## 21-year-old killed in rollover in **Ballinger**

BALLINGER- A Ballinger woman lost her life in a rollover occurring Monday morning, April 7, 2014, on FM 2111 some 8 miles northwest of Ballinger, Texas. Texas Department of Public Safety identified the victim as Jamie Sue Palmer,

21-years-of-age. According to the initial report Palmer was driving a 2004 Chevro-let Avalanche south on FM 2111. She veered to the right off of the roadway then overcorrected back to the left. The vehicle went into a side skid across FM 2111 and traveled into the east bar ditch.

The truck went over to its right and came to rest facing northwest in the east bar ditch. The accident happened at 12:02 a.m. She was not wearing a seatbelt. The weather was partially cloudy and the road was dry. Speed limit in that stretch of the road is 70 miles per hour.

Palmer was pronounced dead by Runnels County Pct. 2 Justice of the Peace Richard Hamilton at 1 a.m.

## AgriLife releases waterefficient turfgrass

DALLAS - Dwindling water resources caused by drought, extreme temperatures and other environmental factors have made the development of more water-efficient turfgrasses increasingly important for southern landscapes, according to experts at Texas A&M AgriLife Research.

According to national water-use statistics, about one-third of all the water consumed by cities in the southern U.S. is used to irrigate lawns and gardens.

Recently Dr. Ambika Chandra, associate professor of turfgrass breeding and genetics at the center, released a new drought-tolerant St. Augustine grass variety that also resists the major disease and insect pests that commonly attack lawns in the southern U.S.

This new variety is the first hybrid of St. Augustine grass produced by our advanced breeding techniques to be released for the commercial turfgrass industry.'

The new variety, currently identified by its experimental name. DALSA 0605, has shade tolerance and

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# From the Chief's Desk

Animal control adjustments, and beware of 'K-2'

The Winters Police Department currently has an open Police Officer position created by the resignation of Officer Zac Mazey. Officer Mazey has accepted a position with the Clyde Police Department. Due to the vacancy of this position, the Officers of the Winters Police Department are taking measures to fill the gap in our calls. In order to maintain a focus towards the more serious crimes, the Winters Police Department is temporarily suspending the day-to-day animal control calls.

The Winters Police Department is currently accepting applications for the vacant position, and conducting background investigations on prospective candidates, however until this position is refilled, only emergency animal control calls will be responded to.

Emergency animal control calls would consist of bite breaking a person's skin, persons receiving an injury or bite requiring medical attention and dogs considered an immediate danger to the public. Most animal control calls currently responded to are dogs running at large and request for traps to be placed in neighborhoods. Regrettably these calls are being suspended until we are back to full staff. This action does not mean the Winters Police Department plans to just ignore certain violations, or providing disregard for those allowing animals to roam at large, but we are prioritizing the calls as needed.

In other news, The Winters Police Department has seen an increase of illegal drug use by teens. Recently The Winters Police Department has received calls of teens abusing prescription drugs with the teens requiring treatment at the North Runnels County Hospital. More recently officers at the Winters Police Department had the unfortunate opportunity of dealing with a child after consuming an unknown drug believed to have been "K-2," again requiring medical treatment at the hospital.

K-2, also known or referred to as "spice," "legal weed" and a variety of other names has been a common alternative to marijuana and has been gaining in popularity in recent years. The term "legal weed" is very misleading because the substance is far from legal and is far from safe.

More disturbing than these kids using these drugs is the fact, some adult somewhere down the line allowed these drugs to get in the hands of these children. resulting in these children having to receive medical treatment. I would like to believe these kids getting these drugs was merely an act of negligence, however it appears from recent information, someone committed the more despicable act of intentionally giving the drugs to these children.

The Winters Police Department is actively investigating where the drugs originated and how they came to be possessed by these kids, with suspected persons identified. For those persons providing children with these illegal substances, it is our intention to pursue this and other matters as far as possible and file appropriate criminal charges with the District Court.

A Judge and good friend once stated "As long as you participate in the dealing of or use of illegal substances or associate with those choosing to do so, you have to get lucky every day. These officers, they just have to get lucky once.

# Weather Whys

Q: It seems like Texas always has some parts of the state that get snow this time of year. When is usually the last snowfall in Texas?

A: Snow can fall in Texas later than you think, savs Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. The Amarillo area has received about 5 inches of snow several times in the month of May. "The latest snowfall in Texas is believed to have occurred May 6-7 in 1917," McRoberts explains. "That's when over 9 inches of snow fell in the Amarillo and Panhandle areas. The two longest snow seasons have occurred in recent years. The longest was from Sept. 29, 1984, to March 30, 1985, a 183-day period. The most recent one lasted from Nov. 2, 2004 to May 2, 2005, a 182-day period."

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

serving the community. Miles was a booming town by 1908 and the population exceeded 2,500 residents. The city had two banks. three hotels, three lumber

shops, two

livery stables,

Today Miles has several businesses, a newspaper and is host to several events. (Glenda Lacy, Miles Preservation, Runnels County A Look Back, May

July 12, A.D. 1888, the Runnels County Commissioner's Court called a Special Term of the Honorable Court. They met at the court house in the Town of Ballinger. The County Judge, Sylvester Adams, C.H. Willingham,

**County Commissioner** Precinct 1, John McEwen Formwalt, Sheriff and W. L. Towner, County Clerk were all present. The first order was to pay the Fort Worth Publishing Co. for Advertising for an architect for the courthouse to be built for Runnels County. The second order was to pay the Galveston News for advertising for the architect's plans for the courthouse. A group of citizens was appointed by the court to examine the finance ledger of the County Treasurer. They ascertained what the balance should appear in the several funds as \$1,120.56 with the road and bridge over paid so balance should be \$871.19.

The court met at 9 a.m. July 13, according to adjournment and all were present as the day before. The court examined, approved and paid bills. The next order by the court was regarding the plans and specifications to be adopted for the removal of the County Jail from Runnels City to Ballinger and erect it in the Town of Ballinger.

The court ordered that the county convicts be "worked on the public roads of Runnels County and the Sheriff is strictly instructed to carry out this order to its fullest extent." The court decided to advertise again for bids to move the jail according

to plans and specifications on file in the office of the County Clerk. All bids were to be submitted to the court Saturday, August 18, 1888. The court reserved the right to reject any and all bids. The ad would appear in the Ballinger Leader for two issues. The court adjourned. The date of July 29,

1888 was the next special called term of the court. Officers present were all except the Precinct 2 commissioner. The court paid the surveyor for making the survey for the bridge across the Colorado River. July 21, 1888, the court met again, the same officers were present. "The proposition from the Missouri Valley Bridge Company by their agent, L.S. Levereidge to change the location of the county bridge from its present site to the foot of Hutchings Avenue in the Town of Ballinger across the Colorado River as made by said bridge company in their letter of July 9, 1888 addressed to C. H. Willingham be accepted and said letter and the profile of said company have an extension of 30 days for the completion of said bridge from September 1, 1888."

The letter added to the court's minutes read:

Dear Sir. In accordance with your request, I have examined

the proposed lower crossing for the bridge and according to the attached profile; I find that the change will call for 120 feet additional trestle approach and about 80 cubic yards additional masonry amounting in all to Sixteen Hundred Dollars (\$1600.) and the original contract price. I am willing to make the change at the above figures which is actual cost of the work for the reason that I consider the site far preferable to the one originally chosen and much more accessible to the public and also that the erection of the work at the Hutchings Avenue crossing will reflect more credit on us than the site above the Railroad Bridge.

Please wire to me to Dallas what you do.

## Mosquito manual readies for spring

COLLEGE STATION-Professionals tasked with public health protection now have a new resource to help control disease-carrying mosquitoes thanks to a team of Texas entomologists.

"The 66-page 'Texas Mosquito Management' manual is the first ever published on our state's most notorious disease vector," said Dr. Charles Allen of San Angelo. Allen is Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service's entomology program leader, statewide integrated pest management coordinator and associate department head of Texas A&M University's entomology department.

'This manual differs from most of AgriLife Extension's publications in that it's not a casual read for the general public,"Allen said. "It was prompted by the 2012 mosquito-borne West Nile Virus outbreak, which revealed a crucial need for a single-source battle plan that could be easily understood and quickly implemented. The full-color manual is specifically designed to equip city and county public health professionals with the knowledge they need to prevent mosquito outbreaks and respond quickly and effectively to outbreaks that do occur."

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## Advocates, officials, children raise their voice to stop child abuse

BALLINGER- With soarabuse and neglect in Run nels County more than tripling in a year, the Children's Advocacy Center in Tom Green County, Child Protective Services and CASA volunteers raised their voice Friday morning in Ballinger, flying blue pinwheels at the County Courthouse in support of the 48 local victims of child abuse and neglect recorded in 2013.

The pinwheels were displayed by Ballinger Elementary School fifth graders in support of community children.

The event brings awareness to a deeply rooted problem that is affecting the more vulnerable members of our society, children between the ages of newborn and 17. According to Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) in 2013 every eight minutes a child in Texas was the subject of abuse or neglect. A total of 55,398 children, including Runnels County, were confirmed victims of abuse or

Brenda Tyree, one of three CASA volunteers in

Runnels County, said that in 2013 a total of 48 cases of child abuse and neglect were recorded in Runnels County, the figure more than triples the 15 cases recorded in fiscal year 2012. So far, in 2014, there are 16 open cases of child abuse or neglect in this county.

According to CASA, statewide 60 percent of the abused and neglected children are under the age of six-years-old. In 2013, there were 156 child-abuse related fatalities in Texas. All citizens of Runnels

County, community agencies, faith groups, school, government agencies and business were urged to participate in efforts to support families and prevent child abuse. Every-body is also encouraged to wear blue every Friday

during the month of April. CASA, the Children's Advocacy Center, and Child Protective Services also encouraged everyone to report any case of suspected abuse or neglect of a child to local authorities and help to stop this growing misconduct.

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# Four burglaries at Ballinger ISD, suspect nabbed

BALLINGER- The most recent chapter in a string of burglaries at Ballinger ISD campuses took place last week at Ballinger High School and Ballinger Junior High, with back-to-back breaking-ins on Tuesday, April 1, and Wednesday April 2, 2014.

Tuesday night, two suspects broke-in into a classroom and several other locations at Ballinger High School, the pair left behind damages and took nearly \$400 in cash from a filing cabinet. According to Ballinger Police Department, surveillance video shows the burglars breaking into the building, were they spent several hours, and at least one of them event took the time to take a shower.

Wednesday night the burglars broke-in at Ballinger Junior High. Two play stations and two tablets, as well as wireless equipment went missing from the junior high. The play stations and tablets were acquired to be awarded to top students for their 2013-2014 academic achievements.

These burglaries were the most recent in a string of four that took place during the last month. Previously the football stadium and the track field had been burglarized as well. Audio equipment with an estimated value of \$4,000 was taken from the track field.

Ballinger Police Department arrested 26-year-old Mario Esquivel, a Ballinger High School graduate in connection with the burglaries. Esquivel was charged with burglary, possession of marijuana and possession of controlled substances. He was taken to Runnels County Jail.

Ballinger Chief of Police Mark McNulty said that the suspect was identified through his tattoos seen in the video, as well as fingerprints and footprints left at the scene. The wireless transmitter antenna was also recovered.


Ballinger Police Department is still investigating a second person of interest.


Monday morning, Ballinger ISD Superintendent Will Brewer issued a statement thanking city and county officials for their hard work investigating this series of break-ins.
