# Prepare your pets to survive disaster

COLLEGE STATION- Disaster can strike anywhere at any time, and the best way to survive is to be prepared

"Hurricane season begins June 1 and is a great time to review your personal preparedness plan," said Dr. Wesley Bissett, director of the Texas A&M Veterinary Emergency Team. "While you make sure all of your family members are covered in the event of a disaster, make sure the four-legged members of your family are included in the planning process.'

It's important to remember that if you have to evacuate your home, you will often have to do so very quickly. Know ahead of time the route you will take, and identify potential shelter locations along the route. Make sure you know which shelters will accommodate pets, or if there are designated shelters for evacuated animals nearby.

"Plan to carry enough food, water, and medications for your family and your pet for at least three to five days, make sure you have vetermar records and photos of you and your pets, and check that your pet's tags are up to date and securely fastened on the collar," Bissett said. "These documents will help ensure your pet is cared for in the best way possible during a stay at the shelter and will also make the reunification process much easier. If you have time, microchips are a great way to make sure your pet stays safe and sound until you are able to return to the shelter."

Pets can't communicate the anxiety and fear they feel during a disaster, so it's important to watch your pets for signs of anxiety. When evacuating with your pets, have a secure carrier, leash, or harness to keep them from running off in panic.

"Bringing a few items from home, such as a blanket or special toy, will help make your pet comfortable. said Bissett, "and will help to reduce their stress during the evacuation." Some people have livestock or exotic pets that can be problematic to plan for. For this reason, it is necessary to plan early.

# From the Chief's Desk

Stay alert for an accident-free summer

This year has passed by pretty fast so far and here we are suddenly finding ourselves in the summer break. The end of the school year means the local swimming pool is now open, vacation plans are being finalized and we will be seeing our kids enjoying the carefree days of summer.

With the onset of the summer break and many kids having the extra time on their hands we can expect to encounter some of these younger and smaller people riding bikes around town and frequenting the local roadways. The increased activity brings with it increased risks. These risks have already become evident as I have had the opportunity to already witness a child riding a bike on the roadway and as traffic approached from behind, the child veered his bike into the path of the approaching car.

I was unable to identify the driver of the vehicle, but my thanks goes out to them for their being alert and their quick thinking allowing for them to swerve and miss the child. I was able to speak with the child who admitted he never saw or heard the vehicle coming up from behind and didn't think twice about his near disastrous maneuver as he explained he was eating his ice cream while riding home.

The incident was an early reminder of how fast circumstances can turn a pleasurable day into one of our greatest nightmares, the loss or injury to a child.

The law allows for bicycles to be ridden on the street but many times cannot be seen by traffic, resulting in the uneven test of strength between a 40 pound bike and a 2 ton motor vehicle. A great deal of safety responsibility falls upon the driver of any motor vehicle and I ask each person driving to be a little more cautious during these days when our children are out in the public. Having said that, not every driver bears the full responsibility of a child darting out into traffic. No matter how skilled or cautious a driver is, he or she cannot prevent all accidents.

Parents need to also talk to, and teach their children how to be safe while in or near the streets. Children often can be easily distracted and many times do not contemplate the dangers or the consequences of their actions until it's too late. As a child leaves the house, a simple word of encouragement and quick reminder to watch for traffic could mean a big difference. It is a goal of the Winters Police Department to have a great summer with no child getting hurt. With parents providing safety reminders while drivers of motor vehicles exercising caution, both working towards the same goal, our children have a much greater chance of truly enjoying the summer months as kids were intended to.

Please watch for the children and help us keep them

### **Reward increased for most** wanted sex offender

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers are offering a reward for information that leads to the arrest of Jerry Don Holmes, 42, a Texas 10 Most Wanted Sex Offender and this month's featured fugitive. The reward has been increased to \$13,000 if the tip comes in during the month of June.

olmes is wanted for failure to comply with sex of fender registration requirements, assault and bond surrender forfeiture. All tips are guaranteed to be anony-

Holmes, whose last known address was in Pearland, has ties to several Texas cities, including Shepard, Livingston, Pasadena and Houston. He also has ties to several Native American tribes in northeastern Oklahoma near Tulsa and Glenpool. Holmes has been known to work in the boating and trucking industries. His criminal history includes indecency with a child by exposure and assault.

Holmes is 5 feet 9 inches tall and weighs approximately 220 pounds. He has tattoos on his right arm, left leg and left hand; and a scar on his forehead.

One offender from the Texas 10 Most Wanted Program is featured each month in hopes the higher reward money from the Governor's Criminal Justice Division will generate additional tips. The higher reward amount will only be paid if the tip comes in the same month the fugitive is featured. All calls, texts, emails and Facebook tip messages are anonymous.



# Weather Whys

Q: What is the usual amount of time a tornado stays on the ground?

A: Most tornadoes stay on the ground for just a few minutes, but some may last an hour or more, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "With today's technology, we can be very accurate about how long tornadoes are on the ground, and research shows that most tornadoes stay on the ground for less than 10 minutes. It's rare for one to stay on the ground for more than 10 to 20 miles," he says. "Perhaps the greatest example of a tornado staying on the ground for a long period of time was the famous Tri-State tornado of March 1925. It stayed on roughly the same path for an amazing 219 miles, from southeast Missouri, crossing over Illinois and finally ending in Indiana. Some reports have it on the ground for more than 7 hours. The tornado was estimated to kill-

ing 695 people and destroying over 15,000 homes."

# Rainwater harvesting 'soaking in' to conserve water resources

**COLLEGE STATION --**After a long dry period, many parts of the state have finally received some badly needed rain, and those with rainwater harvesting systems have been reaping the rewards of this belated gift from Mother Nature, said Texas A&M AgriLife water re-

sources experts. "Rainwater harvesting is a time-tested and effective means of water conservation and irrigation," said Billy Kniffen, retired Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service statewide water resource specialist and past director of the American Rainwater Catchment Association. "And with drought affecting much of Texas, interest in rainwater harvesting from industry, various levels of government and homeowners is increasing. People in general are becoming more receptive to implementing these practices."

As a long-time AgriLife

Extension agent and specialist. Kniffen has been involved in the planning, design and/or implementation of dozens of largeand small-scale rainwater catchment systems for offices, schools, community centers, libraries, hospitals and other facilities throughout Texas. Several of his many projects have been in his home county of Menard, with one notable example being the Menard Public Library.

Kniffen, along with Texas Master Gardener and Texas Master Naturalist volunteers, helped install a 2,500-gallon galvanized tank that collects water from the roof of the library. They also installed drip irrigation and constructed a rain garden to capture water runoff from the building.

"One inch of rainwater dripping from a 1,500-square-foot roof can easily catch 600 gallons of water," Kniffen noted. "At the library, the library the library the ing tank collects rainwater from two downspouts, and the water is used to irrigate more than 50 plots of native plants common to the region. Runoff goes into a shallow, flat bottom pond that would catch a twoinch rainfall event and have it infiltrated into the soil within 24 hours. Rainfall over that amount would overflow into an

irrigation ditch." Another section of the library captured water using a "storm chamber" that stores and gradually releases water into the surrounding landscape.

"For years, AgriLife Extension and Texas A&M AgriLife Research personnel have been involved with rainwater harvesting projects, demonstrations and education through-out the state," said John Smith, AgriLife Extension program specialist, College Station.



### THE IDLE AMERICAN Davidson College's 'Washday Blues?'...

When one of the nation's most prestigious higher education institutions announces a policy change — however slight — it can produce near seismic

results — in the eyes of beholders, anyway. "Beholding," in this case, are faculty, students and alumni of Davidson College. Who knows what may break loose?

**Buildings** may quake, forcing ivy to seek new places to climb. The tradition of 90 years is entrenched, but Dr. Carol Quillen

 completing two years in the presidency after 20 years' teaching/administrative posts at Rice University — has announced closure of the campus laundry next spring.

She may "batten down" hatches, or maybe not....

At first blush, it seems a "ho-hum" decision, but it will save \$400,000 annually. Savings are more than needed for additional self-serve machines planned for residence halls throughout the campus in Davidson, NC.

Davidson — an all-male school founded in 1837 that became co-ed in the mid-70s — has long been considered one of the nation's best. Acceptance for enrollment is highly competitive, and graduates (including President Woodrow Wilson) have distinguished themselves in numerous fields. Endowment now exceeds \$500 million, and in 2012 Davidson received a record single gift — \$45 million — from Duke Endowment.

Back to the laundry's 1911 beginnings.. Faculty complained that students — sometimes heading straight to class from work in the fields brought with them malodorous air. (Arrid deodorant wasn't yet around, so there were no "half safe" warnings. Hmmm, students may have seen this as a trick to introduce fractions.)...

Faculty called for construction of a campus laundry, where workers would wash, press, fold and package students'

soiled laundry.
The administration responded — albeit a decade later — and a tradition was born. Students were happy, and faculty was hap-pier. (As a former college president, I'm hesitant to say faculty is "hap-piest" about anything.) Students and workers cheerfully mingle, per-haps singing "happy little washday songs." Over the years, the college's "free" laundry service became a quirky, but effective "selling point" for prospective students, and a cherished tradition for those enrolled.

In fact, Davidson honored Lula Bell Houston who toiled in the laundry for 57 years — by naming it in her honor when she

retired in 2004. She is one of two former staffers whose names adorn buildings at Davidson. The structure will be converted to other uses, but the name remains....



doing so. Female students prefer doing their own laundry, and senior guys — opting for several "wearings" between washes - eschew

carrying their weighty bags uphill to the laundry. A handful of students in off-campus apartments have other issues — like convincing parents they are eating properly. One mom called, reminding her son to eat something green every day. "Relax, mom," he replied, "I ate some toast just this

Alumni, generally, are "tongue-in-cheek." Larry Dagenhart, proud graduate, respected attorney and Class of '53 valedictorian, moved his cheeklanguishing tongue to its "upright and locked position" for comment.

morning."...

Surprised, he responded, "We gave up vespers, we gave up chapel, we went co-ed, we even gave up the marching band, but dad-gum-it, we can't give up the laundry. What is the world coming to?"

It's a given that college students are wearing fewer clothes these days, a/c has come along, and deodorants are both dependable and handy....

We've learned to exist without trading stamps, and Davidson students will "press on," even if the laundry doesn't. Davidson is aligning its resources to meet educational priorities within higher education's changing landscape.

For now, though, reporters and headline writers are feasting on the item. Imagine headline possibilities: Davidson: Comes Clean, Scrubs Laundry, Hangs Students Out to Dry, Washday Blues and Airs Dirty Laundry. (Students will rub their own dubs, hopefully keeping cleanliness and godliness

in the same yoke.) Hurrah for Davidson College's rich history of preparing students for whatever comes next. I'd love to meet Lula Bell Houston, who may feel drip/dry and permanent press have taken things too far. Me, I don't know whether to wash or hang


