WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Air Force is encouraging commercial companies program is "a tremendous market that is fito provide mortgage and relocation services nancially stable and offers great volume," to Air Force members similar to those offered employees of private corporations.

"By doing so, we hope to reduce both the turmoil and out-of-pocket expenses for the Air Force member," said Eric Thorson, deputy assistant secretary for Manpower, Resources and Military Personnel.

Merrill Lynch, Century 21 and Travelers are the first to offer relocation packages for members moving to another base. These companies are conducting a test of the concept in the Washington D.C. and Southern California areas starting June 1. The test will run for 90 days and may expand nationwide during that time.

"We expect more companies to particigets out," said Mr. Thorson.

The Air Force is promoting the concept,

said Mr. Thorson.

"Nobody has put together a program where you could reach the entire service at one time and have access to that kind of volume."

Current proposals include prequalification and preapproval of mortgages, lower origination fees, reduced commissions and loan processing fees, consideration of expected spouse income and rental assistance. The companies believe they can save members money in "up-front costs" while reducing inconvenience and out-of-pocket expenses associated with a PCS move.

Tattoo of the South Plains...







Be prepared for spring storms

Now that spring is upon us, we need to be thinking about the spring storms which occur over the South Plains.

The following information is provided for you to help you plan to protect yourself and your loved ones should a spring storm happen near you.

There is a distinct difference between a watch and a warning. A watch, whether it be for a tornado, severe thunderstorm, flash flood or whatever, is issued by the National Weather Service when weather conditions are favorable for development of that particular weather condition.

You should not ignore a watch. Continue with your normal activity, but "watch" weather conditions carefully. In case of a severe thunderstorm, or tornado watch, "watch" for large dark clouds moving toward you.

It is during a watch that each member of the family should know exactly what to do if the weather turns dangerous; whether they are at school, work, or just out and about.

By the time a warning is issued, it may be too late to think of what to do.

A warning means that a particular weather condition is presently occurring and you are being warned. Now is when action to protect oneself is necessary.

A tornado warning means that a tornado has actually been sighted. Listen carefully to the warning for the tornado's location and movement. If the tornado is moving toward you, take cover. If you own a shelter or basement, go to it immediately.

In your home, crouch in an interior hallway, closet, bathroom or under heavy wooden furniture. Do not open windows; in fact, stay away from all windows and doors. Protect yourself from flying debris with a heavy quilt or mattress.

Stay away from buildings with large open areas, such as gymnasiums or auditoriums. If caught in a shopping center, move to a lower portion of the mall and take cover in an interior rest room or small shop. In open country, lie flat in a ditch or depression away from trees and cover your head but be alert for flash flooding. Never try to outrun a tornado in your vehicle. Always evacuate vehicles and mobile homes.


A duststorm warning means considerable blowing dust is occurring or is likely to occur. High winds can be expected and there is a danger of damage to property. Store loose objects that could be blown through

When driving, exercise extreme caution due to sudden wind gusts and reduced visibilities in blowing dirt. Peak winds have been known to exceed 100 mph on the High

A thunderstorm warning means that a severe thunderstorm is moving into your area. Watch for hail, high wind and heavy rain. Take normal precautions to protect yourself, your property and small animals.

Store loose objects that could be blown through windows, such as garbage cans or lawn furniture. Stay away from windows. Avoid using the telephone except in emergencies because of possible shock from lightning that may be associated with the area as you would do if you were standing on

A flash flood warning means rapidly rising water is occurring and that you should away from, open water. move to a place of safety immediately. Protect property if you have time, but don't allow escape routes to be closed by rising



A 10 to 15 foot wall of water moving down a creek bed can carry everything in its

An electrical storm warning—to protect yourself from dangerous lightning, get inside a home or large building, or inside an allmetal vehicle. (Remember that you don't want to be inside a vehicle if a tornado forms.) If you are outside, with no time to reach a safe place, do not stand under a natural lightning rod such as a tall isolated tree in an open area.

Avoid projecting above the surrounding a hill top, in an open field, on a beach, or fishing from a small boat. Get out of, and


Get away from tractors and other metal farm equipment. If you are isolated in level field or prairie and you feel your hair stand on end—indicating lightning is about to strike—drop to your knees and bend forward putting your hands on your knees. Do not lie flat on the ground.

You may survive the storm, but you still could be seriously injured. After the storm, you should be alert for sharp objects such as broken glass, nails and sharp pieces of wood. Also, watch out for downed power lines which could electrocute you. Broken gas lines have also been known to explode due to negligence of smokers, or others who cause a spark.

These safety procedures are not a 100 percent guarantee that you will be safe from injury in these types of weather conditions. They are designed to protect you in a much safer manner than if you just sat around and did nothing to protect yourself.

Seatbelts can save lives

once in your life. Sgt. Conrad Butzer of the 64th Security Police Squadron, used that once on the morning of April 10.

There were no passengers in Sergeant Butzer's car. There was passenger in the Chevrolet. Both Sergeant Butzer and the passenger were wearing seatbelts. The driver of the Chevrolet was not wearing a seatbelt, and had been drinking.

Sergeant Butzer sustained minor injuries to the chest area. The driver of the Chevrolet is still in critical condition. The passenger died eight days after the accident from massive head injuries sustained from the impact.

Lubbock police investigating the accident believe Sergeant Butzer's seatbelt saved his life.

The following quote, from a DOD document, illustrates the need for the Air Force to eliminate sexual harassment in the work environment: "As commanders, supervisors or workers, we must be aware that sexual harassment produces adverse morale trends which impact on mission effectiveness. We cannot avoid this issue any longer, but must learn to understand and recognize it."

What is this sexual harassment phenomenon and what does it mean? It is a complex problem in the work place that is difficult to define and takes many forms. In its most severe form, it is job threatening. In its mildest form, it may merely be an aggravation or a nui-

One form of sexual harassment is unwanted physical contact touching, patting, brushing against an employee's body, even pinch-

Sexual harassment involves verbal abuse—subtle forms of behavior such as remarks about an employee's clothing, body or sexual activities. It involves blatant demands for sexual favors, such as propositions, repeated requests for dates, off-color jokes and sexual

The last form of sexual harassment is nonverbal abuse—leering looks, explicit graphic displays and

These three types of sexual harassment all have the potential for being offensive and should be considered improper. There will always be some form of sexual behavior between men and women on

Revolutionary War outcome is remarkableconsidering

The outcome of the Revolutionary War of 1775-1783 is quite remarkable.

Consider the common soldier.

Great Britain, arguably the greatest military power in the world at the time, fielded a small, but well-equipped, highly-trained, combat-tested, professional army.

The army put together by the colonies equipped itself. The soldiers brought their own weapons with them, and the result was a mishmash of every type of firearm imaginable. By and large, they fought the entire war with such weapons.

For three years, most colonial soldiers were the clothes on their backs into battle. With a few exceptions, such as state regiments from Delaware and Maryland, uniforms were homespun brown or gray hunting shirts, varicolored coats and vests and broadbrimmed hats.

It wasn't until 1778 and the arrival from France of brown and blue coats with red facings that Gen. George Washington's "multitude of people under very little discipline, order or government" could be called a uniformed force in the conventional sense.

America's first fighting men were rank amateurs. These were farmers and merchants, doctors and lawyers, students and teachers, common laborers and ne'er-dowell land owners, not soldiers. Few had ever received any form of military training. Fewer still had actually been in battle, and those in a mere handful of engagements against the French or Indians.

Not that the British had no problems — they did. Commissions in both the infantry and cavalry were bought, producing large numbers of mediocre officers.

The troops themselves were recruited from the worst elements of British society. Often, today's redcoat was yesterday's beggar, thief or worse.

Small wonder the British came to rely heavily on mercenaries to do their fighting for them. More than 30,000 troops from six

different German states were hired and sent to the colonies during the war. The best of these came from Hesse-Cassel, thus the nickname "Hessians."

Uniforms weren't everything either, as the British demonstrated. The redcoats had colored lining, facing and piping, lace trim and brass or pewter buttons, with high, stiff leather collars that restricted head movement. The equally decorative tri-cornered hat was awkward, cumbersome and included neither a brim nor visor to shield the eyes.

For sheer flamboyance, however, the British uniforms paled by comparison to those of the French, who became allied with the colonials in 1778 and joined the fight two years later.

The French cavalry wore light blue jackets trimmed in yellow, yellow breeches, plumed hats and fur-trimmed capes. Each of four infantry regiments had its own distinctive, multicolored uniforms.

Fortunately for the Americans, their French allies were not all glitter. There was gold inside those uniforms, the flower of King Louis XVI's army. And Rochambeau, their commander, was clearly the best French general available.

For soldiers on both sides, the fighting style of the Revolutionary War was decidedly European.

The British and French trained for and excelled at the close-order line of battle. Commanders drew up their battle lines approximately 500 yards from the enemy—just beyond effective artillery range. The assault line formed, dressed in ranks, and marched toward the enemy as if on parade.

Due to the limited, 80-to-100-yard range of the flintlock musket, the principal weapon of the foot soldier, volley firing, loading and firing on command, made up in firepower what it lacked in accuracy.

Firing at a high rate of speed was also vital. Compact, solid masses of troops, advancing across open ground made perfect targets. Consequently, troops were drilled to fire one shot every 15 seconds, or about two effective volleys during an average charge.


