Keeping the momentum

Winters Blizzards defeat Munday to claim the Area Championship

WINTERS- A solid defense and a steady offense took the Winters Blizzards into the next round of the playoffs, by defeating the Munday Moguls on Friday, November 21, 2014 by a score of 26-13. Winters claimed the Area Championship at the game held at Indian Stadium, in Tuscola, Texas.

The Blizzards will be facing the Albany Lions on Friday, November 28 at Clyde, Texas. Kickoff is scheduled at 2 p.m.

"It wasn't easy, they were a good team and it was a hard fought game, fortunately we were able to get ahead and keep the pressure on them, we are very pleased to get to this point and to play on Thanksgiving, which was one of our goals," said Winters High School Head Football Coach Stan Caffey.

The defense played a big role in the victory, stopping a fast offense and allowing no points for the first three quarters.

"At the start of the year we wanted to play a better defense, and we have accomplished that goal, it came big for us time after time, we are very proud of them," Caffey added.

For quarterback Jimmy John Ripley claiming the Area Championship represents a big turnaround, after a tough couple of seasons.

"Our team is making history, coming off the past two years, we are just clicking together, we are turning heads and having people in our favor now... We were picked to loose, so we just took that into the game, we stepped up a notch and got the job

done," Ripley said. The senior quarterback

said that the head coach has played a big part in turning this team around, with leadership and by bringing the players together.

Senior Ethan Bredemeyer said that preparation for the game and a strong defense helped Winters to claim the area trophy.

"Munday is a fast team, last week we knew we had to get ready for Baird or Munday, but we had a feel for Munday, our defense had to stop them and that's what happened. Their quarterback, runningback and wide receiver were a threeheaded monster. We knew we had an advantage in the trenches, offensive line and defensive line did a great job," Brede-

meyer said. Senior kicker and receiver Luke Kraatz said the feeling of defeating a great team such as Munday is big, and represents the turning point for a team that struggled to get results during the past two seasons.

"It feels good to get an Area Championship after these past two years, it's really nice to be able to win against a good team like Munday," Kraatz said.

"It's a great thing that this happening in my senior year, going 2-8 last year really changed us, and going 10-1 so far is a good feeling. Albany is a pretty good team, should be a good game and hopefully we can win it," he added.

Jimmy John Ripley passed for 5 of 10 for a total of 119 yards and one touchdown. Receiving Lukas Kraatz captured a 30 yard touchdown pass. Stephon Cleghorn had two for 20 yards, Jake Brock caught one for 38 yards, and Daryl Hagle had one pass for 31 yards.

Rushing Ripley tallied 73 yards in 18 carries and one touchdown, Michael Chavis had 22 yards in 11 carries and one visit to the end zone, while

DPS urges **Texans** to drive responsibly

AUSTIN- The Texas Department of Public Safety is urging Texans to drive responsibly and take extra precautions to help keep roadways safe during the heavily travelled Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

"Unique challenges - including increased traffic, possible winter weather and impaired driving - can make holiday travel particularly challenging and potentially dangerous," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "DPS troopers will be working aroundthe-clock to protect travelers on our road-ways, and drivers must do their part and always drive sober.'

DPS troopers will be patrolling Texas roadways throughout the holiday weekend to promote safety and identify dangerous drivers.

During the Thanksgiving weekend in 2013, DPS troopers arrested 387 individuals for driving while intoxicated, issued 6,848 speeding citations, 804 citations for no insurance and 704 seat belt/ child safety seat citations. DPS patrols also resulted in 244 fugitive arrests and 187 felony arrests during the same time period.

DPS offers the following tips for safe travel during the Thanksgiving holiday:

Don't drink and drive. Designate a driver or take a cab.

Slow down - especially in bad weather, construction areas and heavy traffic.

Eliminate distractions, including the use of mobile devices.

Buckle up everyone in the vehicle - it's the law. Slow down or move over for police, fire, EMS and Texas Department of Transportation vehicles and tow trucks that are stopped on the side of the road with

emergency lights activated – it's the law. Don't drive fatigued get plenty of rest before trips or take breaks as needed.


Drive defensively, as holiday travel may present additional challenges.



Study trumpets State parks' economic benefit

AUSTIN- The Texas State Park system's more than 90 sites have a significant economic impact on the state's economy, generating \$774 million in retail sales annually, contributing \$351 million in economic benefits and creating 5,800 jobs statewide. Those were just part of the findings of a recent Texas A&M University study shared with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The commission was briefed on the results of a survey of park visitors and their spending habits conducted between March and June of this year by a team led by Dr. John Crompton, a distinguished A&M professor in the Recreation, Parks and Tourism Sciences Department. According to Dr. Crompton, Texas state parks not only provide conservation, recreational and health benefits, but

also greatly contribute to the economies of communities throughout Texas, far exceeding the state's expenditures to operate these sites.

"The take-away message from this study," Dr. Crompton says, "should be that the state park system is an important contributor to the Texas economy, particularly in rural areas and that the state's net investment in parks is returned many times over as visitors travel to enjoy the outdoors and leave their dollars behind."

To generate data for the study, almost 14,000 visitors at 30 state parks were polled between March and June of 2014 about their spending on fees, groceries, restaurant meals and equipment during their travel to the park and in close proximity to the park. The results were then extrapolated to apply to 60 additional parks using strict study methodology.

The results show that the purchases made by park visitors result in greater wealth and employment in communities located near state parks. For example, spending by Bastrop State Park visitors added nearly \$1.7 million to the Bastrop County economy and led to the creation of 35.6 jobs. Similarly, in the Panhandle, Palo Duro Canyon visitors added more than \$3.7 million to the coffers of Armstrong and Randall counties that supported 86 jobs in the local area. Even remote Big Bend Ranch State Park in far West Texas contributed significant economic benefits to Presidio County by adding \$1.9 million in sales and

roughly 27 jobs. Texas State Parks Director Brent Leisure says the A&M findings confirm the ongoing value of the Texas State Park system.

"We've long known that state parks are places that preserve the best of our

state's scenic wonders, historic sites and recreational venues," Leisure said. "This report shows that park visitors not only take home wonderful memories and enriched lives, but that the dollars they leave behind lead to jobs and higher incomes in local communi-

The study further revealed that state park spending increased all Texans' income by \$202 million and generated 5,871 jobs paying an average annual salary of \$34,000.

Local economic impacts varied by park, depending on the number of visitors and their spending habits. Some of the findings: Balmorhea -- \$2.3 million in value added; 50.3 jobs Cedar Hill -- \$3.1 million in value added; 41.7 jobs Garner -- \$6.9 million in value added; 16.1 jobs McKinney Falls -- \$883,146 in value added; 16.1 jobs Pedernales Falls -- \$1.7 million in value added; 41.1

Seniors are popular among scammers

The bad guys think the elderly have significant access to money. They may have gotten that wrong but, nevertheless, the scammers view seniors as easy targets, according to the Association of Mature American Citizens.

It's gotten so bad, says AMAC, that the National Council on Aging has posted a warning on its Web site listing the "Top 10 Scams Targeting Seniors." They include Medicare

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fraud where they pose as representatives of the agency to steal personal information. Another favorite is foisting counterfeit drugs on them via phony Internet pharmacies.

Robbie the robot, move over We may have robots to take care of us in the notso-distant future.

Louise Aronson, an associate professor of geriatrics at the University of California at San Francisco, recently made the case for automatons as care-givers

in a New York Times Op Ed article. She noted that researchers around the world are developing computerbased practitioners.

"The biggest argument for robot caregivers is that we need them. We do not have anywhere near enough human caregivers for the growing number of older Americans." It'll be some time, if ever, for android nurses to be accepted, but in the meantime the quest goes on. In Japan, they are building robots that can provide basic nursing chores. In Europe, they are developing a machine that has human features.

Q: Sometimes you hear the weather forecaster refer to "Virga." What is it?

A: Virga is a common weather feature, says John Nielsen-Gammon of Texas A&M University. It refers to rain or snow that forms a wispy streak beneath a cloud and appears not to be reaching the ground. "Most of the virga people see today is usually composed of snow, since snow is so much brighter and easier to see than rain," Nielsen-Gammon explains. "Even in the warm days of summer, the virga coming from the tall anvil-shaped thunderstorms is most likely snow, forming in the frigid temperatures 5-10 miles above the ground. Virga can also come from the base of a thunderstorm and other types of clouds, and it can be mistaken for a tornado at a distance because of its V-shaped appearance.

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
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Initiative extends funding for border protection

AUSTIN- Having established a state-based model for increased border security, Texas leaders have reached an agreement to extend the ongoing law enforcement surge through the end of the current fiscal year.

Signed by the governor, lieutenant governor and speaker, the budget execution will marshal resources from a variety of state sources to enhance the state's efforts to secure the border region.

Effective December 1 through August 2015, the funding agreement would transfer FY15 funding to extend the presence of personnel from the Texas Department of Public Safety,

Texas Military Forces and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department along the border. The agreement is subject to approval by the Legislative Budget Board at its December 1 meeting.

"Texas has proven beyond any doubt that this border can be secured, even if the federal government refuses to take the steps necessary to do so as required by the Constitution," Gov. Rick Perry said. "This agreement will ensure the hardworking men and women from DPS, the Texas National Guard and Texas Parks and Wildlife, who have been working with local and federal partners, have the resources they need to maintain a robust law enforcement presence along

the border until the Legislature can act.

The agreement authorizes DPS to implement 10-hour shifts for its commissioned officers, which will immediately increase the department's patrol coverage along the border. This authorization will increase the statewide full-time-equivalent count by more than 650.

"Having spent the last eight years appropriating more than \$800 million for border security, I am proud to see the effectiveness of Operation Strong Safety and believe its continuation is essential to the safety of all Texans. I am very pleased to have reached the consensus needed to extend border surge

operations through the end of next August," Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst said. "In the absence of sufficient action from the federal government, the state of Texas has proven it is possible to secure the border, reduce crime, and combat the impacts of illegal immigration. This agreement proves Texas is serious about border security.

Funds for DPS would include the addition of new shallowwater boats and other technological capabilities, which would be used to extend tactical capabilities as well as the surge footprint beyond the Rio Grande Valley Sector.

"This approach provides an important bridge to the 2015

legislative session," House Speaker Joe Straus said. "The state's law enforcement agencies will have the tools and technology they need to continue an enhanced presence on the border. Meanwhile, this funding will allow members of the next Legislature to evaluate the state's border security strategy during the session and make adjustments if necessary.'

The \$86.1 million needed to fund this initiative will be provided by: \$13.7 million from the Disaster Funds, \$47.9 million - TxDOT General Revenue Bond Debt Service, \$17.5 million - TPFA Bond Debt Service, and \$7 million - Emerging Technol-

ogy Fund.

FSA microloans cap grows to \$50,000

COLLEGE STATION- Texas Farm Service Agency State Executive Director Judith A. Canales reminded farmers and ranchers that the FSA borrowing limit for micro loans increased from \$35,000 to \$50,000, effective November 7, 2014. Microloans offer borrowers simplified lending with less paperwork.

Canales said it makes borrowing from FSA a "first opportunity" to farm or ranch or quickly expand existing opera-

"This will help more people because of new flexibilities created by the 2014 Farm Bill," Canales said. "We"re especially excited in Texas, because we want to encourage more beginners and young people, especially those from historically underserved communities, to consider farming and ranching as a way to become independent businessmen and women. It's a rewarding way to build or expand a family operation.

The microloan change allows beginning, small and mid-sized farmers to access an additional \$15,000 in loans using a simplified application process with up to seven years to repay. Microloans are part of USDA's continued commitment to small and midsized

To complement the microloan program additional changes to FSA eligibility requirements will enhance beginning farmers and ranchers access to land, a key barrier to entry level producers.

FSA policies related to farm experience have changed so that other types of skills may be considered to meet the direct farming experience required for farm ownership loan eligibility

Operation or management of non-farm businesses, leadership positions while serving in the military or advanced education in an agricultural field will now count towards the experience applicants need to show when applying for farm ownership loans.

"If you want to comment on our changes to the microloan and loan eligibility, you have an opportunity to share suggestions," Canales said. The comment period runs through Dec. 8, 2014.

Since 2010, FSA has made a record amount of farm loans - more than 165,000 loans totaling nearly \$23 billion. More than 50 percent of USDA's farm loans now go to beginning farmers. In addition, FSA has increased its lending to socially-disadvantaged producers by nearly 50 percent since 2010.

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
