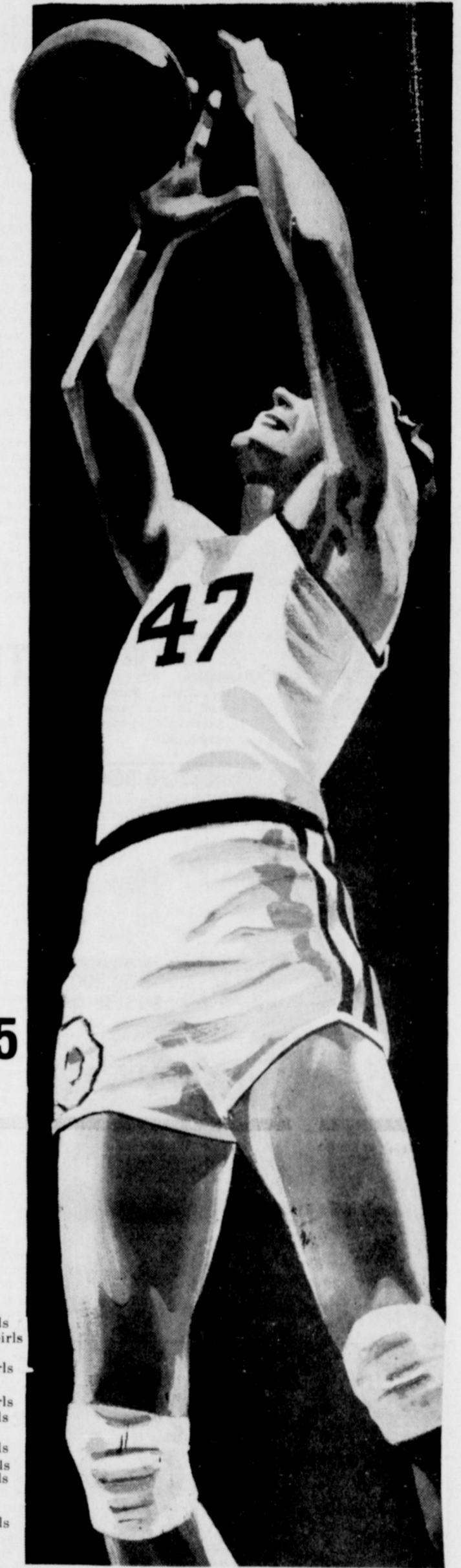
