Buckle Up Week May 18-25

A majority of Texans now fasten their safety belts, according to recent surveys by the Texas Transportation Institute.

If you're one of the minority, the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts hopes you'll give your belt a try during Texas Buckle-Up Week May 18-25.

Governor Bill Clements has issued a proclamation, and many Texas towns will be conducting safety belt awareness campaigns. The coalition will put special emphasis on the proper use of car seats for small children and on belt use by high school and college students.

"The week before Memorial Day is always a good time to promote safety belt use," said George R. Gustafson, president of Texas Safety Association and a spokesperson for the coalition. "The holiday weekend marks the beginning of the 101 Driving Days of Summer, when Texans hit the road in numbers and the risk of a wreck goes up. Many of our young people graduate and travel to new schools or jobs

during this time. "This year, with the speed limit going up to 65 miles per hour on rural interstates, the risk will be even higher," Gustafson added. "We'll have to work hard to keep up the good results we had in the first year under the safety belt law, when front-seat fatalities in cars and pickups decreased by seven percent. And the 1987 survey by Texas Transportation Institute shows Texans are in need of a safety belt reminder."

In 1986, Texas had one of the highest belt-use rates in the nation, with 66% of drivers buckling up in cars and light trucks. The latest survey, conducted in January, indicated usage had dropped to 59%

"That's still high, when you consider that the average for states with safety belt laws is 45%," said Gustafson. "But Hawaii had a rate of 68% for drivers and passengers last year, and North Carolina passed us this spring with rates above 70%. Pride demands that we put Texas back on top."

Annual Field Day May 27 & 28

May 27 and 28 are "Red Letter" days for people interested in research with wheat varieties and integrated production practices involving cattle. The annual field day at The Texas A&M University Research Field at Etter will be shifted from late August to May 27. Dr. G.B. Thompson, Director of Research for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Amarillo, said the change will enable people to see expanded wheat research started in 1986. The event will start at the station headquarters at 12 noon with a dutch lunch.

The regularly scheduled wheat field day at the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland will start at 1:00 p.m. on May 28, according to Dr. B.A. Stewart, Research Director at the facility. Both dryland and irrigated small grain nurseries will be featured at Bushland. Dr. Kenneth Porter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Wheat Breeder says several new varieties and hybrids are being evaluated. He also points out that tolerance of wheat varieties to the late freeze will be easy to observe.

Research with livestock grazing, limited tillage, wheat diseases, and control of Russian aphid will be discussed on the tours at both locations. Drs. Stewart and Thompson invite everyone in the area to the two field days. "New varieties and integrated production methods including livestock that are being developed will help farmers to maintain profits during tough economic times," they said.

The field days are sponsored by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, TAEX, North Plains Water District, and Texas Wheat Producers Association.

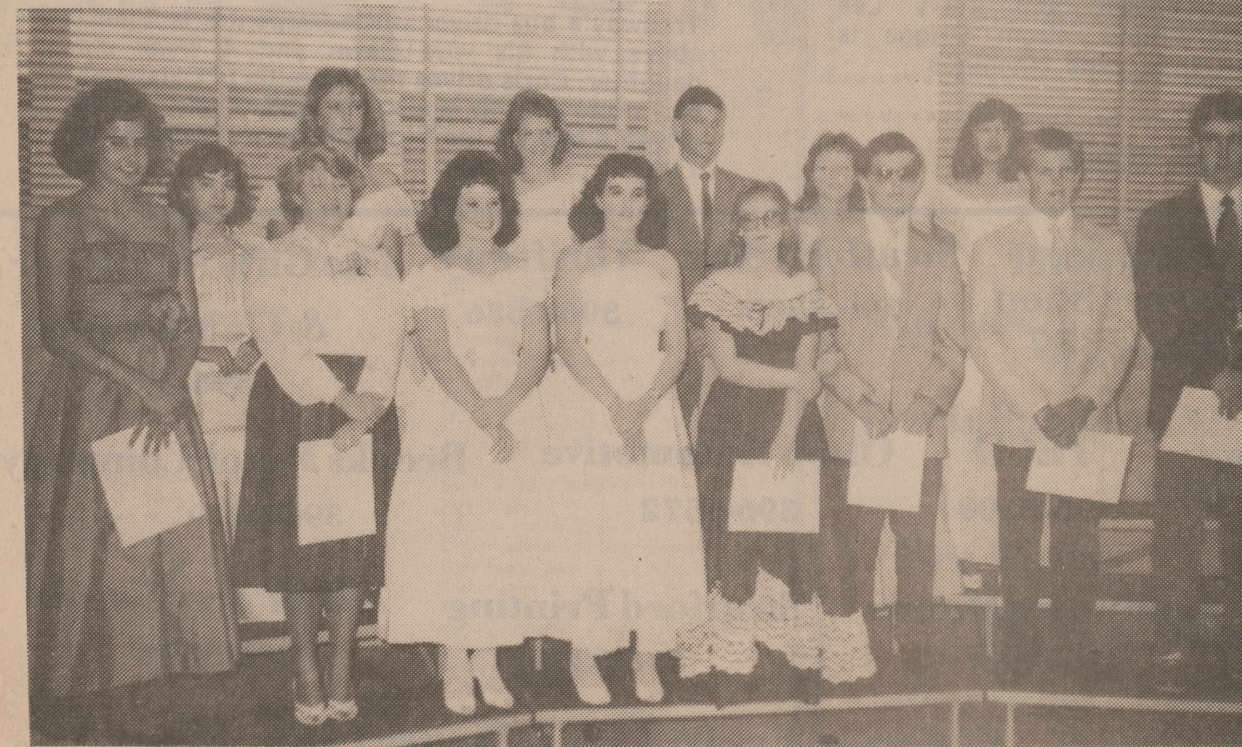

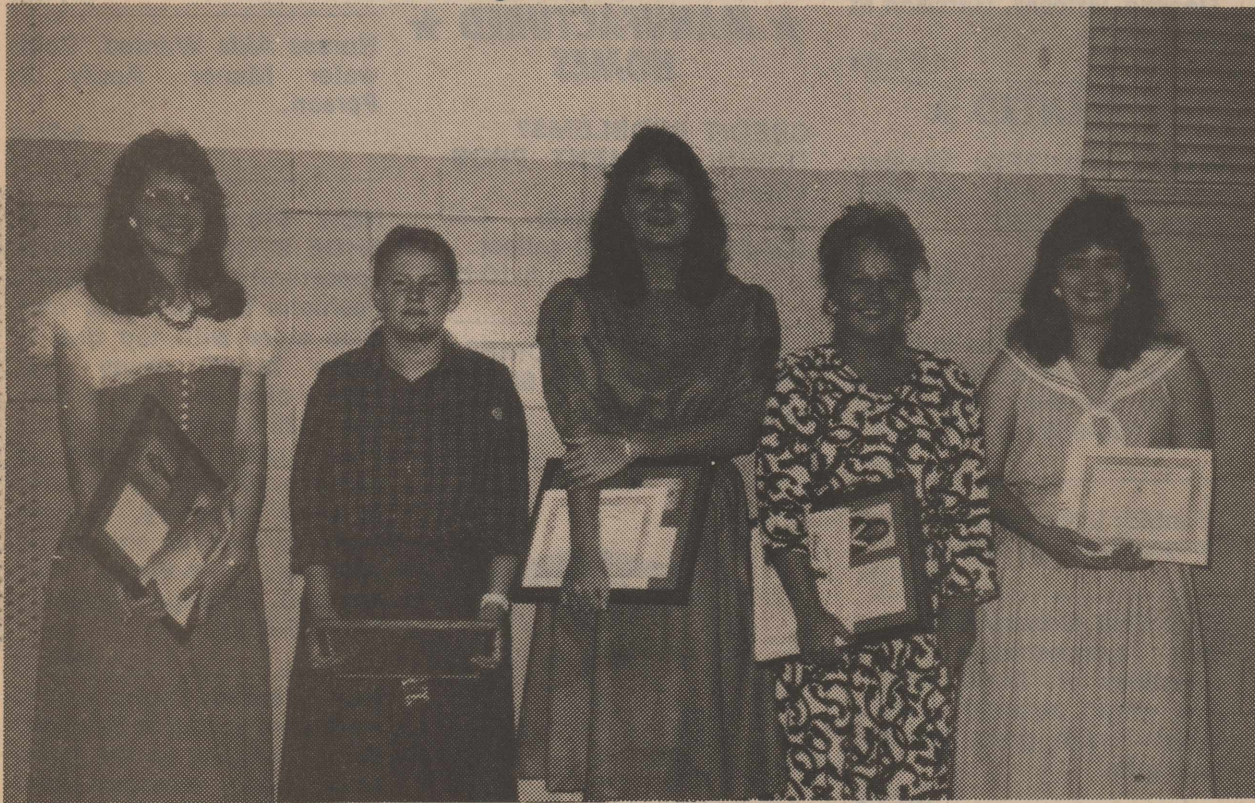
Blake Competes In State UIL

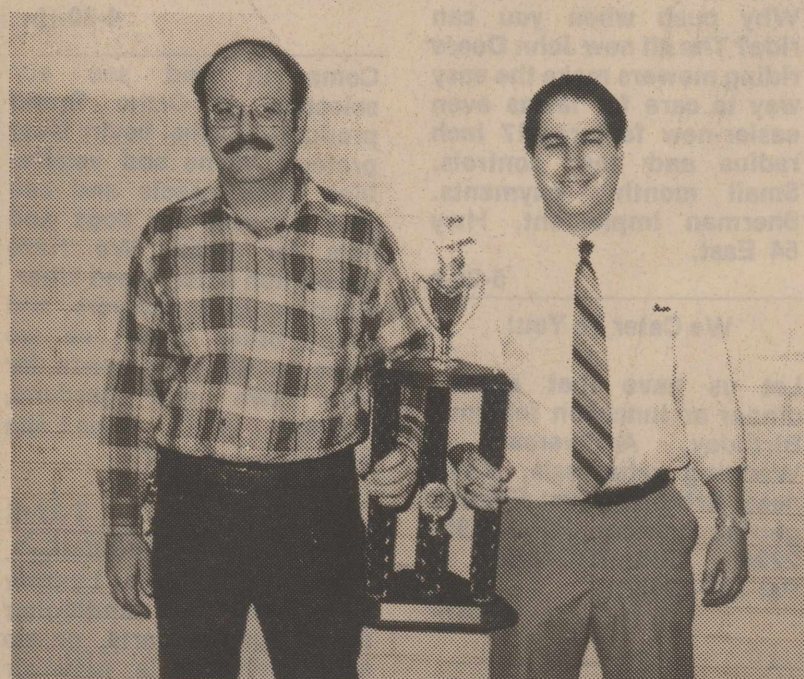

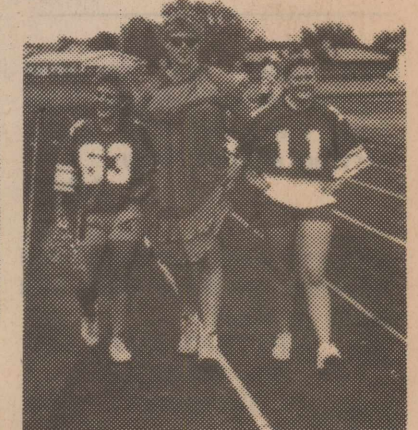

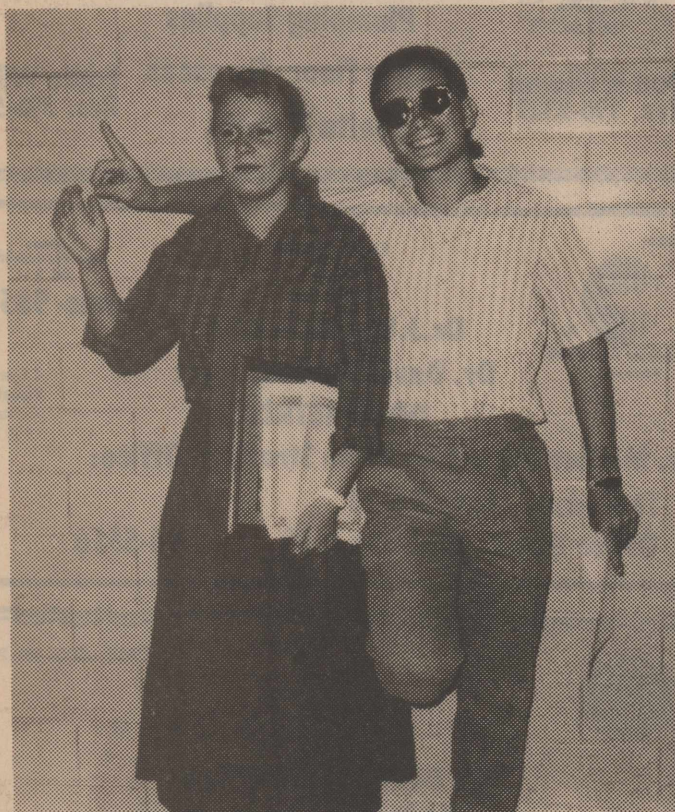

Cotton feels comfortable against the skin on hot, humid summer days but when wet, it may sag out of shape.

Wool is prized for its ability to feel dry when wet, not retain body odors and adapt to a variety of weather conditions. The best wools are specially treated to be machine washable and dryable.

Acrylic imitates wool in feel but does not absorb moisture. It is quick-drying and light in weight.

Nylon is extremely strong and quick-drying. Thin, sleek "second-skin" action-wear is usually made of nylon and spandex to give extra stretchiness.

Polyester is strong, durable and resilient and has properties that are similar to those of nylon.

Polypropylene is soft, smooth and nonabsorbent; it quickly carries moisture away from the skin surface. It is quick-drying but very sensitive to heat--it cannot be machine dried or ironed.

You are the only one who can choose the best fabric for your needs. If you exercise hard, especially in summer, and feel very warm while doing it, look for a thin, open-weave, lightweight fabric.

If your exercise is more leisurely, takes place at dawn or dusk and often feels fairly cool, look for thicker, spongier fabrics which add warming air spaces in your clothing.

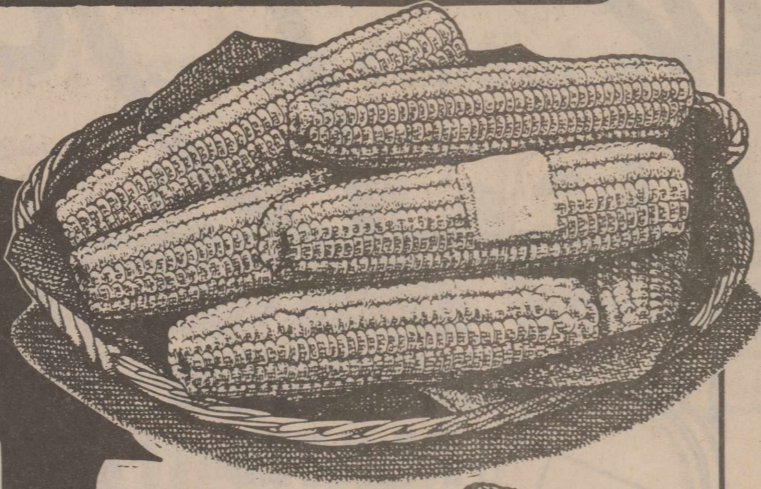

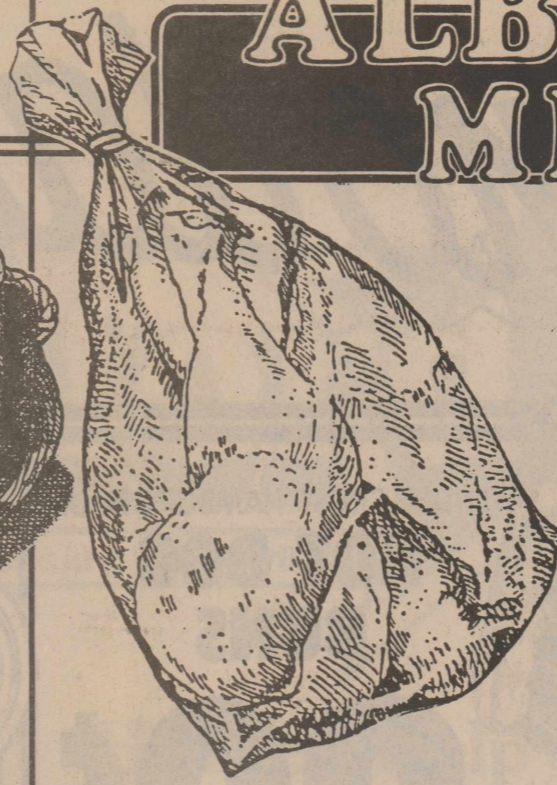

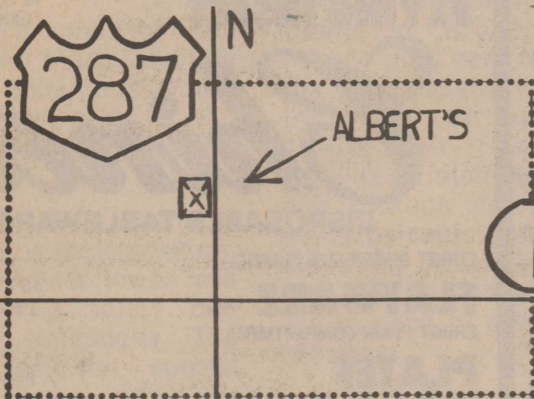
